167th,

I had the opportunity to start Saturday of drill weekend by providing opening remarks for the wing Yellow Ribbon event. I was impressed by the number of wing and family members that attended the event due to having returned from deployment or preparing for deployment. I believe one of the reasons why the United States military is the best in the world is because we take care of and care for our service members. The Yellow Ribbon event is a classic example of the support our service members receive. We ask a lot of our Air National Guard members, so I am glad we take the time to educate our members on the many benefits associated with deployment orders. We will plan to carry on the mission with less manning resources, but there may be times when we need to slow down and ensure we are doing things safely.

Many of you are aware that the Air National Guard has begun moving to the A-Staff construct. The 167th even has members that will be deploying and serving in A-Staff positions. With the reality of reduced staffing during deployments and plenty of work to go around, I have decided the time is right to build the 167th A-Staff. Congratulations to Lt Col David Groom for being selected as the A-Staff Chief of Staff and also to Maj Taylar Belfield for being selected as the A-Staff Deputy Chief of Staff. Guidance from the NGB continues to evolve on A-Staff implementation, so one of their first assignments is to ensure we proceed with the latest information as we continue to build our A-Staff. I envision the A-Staff assisting in maters that impact the entire wing, such as Continuous Process Improvement and long-range planning.

I concluded Sunday of drill by participating in a Teams meeting with our new TAG, General Seward. I can say that he is humbled and honored to be the Adjutant General for West Virginia. He is also aware that the WVANG has earned a stellar reputation amongst the Active and Reserve components. I am looking forward to the opportunity to host General Seward at the 167th.

167th Airlift Wing seeks applicants for critical firefighter vacancies

The 167th Airlift Wing Fire Department is looking for candidates to fill seven open firefighter positions at Shepherd Field, Martinsburg, West Virginia.

Firefighters are critical to the wing's flying mission. They also provide services for the civilian side of the airport and support to the local community.

"We provide twenty-four-seven fire and emergency services to the wing and to the surrounding communities that include structural firefighting, aircraft firefighting rescue operations, offensive HAZMAT response and EMS (Emergency Medical Service) response to the EMR (Emergency Medical Responder) level," said U.S. Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Chris Taylor, 167th AW fire chief. "We run about 200 calls a year, off base and on base, but primarily our responsibility is to ensure the aircraft fly and to protect the personnel on this base."

According to Taylor, the fire department would ideally be staffed with 11 to 12 firefighters. Currently, a typical shift is manned with 7 to 8 firefighters.

Col. Christopher Sigler, who recently took command of the 167th AW, said filling the vacancies is his top staffing priority.

"We are often tasked with some of Air Mobility Command's highest priority missions and sometimes being short just one fire fighter on duty can impact mission success."

As the number of firefighters on duty decreases the level of risk the wing accepts for each aircraft launch or landing increases.

"Recent events clearly show why it is important to have essential services, such as the fire department, properly staffed," Sigler said.

To offset the manning shortage, the firefighters have transitioned from three shifts to two shifts, working a 48-hours-on-48-hours-off schedule, an average of 144 hours a pay period.

"That's the max schedule that we're able to work before we're getting outside of industry standards," Taylor said.

The two-shift system enables the fire department to continue providing services to the wing, airport and community but Taylor expects big impacts this spring when 10 firefighters are slated to deploy, underscoring the importance of filling the positions.

The firefighter openings are dual-status positions meaning one would work for the West Virginia Military Authority and would be required to enlist and maintain membership in the West Virginia Na-

tional Guard.

There are numerous advantages to being employed in a dual-status position, according to Taylor, but he ranks access to military firefighter training as a top benefit.

"There's an endless amount of training courses and certifications that we can get our firefighters through the military that we just wouldn't be able to get if we were strictly state employees," Taylor said. "We have specialized subject matter experts here, and it's because of the many military courses that we're able to provide them."

A qualified applicant for a firefighter position will have a general ASVAB score of 57 and will meet the requirements of the firefighter physical fitness assessment. Beyond the basic eligibility requirements, Taylor said he is looking for coachability.


"We specialize here in training new firefighters, and the successful ones are able to be coached and mentored," Taylor said. "I encourage anyone who is interested in a firefighter job to come and spend a day with us and see what we do."

