NAVY FAMILY OMBUDSMAN PROGRAM



USS Roosevelt holds Change of Command Ceremony

Cmdr. Jared Carlson relieved Cmdr. Jeffrey Chewning as Commanding Officer of USS Roosevelt (DDG 80), an Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer, on Nov. 1 at Naval Station (NAVSTA) Rota, Spain.

"As Roosevelt continues to operate inside the weapons engagement zone, she's empowered by her crew to be able to



continue supporting Fleet commanders," Chewning said. "I am so thankful and proud of what these men and women do on a daily basis. I am truly humbled to have been surrounded by such great Americans."

Chewning, a native of Germantown, Maryland, has been in command of Roosevelt since April 21, 2023. During his command, Roosevelt completed its fifth and sixth Forward-Deployed Naval Forces-Europe (FDNF-E) patrols in support of regional and national security interests, operating in both the U.S. Sixth Fleet and U.S. Fifth Fleet Area of Operations.

On its most recent patrol, Roosevelt patrolled through the North and Baltic Seas, participating in Baltic Eagle operations and operating with NATO's Standing NATO Maritime Group One. In the Eastern Mediterranean Sea, Roosevelt integrated with the USS Wasp Amphibious Ready Group, provided

Foreign Humanitarian Aid in Gaza, and promoted ballistic missile defense of Israel, Europe, and NATO. After transiting the Suez Canal, Roosevelt provided deterrence from Houthi aggression in the northern Red Sea in support of U.S. allies and partners.

Carlson, a native of Wahpeton, North Dakota, commissioned through the U.S. Naval Academy, and prior to taking command, served as Roosevelt's executive officer since November 2023.

Roosevelt, named after U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his wife Eleanor, is one of five U.S. Navy destroyers based in Rota, Spain and assigned to Commander, Task Force 65 in support of NATO's Integrated Air Missile Defense architecture. These FDNF-E ships have the flexibility to operate throughout the waters of Europe and Africa, from the Cape of Good Hope to the Arctic Circle, demonstrating their mastery of the maritime domain.

Esaú Peña, 34, knew from a young age that two-wheeled vehicles were going to play an important part in his life. Since he was a little boy, he would ride his bike everywhere and as soon as he was able to get his license, he started driving motorcycles. When he drove for the first time, he realized that he wanted to dedicate his life to the motor world. Peña then decided to move to Barcelona and study to become a race mechanic. When he got the first glimpse of the racing world, he knew he had chosen the right path.

Peña, a world champion, states that his greatest achievement is being able to do what he loves for a living.

"There are not many job offers in this sector – it is very difficult to get in

During the past few years, he has worked with amazing riders in different world championships. However, winning the Moto2 World Championship with Ai Ogura has made 2024 the best year in his career.

His short-term goal is to enjoy the rest of the season with Ai Ogura, the rider that made his dream come true. His longterm goal is to be promoted to MotoGP and his dream is to win another World Championship!

Peña lives in Rota, but spends most of his time traveling due to his job. When he talks about Rota to people from other parts of the world, everybody recognizes it because of the base. "The base has done a lot for the economy and the culture of Rota" he says. "Rota is what it is thanks to the base." His job takes him to the United States every year and every year he looks forward to that trip. He loves the culture, the gastronomy, the lifestyle and the way Americans enjoy sports. In fact, his favorite racer is from the United States: Nicky Hayden.

His travel recommendations are Australia, Japan and Indonesia. However, and you all probably know by now, roteños and roteñas are obsessed with Rota. Peña moved back to Rota in 2022 and he never wants to leave again, "even if they gave me all the gold in the world!"

When Peña was a little boy, he would take apart all of his toys and then put them together again. Now he takes apart motorcycles, puts them together, and wins world championships. He is grateful for his family and friends, who have always supported him and helped him achieve his goals.

"If you have a dream, fight for it." He stated. "there will be good moments and bad moments, but there is nothing more beautiful than the feeling of making your dreams come true."

Homeschoolers visit Jardín Botánico Celestino Mutis

A group of homeschool families visited the Jardín Botánico Celestino Mutis in Rota, Oct. 13. The garden is situated along Avenida de la Diputación and close to the beach and the pine forest. It is a relaxing space and an area that packs a lot of biodiversity in the park. Walking along the paths, you will find many different varieties of trees and plants from our local area and from other areas of the world. There are over 18 varieties of oak trees found in the garden as well as other plants like the Canary Island Dragon Tree and the Moroccan Atlas Tree that have adapted to our dry and sunny climate in Rota.

