Moondogs memorialize missing Marines

Silent tension filled the ready room of Marine Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron 3 as the squadron's executive officer, Maj. William A. Schultz, approached the flawlessly unblemished plaque with a set of dog tags in his hands.

The clinking of the tags against the chains cut the silence as Schultz's voice cracked with emotion when he announced their owner - Capt. Andrew Muhs, who passed away in an aircraft mishap in 2002.

Schultz hung the dog tags on the plaque, which bore the heading, "Missing Moondogs.

A second set of dog tags were handed to Burton S. Paynter, the father of their owner, the late Capt. Jason J. Paynter, who passed away April 12, also in an aircraft mishap.

The father clutched the dog tags and looked up with sad eyes. "What do you want me to do with these?" he asked the Marines.

Once he understood, he rose and hung the tags on the same plaque, right next to those of Muhs

Both Paynter and Muhs were members of VMAQ-3, and now the squadron's ready room was being

Lt. Col. Dominic Roberts, the commanding officer of VMAQ-3, presided over the unveiling of the

"Though neither one of these pilots were with the Moondogs at the time of their deaths, it is important to memorialize them for two reasons," Roberts said, referring to the squadron by its nickname. "First, they were members of this squadron and we are a family here; secondly, it helps keep us sharp to remember what can happen out there.'

VMAQ-3 had previously dedicated its ready room in Muhs' honor, but after the squadron moved to a new hangar the memorial seemed to fall by the wayside. That seemed to many to be a wasted opportunity for remembrance and learning.

Paynter said he had driven over 1,500 miles from Moorhead, Minn., to see his son's memorial and that every mile was worth it.

"There's a lot going through my mind right now," Paynter said. "One year ago Jason and I were planning my final days; I was suffering from a lung disorder. Now, I'm okay and he's gone - we didn't expect it but we accepted it."

New North Carolina boating law

The National Association of State Boating Law Administrators mandated that after May 1, 2010, every person under the age of 26 must complete a NASBLAapproved boating education course before operating any vessel propelled by a motor of 10 or more horsepower in the state of North Carolina.

"A good number of Marines in the Cherry Point area here are 26 and under, so it really affects a lot of them," said Leo T. Munday, a safety specialist with the Joint Safety Office aboard Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point. "The Marines have been very responsive and diligent in getting the correct training in order for them to get out there on the water."

North Carolina is the first state where the law is in effect with an ample supply of waterways and boating opportunities, Marines and Sailors aboard the air station must complete the necessary education course if they are 26 or younger.

Resident boating education courses are offered locally for free while online courses are offered for a fee.

On http://www.ncwilflife.org, under the education workshops tab, there is a link to boating education courses, which displays when and where resident courses are available, as well as links to online Web sites that offer the course.

The Web site also includes information regarding all regulations on hunting, fishing, trapping, wildlife, how to obtain licenses and permits, and where education courses are offered.

Once the course is taken and passed, a NASBLA-approved card is given and will have to be held at all times if the person is 26 years old or younger.

"I didn't have to attend the course, but I had my 14-year-old son attend and he operates my boat with me so I wanted to make sure he had the education," said Munday. "I sat at the course and with me being base safety, it was a good reminder of basic boating safety requirements.'

Marines, British Sailors conclude Capella Strike

Brandt, the administration officer with Marine Attack Squadron 223, said the exercise was an opportunity for both nations to display their capabilities and find ways to integrate them in a high operational tempo, allowing the Marines and RN Sailors to take advantage of this rare opportunity.

Pilots conducted carrier qualifications along with a variation of training sorties while Marines on the flight deck assured all preparations were made with for the 12 AV-8B Harriers aboard.

A foundation for how the first generation of F-35 pilots and maintainers will train for the next half century continues to evolve at Eglin Air Force Base in Florida as the 33rd Fighter Wing adds state-ofthe-art technology to the classroom arsenal.

"The technology is fabulous," said Col. David Hlatky, 33rd Fighter Wing commander. "It brings us to a revolutionary new capability that's going to define the free world's fighter for the next 35 to 50 years." "The new devices are interesting to say the least; there are some leaps in technology in both the aircraft and

Service set for downed pilot, 44 years later

Marine Corps pilot 1st Lt. Everett "Mac" McPherson had been in Vietnam for only a month when he was shot down on March 18,

Now, 44 years after he made the ultimate sacrifice, the family of the 24-year-old Cherry Point pilot was recognized June 3 at a memorial at Arlington National Cemetery.

The ceremony coincides with a reunion of the Marine Corps Aviation Reconnaissance Association at Quantico, Va.

McPherson and 1st Lt. Brent Davis, an electronic counter measures officer, were on a mission to jam enemy radar when they were struck by surface-to-air missiles over the mountains near Vinh in Vietnam. It was the first loss of an EF-10B for Marine Composite Reconnaissance Squadron 1 at Cherry Point.

