### **NTC Welcomes 3rd ACR**

Troopers of the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment out of Fort Hood, Texas, began flowing into the National Training Center on May 8 for a Training Rotation 10-07 in preparation for deployment to Iraq later this year. The Regiment will focus their training efforts on advising and assisting Iraqi Security Forces to prepare itself for a role in responsibly transitioning authority to the Iraqi government. The new training will be in sharp contrast to previous training that was primarily geared toward full spectrum combat operations, a concept which is consistently winding down in Iraq. Troopers throughout the regiment will train to advise and assist the ISF, aiding in their assumption of both civil and political governance. "The Regiment is preparing itself for the current climate in Iraq," said Col. Reginald E. Allen, regimental commander. "I believe that our training and invaluable experience will lead to a successful partnership by, with, and through the Iraqi government."

# Personal Security unit trains to protect

One of the biggest blows an enemy can inflict on U.S. Armed Forces is to hurt or kill an American commander.

"It's great propaganda for the enemy should one of [the command] get hurt," said 1st Lt. Alayham M. Al-Awaj, a platoon leader with the Regimental Personal Security Detachment, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment.

To reduce the threat, 3rd ACR developed a RPSD to protect their command element.

"We want to ensure they don't become targets of opportunity," Al-Awaj, a Lincoln, Neb., native said when referring to the regimental command element.

"You have to have senior leadership or there is chaos on the battlefield," said Sgt. 1st Class Tobby Bailey, a native of Greensburg Ky., RPSD, 3rd ACR platoon sergeant.

Four months ago, 3rd ACR started building up and training its RPSD, and now the element's strength has reached approximately 40 Soldiers plus the command element.

The main part of the command element consists of the regimental commander, the regimental command sergeant major and the regimental executive officer.

RPSD trains to provide 360-degree security wherever the command group travels, said Spc. Michael Dinwiddie, a gunner with RPSD, 3rd ACR.

"Wherever they go, we go," said Dinwiddie, a Kansas City, Mo., native.

Training started at their home base of Fort Hood, Texas, with firing ranges and specialty classes that focus on protecting the command group.

Now that they have moved out to the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, Calif., they continue to train and prepare for their upcoming deployment.

The focus for the RPSD at NTC will be to integrate the standard operating procedures they developed in garrison, and put them to the test in real world combat simulations.

"This is our first opportunity to sit down with the command group as opposed to gar-

### **Lead 6 Sends**

Be safe, enjoy leave, come back ready

They say that time flies when you're having fun. I'm not sure who "they" are, but I must be having a blast because this past year sure did go by quickly. Here we are just beginning Rotation 10-07 and block leave is less than a month away. And while you can't really tell by the weather that we've all been experiencing lately, summer is bound to be here soon ... I hope.

With summer around the corner and all the typical things that go along with it, I have to use this opportunity to talk to you all about safety. Now I know that leaders across this installation talk

safety at every opportunity, so take this as an additional reminder that there are increased risks associated with summertime activities.

Last year, in this same column, I urged everyone to apply common sense to their summertime activities. Realizing that common sense isn't always common, I'll use that same mantra this year ... USE COMMON SENSE! Please. It really won't take much effort for us all to have a safe summer if we use common sense, and apply just a little thought to what we're doing — before we do it.

Privately owned vehicle (POV) and privately owned motorcycle (POM) accidents continue to be a great threat to us all. Our remote location contributes to the risk our Soldiers, family members and civilian employees experience when leaving and returning to post. Simple things such as speeding, driving while fatigued, seat belts, cell phones (without a hands free device) and driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs can not only ruin your day, but could result in death or serious injury to

you or a loved one. Motorcycle riders — your skills are perishable. By all means don't jump on your bike for the first time this season and ride like there's no tomorrow ... there may not be. Wear your personal protective equipment (PPE) to include bright clothing during the day and reflective garments during limited visibility. Don't assume that motorists see you ... they usually do not.

Water sports such as swimming, waterskiing, and boating bring additional risks of drowning and other injuries. Watch out for your loved ones and each other while you're having fun and know and understand the dangers involved in these activities. Again, think and apply common sense while enjoying these activities. Know that water and alcohol don't mix. Consuming alcohol and participating in water activities is extremely dangerous and can be deadly. Don't mix the two!

Why is it that we're all so aware of the dangers associated with high temperatures while we're training during a rotation, but often forget to apply the same principals while off-duty? Clearly the knowledge is there ... ensure you are hydrated and use sunscreen when participating in outdoor activities. Remember that prior heat injury predisposes you to a future heat injury.

I've said many times that our people are our greatest resource. Clearly, without our Soldiers, family members, DA civilian employees and contract employees, our mission would be degraded, and we, the Fort Irwin military community, would not contribute what we do to our rotational units or our Army. It takes all of us to do that.

Enjoy your summer, take block leave, apply common sense and think about what you're doing so that we all make it home safely.

# Remembering why we have Memorial Day

Here is some really cool information that you might enjoy! On the 5th of May 1868 as commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Gen. John A. Logan established Memorial Day, or Decoration Day, as it has been also called, as a nationwide observance. Two years later, in May of 1870, at the now famous Arlington Cemetery, Gen. Logan uttered "Let us revive our patriotism and love of country by this act, and strengthen our loyalty by the example of the noble dead around us..." His historic "General Order Number 11" established the practice of decorating veterans' graves all over the United States. At that same time, Gen. Logan named this special day as National Memorial Day, and it was to be celebrated on May 30 of each year.

Now what? Well, you should know the Ladies' Memorial Association started the ball rolling on a Memorial Day due to the Battle of June 9, 1864. The ladies wanted "to devise a means to perpetuate their gratitude and admiration for those who died defending homes and loved ones." After World War I, Memorial Day was extended to include all men and women, who died in any war or military action. After World War II, Memorial Day used to be held on May 30, regardless of the day of the week, on which it fell. Then, in 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed as part of a move to use federal holidays to create three-day weekends.

