

THEODORE ROOSEVELT COMPLETES DEPLOYMENT

The Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71) is nearing the end of its almost nine-month deployment as the flagship of Carrier Strike Group Nine (CSG 9) on Oct. 15, 2024.

Theodore Roosevelt will return to homeport following its time in the U.S. 7th and 5th Fleet areas of operations (AOO), where it supported maritime security and freedom of navigation promoted, regional stability and deterred aggression.

Theodore Roosevelt departed San Diego Jan. 11 to operate in the U.S. 7th Fleet AOO to relieve the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70), who had been operating in the AOO for four months prior. While there, CSG 9 completed 5 joint service exercises with various countries and allies including Japan, South Korea, India, Pakistan, France and Canada to support freedom of navigation in the region.

“It’s been a long deployment this year, but we’ve made it, and we were successful,” said Capt. Kyle Aduskevich, executive officer of Theodore Roosevelt. “In 7th fleet, China was always shadowing us and always headed to our operations.”

After spending almost six months in the 7th fleet AOO, Theodore Roosevelt

Carrier Strike Group (TRCSG) was tasked to relieve the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) in the 5th fleet AOO to deter Houthi rebels from attacking merchant ships, deter Iran from elevating regional aggression and to support freedom of navigation in the region.

“In 5th fleet, not a single missile was fired by the Houthis or Iran while the TRCSG was in the region,” said Aduskevich. “The crew has been consistent and very professional during our deployment, and the men and women aboard Theodore Roosevelt should be proud of what we’ve accomplished.”

In the 279 days at sea, Theodore Roosevelt conducted over 48 replenishments-at-sea and fuelings-at sea to aid in distributing mail, fuel and parts to other ships in the strike group while underway. Theodore Roosevelt sailed over 78,459 nautical miles, and on-loaded almost 22 million gallons of fuel without mishaps.

“We’ve been through all sorts of different challenges,” said Aduskevich. “Our crew saw the world, we launched and recovered thousands of aircraft, fed a crew of almost 5,000 Sailors every day and we are coming home successful in our mission of presence and deterrence.”

Moreover, Theodore Roosevelt reinforced partnerships and the interests of our partner nations by hosting foreign dignitaries from five nations, including the president of The Republic of South Korea. The strike group executed photo exercises with four nations and conducted five routine port visits in Guam, Singapore, Thailand, and Republic of Korea where

Sailors participated in community outreach activities to give back to the local communities. While underway, Theodore Roosevelt promoted 279 Sailors, conducted a crossing the line ceremony, a steel beach picnic, and successfully recovered the ship’s 250,000th aircraft trap.

“I just want to congratulate the crew on wrapping up a very long deployment,” said Rear Adm. Christopher Alexander, commander of CSG-9. “I have no doubt this deployment was challenging at times, but make no mistake, we did everything our Navy and our nation asked us to do.”

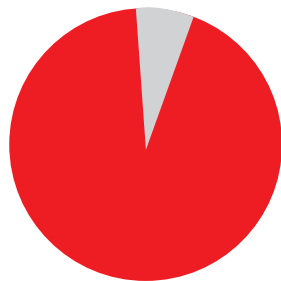
The TRCSG is commanded by Carrier Strike Group 9 and comprised of flagship aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71), the Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers USS Russell (DDG 59), USS Daniel Inouye (DDG 118), USS John S. McCain (DDG 56) and USS Halsey (DDG 97) of Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 23, nine squadrons comprising Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 11.

Squadrons of CVW 11 include the “Black Knights” of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 154, the “Blue Blasters” of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 34, the “Checkmates” of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 211, the “Fist of the Fleet” of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 25, the “Liberty Bells” of Airborne Command and Control Squadron (VAW) 115, the “Rooks” of Electronic Attack Squadron (VAQ) 137, the “Eightballers” of Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron (HSC) 8, the “Wolf Pack” of Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron (HSM) 75 and the “Rawhides” of Fleet Logistics Support Squadron (VRC) 40.

