Public notice of the Year 2009 **Fort Irwin Water Quality Report**

Fort Irwin's Water System is operated under a privatization contract with CH2MHill. As the system ownership is not transferred to CH2MHill, compliance responsibilities still reside with the U.S. Armv.

Fort Irwin has recently completed the Year 2009 Water Quality Report for Fort Irwin.

CH2MHill routinely monitors (on behalf of Fort Irwin) for contaminants in the drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The full results of the monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2009 are available on the web at www.irwin.army.mil/Post/ Environment/. This Web site also contains previous year's reports.

It is important to Fort Irwin that our customers be informed about water quality

The Year 2009 Water Quality Report meets all requirements for the Consumer Confidence Report for 2009. The Environmental Protection Agency and the State of California Title 22 requires that this report be prepared and posted by the community water system on an annual basis to keep the public informed.

Fort Irwin's report contains information on the source of the water and any contaminants that may be present in the source water. For example last year the Fort Irwin's Domestic Use (DU) water exceeded the maximum contaminate limits for Arsenic and Fluoride. The Reverse Osmosis (RO) water provided at small taps and water fountains is safe to drink.

This report's purpose is to improve public health protection by providing educational material to allow consumers to make educated decisions regarding any potential health risks pertaining to the quality, treatment, and management of their drinking water supply.

NTC welcomes Col. Tobin Green

New Operations Group commander takes lead to 'Train the Force'

The booms heard on the morning of June 8 indicated to this post the importance of the occasion that would follow. The cannon blasts of blank charges signified that National Training Center and Fort Irwin commanding general, Brig. Gen. Robert "Abe" Abrams, would be presiding over the change of command for Operations Group.

Abrams conferred to Col. Tobin Green the

leadership responsibility of Operations Group when he handed over the guidon from that unit. Green took charge of the unit, which was activated in 1982 to provide Observer/ Controller capability to the training conducted at the NTC. That initial unit consisted of one OC team, the Cobras. Today, Operations Group is comprised of 15 teams, each with a specific focus.

One mission of Operations Group is to provide feedback to rotational units, ensuring they leave the NTC prepared for combat operations. Operations Group has modified the rotational scenarios at the NTC in order to keep pace with operational requirements in Iraq and Afghanistan. The current counter insurgency fight and security force assistance mission challenges deploying units with a significantly more complex set of battlefield conditions that include civilians, news media, non-governmental officials, host country representatives, allied forces, guerilla forces, weapons of mass effects, joint operations,

They also have to clean the pool (vacuum) and always conduct on-going training for lifeguards and

1916th Support Battalion receives new commander

The 'Desert Warriors' of the 1916th Support Battalion welcomed their new commander during a ceremony at Fort Irwin, June 9.

After an inspection of troops, Lt. Col. Pete Calamaras took charge of the unit that, for the past two years, was led by Lt. Col. Bill Davis. The commander of 916th Support Brigade, Col. David Gaffney, handed Kalamaras the guidon and welcomed him to the National Training Center and Fort Irwin . Kalamaras comes from United States Army Forces Command, in Fort McPherson, Ga., where he served with force management.

"I look forward to what you'll bring to us, and the High Desert welcomes you," Gaffney said. "In the words of Gen. Schwarzkopf, 'When placed in command, take charge."

Calamaras told an audience of service members, leadership, and family of the 1916th, that he was honored to take command of what he considers a great organization.

"I am humble for the opportunity," Calamaras said. "Desert Warriors, you have my unyielding commitment."

The new commander acknowledged the importance and complexity of the unit's mission. The 1916th provides direct support maintenance, heavy equipment transportation and movement control to NTC rotational

and tenant units in order to ensure world class realistic training. Five subordinate units comprise the battalion, each having a role in the NTC mission and in the Global War on Terror. Currently, the 2nd Heavy Transportation Company and the 557th Maintenance

Company is deployed in the Middle East. The 699th Maintenance Company returned in December 2009 from a year-long tour in Iraq.

Gaffney commended Davis for his leadership of the 1916th during a time when three of his companies deployed to war. "Colonel Davis, I know that it's hard for you to believe that today is here and that your command tour is coming to an end," Gaffney said. "However, rest assured that your legacy does not end. You see, Bill took command back in June 2008 with a simple but powerful vision: Number one — develop a warrior's mindset with a focus on deployment training for his companies, with tactical operations remaining the standard, regardless of what a unit was doing, making sure it was ready to go to war. Although understaffed and undermanned, he was relentless in his pursuit to train Soldiers who could successfully move, shoot, communicate and survive at the NTC and abroad."

When Davis addressed the audience, he praised his unit and alluded that Calamaras would be impressed.

"Pete, you are inheriting the best group of Soldier logisticians in the Army and they will take care of you," Davis said. "I am not going to lie to you; this is a bitter-sweet day for me. However, it is made easier by the fact and by knowing that you will lead them well, and that I could not have hand-picked a better man for the job. Welcome to the team. Desert Warriors, you already know how I feel about you — I have never been so proud and honored to be part of an organization as I have these past two years. You've done everything I've asked and then some."

