## **OVERVIEW**

elcome to Fort McCoy!
Fort McCoy's mission is to strengthen Total Force Readiness by serving as a training center, mobilization force generation installation, and strategic support area. As a Total Force Training Center, Fort McCoy's primary responsibility is to support the training and readiness of military personnel and units of all branches and components of America's armed forces. Fort McCoy is a Mobilization Force Generation Installation prepared to support contingency operations as ordered.

As a world-class installation, Fort McCoy's continuing goal is to provide excellent customer service and facilities and to enhance the quality of life for all who train, work, play, or live here. The Fort McCoy community truly is unique, with active, reserve, and civilian components working together for the betterment of all facets of life at the installation.

Fort McCoy is the only Army installation in the state of Wisconsin. Located close to the intersection of two major interstates (I-90 & I-94) in scenic west-central Wisconsin, it is midway between the Chicago/Milwaukee corridor and Minneapolis/St. Paul.

The La Crosse Regional Airport, serviced by American Airlines, is within 35 miles. Amtrak rail serves the region with stops at stations in La Crosse and Tomah.

Fort McCoy is one of the largest area employers with more than 1,900 people working at the post and a more than \$1.6 billion annual economic impact to the region.

The installation features newer Exchange and Commissary facilities that are open to military, veterans and others as authorized by the garrison commander.

The neighboring family-friendly cities of Tomah and Sparta have well-rated school districts, low unemployment, affordable housing, and a low cost of living. Both cities offer vibrant downtown shopping and community events.

Local schools feature exceptional educational opportunities, extra-curricular activities, and sports. Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) is available in both districts. The region also provides quality higher education (public and private), including three colleges/universities in La Crosse with satellite campuses in Tomah and Sparta.

At the edge of Wisconsin's scenic Driftless Area, the region boasts an abundance of outdoor recreational opportunities such as local aquatic centers, rails-to-trails conservancy, biking, hiking, camping, ATV/snowmobile trails, boating, hunting, world-class fishing waterways and much more.

The Mississippi River, Necedah National Wildlife Refuge, Trempealeau National Wildlife Refuge, Wildcat Mountain State Park, Black River State Forest, and many other state and



county parks are within a 45-minute drive.

The area's quiet and safe quality-of-life opportunities draw families from around the country to relocate here.

The local communities, including nearby La Crosse and Onalaska, offer various entertainment: semi-pro and college sports, theater, museums, world-renowned festivals, fine dining and nightlife.

Fort McCoy is located near the Tomah VA Medical Center as well as numerous healthcare services systems, including the Mayo Clinic, and Gundersen Hospitals/Health Care Systems. The original, world-renowned Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., is only a 90-minute drive.

The installation has excellent quality-of-life programs such as Army Community Service, Child & Youth Services, and recreation facilities available to the workforce: Rumpel Fitness Center; Pineview Campground and Recreation Area, https://mccoy.armymwr.com/programs/pine-view-campground, where one can rent cabins and recreation equipment; and McCoy's Community Center, https://mccoy.armymwr.com/programs/mccoys-community-center, which features bowling, food and beverage, and recreation. Fort McCoy is also home to Whitetail Ridge Ski Hill, https://mccoy.armymwr.com/programs/whitetail-ridge-ski-area, one of only three ski and tubing hills in the entire Army.

Fort McCoy's South Post Family Housing offers 120 spacious new family houses.

The newly renovated South Post Community Center provides community space and serves as the office for the post's Housing Division.



## On-post rules for motorist, pedestrian safety

All state and federal regulations about cell-phones, texting, seat-belt use, motorcycle safety, vehicle operations, driver's licenses, etc., apply at Fort McCoy. In some cases, federal regulations are more restrictive than state or local laws. ## **Installation Access**

Visitor passes are issued at building 35 to people who do not have valid military ID cards or Common Access Cards. Each adult occupant of a vehicle must have a valid photo ID and will be cleared through National Crime Information Center Interstate Identification Index (NCIC-III). IDs also must meet REAL ID Act requirements.

The Visitor Control Center is open weekdays, excluding federal holidays. After regular operation hours, visitors can be issued a pass at the Main Gate or Gate 20.

Commercial and tactical vehicles are required to use Gate 20.