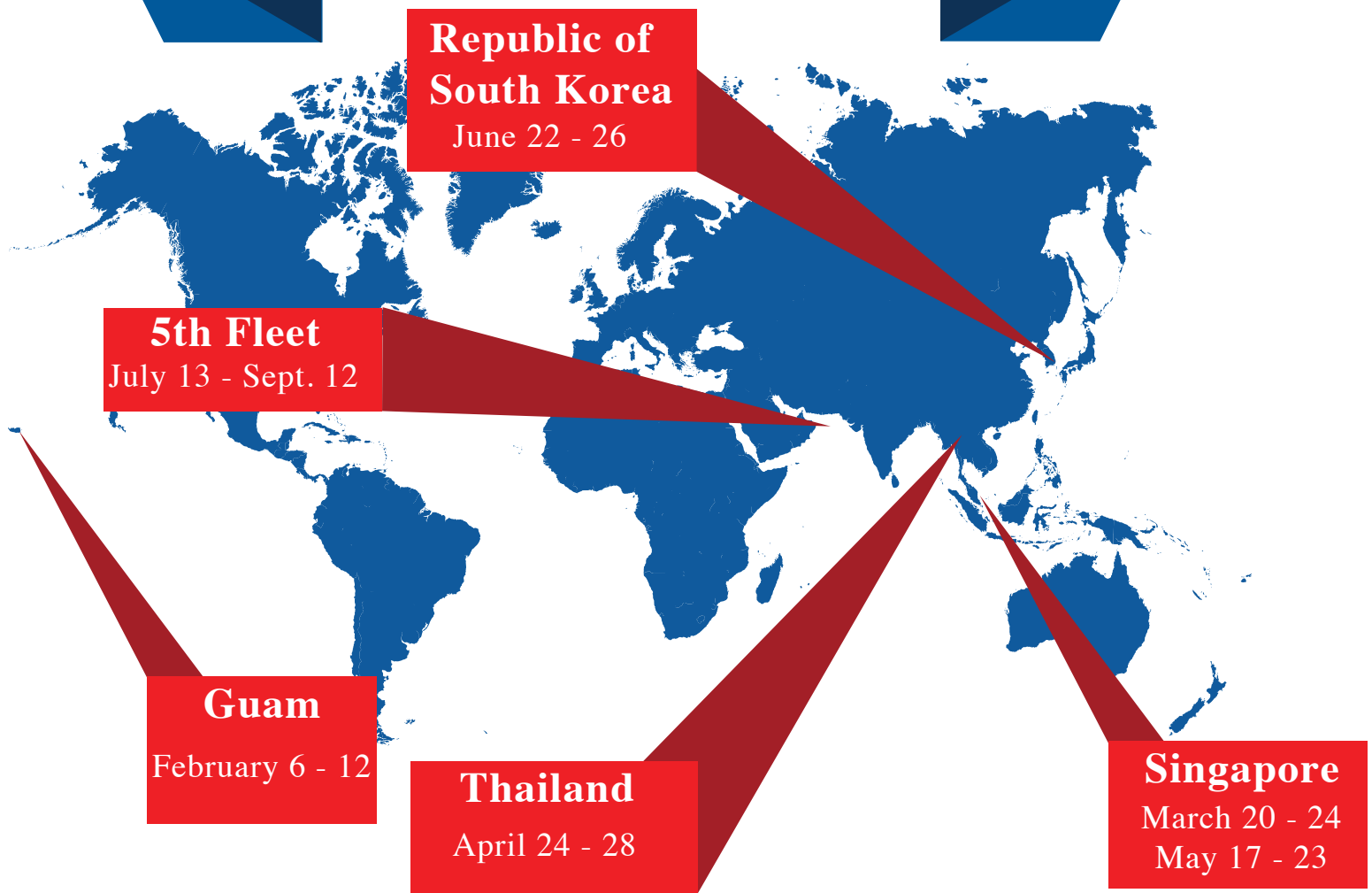

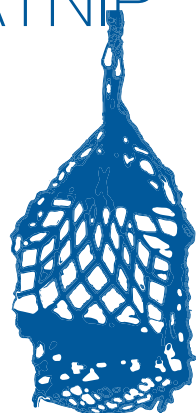

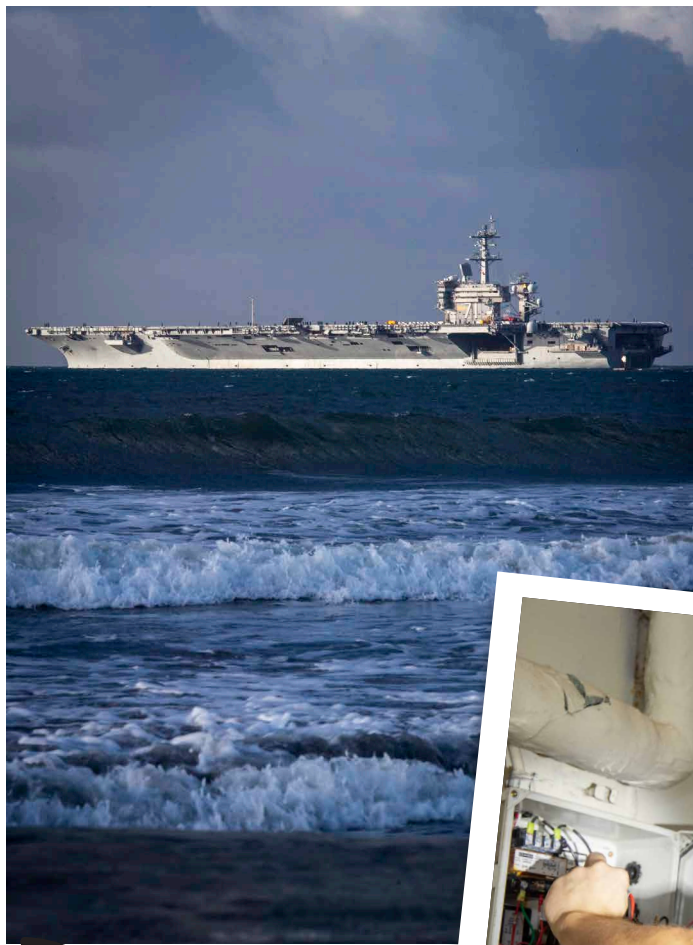

JANUARY

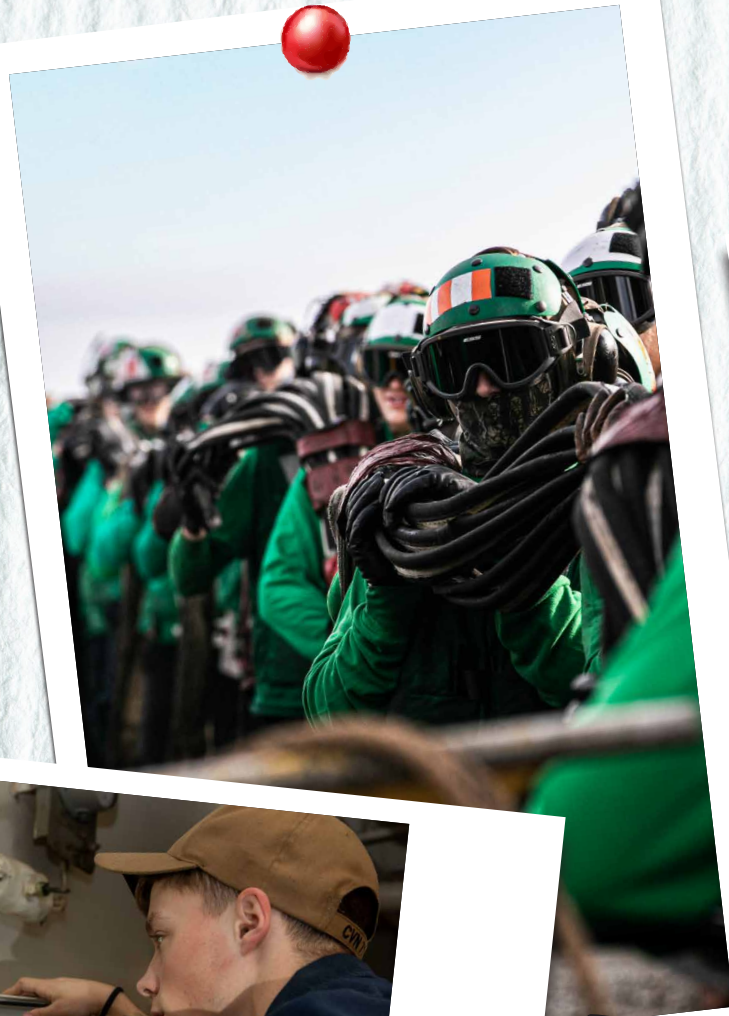

Leaving the U.S. 3rd Fleet area of responsibility, the ship sailed into U.S. 7th Fleet and conducted maritime security