From the Chaplain:

Is history important?

Few people become overly excited about studying history. Too many teachers with voices such as Ben Stein's have put students to sleep with dusty names and dates, just bygone information without context, mere facts to memorize. A clutter of info to cram, reproduce and then dump in the mental recycling bin after the exam.

The study of history is really useful. The yellow pie is almost always the most elusive in Trivial Pursuit. You might need some conversational tidbits to pass the time away at a party when cornered by the guy who's as interesting as wallpaper.

Big history is attempting something else. What is Big History? It places the normal telling of the history of humanity within the entire known cosmic past. It is the beginning of the universe up until life on Earth today.

While half of us will enjoy history and half may pass on it, all of us have our interested piqued by something in the general-education course catalog: Geology, Mathematics, Philosophy, Psychology and maybe even Physics. Therein lays the beauty of this interdisciplinary approach. It is science and humanities playing nice. Big history connects all the dots. Explaining how everything has become the way it is now helps students understand their position in time and space in a way no other approach to history can offer.

Psalm 8 takes a similar multidisciplinary approach to praising God. Instead of Big History, a Big God is on display through several fields of study. Take for the moment

Newer "smart phones" with the Android operating system offer an amazing app called Google Sky. When the phone is held out to the horizon, the screen shows the stars and constellations visible at that trajectory. It's the digital equivalent of star chart wheels we played with in science class. It's really cool, and it's an amazing learning tool. But it can teach you theology, not just astronomy.

Picture the psalmist sitting out on a Palestinian hillside. Black skies are pierced by stars in a way that most of us in electricity-lit cities don't even know how to imagine. He's just stunned – into worship and reflection.

Legal Assistance:

Forget anything anyone's ever told you about the legal requirements for separation and divorce. Forget what your fellow Marine tells you happened in his divorce and forget what that neighbor three houses down tells you the Marine Corps requires. Chances are, they are wrong.

As a legal assistance attorney, a large percentage of the clients I see have issues relating to separation and divorce. Marines or their spouses usually enter my office with incorrect information that was gathered third hand.

First, many Marines or dependents want an annulment to make their marriage go away fast. It is not going to happen. Once a marriage is entered into, an annulment is a highly unlikely option. You will probably have to seek a divorce based on the state laws of where either you or your spouse is in domicile.

State laws vary widely in terms of separation periods, residency requirements and filing methods. In North Carolina, for instance, at least one party must be a North Carolina resident and each party must live separate and apart for at least 12 months before filing for a divorce. Some states have waiting periods up to 24 months and

other states may have no waiting period at all. Second, most of my clients believe they are entitled to something by Marine Corps order or state law. It depends. State law determines how custody is awarded, property is split and support is calculated. Each state looks at these issues differently

If there is not a separation agreement or court order, a commanding officer may order a Marine to pay up to a certain percentage of his Basic Allowance for Housing. This amount can vary depending on the circumstance of each case, and it may be potentially offset by other payments such as rent. The Marine Corps' role in support orders can be confusing, so you should always consult an attorney with any questions

Many clients also mistakenly believe they will automatically receive or be required to pay a certain percentage of their retirement to a divorced spouse. A dependent can actually seek a portion of your retirement if you have been married for as little as one day or as much as 30 years.

Whether the dependent will be successful depends on the circumstances and state law. A state court will look at potential retirement just like any other asset that must be split, such as a home or money in the bank. A spouse that has been married to an active duty Marine for all 20 years of service may receive 50% of the retirement,

Brandt. "They also conducted close air support training missions on land, displaying their ship to shore capability.'

An officer who worked closely with the Royal Navy, Capt. Nicholas R. Wineman, a pilot with VMA-223 said, "Exercise Capella Strike was an exciting opportunity to integrate American air power with British sea power. The HMS Ark Royal was created with the sole intention of launching Harriers into harms way."





trainer recently arrived to the wing wing and was demonstrated to an international press pool. The trainer is one of several devices that will be used to train pilots on the F-35 Lightning II. The machine replicates the cockpit of an F-35 and uses the same software and training systems used for flight. It is a containerized, forward-deployable version of the full mission simulator slated to arrive late this year. Both simulators have the same visual display system, but the MRT uses a smaller 108 degree by 50 degree out-the-window display, while the simulator uses a full 360 degree seamless dome to project images.

"Compared to the other airplanes I've flown, the F-16 and the A-10, the mission rehearsal trainer for the F-35 flies more like how I would envision a fifth generation fighter flying," said Maj. Eric Smith, 58th Fighter Squadron assistant operations director. "It is just like flying a formation off a tanker or something in an F-16...It is great."

