EC-121: Honor the Fallen

The EC-121 two-bell ceremony is a solemn occasion to remember those aircrewmembers who lost their lives on April 15th, 1969 while in the line of duty. It has also become a tradition for Naval Cryptologic Aircrewmembers that fly in the Pacific Theater, who continue to conduct very similar operations and face similar threats. At Navy Information Operations Command (NIOC) Pacific in Hawaii, there is a brass plaque listing the names of all those lost on that day. Junior enlisted Korean language CTIs continue to care for the plaque and the logbook that accompanies it, which holds names of its custodians. That logbook lists names from long before NIOC Pacific had an Aircrew presence.

Memorials for the lost crew began in Atsugi, Japan in the 1970s and were held by Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron One (VQ-1) until the 1990s, when VQ-1 moved to Misawa, Japan. They were held there every year until 2014, when NIOC Misawa closed and the Aircrewmembers, the ceremony, the plaque, and the memory of the crew of the EC-121 migrated to NIOC Pacific, where the ceremony is still held every year on Ford Island.

The ceremony has spread across the Naval Cryptologic community in recent years. Ceremonies have been held at

the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California, NIOC Pensacola on Corry station, Florida, and now at Cryptologic Warfare Group SIX at Fort Meade, Maryland.

This year's ceremony is the continuation of what has now become a tradition wherever cryptologic Aircrewmembers who have flown in the Pacific go. The remembrance of the crew of the EC-121 is also a chance to reflect on our own places in the history of cryptology.

The men who were taken on that day in 1969 have earned veneration, but when looking at their pictures and thinking about their mission and lives, it is hard not to think about how similar they are to those who fly today.

To imagine the jokes they might have told each other, the way they might have lived in close quarters, or the way they must have dealt with the very particular set of challenges that only cryptologists know. Their photographs conjure up all the joys, the struggles, and the purpose that makes flying as part of a crew an indelible part of every Aircrewman's memories. When seen in this light, one can feel their loss anew; a loss mixed with the pride that comes with being part of a legacy. When lost in this emotion, one knows that the past is not a distant or foreign land, at least not to a cryptologic Aircrewman every April 15th.



HONORING ONE OF OUR OWN

Cryptologic Technician Collection (CTR) 2nd Class Jack Michael Brown, of St. Louis, Missouri, was honored June 17, 2024, during a memorial service at the Argonne Hills Chapel in Fort George G. Meade, MD.

Brown, who was attached to Cryptologic Warfare Activity SIX-FIVE, died in the early hours of May 22, 2024, from injuries sustained through a motor vehicle collision.

In attendance at the memorial service were CTR2's close friends and family, which in truth meant the entire CWA-65 command, along with others from the Cryptologic Warfare Group SIX enterprise. Attendees and speakers alike remembered and honored Brown by sharing their favorite stories, many noting that he never met a stranger and lived an enormous life full of laughter, love, and friendship.

"I said Jack had depth, and I meant it," said CTRC Ann M. Benson, Brown's divisional Chief Petty Officer. "He could be light, funny, perceptive, and ambitious. Jack had a gravity that pulled people in. He cared deeply for those around him. And could see how he, and the rest

of us, fit within the navy.

"When his [Commanding Officer] notified our division of his passing, Sailors instantly fell apart," Benson continued. "In my honest opinion, I think it will take us a very long time to heal from this wound, because he was fundamental to our foundation. It was an honor to be his Chief and he will be deeply missed."

Brown is survived by his parents, Jeff and Michelle, his sister Annika, and a multitude of others in his extended family; as well as by his boyfriend, Kieran, and his dog, Starboard. He is also survived by a village of friends and shipmates, most of whom showed up to say farewell.

During his opening remarks, LT Troy Sundermeyer, the CWG-6 Chaplain, reminded attendees that they are not alone with their pain.

"We grieve because we care," said Sundermeyer. "We grieve because we love. We grieve because Jack is a part of who we are. (...) We grieve, and experience sadness, because we have lost a member of our family. And while we will certainly experience this type of grief, we must remember that we need not grieve alone."





MAKING WHAT'S OLD INTO NEW

When things are broken, we don't always fix them; we're more likely to cast them to the background to collect dust, never to be remembered.