operations. At the end of the month, the TR CSG and the USS Carl Vinson CSG joined Japanese Hyuga-class helicopter destroyer JS Ise (DDH 182) for a Multi-Large Deck Event in the Philippine Sea.



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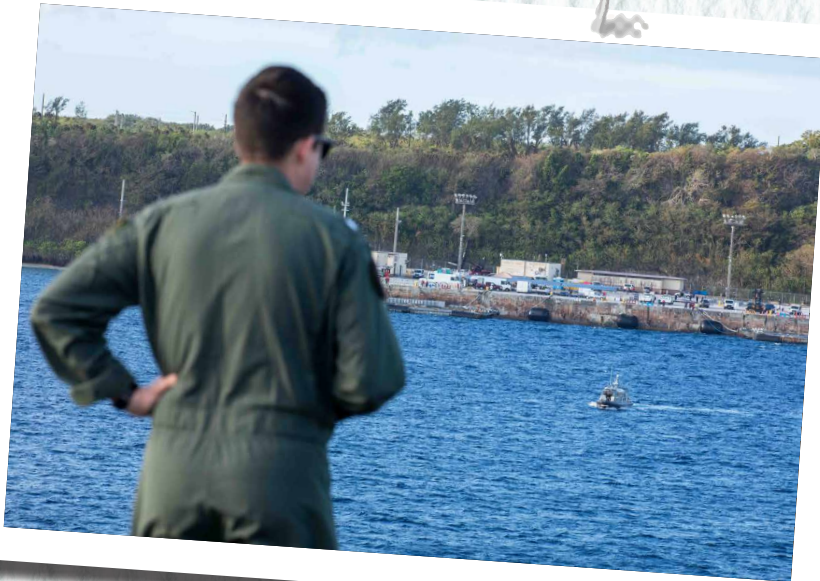

