FORT RILEY, Kansas – Danger Ready 2 enters its second week and Soldiers of the 1st Infantry Division continue to perform their functions at various sites across Fort Riley, Kansas, Oct. 30, 2023.

In a simulated combat environment, headquarters elements engaged forces while Soldiers assigned to sustainment operations maintained the 1st Inf. Div's fighting power.

“I believe the end state is to maximize our capabilities,” said Sgt. 1st Class Tyler Robinson, senior movements noncommissioned officer assigned to the 1st Sustainment, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Division Materials Center, 1st Inf. Div. “Knowing our capabilities, knowing how many heads or M915s or [Light Medium Tactical Vehicles] that we have in order to support all classes of supply.”

Logistics elements play a key role in all war-fighting capacities. The ability to sustain a fighting force often is the difference between victory and defeat. These commodities are the life-blood of any combat element and in a strenuous environment it is essential to know what a unit needs and how to supply them if they are traveling.

“I believe we are replicating what happens overseas,” said Robinson. “It’s great training. It’s kind of rough at times but that’s what refines you and makes you better.”

From the junior enlisted Soldier to the senior sustainment and logistics officer, Danger Ready 2 has provided training on the scope and scale of the essential support needed during large scale combat operations.
