MEDDAC holds change of command

United States Army Medical Department Activity held its change of command ceremony, with Col. Judith Bock relinquishing command to Col. Michael Kiefer, at the parade field, June 4. Maj. Gen. Philip Volpe, commanding general, Western Regional Medical Command, handed over the guidon from Bock to Kiefer, officially handing over the command to the new commander

Col. Kiefer entered the U.S. Army in 1986 and served five and a half years at Fort Ord in various positions including medical platoon leader for 5th Battalion, 21st Infantry, 7th Infantry Division (Light) where he was deployed to the Sinai Peninsula in Egypt as part of the Multinational Forces and Observers monitoring the provision of the Camp David Accords. Col. Kiefer was an administrative branch chief in the Clinical Support Division, and company commander at Silas B. Hayes Army Community Hospital, Fort Ord, Calif. After attending the Army Medical Department's Officer Advanced Course at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, he attended graduate school.

Col. Kiefer completed the didactic phase of the U.S. Army-Baylor University Graduate Program in Healthcare Administration in 1993, and performed his administrative residency at Tripler Army Medical Center in Honolulu, Hawaii. After completing residency, Kiefer spent the next yeas the Administrator, Department of Surgery at Tripler. He was reassigned as the executive officer at the 43rd MASH in South Korea. After Korea, Kiefer served two years as

Sponsorship: Start Strong to Be Strong

I have moved many times in my career, within the United States and overseas. I have deployed several times, leaving my wife to pull double duty at home. I know the good, the bad and the ugly of moving firsthand from my Family's experience and the stories shared by other Soldiers, civilians and family members. Every move brings new opportunities but also challenges and stress that can have a negative impact on work and home life.

I also know from personal experience that sponsors can be the determining factor between a good or bad move. An excellent sponsor plays a key role in making a positive first impression and helping the new person and Family integrate into the unit, workplace and community.

During the past several years, the Army has been experiencing a high volume of transition due to Army Force Generation, modularity, Grow the Army, Base Realignment and Closure and troop mobilization. Now more than ever, we need effective sponsorship to mitigate the stress of transition; however, Soldiers, civilians and families continue to express frustration with the Army's Sponsorship Program.

Sometimes, our personnel and family members have an exceptional sponsor — someone who truly makes them feel welcome and gets them off to an excellent start — but that is not always the case. There may be sponsors who are not well-equipped or motivated to provide the needed assistance or, even worse, no sponsorship at all. These experiences make sponsorship a pressing Army Family Action Plan issue. I am taking this opportunity to improve on our Total Army Sponsorship

Program (TASP) to enhance the readiness of our Soldiers and Civilians, and deliver on our promise to take care of Families.

The Army's Sponsorship Program, as prescribed in AR 600-8-8, The Total Army Sponsorship Program, requires every first-term Soldier have a sponsor. The sponsor acts as a big brother or sister and helps the Soldier learn Army standards and develop a sense of responsibility and teamwork. After that initial assignment, TASP offers sponsors for every Soldier, private through colonel, and likewise for every civilian in grades up to GS-15. A vital part of the Sponsorship Program that is often forgotten or overlooked is the rear detachment support provided to family members of deployed Soldiers and civilians.

So we have in our regulations a Sponsorship Program that covers all members of our community. I want to make sure that what is outlined on paper is also happening in our communities. Soldiers, civilians and family members will have a sponsor to provide information and support before, during and after transitions, mobilizations and deployments.

Team, it's with great sadness that I report that the National Training Center and Fort Irwin recently lost a truly great person and one of our key members. Mr. "Electric" Etric Smith passed away unexpectedly last weekend.

Most know Etric as the "voice" of the National Training Center through his morning radio shows on KNTC — The Heat. What you perhaps don't know is what I personally want to honor him for in this column.

Etric's official job in our Public Affairs Office was as our Media Relations Officer. As you can imagine, this was often a thankless job involving long hours in dealing with reporters and media outlets covering everything from blotter reports and rotational unit training to resource conservation and stories stemming from new DA and DoD policies.

What differentiated Etric Smith from the many Media Relations persons that I've personally dealt with is Etric handled each media outlet with great pride in balancing the professional needs of the represented organization with the needs of the person or the personality of each individual reporter. It's through his "Golden Rule" approach to media relations that lead not only to his personal success, but to the success of the National Training Center and Fort Irwin as portrayed in the media.