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MARCH

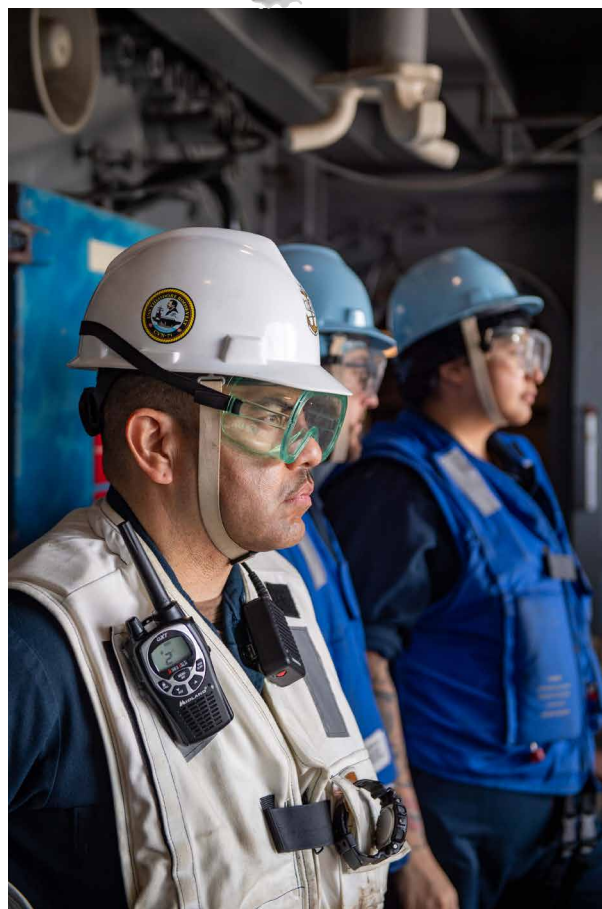

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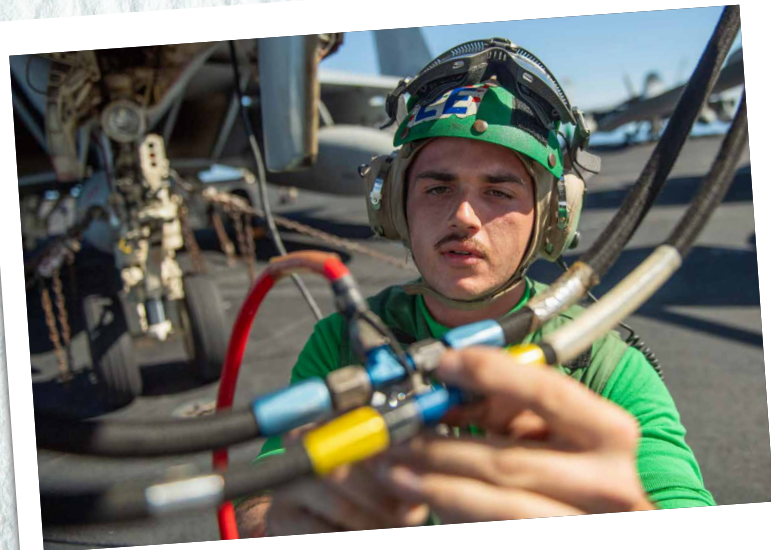
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MAY