In the park, you can see different varieties of birds, insects and reptiles. If you are lucky, you might get to experience seeing chameleons crawling on rocks, trees or other plants.

The garden's head biologist led a guided tour in English where he talked about the history and founding of the botanical garden. The garden was named after Jóse Celestino Mutis who






was born in Cádiz in 1732, but he died in 1808 in Bogotá, Columbia. He was a Spanish priest, doctor, botanist and mathematician. He is known not only as a great scientist, but also as a great promoter of knowledge.

If you wish to visit the botanical garden, entrance is free, and it is open from 10 in the morning until 9 in the evening. The park is closed on Mondays.






























MWR Library Bookmark Design Contest | DODEA High Schools Achieve Honor Roll

The Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) Europe Region is proud to announce that 19 of its high schools have earned Platinum status and two have achieved Gold status on the prestigious Advanced Placement (AP) School Honor Roll. The fact that every high school was recognized underscores the region's commitment to broadening access to college-level courses and promoting equity in education.

"Equity and access to rigorous instruction for every student are at the heat of our regional goals," said Dr. Michelle Howard-Brahaney, Europe Director for Student Excellence. "Our AP programs are a critical component of helping students develop the skills and confidence to succeed in college, career, and beyond."

The AP School Honor Roll celebrates schools that are delivering exceptional results in their AP programs while ensuring increased access for students. This annual recognition is based on key criteria, reflecting each school's dedication to fostering a college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit, and maximizing college readiness.

To earn Platinum status, the highest award, schools must meet the following criteria for their Class of 2024:

80% or more of students took at least one AP course before graduating.

50% or more of students earned potential college credit by achieving an AP exam score of 3 or higher.


15% or more of students took a total of five AP courses during their high school years, with at least one taken in 9th or 10th grade.

Recent studies highlight the importance of early exposure to college-level coursework in boosting college readiness and increasing the likelihood of students pursuing higher education. According to one study, students who engage in rigorous AP courses are more likely to persist in college and graduate on time.

Tami Elder, the Europe Instructional Systems Specialists for AP, worked with secondary counselors to embrace a broader view of College Readiness. "Throughout the region, we've expanded our vision of what college and career readiness truly means," said Elder. "It's about providing equity and access to academic rigor—and cultivating resilience, adaptability, and critical thinking, ensuring that every student is prepared to excel and thrive in an ever-evolving world."

At ten schools, every graduate in the Class of 2024 took at least one AP class during their high school career, marking an extraordinary achievement in providing

Health Promotions - Fight Inflammation with Food

Chronic inflammation is a state of persistent activation of the immune system, which may contribute to chronic diseases such as diabetes, cardiovascular disease and cognitive decline. The foods you eat can have power over the inflammatory response in the body. Certain foods can help fight inflammation, whereas others can make it worse.

Anti-inflammatory foods - foods which fight inflammation-are all part of the Mediterranean style eating philosophy. These foods consist of fruits, vegetables, legumes, whole grains, seeds, lean proteins and small amounts of dairy and olive oil. Plant-based foods provide vitamins, minerals, fiber and phytochemicals that can protect our cells against inflammation. Foods such as fish, nuts and plant oils contain monounsaturated fats which are good for blood vessels, heart and brain health.

Here are some my favorite foods that fight inflammation!

Berries: strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, blackberries contain phytochemicals called anthocyanins this gives them their red and purple hues. Anthocyanins have an anti-inflammatory effect on cells and are associated with lower risks of heart disease, cognitive decline and diabetes.

Fatty fish: salmon, tuna, sardines, trout - are rich in omega-3 fatty acids, which have been shown to reduce cardiovascular disease risk.

Leafy Greens:

arugula, chard, kale and spinach - all good sources of vitamins A, B, C, E and K, as well as minerals (iron, magnesium and potassium). Not to mention, loaded with phytochemicals. All of which help to reduce inflammation levels over time.

Nuts and Seeds: pistachios, almonds and pumpkin seeds are rich in fiber and other nutrients that help promote healthy gut bacteria and are good for brain health. Other nuts like walnuts, flaxseed and chia are good sources of omega-3 fatty acids.