Etric was one of the good guys. He made everyone around him better. Etric believed in the saying that "People don't care how much you know, until they know how much you care." Etric Smith believed in our mission with the same enthusiasm and conviction as his ACU wearing counterparts. He cared about everyone around him and he showed it everyday. Etric went the extra mile to do things "right" and he never looked for the credit. Dedicated and selfless, Etric made an impression on everyone he came in contact with. His infectious smile, that put meaning to the name "Electric," and his passion made the world a better place, and better aware of what we do to train America's war fighters for combat.

Those of us who dealt with Etric on a routine basis may remember that he often signed his e-mails with "Best Effort"... and most recently, "Proudly Serving." His signature was a gentle reminder to all of us to do our very best everyday and be proud to serve our country as he was.

We'll dearly miss you Etric

Long time NTC employee, friend, family man, passes away

You heard his soothing voice on the radio three times a week. You saw him escort media to "The Box," time and time again. And you could always count on him to lift your spirit. These are just a few of the great memories he has left us with since his passing.

Etric Peron Smith, 44, passed away Saturday near his home in Helendale, Calif., on June 5. He is survived by his wife, Leslie, and three children— Erica, Genesis, and Gianna. Etric was originally from Bogalusa, La. He joined the Army and served for less than a decade, having completed all of his enlistment time at the National Training Center and Fort Irwin. He lived in Barstow for many years, becoming active in his community and church. It wasn't until recently that he and his family moved to Helendale to enjoy a resort lifestyle in the small community of Silver Lakes.

John Wagstaffe, public affairs director here, remembers Etric as a friend of 22 years. Etric actually served as a Soldier under, then Maj. Wagstaffe, at the Public Affairs Office from 1989 to 1992. Wagstaffe assisted in getting Etric reassigned, who was a wheel-vehicle mechanic, to write for the post newspaper. Etric eventually progressed to becoming station manager of KNTC, the radio station for Fort Irwin and the NTC, said Wagstaffe. Wagstaffe

recalled that ever since knowing Etric, he always had a positive outlook on him.

"He was never down," Wagstaffe said. "I never saw him down a day in his life. He could be upbeat about anything. Everything that he dealt with, he took a positive attitude towards. And that was also true with all the people he dealt with. He dealt with everybody with dignity and respect. I don't believe he has an enemy on this post."

In 2008, Etric began serving as the NTC and Fort Irwin media relations officer. After an initial training period, Etric took full charge of the media relations duties, Wagstaffe said. He coordinated and facilitated visits by the media to this post and

congressional liaison to the Surgeon General, Wash., D.C. In 1999, Col. Kiefer was selected to participate in the Training with Industry Post Graduate Fellowship with Inova Health System's Medical Group Practice.

Upon completion of TWI, Kiefer spent two years at Medical Command as chief, Analysis Branch in the Program Analysis and Evaluation Directorate. He served in four successive positions as deputy commander for administration for

USA MEDDAC, Fort Huachuca, Ariz.; USA MEDDAC, Fort Drum, N.Y.; Carl R. Darnall Army Medical Center, Fort Hood, Texas, and Tripler Army Medical Center.

Col. Kiefer's recent assignment was as Chief of Staff, Pacific Regional Medical Command and Deputy Commander for Administration, Tripler Army Medical Center, Hawaii.

Col. Kiefer's numerous awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal with six oak leaf clusters and Army Commendations Medal with two oak leaf clusters.

Col. Bock's next assignment will be as Regional Nurse Executive, Pacific Regional Medical Command and Deputy Commander for Nursing, Tripler Army Medical Center, Hawaii.

then onwards to the training area. He facilitated visits by CNN, ABC, NBC, CBS, the New York Times, the Los Angeles Times, local broadcast affiliates, small town newspapers, and documentary filmmakers. Those media outlets and countless others reported on the training and community life of this military installation. Etric's work promoted the mission of NTC and the U.S. Army to world-wide audiences. His personality and work ethic made the media relations program a huse success.