167th Air Transportation Function processes passengers and cargo for flight home



Nearly 350 Idaho National Guardsmen and their cargo were transported from the 167th Airliff Wing Shepherd Field, Martinsburg, West Virginia, to Boise, Idaho, on two 167th AW C-17 Globemaster aircraft and two C-130 Hercules aircraft from the 123rd Airliff Wing, Kentucky Air National Guard, Jan. 22, 2025. The Idaho Guardsmen supported the presidential inauguration on Jan. 20 and were bussed from Washington D.C. to the 167th AW the morning of Jan. 22. The 167th's Air Transportation Function set up a temporary aerial port in a hangar to process the passengers and their cargo. Fourteen ATF members, along with four loadmasters, built, weighed and loaded 10 cargo and baggage pallets in just a few hours. Even with temperatures well below freezing and stubborn ice covering the flight line, the final aircraft departed Shepherd Field 55 minutes ahead of schedule, a testament to the efficiency of 167th's logistics experts and air crew. Winter Storms and Extreme Cold

167th EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Brrr...It's Cold Outside

A winter storm can range from moderate snow over a few hours to blizzard conditions with blinding wind-driven snow that lasts several days.

- Winter Storm Watch Indicates that severe weather may impact your area.
- Winter Storm Warning Indicates that a winter storm is occurring or will occur in your area.

Winter Driving

- Keep a windshield scraper and small broom for ice and snow removal.
- Maintain a full tank of gas during the winter season.
- Install winter tires with plenty of tread and install snow chains, as necessary.
- Listen to the radio or call the state highway patrol for the latest road conditions before travelling. Always travel during daylight and, if possible, take at least one other person and keep others informed of your schedule.
- When feasible, use public transportation if you must go out during a winter storm.
- Above all, wear warm, layered clothing! Be sure to include gloves and the appropriate footwear and headwear protection.





- Frostbite A condition where localized damage occurs to skin and other tissue due to extreme cold. Symptoms of frostbite include a loss of feeling and a white or pale appearance in extremities such as fingers, toes, tip of the nose, and ear lobes.
- Hypothermia A condition brought on when the body temperature drops to less than 90 degrees Fahrenheit.
 Symptoms of hypothermia include uncontrollable shivering, slow speech, memory lapses, frequent stumbling, drowsiness, and exhaustion.

SAFE AND SECURE

Antiterrorism & Force Protection - Suspicious Personnel

These Antiterrorism tips are general safety tips are on suspicious people and activity. GENERAL SECURITY:

- Instruct family and friends not to provide strangers with information about you or your family.
- Be alert to strangers who are on government property for no apparent reason.
- Report all suspicious persons loitering near your residence or office; attempt to provide a complete description of the person and/or vehicle to Security Forces.
- Don't open doors to strangers.
- Report all threatening phone calls to security officials.

BE SUSPICIOUS:

- Be alert to public works crews and, if overseas, other foreign nationals requesting access to your residence; check their identities through a peep-hole before allowing entry.
 - Be alert to peddlers and strangers.
 - Write down license numbers of suspicious vehicles; note descriptions of occupants.
 - Treat with suspicion any inquiries about the whereabouts or activities of other family members.
 - Report all suspicious activity to Military/Security Forces or local law enforcement.

REMEMBER: Antiterrorism and Force Protection is EVERYONE'S job.

Psychological/Behavioral Indicators include submissive, anxious, lack of free will.



Update to DAFI 36-2903, Dress and Appearance of Department of the Air Force Personnel- Applicable to Air Force Only

Effective I February 2025, the following standards in DAFI 36-2903 are updated for Air Force personnel only. This memorandum is not applicable to USSF members. This policy will remain in effect until further official guidance is published in the next update of DAFI 36-2903.

- Duty Identifier Patches (i.e. Career Field Identifier patches) are no longer authorized for wear. Duty Identifier Tabs, as identified in para graph 12.8.1, commander insignia, and USAF Graduate patches, as identified in paragraph 5.1.6.2.4 are still authorized for wear.
- Nail polish: When in uniform, nail polish will be clear or French or American Manicure.
- Clarification on male facial hair (beards): Unless male Airmen have a current medical waiver or religious accommodation IA W paragraphs 3.1.2.2. and 3.1.2.3, at the start of each duty day, male Airmen must be clean-shaven.
- Clarification on male hair standards: Addition to paragraph 3. 1.2: Hair will not touch the ears.
- Addition of definition for "Gig Line" for use in wear of Dress Uniforms: "When members wear shirt tucked into trousers or slacks with front fly opening, the button front edge of the shirt, the outside of the belt buckle (when required) and the edge of the fly will align. This alignment creates a gig line. The gig line should be straight and neat."
