Marine Corps Base Hawaii Change of Command

Beaven during a Change of Command Ceremony, May 25, 2023. Maj. Gen. Stephen E. Liszewski, Commanding General of Marine Corps Installations Pacific. presided over the ceremony and was one of several distinguished visitors in attendance including: Honolulu Mayor Rick Blangiardi, Hawaii State Sen. Jeremy Keohokalole and Sen. Chris Lee, Hawaii State Rep. Natalia Hussey-Burdick and Rep. Lisa Marten, General and senior officers from the various

commands across Hawaii, city council and community leaders. "The Marine Corps is modernizing itself, to get ready for future challenges and to get ready to beat the pacing threat that is on the other side of the Pacific," said Maj. Gen. Liszewski "The capabilities you see here [KC-130J aircraft and MQ-9A remotely piloted aircraft1...these new capabilities are here in Hawaii and have been brought by the Marine Corps in part because of the hard work of Col. U.S. Marine Corps deactivates 1st Battalion, 12th Marines

MARINE CORPS BASE HAWAII -1st Battalion, 12th Marines cased its colors during the unit's deactivation ceremony at Marine Corps Base Hawaii, May 26, 2023.

1st Battalion, 12th Marines activated on Sept. 1, 1942, as 4th Battalion, 12th Marines at Camp Elliot, California, as an artillery regiment in support of 3d Marine Division. After participating in a number of World War II campaigns, to include battles at Bougainville, Guam, and Iwo Jima, 1/12 underwent a brief period of deactivation before reactivating in support of the Far East Command's maintenance of amphibious readiness capabilities during the Korean War.

The Marines of 1/12 saw the Vietnam War unfold from April 1965 to September 1969 while operating from their positions at Phu Bai, Da Nang, Cam Lo, Khe Sanh, and Camp Carroll. As U.S. forces kicked off the major raid

known as Operation Thor on June 1, 1968, 1/12 enabled the regaining of control of the Demilitarized Zone through the provision of fire support and conduct of artillery raids.



In June 1971, at the conclusion of the Vietnam War, the Marines of 1/12 reported to Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, where they have since been permanently stationed. In September 1994, after the battalion's successful participation in operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, 1/12 was reassigned to the 3d Marine Division as a part of III Marine Expeditionary Force. From August 2004 to November 2011, 1/12

participated in the Global War on Terror, deploying in support of operations Iragi Freedom and Enduring Freedom. One such deployment to Al Anbar Province, Iraq, was under the command of now Maj. Gen. Stephen Liszewski, who served as 1/12's battalion commander from 2006 to 2008, and is now the commanding general of Marine Corps Installations Pacific.

In recent years, 1/12 has been at the forefront of institutional change, leading the practical application of expeditionary advanced basing operations, experimentation with foraging concepts, and the employment of next-generation weapons systems.

VMU-3 Received its first two MQ-9As



MARINE CORPS BASE HAWAII -U.S. Marine Corps Marine Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Squadron (VMU) 3, Marine Aircraft Group 24, received its first two MQ-9As on April 27, 2023.

The MQ-9A is a remotely piloted aircraft capable of supporting a wide range of operations such as coastal and border surveillance, weapons tracking, embargo enforcement, humanitarian and disaster assistance, support of peacekeeping and counternarcotic operations. VMU-3 supports the Marine Air-Ground Task Force by providing multi-surveillance and

reconnaissance, data gateway and

relay capabilities through an aerial layer, and enabling or conducting the detection and cross cueing of targets and facilitating their engagement during expeditionary, joint and combined operations.

To meet combatant commanders' requirements in the Indo-Pacific region, VMU-3 will conduct maritime domain awareness, airborne early warning, airborne network extension, and electronic



The MQ-9 delivers tailored capabilities using mission kits containing various sensor combinations. The MQ-9 baseline system carries a robust suite of



visual sensors for intelligence gathering, surveillance and reconnaissance. The baseline components include infrared sensor, color, monochrome daylight TV camera, shortwave infrared camera, laser designator, and laser illuminator.

Since the arrival of the aircraft, VMU-3 has worked tirelessly to assemble the aircraft and begin the safety certification process. The aircraft made their first public appearance on May 26, 2023 at the MCBH change of command ceremony.