"He developed the [media relations] program himself and turned it into an amazing program," Wagstaffe said. "I personally believe he was the best media relations officer in the Army, but I'm not the one who says that. All the public affairs officers who come out with rotational training units, and all the media, all make that same comment — that he is the best media relations officer that they've dealt with. And that played a tremendous impact on getting the NTC story out."

Etric also was known as "Electric Etric" on KNTC, the radio station of Fort Irwin and NTC. He was on the air three times a week, playing popular tunes, taking on-air phone calls, and providing command information to the community. He hosted the show "Newsmakers" on Wednesdays, interviewing a wide range of guests from the commanding general to Fort Irwin school children.

Jackie Hoggins, marketing director for Family, Morale, Welfare, and Recreation here, attested to Etric's character as the key to positive media relations and successful radio interviews.

"Etric just had that magic — whoever he touched, he made you feel like he was your best friend," Hoggins said. "It didn't matter how hurried he was, or how busy, he took a minute. He never talked about himself. He was always asking about you and how your family was. I think people just felt good to be in his presence. He had good energy."

Before joining the Public Affairs Office, Etric served with various contractors on post supporting the NTC mission. With Raytheon, he advanced to a lead position for a system repair support team working on the technical aspects of after action reviews during training rotations. In that capacity he supervised Ernie Dutton, who is now a technician with Tybrin. Dutton described Etric as a mentor who helped him during his early 20's when he was starting a family.

"He helped me out in a lot of situations — just in general life," Dutton said. "He helped me through the 19, 20, 21-age period. I had a new daughter at the time, a new wife, and he helped me through all of that by just being a big brother."

Always treating others as a brother — that's how Chicpaul Becerra, editor of the *High Desert Warrior* newspaper, also remembers Etric.

"I'm going to miss Etric, because he treated you like a brother," Becerra said. "He treated you like a friend and family member. I'll miss his smile and his energetic, soft-spoken, humble lifestyle."

Becerra described Etric as a very caring and sincere individual.

"His personality hadn't changed since I first met him in 1988," Becerra said. "He was a very caring and loving husband and father to his three children."

As Soldiers, both Becerra and Etric were assigned to the Public Affairs Office in the late 1980s. Etric served as a photojournalist for the post newspaper, then called The Combined Arms Monitor. Becerra recalls Etric being introduced to and performing the different aspects of public affairs, including media relations and media escort duty at the NTC during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

Agustin "Auggie" Rodriguez, office administrator for PAO, talked about Etric's respect and support of others.

"He always tried to make you feel at ease and comfortable," Auggie said. "He was always supportive and tried to make you feel good. He was always complimenting people instead of criticizing them."

Auggie especially remembers the time Etric took him to the training area. He was probably one of the few non-media to receive an introduction to "the Box" by Etric. He also remembers Etric as completely redesigning the look of the public affairs office when he began working there two years ago. Auggie recalls that Etric "was on fire" during his mission to give the shop a patriotic, NTC ambiance.

"Etric was always looking for things that could be better — not only in the office, in general, but individually, as a person as well," Auggie said. "He always saw that a person could do better in a certain area. He tried to somehow help get that improvement for that person. We'll remember him for the rest of our lives, because he was the kind of person that makes an impact on other people."

Kelsy Hustead, new media specialist, Strategic Communications Office at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., remembers Etric as a kind, patient, and caring friend and colleague. He appreciated folks for who they were and saw the best qualities in everyone he encountered, said Hustead, who worked with Etric.

"I am fortunate to have known him, served with him and to have had him as my personal battle buddy." Hustead said. "Etric provided balance to the team and was truly admired. His spirit for the team, the mission, and the United States Army encouraged me."

Hustead also said that Etric often reminded her that life experiences, good or bad, served to shape us as individuals.

"This week, I was having a really tough time understanding why this happened," Hustead commented. "Another friend shared a special quote with me that helped put things in perspective: 'To have touched so many lives and left us all better for it, is an unbelievable act by an amazing friend.' Etric was that amazing friend for me, and for so many others. Thank you for positively influencing my life. Rest in peace Etric."



We must make sure sponsors are wellequipped for their important role. Sponsors must understand their role and have the necessary information and resources to fulfill it. Even more so, sponsors must be willing to reach out and make human contact, especially with new Soldiers, first-time civilian employees, and family members who are unfamiliar with the Army way of life.

