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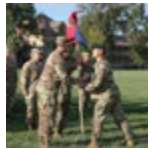
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EDITOR'S NOTE

BIG RED ONE WELCOMES NEW COMMAND SGT. MAJOR

Soldiers of the 1st Infantry Division welcomed Command Sgt. Maj. Derek Noyes as the new division command sergeant major during an assumption of responsibility ceremony on Fort Riley, Kansas, Sept. 29, 2023.

Noyes replaced Command Sgt. Maj. Clarence Raby, who assumed the position on Aug. 9, 2023 from then Command Sgt. Maj. Christopher Mullinax.

“This division has an incredible history and I am humbled, honored and incredibly excited to be standing before you today as a Big Red One Soldier and your command sergeant major,” said Noyes. “It’s not lost on me the legacy of the Soldiers who came before me in this storied division. From the battlefields of France, to the beaches of the Normandy, to the

jungles of Vietnam, to standing watch on the frontier of freedom in Europe, to the deserts of the Middle East.”

A native of Amarillo, Texas, Noyes enlisted in the United States Army in July 1996. He attended One Station Unit Training at Fort Knox, Kentucky, as an armor crewman. He has since held every enlisted leadership position in the armor and cavalry branches from tank gunner to brigade command sergeant major. Noyes now adds division command sergeant major to that list.

Noyes served as the command sergeant major of the 194th Armored Brigade, the operations sergeant major for the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade and the command sergeant major of the 3rd Battalion, 69th Armor Regiment, at Fort Stewart, Georgia.

He deployed twice as part of Operation Iraq Freedom, once in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and once more in support of Operation Spartan Shield.

He has completed all levels of non-commissioned officer education, while also graduating from the Army Recruiter Course, the M1A1 Master Gunner Course and the Battle Staff Course, to name a few. He holds a bachelor’s degree in history from the University of Maryland and is currently pursuing a master’s degree in human resources from Columbia Southern University.

“The reason I chose sergeant major [Noyes] is for the reasons I have just described,” said Maj. Gen. John V. Meyer III, commander of the 1st Inf. Div. and Fort Riley. “I want somebody who is a leader, who will accept the authority

that I have given him and the responsibility that comes with that.”

“I wanted somebody to accomplish what we need to do in the division and that is to focus on our people, focus on gunnery and focus on our maintenance; and this command sergeant major has the right training and experience to help us improve in those areas.”

Since its inception, the noncommissioned officer corps has served an essential role in the United States Army.

They are pivotal players in understanding commanders intent and end state and executing key tasks.

“When something happens to us on the beaches of Normandy on June 6, 1944, and the officers are no longer present on that beach because they have been killed, the noncommissioned officer corps steps up and leads the Soldiers off that beach and up that bluff to liberate a continent,” said Meyer. “That’s the authority our NCO Corps has.”

1ST INFANTRY DIVISION HOSTS COMBINED UNCASING & CASING CEREMONY

OCTOBER 4TH

FORT RILEY, Kansas

The 1st Infantry Division conducted a combined casing and uncasing ceremony for the 1st Combat Aviation Brigade and 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, respectively, at Cavalry Parade Field on Fort Riley, Kansas, Oct. 4, 2023.

U.S. Soldiers, senior leaders, distinguished guests, friends and family of the Big Red One attended the ceremony to welcome back 2nd ABCT, “Dagger” Brigade, from their nine-month rotation. Simultaneously, the division prepared to send off 1st CAB, “Demon” Brigade, for their rotation to Europe.

An uncasing and casing ceremony is a reflection of customs practiced since the birth of the Army in 1775. In the past, unit flags, also known as the colors, served as a rallying point for

Soldiers during the smoke and fog of battle to assist Soldiers in finding the center of the battle lines and the commander. Today, the colors continue to be a symbol of the unit and the commander, and accompany the command wherever they go, whether deployed or in garrison.

During 2nd ABCT’s rotation throughout Eastern Europe, they trained and operated in conjunction with NATO allies and partners in support of Operation Atlantic Resolve. Their return marked the first time that the entire division was together since 2021. But with the return of the brigade, came the departure of another.