Wow, they must have thought about us by creating three-day weekends.

Seriously, though, this is a day where many people and States observe the holiday. People visit cemeteries and memorials on Memorial Day, and it is traditionally seen as the start of the summer season. Many of our families throughout the United States hold picnics, sporting events, and family gatherings. All non-essential Government offices are closed, as are schools, businesses and other organizations. It is truly a time to respect those who have died in military service for the United States.

I ask that we each reflect on the values of serving one's Nation and ask ourselves one question: "Who would value our lives above their own?" You will clearly see that our American way of life often call us to duty when the war or wars are unpopular. Nevertheless, it is our Nation and for those of us who continue to serve or have served before them ... we still love what we stand for and who we are defending.

Take time out during this three-day holiday to honor those who have served before us and who have honored us with their own blood. It is important we continue to remember the purpose of Memorial Day. Also, "Thank you" to those who are still serving in harm's way. It is a very important and honorable mission to protect America from terrorists, both domestic and abroad. A sincere "Thank you" goes out to family members who endure the loss of their loved ones throughout time. The losses are hard to handle sometimes, but there is no more of an honorable calling than serving one's country. Have the picnics and family gatherings, but reach out to those less fortunate than us who have served and are still here to talk about their service.


MEMORANDUM FOR All Soldiers, Civilians and Family Members of United States Army Forces Command

# **Memorial Day 2010**



Memorial Day, which falls on the last Monday of May, commemorates the men and women who died while serving in the American military. Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, at least, it marks the beginning of summer.

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

# ACAP successfully transitions Soldiers, families



The Army Career and Alumni Program (ACAP) is a transition service to assist service members and their family members when they are transitioning out of the Army.

ACAP services include:

- Pre-Separation Counseling
- VA Benefits Briefing
- VA Claims Filing
- Transition Assistance Program (TAP) Workshop
- Individual Transition Planning
- Resume Assistance and Cover Letter Assistance
- Disabled American Veteran (DAV) Medical Records Review
- Disabled Transition Assistance Program (DTAP)
- Job Fairs

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It is important that leaders give their Soldiers time to attend ACAP.

Regardless of rank or type of discharge, Soldiers must receive a Pre-Separation Briefing at least 90 days prior to retiring or separating (ETSing) from the military.

ACAP rules and regulations does allow retiring service members to start ACAPing at least 24 months from their retirement date and those just separating to start 12 months out.

What happens when Soldiers are encouraged to ACAP early is that they have time to meet their military obligations and they also have time to:

- Receive VA benefits information
- Obtain Disabled American Veterans (DAV) information
- Get Disabled Transition Assistance Program (DTAP) information

- Work on their civilian and Federal resume
  - Acquire job search skills and information
  - Receive transitional counseling

The post's transition services manager believes ACAP is important for both the Soldier and the Army.

"Timeliness lowers unemployment rate and informs Soldiers of their benefits before it's too late or after the fact," said Mfon Umoren. "There are many opportunities for Soldiers getting out of the Army. Unfortunately, due to various reasons, many Soldiers do not receive the information they need to transition out of the military."

"The Army pays more than \$100 million in unemployment benefits to service members every quarter (every three months). We at ACAP believe we can decrease this if the transition process is started early," he added.

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# Motorcycle driving, alcohol is deadly mix

In the last 20 years, the legal system has created serious conse-

quences for anyone driving under the influence of alcohol. However, the idea of driving a motorcycle under the influence is even more dangerous for a number of reasons.

First, it's more

deadly. Riders do not have the advantage and security of a metal cage a vehicle offers in the event of a crash. In fact, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (2003), motorcyclists are about 26 times as likely to die in a traffic accident. It's

clear why, it's the reason you love to ride, no restriction, open road. But there is also no air bags, no safety features, and there is open concrete with vehicles all around you.

Second, motorcyclists are more

likely to be intoxicated than any other driver, the highest of any type of vehicle. Statistically, motorcyclists had the highest rate of alcohol use among all vehicle types in

crashes, with motorcycles counting 37 percent, next to passenger cars at 27 percent, and sport utility vehicles at 27 percent.

Lastly, operating a motorcycle requires much more coordination than driving a passenger vehicle.

Your reflexes are slowed, your vision is impaired, and you are less coordinated when under the influence of alcohol

For all of the efforts of law enforcement, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and motorcycle groups themselves are persuaded to lower the incidence of riding while under the influence.

Additional efforts are being made to reduce the number of accidents related to riding and alcohol use. This includes making people aware of the risks and having them take responsibility for themselves and others on the road.

rison operations to perfect our procedures prior to deployment," said Al-Awaj.

After NTC, they'll have a limited amount of time before their deployment, but the RPSD is still going to send Soldiers to the International Training Institute in Dilley, Texas, where they will receive additional training on the protection of the command group.

"I love all the training we get," said Dinwiddie. "If you're

going to be working outside of your (military occupation specialty), this is the position to be in." Dinwiddie is an armored crewman by trade.

Al-Away said the RPSD is made up of six different military occupational specialties to include: armored crewman, cavalry scouts, combat engineers, health care specialists, wheeled mechanics and one systems support specialist.

The variety of skill sets allows the unit to handle most

issues with equipment and personnel without help from outside the detachment.

'We are made to be a self-sustaining platoon," said Al-Awaj.

Soldiers weren't selected for their occupational capabilities alone, but for prior experience and recommendations from leadership within 3rd ACR.

"You have to be hand picked to be a part of this," said Bailey. "It's an honor to be picked."

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
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