Above all, I want to ensure that commanders are invested in the success of the Sponsorship Program within their community. TASP is a commander's program. Its success is contingent upon the commander's involvement and support. It is leadership's responsibility to send the message that sponsorship is something important to do and to do it right. At the most basic level, that means having an adequate pool of sponsors to meet the needs of the community and supporting those sponsors with reasonable time and resources to do a good job.

I have asked Command Sgt. Maj. Neil Ciotola to lead a working group to review sponsorship from a holistic perspective and to update the program to meet the needs of Soldiers in today's Army. Two important aspects of the Sponsorship Program under examination are integration and tracking. We must have a means to collect, transmit and follow up on their needs and issues. We do not want Soldiers carrying unresolved issues from assignment to assignment. We do not want families to fail to connect or to become disconnected from their community, especially if their Soldier is deployed. We are looking at the feasibility of using current systems to integrate and track TASP processes Army-wide, among other possible improvements. I anticipate that new recommendations, guidance, and requirements will be forthcoming as a result of our review.

We are approaching summer, the traditional moving season for the military. Most of us in an Army environment, Soldiers, civilians and family members alike, know what it is like to relocate. We know what a difference it makes to have a helping hand along the way.

Leaders, your direct experience alone, whether good or bad, should be enough incentive to make the Sponsorship Program in your sphere of influence as effective as possible.

With a successful sponsorship program, we can treat every one of these moves as an opportunity to show that we will do right by Soldiers, civilians and families. The time and effort invested up front will pay big dividends in the satisfaction, commitment, and increased cohesion and mission readiness of Army units. All Soldiers, civilians and family members must be provided with quality programs and safe communities that meet their needs while enabling them to thrive and maintain resiliency. We will keep our promise.

The class was conducted from April 26 to May 21. The class graduated 34 students out of the initial 46 Soldiers from Fort Irwin and Fort Richardson, Alaska: 24 Soldiers from Regiment, five Soldiers from 916th Support Brigade, two Soldiers from MEDDAC, and three Soldiers from 58th Engineer Company.

Kilo goes deep during grenade launcher qualification

A Soldier looks down his sights. He looks up to recheck his target's distance and lowers his face onto his weapon and looks down the sights, aligning his target, an old armored vehicle, with the notches on the sight post once again.

With a quick squeeze of the trigger, a swift "thwomp" sound emanates from his weapon. As the round flies through the air, the Soldier intently follows its arch. A few short seconds later, a cloud of orange paint rises from the vehicle and the Soldier lets out a satisfied sigh.

This scene was repeated numerous times throughout the day as Soldiers from K Troop, 2nd Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment conducted an M203 qualification range at the National Training Center on Fort Irwin, Calif., May 25.

The noncommissioned officer-in-charge of the range, Sgt. 1st Class Roger Ordish, said that training on the M203 weapons system helps his Soldiers

be better-rounded in their overall Soldier training.

"We need to be familiar and competent on all weapons systems," said Ordish, a native of Peck, Mich., who now serves as the 1st Platoon Sergeant of K Troop. Ordish said that even though all his Soldiers may not necessarily be assigned M203s with his unit or their next, it is still an important training to possess.

"You have to be trained and proficient before you go to combat, you train as you fight," he said.

To qualify, the Soldiers had to hit various targets at different ranges and from a myriad of positions. Some targets required them to shoot a grenade round through a window, while some required them to hit enemy personnel or vehicles. Orange paint marked where the Soldiers had hit their targets. The rounds used were training rounds that resembled those used in paint ball matches.

For junior Soldiers like Pfc. Max Harris, a native of Janesville, Wis., they considered the range good training, albeit a fun one.

"The best part was firing the grenade launcher itself, it was kind of fun."

Flag Day is For Everyone!

Why is our American flag so controversial to so many people? It would be great if those folks joined other patriotic Americans in celebration of the flag. I guess that is what makes us a diverse society ... the ability to make one's own decisions. Nevertheless, the flag is for everyone.

This is the Day to celebrate and show respect for the flag. The flag celebration is always on June 14th. Flag Day, although not an official holiday, and commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States. The day was created by a resolution of the Second Continental Congress in 1777. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that established 14 June as Flag

Day; National Flag Day was established in August 1949 by an Act of Congress.

