March 31, 1980 The Air Force Veterinary Corps was disestablished, and the U.S. Army became the sole executive gent for all Department of Defens

agent for all Department of Defense (DoD) veterinary services, taking on responsibility for animal health care across all military installations.

April 5, 1945 Corporal Thomas J. Kelly, an aid man with the 7th Armored Division, was awarded the Medal of Honor for repeatedly risking his life under hostile fire to save wounded Soldiers while in Alemert, Germany.

WEEK IN REVIEW

April 2, 1814

Army surgeons are ordered to record weather data, as it was thought to cause illness. This was the beginning of systematic meterological observations in the U.S.

April 4, 1872

Hospital Steward William Saunders is recognized as the first U.S. Army Dentist. Dental injury and emergencies account for 20% of all DNBI. Our dental teams keep Soldiers healthy and in the fight.

April 6, 1917

U.S. declares war on Germany and enters World War I. The AMEDD greatly expands relying on large numbers of reserve officers. Today, almost half of Army Medicine is comprised of Reserve Component citizen warriors, with two of our four Theater Medical Commands (TMCs) residing in the Army Reserve. TMCs provide essential medical command and control, ensuring support to line commanders.

April 7, 1777

Pay of nurses in Army hospitals raised to \$8 per month plus a ration; matron (chief nurse) received \$15 plus a ration. Advanced practice and specialty trained nurses now receive board certification pay, and the Army offers retention bonuses for critical wartime specialties: Critical Care (66S), Psychiatric Mental Health (66R), and Nurse Anesthesia (66F).

April 13, 1911

Dr. John Sayre Marshall becomes the Army's first commissioned dental officer. The Dental Corps currently has 961 commissioned officers and offers nationally ranked and accredited graduate dental education programs.

FEATURE - CORPORAL THOMAS J. KELLY

Corporal Thomas J. Kelly, Medical Detachment, Company C, 48th Armored Infantry Battalion, 7th Armored Division, distinguished himself at Alemert, Germany, on April 5, 1945. Corporal Kelly realizing the extent of casualties suffered by the platoon after an enemy attack, voluntarily retraced his steps and began evacuating his comrades under direct machine-gun fire. He was forced to crawl, dragging the injured behind him for 300 yards. He made ten seperate trips through the brutal fire. Seven more casualties who were able to crawl by themselves he guided and encouraged in escaping from the hail of fire. After he had completed his self-imposed task and was near collapse from fatigue, he refused to leave his platoon until the attack had been resumed and the objective taken.

Dr. Mary E. Walker, a Medal of Honor recipient, is captured by Confederate troops. Walker was a surgeon, abolitionist, and spy during the U.S. Army Civil War.