2nd ABCT uncased their flag, which signified the completion of their mission in Europe and their resumption of responsibilities at Fort Riley. 1st

CAB cased their flag in preparation for the journey to the European theater, where it will once again serve as the tip of the spear and rally point from which the Demon Brigade will conduct their mission in Europe.

Following the casing of the colors, U.S. Army Maj. Gen. John V. Meyer III, the 1st Inf. Div. and Fort Riley commanding general, gave a speech expressing the division’s support to allies in Europe.

“Standing in front of us, you see the division colors, and for a brief moment on that field was the first time that all of the colors in this division at Fort Riley were present and uncased on the parade field since the beginning of 2021,” Meyer said. “And it’s the last time they’ll be uncased for the foreseeable future, as the

United States Army continues their commitment and our commitment to the freedom of Europe, our allies and the alliance.”

Meyer welcomed back the Dagger Brigade and spoke about the difference that 1st CAB will make while they are away, representing the division and the United States.

“For the family members of the Dagger Brigade, I know you’re all happy that your Soldiers are home and we’re pleased to have everybody back,” Meyer said. “For the Soldiers in the Demon Brigade who are getting ready to deploy, our country needs you in Europe and you will make a difference. Your presence on the continent of Europe shows our country’s commitment to our allies and it makes a difference every single day.”

Col. Bryan M. Harris, the 2nd ABCT commander, shared insight on what the brigade did in Europe during their rotation and expressed his pride following the brigade’s accomplishments.

“Like countless Dagger Soldiers who stepped forward to put tyranny in check, these Dagger Soldiers did the same” Harris said. “The Soldiers standing before you, their allies and partners know what they have accomplished. We demonstrated to the world and our allies what a ready, resilient and lethal armored brigade combat team is capable of in a combined arms operation.”

On behalf of the brigade, Harris thanked friends and families for their support during the Dagger rotation, and wished the Demon Brigade a successful rotation.

“To the families and community, thank you,” Harris said. “We can never repay the sacrifices you gave for freedom. The countless late night

calls, packages, letters and photos reminded everyone of us what we were defending. To the Demon Brigade, safe travels and Godspeed.”

Col. Chad P. Corrigan, the 1st CAB commander, spoke about the last time the brigade was in Europe and the training they conducted leading into the next rotation.

“The CAB came home December 2021 from the last rotation,” Corrigan said. “In the last 22 months the Soldiers and NCOs worked hard, doing very realistic training to be combat ready, really a lot of work on the maintenance side to make sure all the aircrafts are ready to go.”

Corrigan looked to his Soldiers and the crowd, and said the brigade is prepared to go back and give their support.

“They’re ready, and we’re looking forward to going over there to support

the mission of Operation Atlantic Resolve,” Corrigan said. “We’re ready to add another chapter in the long history of this historic division, and are proud to follow the footsteps of our recently deployed teammates from the second brigade and division headquarters.”

Corrigan thanked the Flint Hills community, families and friends for their support and care.

“No one serves alone,” Corrigan said. “I know goodbyes are never easy, but your love and support makes us stronger. No mission too difficult. No sacrifice too great. Duty first, above the first.”

The 1st Inf. Div. remains steadfast and ready to support the United States’ commitment to NATO allies and partners in Europe. The Demon Brigade will be in Europe for nine months as part of a regular rotation of forces in support of Operation Atlantic Resolve. They are expected to return in July 2024.