Contractors creating the trainer's software took cameras out during daylight and nighttime hours to capture the most realistic pictures of Eglin possible, said Greg Wilder, Lockheed Martin lead instructor for the MRT. The trainer even shows grease and skid marks on the runway.

The trainer is one of many technological steps for three U.S. military services and eight partner nations purchasing the Joint Strike Fighter. From their arrival at the 33rd Academic Training Center, students will interact with the latest technology, receiving laptops from the registrar's office instead of books.

"You are looking at a pretty advanced 21st century classroom. You will notice there are no pads, no pens on the desk, no books," said Marine Col. Arthur Tomassetti, 33rd FW vice commander. "The students, whether they are pilots or maintainers, are going to start in a state-of-the-art electronic classroom."

The high-tech, uncluttered environment is a stark contrast to traditional training methods using chalk boards, stacks of books, poster-sized visual aids and cockpit mock-ups.

"I went through flight training in the A-10 in 1996," Major Smith said. "Back then, there was no simulator for the A-10. It was a cockpit procedure trainer that you just threw switches and nothing really happened. The academics were all on view graphs. They would put things on the slide projector, and it would go up on the screen. It was all grease pencils and view graphs."

Touch screen technology on desktop pilot training aids in the classrooms replaces the grease pencils and graphs.

The computers and controls, which will be in every classroom, run the same software as the actual F-35, said Maj. Matt W. Renbarger, 58th Fighter Squadron Weapons and Tactics chief.

"What is unique about this system is that the way you are learning on the pilot training aide, the way you are learning on the MRT, will look the same [as] when you get to the airplane because it is running the same software," major said.

The core cadre of instructor pilots will spend the summer working through dry runs of the courseware, said Colonel Tomassetti.

When the wing reaches full strength in 2014, it will train Air Force, Marine, Navy and international partner operators and maintainers of the F-35 Lightning II.

McPherson and Davis received the rank of major posthumously.

Wayne "Flash" Whitten, a retired colonel who is the chief historian for the Marine Corps Aviation Reconnaissance Association website, was on the same mission when McPherson and Davis were shot down.

"I was in the lead aircraft," Whitten said. "They were our wingmen on that fateful day

"We were at least 10 to 15 miles away from them when the SAM detonated. We thought they were all blown up to pieces. We didn't see anything come out of the fireball."

Davis' partial remains were found in the early 1990s, but U.S. authorities never found any remains or personal effects of McPherson.

Ray McPherson, Everett's brother and a retired Navy chaplain in Jacksonville, said the Marine Corps extricated the crash site and has done everything possible to recover his brother's remains.

"Over these years we have had some difficulty bringing closure because there was never anything to lay hands on, no personal effects," he said. "It's been pretty much up in the air."

The older brother remembers his lost brother's patriotism when he began his Marine Corps career.

"Everett went on to Pensacola (Fla.) and got his wings. When I was going to finish at Campbell University, Everett flew his plane over from Cherry Point and he rattled the windows at Wake Forest. He was quite a pilot and quite a jock," McPherson caid

"It's no surprise to hear that he did that," said Danny Walsh, who was a young enlisted Marine who worked on McPherson's plane at Cherry Point. "We all knew that every pilot we had flew under every bridge around. If we had a pilot that didn't fly under the bridge, he didn't stay a pilot."

Walsh still remembers the fallen pilot.

"He was just one of those guys that was in a bubbly mood, and he was always helping us trouble-shoot the airplane," Walsh said. "He had a smiling face and a great attitude and was a great pilot to work under. We were all devastated when we heard we lost him."

Chaplain McPherson said he remembers giving his brother some advice upon his deployment to Vietnam.

"As the older brother, I just told Everett not to be a brave one, just bring yourself back," he said. "I always thought jets were safe but they're fast. I didn't think he was going to take a hit so fast.

"He had some misgivings and a few reservations about our involvement (in Vietnam), but he was the kind of guy that was a patriot. He loved his country and loved God. He loved to fly, and my regret is that he didn't get to fly as much as he wanted to. He was a baptized believer, and I know when my time comes I will see him."

McPherson praised Whitten for helping organize Friday's ceremony, for which a missing man flyover with an EA-6B Prowler is planned.

After the memorial, a reception is planned when family will share their memories of a fallen hero

"I'm going to be giving token medallions to all the siblings, and they are going to be Purple Heart medallions for all of the years of hurt and loss that they have felt," Ray McPherson said. "It is a much, much deserved tribute to our brother for his supreme sacrifice."

All meetings will be held in an open house format; no formal presentation will be conducted. U.S., Romanian training goes airborne

CAMPIA TURZII, Romania – U.S. Marines and soldiers currently deployed to Eastern Europe for Black Sea Rotational Force 2010 conducted parachute training with Romanian airborne forces, June 2-3. The Marines and Romanian forces are scheduled to take to the skies again for additional training, June 8-9.