Dark Chocolate: my personal favorite rich in protective plant polyphenols and catechins, dark chocolate is well known for it's heart healthy benefits. To reap those benefits - be sure to choose the chocolate with at least 85% cocoa

Foods that promote inflammation tend to the ultra-processed foods with added sugars, salts and fats. Avoid eating processed foods such as hotdogs, sausages, candy, chips, donuts, fatty meats, ect. Instead, opt for whole, natural foods with minimal processing to help reduce and prevent chronic inflammation.

Recommendations: To get enough foods that fight inflammation, eat at least two servings of fatty fish per week and at least two fruits and 3 servings of vegetables per day. Since nuts are higher in fat and calories, enjoy a small amount each day (1/4 cup or small handful). A key to promoting gut health is to load up on fiber-rich foods, this includes fruits and vegetables along with whole grains,

beans and lentils.

Make the most of your meals by adding a colorful green salad loaded with vegetables, berries and use a little olive oil for dressing. nstead of using refined, processed grains, opt for whole grains

such as guinoa or brown rice.

Tables are filled with seafood, jamón ibérico, roasted lamb or turkey, and finished with sweets like "turrón" and "polvorones." These crumbly almond treats hail from Estepa, Andalucía, and the trick is to give them a little smash while they're still wrapped. If you can manage to eat one without making a mess, you've mastered the Spanish Christmas!

New Year's Eve: The Challenge of the 12 Grapes

As the clock approaches midnight on New Year's Eve, Spaniards prepare for "Las 12 Campanadas," or the 12 chimes, which is a time-honored tradition that's part countdown, part superstition, and all about luck. At the stroke of midnight, the bell at Madrid's Puerta del Sol rings twelve times, each chime marking a second to eat a grape. If you manage to finish all 12 grapes before the final chime, it's believed to bring good luck for each month of the coming year.

This tradition sounds simple, but as the clock strikes and everyone races to eat one grape per chime, it becomes a joyful challenge. Friends and families gather around their TVs or in public squares, trying not to laugh as they rush to keep

up with the chimes. To make things easier, some people peel and deseed their grapes in advance (a widely accepted shortcut!) or use seedless grapes. Others opt for the convenient canned grapes sold specifically for this night, making it just a bit easier to complete the tradition.

For an added touch of luck, many Spaniards wear something red, such as a scarf, bracelet, or undergarment, and some place a gold ring in their glass of cava as they toast. When the final grape is downed, the new year officially begins with hugs, laughter, and a shared sense



of accomplishment, setting the tone for a year filled with joy and connection.

Jan. 5 - 6: The Three Kings Arrive in Style

While Santa Claus might have a growing presence in Spain, it's the Three Kings—Melchior, Gaspar, and Balthazar—who remain the true stars of the Spanish Christmas season. The magic reaches its peak on the evening of Jan. 5, when cities across Spain host grand parades known as "La Cabalgata de Reyes." The Kings arrive in elaborate floats, throwing candy to thrilled children and families gathered along the streets. Each King represents a different region of the world, symbolizing unity and the diverse origins of those who came to celebrate Jesus' birth. Melchior, Gaspar, and Balthazar enchant the crowds, filling the streets with music, color, and joy.

As the parade winds down, children rush home to place their shoes out in anticipation, sometimes leaving snacks for the Kings and their camels to enjoy during their long journey. When they wake up on Jan. 6, the kids find gifts surrounding their shoes—a magical experience that brings the holiday season to a spectacular close.

To mark the day, families gather around

a "roscón de Reyes," a ring-shaped pastry adorned with candied fruits that symbolize the Kings' crowns. Inside the roscón are two surprises: a figurine of a King and a dried fava bean. The person who finds the King is crowned and wears a paper crown, enjoying a bit of "royal" luck for the day. But if you're unlucky enough to get



the bean, tradition has it that you must pay for the roscón!

Together, the 12 grapes on New Year's Eve and the joyful arrival of the Three Kings represent the heart of Spain's holiday spirit. These moments capture the laughter, anticipation, and rich sense of community that make the season unforgettable. 





all students with access to collegelevel coursework.

The college board's AP program enables students to challenge themselves with college-level studies while still in high school. AP students learn to think critically, construct sound arguments, and appreciate diverse perspectives—skills that serve them well in college and in their future careers.
