167th Airlift Wing Airmen deploy overseas for six-month rotation

Approximately 130 Airmen from the 167th Airlift Wing are deploying overseas this spring to support ongoing operations in the U.S. Central Command and U.S Africa Command theaters.

Departing over the course of several weeks, the majority of the deployers mobilized as part of a pre-planned six-month deployment, Reserve Component Period 6. Many of them will be serving in leadership positions at the deployed location. Airmen will also be providing logistics, security, fire services, communications, financial and aircraft maintenance support.

A small group of aircrew and maintainers are deploying in response to an emergent requirement that is not part RCP 6.

Partnered with the 140th Wing, Colorado Air National Guard, the 167th is the first Air National Guard C-17 Globemaster aircraft unit to serve as an Expeditionary Air Base lead wing unit.

"This is the first time our wing has been assigned to organize, train, and equip a deployment package to sustain a specific Expeditionary Air Base with A-staff, command and control and

base operating support," said Senior Master Sgt. Chad Dorsey, 167th Logistics Readiness Squadron superintendent for logistics plans and integration.

The 167th and the 140th worked together throughout the past year developing a certification plan, conducting site surveys and holding training events to prepare for their lead roles during the deployment.

"One of the advantages of being the first ANG C-17 unit to serve as a lead wing is that we have rapidly gained expertise in this new deployment construct," said Col. Christopher Sigler, 167th AW commander. "Our deployed commanders and supervisors will return to the 167th with valuable experience and insight for future taskings."

The Air Force's new deployment construct, Air Force Force Generation (AFFORGEN), offers a more structured and predictable deployment cycle, with the goal of ensuring long-term sustainable readiness for the high-end fight.

• Have all electrical work done by a qualified electrician.

- When buying or remodeling a home, ensure it is inspected by a qualified inspector or as per local requirements.
- Only use one heat-producing appliance plugged into a receptacle outlet at a time.
- Extension cords or power strips should not be used with major appliances.
- Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCls) should be installed inside the home in

bathrooms, kitchens, garages, and basements.

- Check electrical cords to make sure they are not running across doorways or under carpets.
- Extension cords are intended for temporary use.
- Use a light bulb with the correct number of watts for the circuit.

Call a qualified electrician or your landlord if you have:

- Frequent problems with blowing fuses or tripping circuit breakers
- A tingling feeling when you touch an electrical appliance
- Discolored or warm wall outlets
- A burning or rubbery smell coming from an appliance
- Flickering or dimming lights
- Sparks from an outlet

Current times have many struggling with achieving personal financial goals, but fortunately we have a new personal financial counselor who is eager to help anyone interested on learning how to meet those goals. Meet in Rebecca Carlson, Rebecca has over 15 years in the finance field, and this is her first installation.

We sat down with Rebecca for a brief question-and-answer session to get a feel of what she hopes to do here and how she can help.

Q: What is your position here at Fort Detrick?

A: I am the new Personal Financial Counselor. If you know Madeline Green, I am taking over for her. (Everyone remembers Mrs. Madeline Green. You saw her everywhere and she continued to entertain us all so many times with her dollar bill necklaces and sunglasses. Last year she retired)

Q: Are there specific educational requirements for this position?

A: I have a master's degree in personal finances, and I hold the Accredited Financial Counselor (AFC) certification through the Association for Financial Counseling & Planning Education.

Q: What does that position require of you?

A: My focus is to assist Service Members and their families in achieving their financial goals. We can discuss debt, building/repairing credit, TSP, spending plans, large purchases, preparing financially to PCS, divorce, new babies, and anything in between.

A Personal Financial Counselor (PFC) provides essential financial support and education to service members and their families.

Their responsibilities include:

- Financial Counseling: They assist service members in evaluating their financial circumstances and setting financial goals.
- Education and Tools: PFCs offer tools and education to help individuals and families achieve their financial objectives and overcome challenges.
- Support Services: They provide face-to-face appointments, group presentations, and referrals to military and community resources for budgeting, credit management, and navigating benefits.
 - Professional Guidance: PFCs are trained professionals who help service

members address their financial concerns and provide referrals to appropriate services.