During the training, a pair of Marine Corps KC-130T Hercules dropped about 75 Romanian paratroopers from heights ranging from 1,250 feet above ground level to nearly 10,000 feet mean sea level, while U.S. Army jumpmasters offered their expertise for the execution of the event.

"It's fun working with Romanians," said U.S. Army Sgt. Ben Lipton, an Army Special Operations Command static-line jumpmaster from U.S. Army Europe. "There is a language barrier, but we have a common nomenclature. All paratroopers train similarly, they just accomplish it in different ways."

The Romanian forces conducted both static-line and military free fall jumps. In a static-line jump, a troop's parachute is automatically deployed as he exits the aircraft, where as in a military free fall jump, the paratrooper must deploy his own parachute.

"It's always nice to jump from a C-130," said Romanian Capt. Claudio Rotaru, a Romanian paratrooper who participated in the training. "I have a very good opinion of training with the U.S."

The aircraft, one each from Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron 234, out of Fort Worth, Texas; and VMGR-452 out of Newburgh, N.Y., are currently deployed to Romania as the air combat element of the Black Sea Rotational Force Security Cooperation Marine Air-Ground Task Force. Both 4th Marine Aircraft Wing squadrons are deployed to Romania with a compliment of reserve and active-duty Marines.

"The aircrew have been very motivated and extremely flexible," said Lipton, who said the training event was his first time working with Marine aviators. "I'd be excited to work with Marines again."

For the Marines of VMGR-234 and VMGR-452, training with Romanian forces in Romanian air space also created a unique experience

"There's some give and take, but both sides were able to do that equally to get the job done," said U.S. Marine Corps Chief Warrant Officer 3 Mario Helpley, a native of Phoenix and a tactical systems operator with VMGR-452, of working with the Romanian land and air forces. "The Romanians' 'can do' and 'get the job done' attitudes match up quite well with Marine Corps philosophies."



USS BONHOMME RICHARD – A group of Marines returned to Marine Corps Air Station in Yuma, Ariz., May 28, after participating in the Marine Corps' first Exercise Dawn Blitz

The purpose of the exercise was to demonstrate the newly established guidelines for amphibious assaults, detailed in the Naval Operations Concept 2010, released May 24.

Fifteen Marine Attack Squadron 513 support and maintenance Marines embarked on the USS Bonhomme Rich-

ard from San Diego to participate in the exercise May 24. The exercise is ongoing and slated to end June 4.

Total eight AV-8B Harriers and 12 pilots participated in the exercise. The pilots operated out of Yuma and flew to the ship daily to refuel before providing close-air support for the exercise.

Dawn Blitz afforded Marines and Sailors an opportunity to practice large-scale amphibious assault operations, combining long-range support in the form of naval gunfire and artillery, Harrier close-air support, helicopter transport and amphibious landings.

"The exercise was successful for everyone involved," said Capt. Brian Boyd, squadron ground safety officer and landing signals officer for the exercise. "We were able to get a lot of training for the pilots and Marines on the ground. We were also able to get carrier qualifications for seven of our pilots."

During the week, the Marines assisted the Sailors on the flight deck of the ship with more than 50 takeoffs and landings, logging in approximately 50 hours of flight time.

The Corps plans to hold Dawn Blitz annually.

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American, Japanese officials commission, open new runway at MCAS Iwakuni

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION IWAKUNI, Japan - American and Japanese officials gathered at the new runway at MCAS Iwakuni, Japan, to officially open it to flight operations in a commissioning ceremony May 29.

The historic ceremony marked the conclusion of the \$2.6 billion, 13-year construction effort, which was designed to enhance the safety of flight operations and to decrease aircraft noise in the communities surrounding the air station.

John Roos, U.S. ambassador to Japan, said he considered the construction and completion of the new runway a notable accomplishment of the alliance between the United States and Japan.

"I want to recognize and thank the numerous Japanese partners who were involved in this undertaking, and I particularly want to thank and acknowledge the local residents," said Roos. "The successful completion of

this new runway, a project of great importance to both of our nations, proves that the future of U.S./Japan partnership is bright

American and Japanese officials formally commissioned the runway with a bilateral ribbon cutting.

After the ribbon cutting, a Marine F/A-18 Hornet and a Japanese Maritime Self-Defense Force P-3 Orion symbolically closed the old runway with a final take off from it and officially opened the new runway by landing on it.

"The fact that the flight evolution and this ceremony and the ribbon cutting itself is bilateral is representative of the long-term spirit of cooperation between our two nations," said Lt. Gen. Terry G. Robling, Marine Corps Bases Japan commander and II Marine Expeditionary Force commanding general. "On a broader level, commissioning the new runway in 2010, the 50th anniversary of our alliance, reminds us what our two countries can accomplish when we

work together towards a common goal and 2005. speaks volumes about the strength and future of our alliance."