People and vehicles are subject to search upon entering and while on military property. Unauthorized entry is punishable by Paragraph 18 U.S. Code 1382. All motorists entering or operating a motor vehicle at Fort McCoy must be prepared to show proof of vehicle insurance, driver's license, and vehicle registration when requesting visitor passes or when asked to show such documentation by law-enforcement personnel.

## **Accidents**

All accidents occurring on Fort McCoy must be reported to the Fort McCoy Directorate of Emergency Services Police Department as soon as possible. To report an accident, call 502-898-2266.

## **Speed limits**

- Paved roads within the cantonment area: 30 mph unless posted otherwise.
- Range roads, training area roads, and tank trails: 30 mph unless posted otherwise.
- Passing personnel in formation: 10 mph. (NOTE: Any group of troops has right of way over all vehicular traffic on all roads on the installation.)
- Pine View Campground: 10 mph or as posted.
  - Family housing areas: 15 mph.
  - Parking lots: 5 mph.

## **Cellphones**

Vehicle operators shall not use cellphones when the vehicle is moving, unless using a hands-free device (voice only, not texting).

Drivers needing to use their cellphones are encouraged to pull into a legal parking spot or to the side of the road.

Use/wear of any portable headphones, earphones, or listening devices, other than for hands-free cellular devices while operating a motor vehicle, is prohibited.

## **Seat belts**

Seat belts are required for drivers and all passengers in vehicles at Fort McCoy. This is a primary-enforcement law in both Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Children who are vehicle passengers weighing 40 pounds or less must be restrained by an approved child-safety seat.

## **Motorcycles**

All operators must be properly licensed.

Prior to operating any motorcycle, Soldiers will successfully complete an appropriate Motorcycle Safety Foundation-based Basic Riders Course.

Based on the type of motorcycle(s) owned and operated, Soldiers must complete either the Experienced Riders Course or the Military Sport Bike Riders Course within 12 months of completing the basic course.

Motorcycles must have headlights turned on at all times. Motorcycles must have rear-view mirrors mounted on both the left and right of the handlebar.

Operators and passengers must wear required clothing and safety equipment.

This includes an approved helmet that meets Department of Transportation Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards; eye protection that is American National Standards Institute Z87.1 impact-resistant; sturdy, over-the-ankle footwear that affords protection for the feet and ankles (durable leather or ballistic-type cloth athletic shoes that cover the ankles may be worn); long-sleeved shirt or jacket; long trousers; and full-fingered gloves or mittens made from leather or other abrasion-resistant material.

Motorcycle jackets and pants constructed of abrasion-resistant materials such as leather, Kevlar, or Cordura and containing impact-absorbing padding are strongly encouraged.

Riders are encouraged to select personal protective equipment that incorporates fluorescent colors and retro-reflective material.



## **Firearms**

All firearms must be registered with the Police Department before being brought onto Fort McCoy property. State-issued concealed-carry permits, sometimes referred to as CCWs, are not valid on Fort McCoy. All firearms need to be transported unloaded and in a case. A gun sock does not count as a case.

## **Hunting, Trapping, Fishing**

A valid Wisconsin hunting, trapping, or fishing license is required while conducting activities. Fort McCoy-specific permits in addition to Wisconsin permits and/or stamps may be required for certain recreational activities. Activity Information Cards are required to be placed in the windows of parked vehicles and must identify the iSportsman permit number and the type of recreation for each participant.

## **FORT McCOY COMMISSARY**



## Fort McCoy major support services located in buildings 35, 2187

At Fort McCoy, services for identification (ID) cards, retirement services, visitor passes, physical security, civilian personnel support, and more can be found in the building 35 Visitor Center at the Main Gate area and in building 2187, which is just a block from the Main Gate.

## **Building 35 Visitor Control Center**

The Visitor Control Center is a section of the Directorate of Emergency Services — Physical Security Division that issues visitor passes. Each adult occupant of a vehicle who does not have a valid military ID card or Common Access Card (CAC) must have a valid photo ID and will be cleared through the Fort McCoy Police Department. Fort McCoy fully enforces the provisions of the Real ID Act.

The Visitor Control Center also enrolls all CACs issued by the ID Card Section with the e-Gate protocol at the security guard window. Military personnel and civilians who have attended the DES Physical Security e-Gate class can have their CACs enrolled immediately at the Visitor Control Center.

The Visitor Control Center is open weekdays, excluding federal holidays. After regular operation hours, visitors can be issued a pass at the Main Gate or Gate 20 (if open). Personnel also can provide directions to on-post locations.

