Tokyo Metro System


The Tokyo Metro System is one of the most expansive and efficient train networks in the world.

The network is comprised of dozens of train lines with hundreds of stations that are opperated by several different passanger rail companies.

The Tokyo Metro System has tens of millions of daily riders. The Keikyu Line has an average of 2,232,264 passengers daily, with 58,202 of them arriving or departing from Yokosuka-Chuo station.

It might seem complicated, but it is easy once you learn how the system works!





Reading Train Maps

This map is for the JR-East trains, meaning it mostly shows lines that are operated by the East Japan Railway Company. Other companies may use different designs and formats, but the common principals are the same.



Each line is given a name, abbreviation, color, and symbol. This is an example of the line that goes to JR Yokosuka Station.

Even if you can't read Japanese, you can identify lines and stations by their custom symbol!



Each station on a line is given its own unique symbol. Each symbol will have the same color and abbreviation of the line and have its own custom identification number. This is an example of the symbol for JR Yokosuka Station.




Stations with multiple lines will have multiple symbols repersenting every line that has a stop at that station.



Reading Train Charts

Train companies display informational charts at the station and on the train. Each company is a little different but the main system is the same. These charts are from the Keikyu Corporation.



Getting to the Platform



Buying a Ticket

All train stations have a fare chart near the ticket machines. The chart is used to determine the cost of an individual one way ticket. Ticket prices vary and are based on distance. Find your desired ending location on the map, the number displayed with the station is the cost of the ticket fare. After you determine the fare buy a ticket at the machine for that amount.

The image to the left is a section of the fare chart at Shinagawa Station (KK01).

Use an IC Card to nake travelina easier IC Cards are prepaid cards that can be used to pay for trains without a ticket. It can also be used for busses, vending machines, and some stores.

Scan your IC Card when you enter your departing station and when you exit at your destination and it will automatically deduct the proper fare amount.

IC Cards can be purchased and recharged at most train stations. You can also add to a wallet on a smart phone.

Train Type

The front and side of each train will display the type of train and the direction of travel.

Make sure to check the signs before you get on the train!



Screens on the train will display information that you can use to quide your trip.



CFAY Train Access

There are three train stations on two different lines that are walking distance from CFAY.

All three stations have several connecting bus lines operated by the Keikyu Corp.

Yokosuka-Chuo and Shioiri Stations on the Keikyu Main Line directly connect to HND Airport and the Shinkansen. You can always set a navigation app to 'transit' mode to get in-depth and real time directions!