Construction of the new runway involved the joint efforts of the government of Japan, the Ministry of Defense, the Chugoku-Shikoku Defense Bureau, the Japanese construction industry, the U.S. Army Corps of engineers, the Naval Facilities Engineering Command Pacific the Marine Corps Air Station Iwakuni Facilities Department and

The Iwakuni Runway Relocation Project was first announced in 1992 with actual construction starting in June 1997.

Approximately 22 million cubic meters of land from nearby Atago Mountain was moved via conveyor belt and barge to the 533-acre construction site in the Seto Inland Sea.

Construction of the runway was accomplished in three phases

Phase one involved the construction of a new port facility, which was completed in

Phase two involved the construction of the north end of the runway, and phase three concentrated on the middle section of

"The end result is nothing short of an engineering marvel and built on a scale that only a few countries in the world are technologically capable of achieving." said Robling.

Yoshihiko Fukuda, Iwakuni city mayor, said he considered the construction of the new runway the best way to resolve many of the noise issues and safety concerns of the local community related to the air station while maintaining the nation's defenses.

"We shall never forget that we are here today thanks to those who worked so hard towards this goal." said Fukuda. "It is no exaggeration to say today is a historical day for Iwakuni city because what the residents of Iwakuni have long wanted has been real-









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Marines mentor Helmand provincial police forces

LASHKAR GAH, Helmand province, Afghanistan - "Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime." Marines in Helmand province's British Forward Operating Base Lashkar Gah, have come to understand this ancient Chinese proverb very too

The Marine Provincial Police Mentor Team, or P-PMT, has been tasked to work with NATO and the International Security Assistant Force, and to partner with the Afghan Police headquarters staff to enhance their policing procedures, communications, logistical and operational capabilities.

"Our job isn't to tell them how to do their job, but to actually partner with their staff, help them identify problems, and develop solutions," according to Col. John Klink, P-PMT officer-in-charge.

The P-PMT team, partnered with the British soldiers of the 1st Battalion Mercian Regiment's Police Development Advisory Training Team, is responsible for training police forces at the Helmand Police Training Center, along with its 13 districts throughout Helmand province's 23,000 square miles.

"The team's main focus is mentoring members of the provincial police headquarters, and aiding in developing key programs such as crime stoppers, training and education, and community outreach, where the villagers can voice their concerns to their respective police forces," said Master Sgt. Scott Nichols, P-PMT senior enlisted advisor, and a Sanford, Maine, police officer.

The P-PMT team - comprised of 13 Marines, a Navy Corpsman, and two interpreters - brings a wide variety of military skills and specialties to the table. Like Nichols, there are two other police officers on the team, plus experts in the field of communications, intelligence, heavy equipment operations, logistics and infantry.

Beyond assisting with the mentoring of the police force located in Lashkah Gah, Helmand province's capital, the P-PMT is responsible for medically screening Afghan National Police and initially processing them into the system. They escort recruits to the Joint Security Academy Shorabak, which is Camp Leatherneck's training area. Upon their graduation, they are escorted to their respective police districts.

Spearheading the ground and air movement of his Marines and the ANP is Staff Sgt. Justin Rettenberger, P-PMT operations chief.

"Our forward operating base facilitates a strong presence in the community, and allows us to move our teams from the FOB to our areas of operations to assist and train the members of the Police Headquarters and the HPTC," said Rettenberger, a Dubuque, Iowa, native.

With just more than two months on the ground, the Marines of the P-PMT have faced some difficul-


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

There is no automatic right to a specific portion of anyone's retirement. This is a highly complex issue. You should always consult with an attorney when dealing with a divorce involving retirement issues.

Third, some parents want to receive sole physical and legal custody. This is not likely to happen. Though a court may grant a parent sole legal and physical custody in some extreme cases, it is more likely that the court will grant some type of split, shared, or joint custody. Just as a parent has a right to a child, a child has a right to each parent. As a result, courts rarely give one parent sole rights with regard to a child. The real debate is often over physical custody – where the child will reside.

Finally, separation and divorce involves numerous momentous decisions that will affect both you and your spouse, and any children, for the rest of your lives. Come to Legal Assistance with any questions, or go see your favorite civilian attorney. One way or another, you need to know the true answer to your question, rather than taking a chance on what your barracks "lawyer" tells you.

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

the world games," said Hulme. The United States have a unique team spirit," said Hulme. "Whether it is good or bad


that happens to them they always have a lot of energy and a happy attitude."



PMO offers gun safety tips



It is critical for a child to know what to do if he or she encounters a firearm anywhere, and it is the parents' responsibility to provide that training. There is no particular age to talk with a child about gun safety.