Our flag is representative of our independence and unity as a nation. The flag has been at the forefront of every battle fought by Americans, even standing proudly on the surface of the moon years ago. Now, here are the basics for flying our great American flag: It is normally flown from sunrise to sunset; should not be flown in rain or inclement weather; should not be flown at night without a light on it; raise the flag quickly in the morning and at sunset, lower it slowly. After a great tragedy or death, the flag is flown at half staff for 30 days. The American flag is flown at the top of the pole with the state and other flags flown below it. Never let the flag touch the ground...never! The union is always on top. When displayed in print, stars

and blue field are always on the left. When flown vertically on a pole, the stars and blue field, or "union", is at the top and at the end of the pole (away from your house). Fold the flag when storing. Don't just stuff it in a drawer or cabinet.

When the flag is old or tattered, it is time to retire it. Old flags should be burned or buried. Do not throw them in the trash. Wow! That was a rushed synopsis of the flag. Now you know everything about our flag, go out and watch it wave gently in the wind as sunrise and sunset approaches.

Two other tidbits: Francis Scott Key penned the lyrics to our National Anthem while our American flag flew in the breeze as the British bombarded Fort McHenry and Betsy Ross was the seamstress who made clothes for George Washington. In June 1776, Washington approached Betsy to make the country's first flag.


Symbolic thoughts: The flag consists of 13 horizontal stripes, seven red alternating with six white to represent the 13 colonies. Red symbolizes hardiness and valor and white symbolizes purity and innocence. The blue symbolizes vigilance, perseverance and justice.

Lastly, if you like to study flags, then you are a Vexillologist! Thank goodness I do not study flags. Also, thank you to everyone who has served or continues to serve our Nation whether they be veterans, retirees, civilian, military, and our families. Honoring the flag is a good thing, and everyone should be proud to be an American.



A medical background isn't necessary for this chair position, but strong communication and administrative skills are important.

The Fort Irwin Red Cross Station also needs a Station Chair. This position partners with Station Manager Stephanie Luce and directs, guides, and implements Red Cross programs and services at Fort Irwin. This position appoints and supervises all station leadership volunteers, participates in developing station objectives and action plans and participates in the budget process. This is a very important position and therefore requires strong leadership, administrative, communication, and management skills.

The Red Cross Station also needs additional CPR and AED instructors. The Station offers these classes just about every month, but the number of instructors is limited. If you are certified to instruct this class, your help is needed.

Emergency responders participate in Active Shooter Exercise

Sirens blared, two individuals lie fatally injured in a parking lot off of B Avenue on Apr. 21. This nightmarish scene imitated a real incident, providing training for emergency responders. Post emergency responders participated in a Active Shooter attack as part of a force protection exercise. Fort Irwin Antiterrorism Officer Mark L. Laury said the situation mimicked some intelligence the FBI provided installation staff.

"The training reflects what we might be looking at," he said.

At about 8:30 a.m., emergency personnel responded to a call of a shooting incident, at the intersection of B Avenue and First Street. When they arrived, they found 2 simulated casualties – fatally wounded by gunshots.

Fort Irwin Firefighters and Police first tried to determine what caused the shootings to occur. After an investigation, it was determined that an argument started between a husband, wife and a male associate of the wife, which fueled the tension between the couple.

Military police officers manned the emergency call center and directed traffic around the scene, and military working dogs and their handlers ensured no other threats existed in the area.

In order to coordinate all the activities, directorate leaders determined they needed to establish an incident command post near the site.

The exercise culminated training staff members undergo daily, CPT Weiner said.

"They do little bits of this every day. It's not as intense, but they get trained every day doing their jobs," he said, adding military police direct traffic and medical responders treat people every day.

Weiner thought all parties involved performed well, something outside evaluation teams also concluded, Laury said.

"The team auditing us was very impressed. They had nothing but kudos," he said. "They took away some ideas they want to implement at other installations."

Post staff conducts smaller force protection exercises quarterly, events that Laury believes contributed to this exercise's high marks. He added the team noted emergency response personnel's cohesiveness as an exercise strong point.