For 12 years, Cryptologic Technician Interpretive (CTI) Adam Peña from Cryptological Warfare Group SIX (CWG-6), has been taking newly checked-in Sailors to-and-from Clinic 3 at Fort George G. Meade's Kimbrough Ambulatory Care Center. Throughout that time he has observed a small, unpolished bell perched on a dusty wooden mount, its cord hanging by its last connecting fibers, slowly deteriorating over time.

"I've seen that bell every time I come into the dental clinic, as I bring in [sponsees], and every time I see it, I'm like, I could fix that," said Peña. "And then the last person I sponsored just told [the front desk personnel], 'Hey, he said he's gonna fix your bell.'"

As a result, Rhonda Cain, a medical support assistant at Clinic 3, handed over the bell to be in Peña's

care. During Peña's free time, his recreational hobby of decorative rope work would be put to the test.

Peña was not always interested in rope working, however, he said he took up the hobby after having a conversation with a Captain White a few years ago, back when he was applying for the Navy's Officer Candidate School (OCS).

"I was applying for OCS, and [Captain White] said, 'as a CTI, you're not going to feel like you're in the Navy,'" said Peña. "He went on to say, 'find things that make you connect to the Navy.' And I came across [decorative rope work], and I kind of kept doing it and enjoyed it."

Throughout April, Peña worked on beautifying the bell in his free time. First, he started by replacing the cord. He used a spiral knot with two diamond knots and finished it off with traditional cord whipping. As for the bell itself, it only needed a little bit buffing and polishing to restore it in time for its delivery to Clinic 3 on May 10.

Cain, who was working at the front desk once again, reportedly let out an excited shout after she saw the refurbished bell.

"Peña saw it and said he would make it look beautiful, and he exceeded my expectations," said Cain. "We definitely put it more in the forefront of the front desk now (...) and it's definitely going to be a conversation piece for the new service members who come in."






Fleet & Family On the Move

Ten years ago on Fort George G. Meade, the Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) celebrated its move to 2212 Chisholm Avenue. However, due to unforeseen circumstances FFSC will be moving their service hub once again to the National Business Park (NBP).

For over 44 years Fleet and Family has been servicing Navy families after concerns were brought up during a Family Awareness Conference held in Norfolk, VA, 1978. Soon after, the first FFSC (formerly known as Navy Family Service Center (NFSC) was built in Norfolk, VA in 1979. After its construction in 1988 and two moves, the FFSC will now be moving to NBP 306.

“It’s been chaos. Controlled chaos at that,” said Joyette Weber, the Director of FFSC Ft. Meade. “We were hoping actually to be over here to NBP 306 last December, but because of the continuing resolution with no funding to make things happen, we had been put on hold.”

Currently FFSC supports over 18,000 service members and 8,000 family members in the Fort Meade area. They are responsible for providing wide variety of services including: deployment support, relocation assistance, confidential non-medical clinical counseling, personal and family life education,

financial readiness, employment assistance, and parent support and transition assistance program

“I had my counselors over here first because we were able to get them duty cell phones because they need to be able to talk to their clients in a safe space,” said Weber. “Then I sent my sapper folks over, my PFM, my financial manager over, and then finally the rest of the crew came over [June 10.]”

“I’m excited about the move,” Karol Yox, FFSC’s Family life Specialist. “The command has worked really hard to get us this space. They help make sure that we can continue providing the services that we need to provide for the sailors and their families.”

Yox says that this new facility will allow more service members to be trained through the increase of classroom capacities. Currently, the Transitional Assistance Program (TAP) seats 25 service members every week and classes are booked until February. In the new large classroom, they will be able to seat an additional 15 participants, and the smaller classroom size will increase from 15 to 20 seats.

In addition to the move to NBP 306, Fleet and Family is planning to provide a new service: Spouse Indoctrination, or INDOC.

“Spouse INDOC is something that we did a few years back, but reimaged,” explained Yox. “We have learned that if we can bring them [to FFSC] then they can see what we have to offer to become more knowledgeable. So one of the things we will do is a scavenger hunt where you have to find the resources and that way you understand what the resources are.”

By using this kind of interactive activity it allows spouses and service providers to create a connection. Spouses will have a more impactful opportunity to understand the resources available and make them more resilient to potential obstacles they can experience.

Ft. Meade’s Fleet and Family Support Center has gone through a plethora of changes over the years, but the one thing remains the same: providing aid to Sailors and their families.

“We are here for you,” said Yox. “We are here for you. We’re here for your family. That’s why we do what we do. Don’t be afraid of utilizing our services.”