Vehicle drivers are reminded they must have a valid driver's license, vehicle registration, and proof of insurance in the vehicle, as is required by Wisconsin law. For more information, see the personnel at building 35 or call 502-898-2266.

## **Building 2187 services**

— **ID Card Section** — The Fort McCoy Personnel Services Branch in building 2187 can issue ID cards for members of all branches of service — active, reserve, guard, retirees and dependents — as well as Department of Defense civilian employees and contractors.

Appointments are required for the ID section. Call 502-898-4563 to verify the ID Section is operational, as well as to verify which documents will be required to get an ID card or make any changes to DEERS.

— Retirement Services Office — The Fort McCoy Retirement Services Office (RSO) is located in building 2187, not far from the Main Gate. Although walk-ins are welcome, appointments are suggested. The office is handicapped accessible and is ADA compliant. The Fort McCoy RSO can be reached by calling 502-898-3716 or by sending email to Retirement Services Office.

The RSO offers pre-retirement and Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) briefings in a group or one-on-one setting.

A Retiree Appreciation Day (RAD) is conducted annually at Fort McCoy in September. The RAD features a morning session with guest speakers from organizations that affect military retiree living. The afternoon session is a benefits fair featuring display tables manned by representatives from a wide variety of military retiree and veteran-related organizations and activities.

Honors Newsletter — The RSO publishes its annual retiree newsletter, HONORS each summer. The newsletter includes valuable information about retiree issues and benefits, as well as information about RADs being held throughout a five-state area.

Fort McCoy also supports an Installation Retiree Council. The Council oversees seven Area Retiree Councils located in Davenport (Quad Cities), Iowa; Des Moines, Iowa; Fort Sheridan (Chicago), Ill.; Duluth/Superior; Minn.; Minneapolis (Twin Cities), Minn.; Selfridge, Mich.; and the Wisconsin area. Councils serve as the voice of the retiree community and have the means to submit issues up the chain of command. If you are interested in serving on a retiree council please contact the RSO at

## Longstanding tradition of bugle calls continues at Fort McCoy

Every day at 6 a.m. and 5 p.m., Soldiers, family members, and civilian employees can see, hear, and participate in a ritual that honors the nation while continuing a tradition as old as the U.S. Army. Traffic stops, work pauses, and activities cease while we render honors to the colors.

But reveille in the morning and retreat at night are only two of many bugle calls that punctuate daily life at Fort McCoy. Most think of old Western movies and cavalrymen when hearing a bugle call, but few actually understand the significance of most of the bugle calls heard throughout the day.

In the frontier outposts of the late 1800s, bugle calls united Soldiers and their families. These small, lonely forts with garrisons of only 100 to 200 Soldiers were often far from the nearest town. Household clocks were set by the bugle calls. According to some tales, an Army wife even used assembly as the signal for the children to take their naps.

Days began early for Soldiers as they began feeding and grooming the horses before dawn. Following reveille and breakfast, Soldiers came together for inspection when they heard the call for Assembly. The Soldier with the best uniform and equipment was selected to be the commander's orderly, which gave him bragging rights and (sometimes) the following day off.

After inspection, Soldiers trained in critical skills of the day: marching, riding, bayonet drill, marksmanship, and gun crew drills.

Mess call to lunch ended the morning's training. Soldiers spent most of the afternoon in fatigue details, such as chopping wood, maintaining the buildings and stables, and taking care of the horses.


Soldiers returned from these tasks when the bugler sounded recall, giving the Soldiers time to prepare themselves for the evening parade and retreat.

The day at most frontier outposts ended with a parade of the entire command around the central field. This was a way to inspect the discipline and equipment of the unit, but it was also a community social event that was attended by nearly all of the family members.

Prior to the 1890s, Soldiers were required to assemble for a final roll call at 10 p.m. at the sound of tattoo, but this practice — along with inspections on Sundays — ended when the Army made efforts to improve the quality of Soldiers' lives.

Purpose of bugle calls (times played at Fort McCoy)

- First call (5:55 a.m.) sounded as a warning for Soldiers to begin assembling for a formation.
- Reveille (6 a.m.) signals the Soldiers to Stand-To for morning roll call and accompanies the raising of the national colors.
  - Assembly (6:45 a.m.) signals Soldiers to



assemble at a designated place.