Davis will next serve in a joint fellowship at the U.S. Army War College in Carlisle, Pa.



Bella the Safety Bee says ... "Your best bet is to let the professionals handle the fireworks"

Fireworks possession, use prohibited on post

Approximately 10,000 people are treated in hospitals every year for injuries resulting from mishandled fireworks, over 3,000 of these usually are children. Also, several fatalities occur each year from fireworks.

Per NTC Regulation 420-2: The sale, storage, possession or use of fireworks of any description on the Fort Irwin Installation, including Army owned housing areas, is prohibited as well as in many townships and counties in California.

For areas outside the installation, check with local government officials about the use of fireworks. County, state, and federal government lands (i.e., parks) are off limits

Here are some safety tips if you are going to handle or purchase fireworks:

- · Read and follow all warnings and instructions.
- · Never allow children to play with or ignite fireworks.

- · Keep other people are out of range before lighting fireworks
- Only light fireworks on a smooth, flat surface away from the house, dry leaves, and flammable materials.
- Never try to relight fireworks that have not fully functioned.



- · Keep a bucket of water in case of a malfunction or fire.
- Have a fire extinguisher at all times while lighting
- If someone approaches you to sell one of many illegal fireworks, politely decline and contact your local authorities.
- Never buy fireworks from an individual's house or from someone on the street.
- Consumer fireworks regulated by the Consumer Product Safety Commission are packaged in bright colors and have safety warnings on the packaging.
- Typical consumer fireworks include fountains, cones, sparklers, firecrackers, bottle rockets and multiple tube products.
- · Illegal fireworks are often unpackaged and are wrapped with plain brown paper.
- Illegal fireworks are very unlikely to have any safety warnings or place of manufacture.
- Some illegal fireworks go by names such as M80, Quarter Sticks, or Cherry Bombs.



Armorer keeps unit mission ready

In the modern Army, there are many ways to be a Soldier, but on the battlefield a Soldier without a weapon is ineffective. Weapon familiarity and maintenance can be the deciding factor in a Soldier's survival.

All Soldiers are responsible for their personally issued weapon, but certain Soldiers are chosen to be the unit armorer. The armorer has additional training on the assembly/disassembly and maintenance of a variety of weapons systems. The armorer is also in charge of the unit arms room where weapons and sensitive items, such as night vision goggles, are stored when not in use.

The armorer is held to a higher level of accountability because of the importance of their duties, and it is unusual for a Soldier lower than the rank of sergeant to be the head armorer for a unit — unusual but not impossible.

Pfc. Andrea Witmer, Headquarters and Headquarters Troop, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, is an example of a young Soldier filling the shoes of the head armorer as the unit prepares for an upcoming deployment to Iraq with a mission readiness exercise at the U.S. Army National Training Center at Fort Irwin, Calif.

"The first time I touched a weapon was in basic training," said Witmer, a New Port Richey, Fla., native. "I never grew up with them. I had never seen them except for on television until I hit basic training."

Witmer said that she loved learning basic rifle marksmanship but it wasn't until she arrived at Fort Hood, Texas, where the 3rd ACR is based, that she was picked to attend the armorer course. After graduating the course, Witmer worked to get the unit's arms room ready for an annual inspection by III Corps and earned the first mark of excellence for the troop.

"It was a lot of work, but it was definitely worth it," said Witmer, who is trained as an automated logistics specialist.

At NTC, Witmer must keep accountability for more than 425 individual and crew served weapons. Witmer said that Soldiers look to the armorer as a weapons expert and often come to her when their weapon is malfunctioning.

"I've read regulations and technical manuals on my own time to make myself better at what I do," said Witmer. "But the best way to learn is from experience. If I don't know something, I'll be the first to admit it and then I'll do some research and try to figure it out. I always try to sit down and go through it with that person so that we are both learning."

Witmer said the biggest issue at NTC has been with Soldiers either not cleaning their weapon or taking their weapon apart for cleaning beyond their level of expertise.

In addition to being a junior enlisted armorer, Witmer admitted that some Soldiers are surprised that a female Soldier is so interested in and capable with weapons.

"I think it's more of an individual stereotype than a mass one," said Witmer. "I've gained a lot of respect for being in the arms room."

Sgt. Thomas Warden, a supply sergeant with HHT, 3rd ACR, said Witmer is the type of Soldier to get things done. Warden was the assistant armorer that helped Witmer stand up the unit's arms room at Fort Hood.

"She's squared away. She knows what she's doing," said Warden, a Jefferson, Texas, native. Warden has 10 years of combined service in the Army. "She enjoys the job, and she strives to excel."

Warden said that his advice to Witmer on the upcoming deployment to Iraq, her first, is to keep a level head and take the deployment 'one day at a time.'

For Witmer, being the unit armorer is an extra source of pride and has added to her experience in the Army so far.

"Being the armorer makes me feel accomplished," said Witmer. "It's kind of an honor."

Witmer will continue her armorer duties while the regiment is deployed to Iraq.