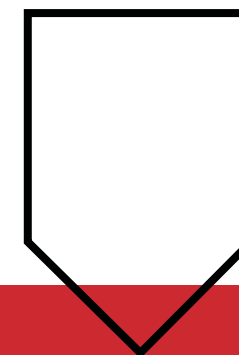

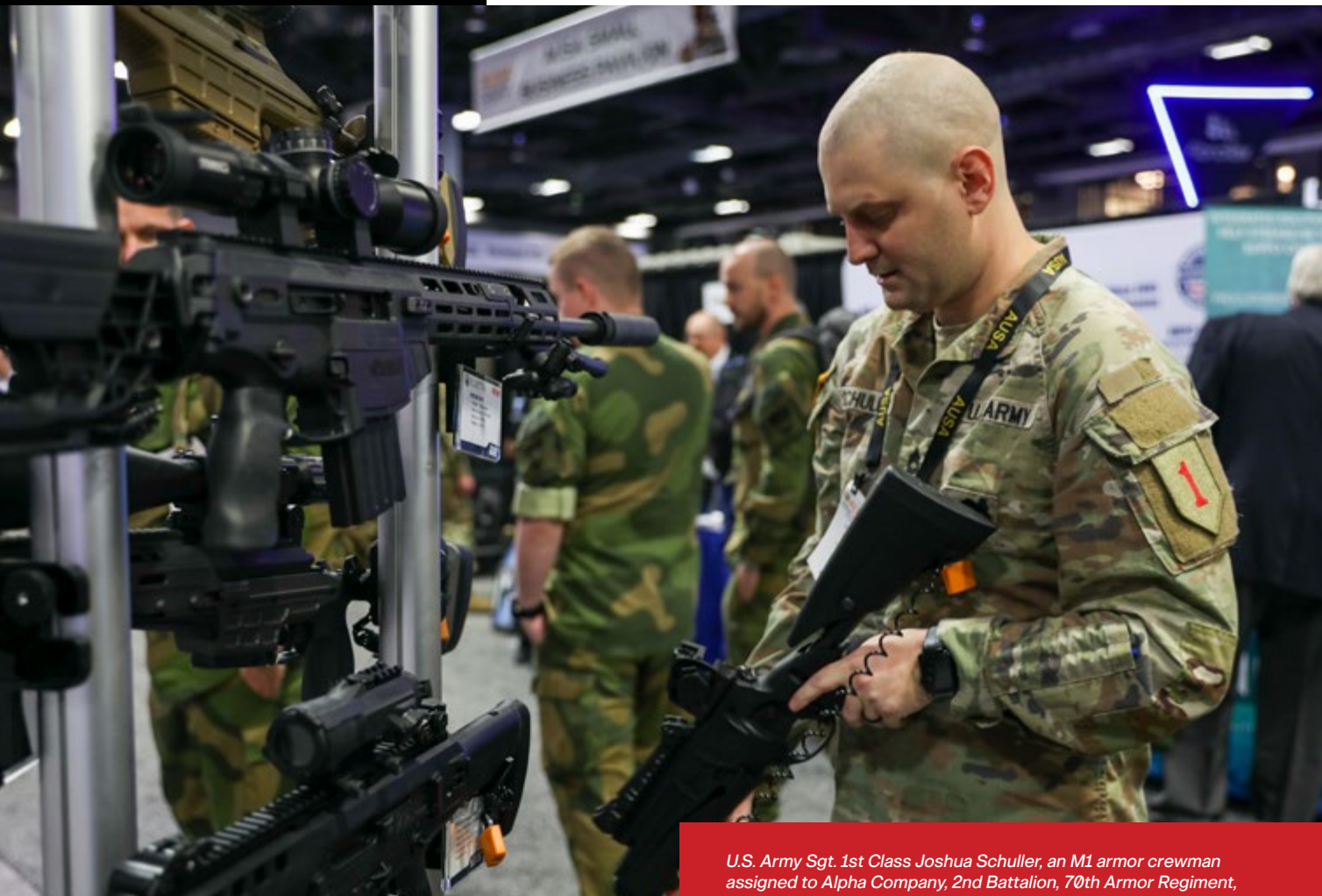
The meeting presented a dynamic conference which delivered the Army’s key messages, highlighted the

1ST INFANTRY DIVISION HOLDS VICTORY RECEPTION ACTIVATION CEREMONY

OCTOBER 19TH



FORT RILEY, Kansas

The 1st Infantry Division conducted a combined activation ceremony and assumption of command and responsibility for Victory Reception Company (VRC), Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion, Division Artillery, 1st Inf. Div., at Cavalry Parade Field, Fort Riley, Kansas, Oct. 19, 2023.

Big Red One Soldiers, senior leaders, distinguished guests, friends, and family of the VRC attended the ceremony to witness the uncasing of the colors and the assumption of command, and responsibility.

Although Installation Reception Companies are a new formation within the

Army, their purpose can be traced back to the Replacement Depots that were established during World War I. These organizations were responsible for training newly arrived soldiers while accounting for personnel returning to the home front. Personnel Service Battalions (PSBs) replaced the Replacement Depots following the Vietnam War. However, as the Army modernized in response to the changing demands during the War on Terrorism, PSBs were deactivated, and their mission was given to Garrison Departments of Human Resources.