First and most importantly, always remember that gun safety is the responsibility of the parents, not the child.

The degree of safety a child has at a home where a gun is kept rests squarely on that child's parents. In any home, guns should be stored in a locked safe or cabinet, and the ammunition stored separately and in a locked container. There are many trigger locks and gun locks and lockable gun safes available on the market today that are highly recommended as extra safety measures.

A parent who leaves a loaded gun unsecured inside a home with children may be criminally negligent if a child has access to it and an accident occurs. Parents who accept the responsibility to learn, practice and teach gun safety rules will ensure their child's safety to a much greater extent than those who do not.

It is critical for a child to know what to do if he or she encounters a firearm anywhere, and it is the parents' responsibility to provide that training. There is no particular age to talk with a child about gun safety. A good time to introduce the subject is the first time the child shows an interest in firearms, even toy pistols or rifles. Talking openly and honestly about gun safety with a child is usually more effective than just ordering him or her to "Stay out of the gun closet," and leaving it at that. Although the child needs to understand that the gun cabinet is off limits, such statements may just stimulate a child's natural curiosity to investigate further.

As with any safety lesson, explaining the rules and then taking the time to explain why it's important to follow the rules normally will achieve better results. Any rules set for one child should also apply to friends who visit the home. This will help keep a child from being pressured into showing a gun to a friend.

Toy Guns vs. Real Guns.

It is also advisable, particularly with very young children, to discuss gun use on television as opposed to gun use in real life. Firearms are often handled carelessly in movies and on TV. Additionally, children see TV, movie characters, and video game characters shot and "killed" with well-documented frequency. When a young child sees that same actor appear in another movie or TV show, confusion between entertainment and real life may result. It may be a mistake to assume that your child knows the difference between being "killed" on TV and in the reality of death. Children these days are exposed to so many forms of media and have many questions, but their best source of information is still their

Safety reminders for critical days of summer

The 101 Critical Days of Summer Campaign began Memorial Day weekend and ends Labor Day, when the military services typically see a big spike in vehicle and recreational accidents. Each service's campaign is designed to promote safety and reduce the number of accidents and mishaps during the summer vacation season.

Marines and Sailors between the ages of 18 and 25 are most at risk for injury or death, yet all Marines, Sailors and their families need to remain extra vigilant about safety as the temperatures rise.

Whether barbecuing in your backyard, on a road trip, or even just trying out a new sport, all Marines and Sailors need to think about their actions and the possible conse-

During the last three summer campaigns, we lost an average of 42 Marines and Sailors; and even though last year we experienced one of our safest summers ever, we still lost 33 Marines and Sailors to mishaps. The Marine Corps Safety Division and the Naval Safety Center provide a plethora of information to help prevent mishap and fatalities, but information alone will not solve the problem. It takes every Marine, Sailor, and civilian to help save lives, and we have a responsibility to teach, mentor, and provide the right message for the Critical Days of Summer Campaign.

Throughout the summer, you can expect to be reminded of safety tips by the Marine Corps Safety Division, Naval Safety Center, Marine Corps Center for Lessons Learned, Marine Administrative Messages, safety standdowns and Some important safety reminders are:

•Wear seatbelts in cars and required protective equipment on motorcycles

•Remain alert while at the wheel and plan rest breaks at frequent intervals.

•Don't speed in an effort to arrive early.

•It is better to arrive late than not arrive at all.

. Don't drink alcohol and drive.

·Beware of heat exhaustion when the weather is particularly hot.

·If you're at a beach, be even more vigilant. •In the case of severe thunderstorms, find a safe place

First Fire Scouts arrive at FRC East

Fleet Readiness Center East began its new role as one of the Navy's depot repair points for the MQ-8B Vertical Takeoff and Landing Tactical Unmanned Aerial Vehicle when it inducted its first two Fire Scouts, April 19.

The Fire Scout is an unmanned helicopter that is equipped with a number of information gathering systems designed to provide operational commanders with real-time intelligence, reconnaissance and targeting awareness. The 9.4foot tall, 3,150-pound aircraft has a 20,000-foot ceiling, a top speed of about 143 miles per hour and can fly 110 nautical miles, then hover on station for up to five hours relaying and recording events from distances far away enough to remain largely unseen and undetected.

In a recent deployment aboard USS McInerney, one of the MQ-8B's now at FRC-East, tracked, filmed, then played an integral role in a drug interdiction mission that nabbed drug nugglers off the coast of Latin America. The six-m cruise was the first operational assignment for the weapons

FRC-East is performing maintenance in conjunction with a corrosion assessment requested by PMA-266, according to MQ-8B Fire Scout Fleet Support Team Lead, Brian Ste-

"The material condition of the aircraft is being evaluated by FRC-East E and Es (estimators and evaluators) and fleet support team, or FST, engineers along with a broader national Fire Scout team," said Stevens. "The results of this inspection will enable FRC-East artisans to improve the condition of the aircraft before it is returned to service later this year. As a result of the configuration changes developed and incorporated at FRC-East, the aircraft will be even more robust on future deployments then they were when received from the manufacturer."