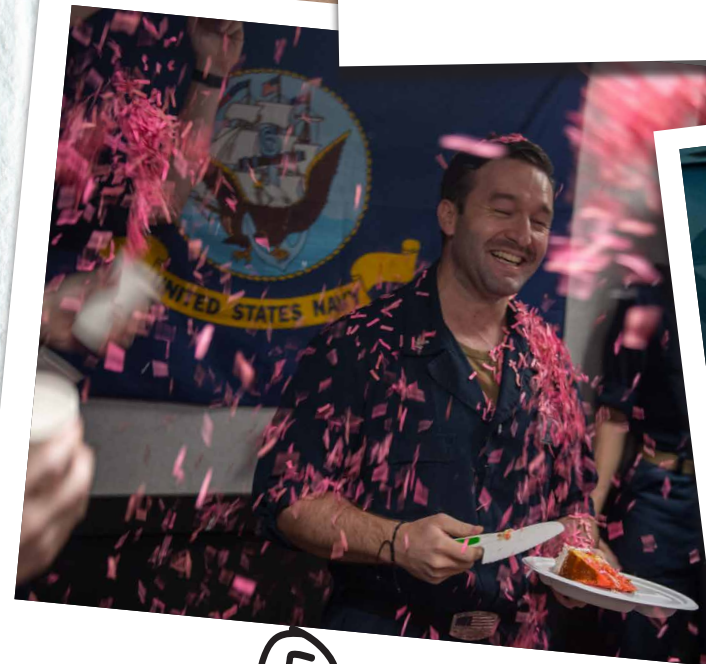

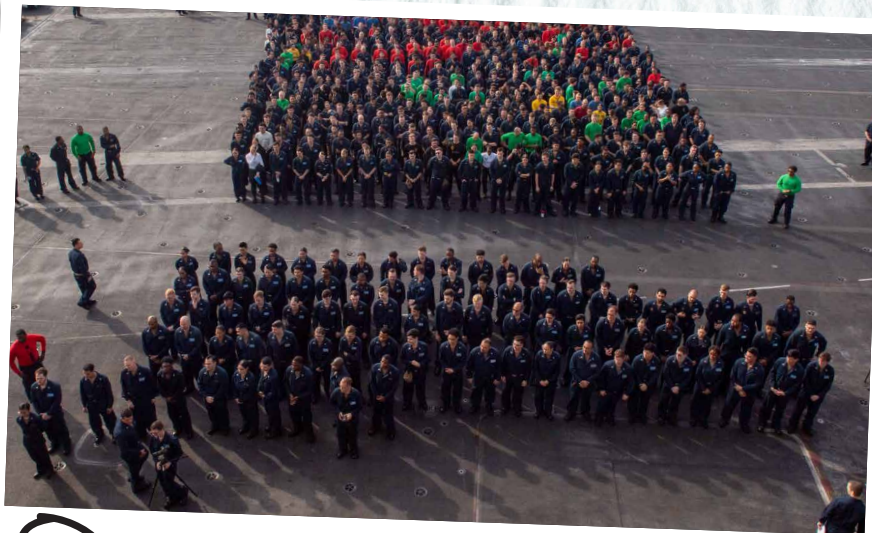

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AUGUST