As the First Infantry Division officially activated its Installation Reception Company and uncased the colors,

it began the new company's history and lineage.

After assuming command and responsibility, Capt. William Gagnon-Brubaker, the newly appointed VRC commander, along with 1st Sgt. Jason M. Wright, the newly appointed first sergeant of the VRC, and Lt. Col. Derek J. Raymond, the commander of HHBn, 1st Inf. Div., conducted a passing of colors ceremony.

During the ceremony, Raymond passed the company guidon to Gagnon-Brubaker, officially designating him as the first commander of the new company. Gagnon-Brubaker then entrusted Wright with the responsibility of the unit by passing him the guidon.

Finally, Wright passed the guidon to the guidon bearer, symbolizing his allegiance to the Soldiers of VRC and the continuation of the NCO support channel.

“There’s a saying, ‘First impressions are lasting impressions,’” Raymond said. “I can’t think of a more meaningful expression that represents the Victory Reception Company. The VRC is the first impression of the 1st Infantry Division for every Soldier.”

Raymond gave his remarks, explaining the importance and mission of the new unit.

“While we are not in combat operations today, the Victory Reception Company prepares every new Soldier to arrive at their new units, ready to train for combat operations,” Raymond said.

“When Soldiers leave VRC, they arrive at their new units ready to train. They are ready to become more lethal, and they are ready to deploy, fight, and win our nation’s wars.”

On the other hand, Gagnon-Brubaker discussed how leaders across the division collaborated to establish the VRC.

“Today’s activation ceremony marks the culmination of 23 months of hard work

transitioning reception operations from the Fort Riley Garrison to the First Infantry Division,” Gagnon-Brubaker said. “This could only be achieved with the close cooperation of leaders across the 1st Infantry Division, the Fort Riley Garrison and the Fort Riley Community.”

He expressed gratitude to past and present Soldiers and NCOs for their assistance in preparing incoming Soldiers for their units.

“Thank you again for your tireless efforts in taking care of Soldiers and preparing them for their new assignment,” Gagnon-Brubaker said. “Your hard work does not go unnoticed by the leaders across this installation and is reflected in consistent praise and thanks I hear from new Soldiers and their Families long after they have departed our care.”

The VRC will continue to ensure seamless integration of new soldiers and their families into the 1st Inf. Div., Fort Riley, and Flint Hills Community while building combat power for the division and Fort Riley units.

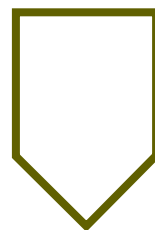

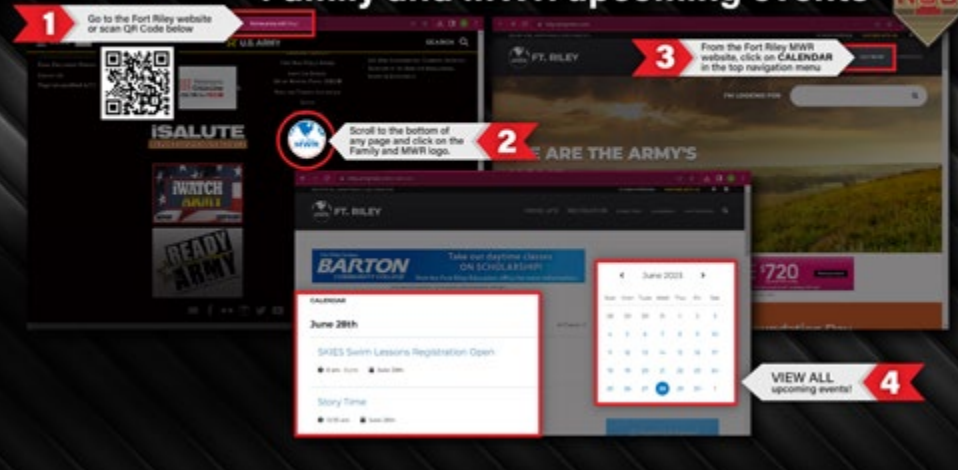