The depot is also reworking 10 main rotor heads

"We're applying an improved finish that will significantly reduce the corrosion that had to be treated during the first deployment," Stephens explained.

In the future, FRC-East will repair approximately 60 of the Fire Scout's components. Artisans are receiving handson training by working with the FST and Northrup Grumman engineers.

The Navy will field 121 Fire Scouts, once the platform is fully deployed. The inventory now stands at seven – one trainer, two at Northrup Grumman for developmental testing, and four the Navy flies during operational evaluations.

The two MQ-8B's at FRC-East should be back in the Fleet about mid-June.


This week in Marine Corps History

June 12, 1961

President John F. Kennedy signed a presidential proclamation calling for the American flag to be flown at the Marine Corps War Memorial in Arlington, Virginia, "At all times during the day and night." Discussions between the Attorney General's office and Marine Corps officials earlier in 1961 on improving the visibility and appearance of the monument led to the proposal to fly the flag continuously, which by law could only be done by congressional legislation or by presidential proclamation.

June 15, 1944

Preceded by naval gunfire and carrier air strikes, the V Amphibious Corps assaulted the west coast of Saipan, Marianas Islands. By nightfall, the 2d and 4th Marine Divisions, moving against heavy opposition, had established a beachhead 10,000 yards wide and 1,500 yards deep.



As Sprint, Nationwide schedules diverge, choices must be made

NASCAR season, when the Sprint Cup and wide Series schedules find the two circuits running in different venues across the country, the debate resumes about the wisdom of Cup drivers flying back and forth to run

Nationwide races. Some feel it distracts from a driver's Cup efforts, and that's one of the reasons Kyle Busch dropped off the Nationwide tour even though he was leading the series in wins with five and just one point out of the championship lead heading into last weekend's Nationwide race at Nashville Superspeedway.

History has shown that crosscountry trips tend to produce a lot of wins for drivers, in both Cup and Nationwide, but they don't seem to help one's chances of winning a Cup title.

In 2008, Carl Edwards led the Cup series in wins with nine and had seven Nationwide victo-ries while running both circuits full-time. He was second in the standings in both series.

Kyle Busch had eight Cup wins and 10 Nationwide victories in '08, but was 10th in Cup points and sixth in Nationwide In 2009, Busch had four Cup

wins and nine in Nationwide

onship but didn't even make the cut for the Chase on the Cup

Edwards told reporters at Pocono last week that cross-country double-dipping suits him. In fact, in 24 cross-country trips leading up to this past weekend, he wan three Cup races and six Nationwide, a better performance percentage than when the races were held at the same race track.

"When we get to these races where we go back and forth I do feel better about it," he said. "Maybe subconsciously I know we have done well."

Edwards skipped the trip to Nashville on Friday, saying be didn't think the practice session

would be worth the effort. Sometimes I believe that showing up with no expectatio makes it simpler," he said. "Maybe there is something to that, maybe not. I like the summer stretch with the hot weather and slippery race tracks, so maybe that is what it is."

Edwards might want to reconsider after this weekend. Brad Keselowski, making his first cross-country double weekend did so from Pocono to Nashville for practice, and that appeared to help propel him to victory on

Saturday night. He now leads the series standings by 196 points. Busch maintained second slace, while Edwards is third, 277 behind Keselowski.

Both Keselowski and his crew chief Paul Wolfe said in their winner's interviews that the trip to Nashville on Friday for practice was key to their victory.

Hamlin's win, his fourth in nine coreer starts and his fourth in the past nine Cup races, gives Gibbs six wins in the last nine, counting two by teammate Kyle Busch, who was second at Pocono on Sunday:

Busch had a career-best run at Pocoso, where his average finish is 19.6. The third Gibbs driver, Josy Logano, was poised for a top-five before spinning after contact with Kevin Harvick.

Gibbs attributed his team's recent sucress to old-fashioned teamwork.

"I think what's happened to us is our drivers and our teams have done a great job of working together," he suid, adding that Hamlin and his crew helped the other two with Pocono setups. People say you have three different cars, but really truly it takes great teamwork at this vel. I think it's been Kyle at some mile-and-ahalf [tracks] helping Denzy. So, I think right now both of them have really helped Joey."

But Gibbs cautioned that there's no guarantee the run will continue.

"Now this can all turn on a dime," he said. "I'm never confident, or I don't think anybody on our team feels like we've arrived for sure. It's just the last seven, eight weeks, we've had a

very good seven, eight weeks. "That's very hard to do in pro sports."