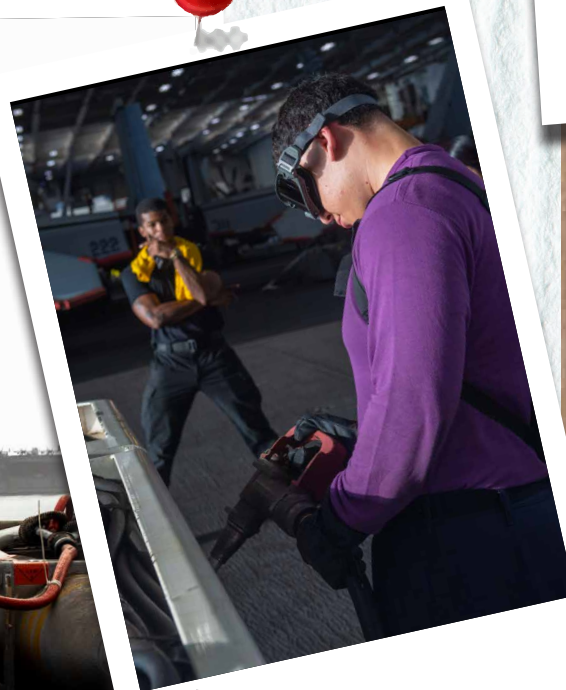

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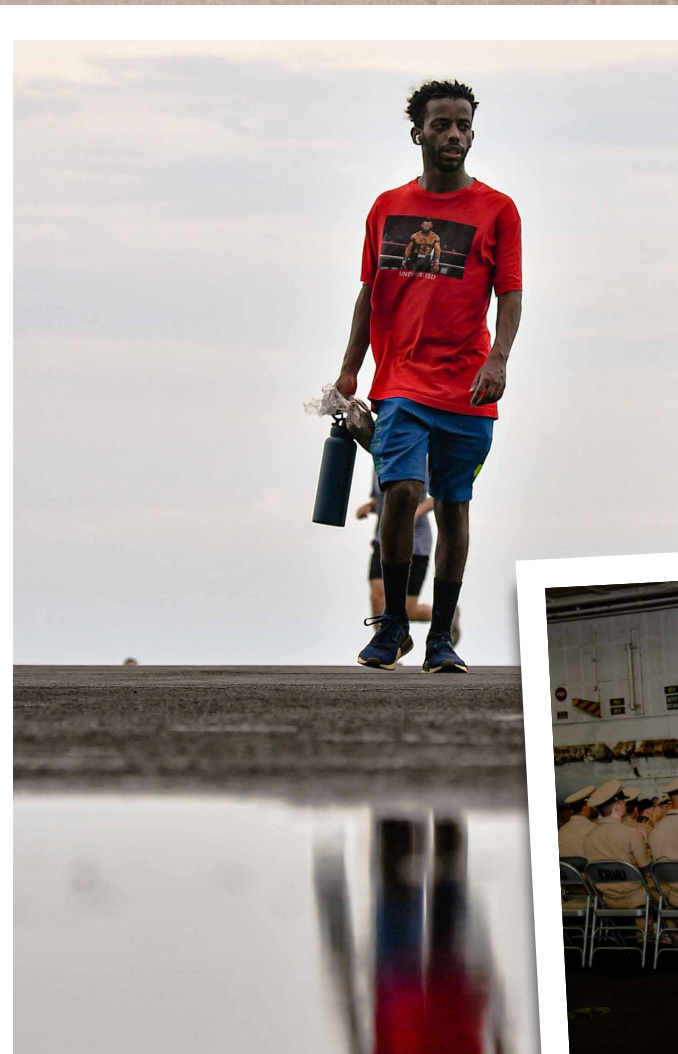