This role is crucial for enhancing the financial wellbeing of service members and their families.

Q: Any goals or what you hope to do while here?

A: My goal is to integrate myself into the units to ensure their financial success. As a fiduciary, I work in the best interest of the service member. I am not an advisor but am an educator.

Q: Can you assist anyone, contractors, active duty, DoD civilians, spous-

A: I am a free and confidential service provided to Service members, and their immediate families.

Q: Will you host any training events or informational sessions?

A: I host multiple finance classes that change monthly, along with teaching whole unit classes. Financial literacy training provides the pathway for sustaining financial wellbeing and resiliency with benchmarks of meeting all financial responsibilities, building wealth, and obtaining a sound financial future and a secure retirement. PFCs are beneficial in providing service members with training and resources to help avoid debt and create practical solutions for financial goals.

Q: Where are you located?

A: I am in Army Community Services located in building 1520, room 125 at Ft. Detrick. I can also be reached through email PFC.FortDetrick@magellagfederal.com. I am available during drill weekends in building 120 or in the dinning hall.

Personal Finance Counselor prohibited services.

While PFCs provide valuable services through a wide range of financial readiness capabilities, there are several services that are prohibited.

Personal Finance Counselors cannot:

- Act as an agent for a military aid society in providing emergency financial assistance.
- Provide financial investment advice in specific investment funds/ opportunities.
- Make financial or financially related decisions on behalf of a client to include, but not limited to, TSP asset allocations, designation of beneficiaries for assets, etc.
- •Perform inherently governmental functions such as certification training and responding to media queries on behalf of the government.

Personal Financial Counselors stay in their position for a minimum of 12 months, and then they can choose to stay in place or move to a new open position.




Purple Ball 2025

Antiterrorism & Force Protection - General Security

This article will address general security precautions and further articles will address specific security concerns (e.g., travel security, suspicious activity).

GENERAL PRECAUTIONS:

- Do not volunteer personal information.
- -- Be cautious of conversations in public places and on the telephone.
- -- Do not have rank or duty title in commercial phone books.
- Avoid (when feasible/possible) wearing military uniforms or other identifiable clothing while traveling off the installation. If possible, remove military headgear and cover uniform when traveling in a vehicle. If a uniform is required, consider changing at the office.
- Vary routes and times when going to and from work, taking children to school, shopping, etc. Be unpredictable and avoid establishing routines.
- Look for unfamiliar objects or activities when traveling by vehicle, especially during early morning or late at night.
- Avoid isolated areas, side streets, civil disturbances, and demonstrations.
- Consider removing family name from home or vehicle.
- Know where your family members are at all times and encourage them to check in by telephone.
- Verify all deliveries and repairs through proper credentials or other documents.
- -- Contact the agency or company they claim to represent for additional verification.
- Be alert for unidentified vehicles or personnel and exercise caution with strangers.
- Know your neighborhood & neighbors.
- Keep all outside doors and accessible windows closed and locked.
- Keep car and house keys separate and maintain accountability.
- Conduct frequent checks of your vehicles to ensure they are in good working order and there are no anomalies.
 - Never leave young children at home unattended.
 - Examine mail for suspicious letters or parcels.
- Familiarize children with police and fire stations and teach them emergency procedures and telephone numbers.
- Advise children to avoid isolated areas, to travel and play in groups, never talk to or go anywhere with strangers

and to keep family members informed of their whereabouts.

- When making travel reservations, do not use rank or position and if possible use military air.
- When in a restaurants, locate emergency exits upon entering, chose a table with greatest field of view, avoid business conversation near other patrons, and do not reveal after-dinner plans.
- Stress the importance of security and the seriousness of the threat to the whole family.
- Be alert to your surroundings and report suspicious personnel or activities to local authorities
- Remember to trust your instincts! Keep these tips in mind to keep your family's peace of mind.

REMEMBER: Antiterrorism and Force Protection is EVERYONE'S job.