"Has a NASCAR official ever made a mistake that affected a driver as much as the MLB umpire's blown call last week that cost Detroit Tigers pitcher Armando Galarraga a perfect game?"

A: It happened in 2004 during a Camping World Truck Series race at Charlotte Motor Speedway. Carl Edwards was leading down the backstretch with four laps to go when the caution light came on. Edwards ed down, as he's supposed to do in a situation like that, when suddenly second-running Dennis Setzer sped by him into the lead.

Edwards looked again, and the light was green, but Setzer had such an advantage already that he went on to win the race.

Immediately afterward, Edwards argued unsu cessfully that the yellow light indeed had flashed on, but series officials said he was mistaken. Only when Edwards retrieved the in-truck camera footage from his truck did officials admit they'd made a mistake.

Still, Setzer kept the win. I was more hearthroken than I have ever been

[NASCAR president] Mike Helton talked to me out it and issued a press release that said they inadvertently turned on the lights. That meant the world to me, but I didn't get the trophy or anything.

"That is just part of any sport, and there are going to be mistakes, but it was a hard pill to swallow." NASCAR's policy generally has been to not reverse the outcome of a race after it's over, but officials generally will right a wrong if it can reasonably be done during the running of an event.

Q: In light of the fact that Robby Gordon's Sprint Cup car, with Ted Musgrave as the substitute driver, failed to qualify at Pocono while Gordon was off running the Baja 500, should Gordon focus on just one

A: No. Many think it's refreshing for a driver to be as versatile as Gordon, And Gordon himself, while disappointed his Cup car missed a race, vows to press on with his current racing program.

Gordon issued a statement thanking Musgrave and

the Cup crew and vowing to improve.

Knights' ride their trusty steed one last deployment

USS PELELIU, At sea – Goodbyes are always hard, especially when it involves a working relationship 40 years in the making.

Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 165 (Reinforced) set sail this week on its last deployment with the infamous CH-46E Sea Knight, lovingly referred to as the "Battle Phrog." The CH-46E Sea Knights with HMM-165 (Rein). will soon be replaced by new MV-22B Ospreys and the squadron will be renamed. However, the Phrog will still hold an important part in history.

The CH-46E Sea Knight, a Boeing-manufactured tandem rotor helicopter, has been used by the White Knights since the Vietnam War in a wide variety of

"The CH-46E is an especially capable aircraft," explained Captain William J. Moran, CH-46E pilot, HMM-165 (Rein). "It's been used to transport food, medical supplies, troops, and essential cargo all over the world in its long career with the Marine Corps."

Of all missions the Phrogs' of HMM-165 have flown, the most famous is often regarded as the extraction of the U.S. ambassador in Saigon. When Lady Ace 09 left Saigon that day the U.S. ended its involvement in the Vietnam War.

The White Knights Phrogs went on to fly missions all over the world, participating in operations during

the Gulf War as well as Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan. The White Knights gained international attention when they were called upon to rescue the infamous Jessica Lynch during a special operation during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

With everything the Phrog and the White Knights have been through, saying goodbye will be hard for the Marines who have spent their entire career working with them.

"I've been working with the CH-46E for over 13 years," said Gunnery Sgt. Wade M. Davis, CH-46E crew chief, HMM-165 (Rein)., 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit. "All the knowledge and experience I've taken away so far I will cherish and use when we eventually have to learn the ins and outs

of our new bird."

When the White Knights return from this deployment they will no longer will be known as HMM-165, but instead will be named Marine Medium Tiltrotor Helicopter Squadron 165.

Officially, March 1, 2011 will begin a new era for '165'.

"We will change names to VMM-165 and put to rest the CH-46E for the new MV-22 Osprey," explained Davis, a 36-year-old Ogden, Utah native.

A common question asked is what will happen to the Marines who currently work with the Phrogs.

Moran explained that once the White Knights come back from this deployment,

they will begin transitioning their personnel. A third of the Marines will stay with the White Knights to start training on the Osprey. Another third will leave and go to other units where the Sea Knight may still be in service, while the last third will come from units where they currently use the Osprey.

"The goal is to get the squadron up and running as soon as possible with the highest possible standards," said Moran, a 28-year-old St. Louis native.

When the day finally does come the Phrogs will hop their way to many different places. For a few it will be their final resting place.

"Some will go to the bone yard where

they will be preserved for war reserves, others will be placed in museums, and some will be rotated to other units where they will be used a bit more before they too are finally put to rest," said Moran.

After all is said and done, one thing can definitely be agreed upon by all that have worked with the Phrogs.

"Everything the CH-46E's have done is because of the mechanics," said Davis. "They are the ones who put in all those hours to keep them in the sky. Without them we wouldn't be where we are now and we wouldn't have been able to accomplish our mission."