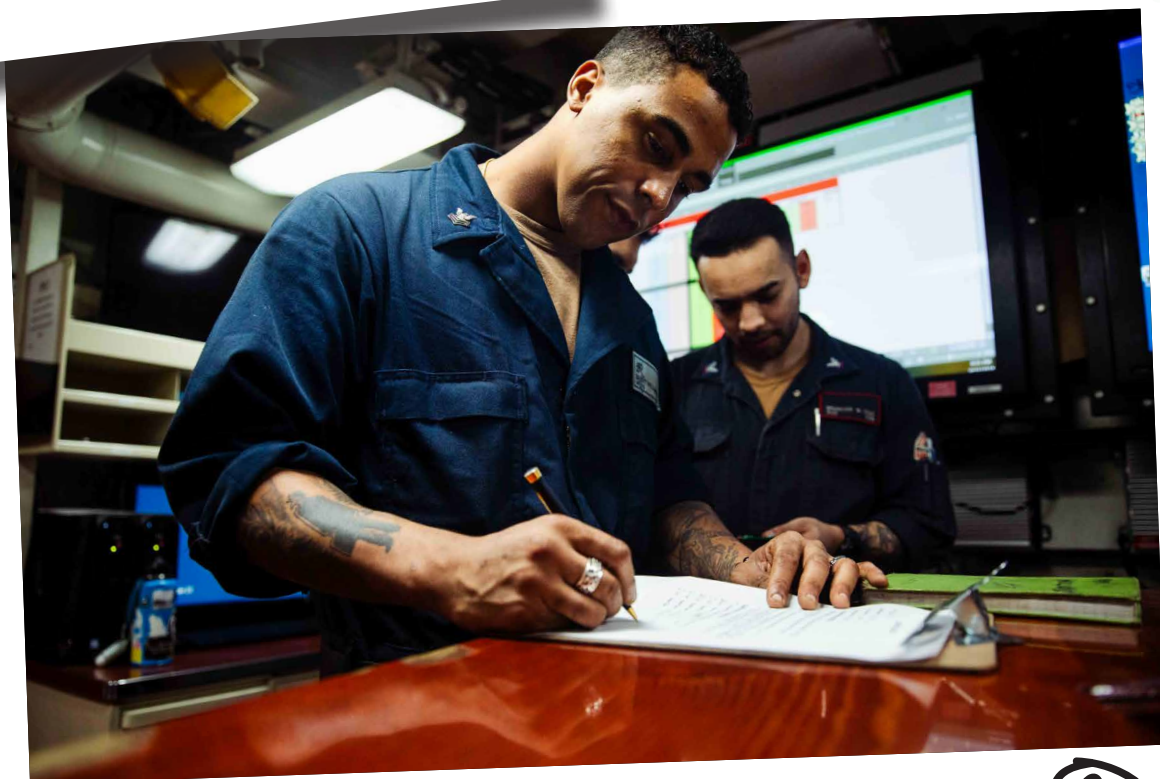

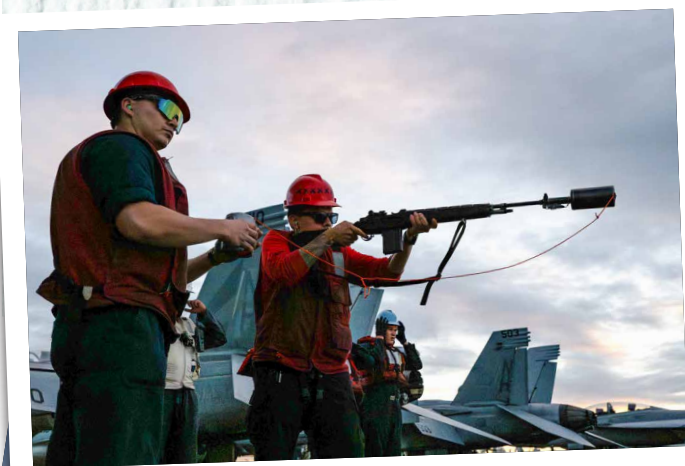
