Sierra Army Depot has been charged with the opportunity to spearhead a TACOM initiative called the Strategic War Reserve – a pilot program that has the potential to be implemented at arsenals and depots throughout TACOM. This program is focused on setting conditions for the industrial base to provide faster and more significant material support to the force. This involves identifying and segmenting equipment -- \$3.2 million to start – so that the industrial base can deliver entire end items to the force, rather than just replacement parts. Sierra Army Depot has a great opportunity to show its capabilities and to lead a TACOM effort in this area.

One thing that LTC Cory often said to me, is that she was always impressed by the way the Sierra workforce stepped up to a challenge. No matter how short notice a requirement was, Sierra Army Depot always remained adaptable and resilient and met any challenge that was set before it and did so while maintaining an impressive reputation for safety. One of my goals is to maintain the positive momentum that we have had in safety in our efforts towards ISO 45001, as we continue to put safety first in our pursuit of Pride in Excellence.

### TACOM changes command, welcomes Brig. Gen. Lalor

DETROIT ARSENAL, Mich. - After more than three years as U.S. Army Tank-automotive and Armaments Command's commanding general. Maj. Gen. Darren Werner relinquished command of the logistics-focused organization to Brig. Gen. Michael Lalor. The transfer of leadership was conducted at the July 19 change of command ceremony held on the Detroit Arsenal.

"It has been an honor to serve you and lead you all. What you do each day makes a difference to the Soldiers, Families and communities we serve around the globe – and I'm proud to have been here to support the work you do," said Werner to the assembled crowd of Detroit Arsenal employees, community leaders and representatives from all levels of government.

The change of command ceremony is one of the Army's long-standing traditions and included elements like the firing of howitzers and the transfer of colors. The symbolic focus of the change of command ceremony was the transfer of TACOM's colors from the outgoing commander to the incoming commander, symbolizing the orderly continuity of command. The ceremony, presided by Army Materiel Command's Gen. Charles Hamilton, saw the TACOM colors passed from Werner to Hamilton, and Hamilton to Lalor.

"Today, we bid farewell to Maj. Gen. Darren Werner ... who has been a remarkable commanding general for TACOM," said Hamilton. "And we welcome a new commanding general, Brig. Gen. Michael Lalor ... bringing a wealth of experience and a lifetime of dedication."

Lalor recently served from July 2021-2023 as chief of ordnance and commandant for the U.S. Army Ordnance School, and now serves as the commanding general of TACOM.

"TACOM is known for the materiel we provide to our Soldiers and servicemembers. To be part of that legacy is an honor I'm glad to accept," said Lalor. "It is a great honor to lead a team of people that does so much for our country and Army. I look forward to continuing that work which has become so important in this age of great power competition."



HERLONG, Calif. -- Sierra Army Depot introduced its 44th commander, in a change of command ceremony, June 21, in Herlong.

Lt. Col. Jason A. Haynes took over for Lt. Col. Amy M. Cory as commander while Maj. Gen. Darren Werner, U.S. Army tank-Automotive and Armaments Command commanding general presiding over the proceedings. Werner himself would change command, July 19, at the TACOM headquarters in Detroit Arsenal, Mich.

"It's an honor to be able to serve in TACOM and in the industrial base," Haynes said as he addressed the ceremony audience. "I look forward to what the future holds for our depot and I am grateful for the opportunity to serve with all of you for the next few years."

Sierra Army Depot and TACOM celebrated its achievements under Cory's leadership including spearheading presidential drawdowns in support of military assistance to Ukraine, winning the Army Award for Materiel Excellence, as well as the SIAD fire department being named Army Materiel Command's fire department of the year, as well as multiple safety awards. Cory is moving on to be the logistics chief at the Joint Task Force in Fort McNair, Washington D.C. Haynes comes to Sierra Army Depot after serving as petroleum branch chief of current operations for the 377th Theater Sustainment Command in New Orleans, La.

"I am privileged and humbled to have been your commander for the last two years," Cory said. "In that time we have weathered many challenges together and celebrated much success. I am grateful for your unfailing support to our nation and the warfighter. Working together to accomplish every mission and meet every deadline with a genuine spirit of teamwork and pride."

Haynes comes to Sierra Army Depot after serving as an petroleum branch chief of current operations for the 377th Theater Sustainment Command in New Orleans, Louisiana. Werner pursuing modernization will be a key focus during Haynes' time at Sierra Army Depot.

"He is more than capable of leading the thirteen hundred Soldiers, Army civilian employees and contractors who manufacture and deliver readiness to Army and Department of Defense systems around the world," Werner said. "That's why, under the leadership of Lieutenant Colonel Haynes, we will focus on executing the modernization strategy for Sierra."


