Wardak went on to say, "We have a short time before the second iteration of the parliamentary elections.

That Afghan people should have the freedom to select their own candidate."

The parliamentary, social and public affairs department of the Ministry of Defense are conducting a big media campaign informing the public of the degree of security that will be provided for the parliamentary elections.

"We will ensure security for our area of responsibility," said Wardak.

During the press conference, Wardak informed reporters that Afghan National Security Forces have been in strategic coordination and communication meetings to ensure security.

Included in the planning conferences have been commanders of the Afghan National Army, Afghan Border Patrol, Afghan National Police and U.S Army.

Wardak told reporters that ANSF have also, "coordinated with the governors, sub-govenors and coalition forces in our AOR."

A Combat Medic graduation ceremony was held for members of the Afghan National Army and the Afghan National Police in the conference room, here at Pol-e-Charki.

The ceremony began by reciting of few verses of the Holy Quran.

ANA Col. Abdul Aziz Gulastanee, 201st Corps Surgeon, spoke to the new medical graduates at the ceremony.

"The medical section is the most important section," said Gulastanee, "besides the other sections, we should increase our knowledge and familiarize ourselves with modern technology."

ANP Col. Baryalei Kamal Porey, 202nd Shamshad Zone, surgeon said, "The doctors have important role to treat and take care of patients."

The Portugal mentors donated 20 hot storage food containers for those soldiers who are at the main gates and outposts of Pol-e-charki.

ANA Col. Abdul Hadi Faheem, Pol-e-charki Garrison commander, ANA Lt.Col. Mohammad Akram, Pol-e-charki Garrison Logistic officer, NCOs, and soldiers appreciated the Portugal mentors, especially the Portugal Army Pole-charki garrison commander and his team.

The Portugal mentors aid the 201st headquarters in different

dishes, 12 large tents and 150 radios to flood victim families.

The 2nd brigade personnel have conducted several missions of this type in their area of responsibility for flood victims. The affected areas include Kama, Momandra, Bahsod, Shewa and districts of the Jalalabad province, the Surkani district of the Kunar province, and Qarghai and Kakas districts, of the Laghman province.

The 2nd brigade personnel were

able to carry out this mission by utilizing their heavy equipment such as seven ton Ranger trucks and ambulances.

Also utilized were engineering vehicles, including bulldozers, graders and lodgers to rescue the residents of the above mentioned areas from the flood.

Over the course of the flooding, the Afghan Air Corps have rescued 2,786 women and children from the flood.