- Mess call (7 a.m., noon, and 5:45 p.m.) signals breakfast, lunch, or dinner.
- Retreat (5 p.m.) signals the end of the official duty day.
- To the colors (5 p.m.) used to render honors to the nation when no band is available or in ceremonies requiring honors to the nation more than once. It requires the same courtesies as the national anthem. It is used to accompany lowering the national flag.
- Call to quarters (10 p.m.) symbolically signals all Soldiers not authorized to be absent to return to their quarters for the night.
- Tattoo (10:30 p.m.) signals that all lights in squad rooms be extinguished and that all loud talking and other disturbances be discontinued within 15 minutes.
- Taps (11 p.m.) signals that unauthorized lights are to be extinguished. This is the last call of the day. It is also sounded at the completion of a military funeral.

Some bugle calls require certain actions or courtesies, whether the listener is civilian or a service member. For reveille (6 a.m.) and retreat and to the colors (both 5 p.m.), Soldiers in formation should execute the commands of the officer or noncommissioned officer in charge. Soldiers who are in uniform but not in formation should face the flag (or the direction of the music if the flag is not in view) and render a hand salute until the last note of music.

Civilians and Soldiers wearing civilian clothes should face the flag, come to the position of attention, remove any headgear with the right hand, and place the right hand over the heart until the last note of music. Soldiers, veterans, and retirees may render a hand salute rather than placing their hand over their heart, according to a 2009 law passed by Congress.

All personnel in vehicles should stop in a safe area, exit vehicles, face the flag (or in direction of the music), and render honors as described above

## Serving America's armed forces since 1909

Fort McCoy is named for Robert Unlike any other acquisition of Bruce McCoy. Unlike any other acquisition of sub-marginal farm land by the fed-

The son of a Civil War captain, McCoy was a prominent local resident who, throughout his lifetime, served as a lawyer; district attorney; county judge; and mayor of Sparta, Wis.

He reached the rank of major general during his 31 years of distinguished military service, which included service in the Spanish-American War, the police action in Mexico, and World War I.

McCoy returned from the Spanish-American War with a dream. He knew that as warfare became increasingly more modern, larger and more powerful guns would be developed, and training would be emphasized. He envisioned these changes would require larger training areas, and, by 1905, he had acquired approximately 4,000 acres of land in the Sparta area.

Maj. Samuel Allen of the 7th Field Artillery at Fort Snelling, Minn., also admired the terrain of the Sparta area for its training value. McCoy invited Allen's unit to put his Family's ranch to the test during 16 days of training. September 1905 marked the first use of the land for military purposes.

As a result of the 16-day test, Allen recommended to an Army review board that a large piece of land be purchased for an artillery camp. Approximately 14,000 acres of land, including McCoy's property, were purchased in 1909. The resulting parcel was called the Sparta Maneuver Tract.

The Sparta Maneuver Tract was divided approximately in half by the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad. The maneuver camp situated on the northern half of the parcel was referred to as Camp Emory Upton, while that to the south was known as Camp Robinson, an artillery camp.

In 1910, the War Department authorized \$40,000 for construction and improvements to the area. The camp officially was designated Camp McCoy on Nov. 19, 1926, in honor of Maj. Gen. Robert B. McCoy, who had died that same year.

More than 45,000 acres were added between 1938 and 1942.

Unlike any other acquisition of sub-marginal farm land by the federal government, the Camp Mc-Coy project envisioned the use of the land for military purposes as well as fishing, hunting and forest production.

In February 1942, the War Department announced the building of a cantonment area referred to as the "New Camp," which still serves as the installation's cantonment area today. These additions included construction of the large, triangular-shaped cantonment area, known as the "triad."


Camp McCoy was used as a training facility for many World War II units, including the 2nd Infantry Division; the 76th Infantry Division; and the 100th Infantry Battalion, which comprised Hawaii National Guardsmen of Japanese ancestry and was among the most decorated units in history. The post also served as a prisoner-of-war and enemy-alien prison camp during this time.

Aside from temporary lulls, the installation has been in almost constant use since its founding in 1909 and has provided artillery and maneuver training opportunities for millions of military personnel from all services.

Camp McCoy was aligned under U.S. Army Forces Command on July 1, 1973, and officially was re-designated as Fort McCoy on Sept. 30, 1974. In 1990-91, during Operations Desert Shield/Storm, Soldiers from 74 separate units and their equipment were deployed and redeployed at Fort McCoy.

From June 1991 through June 1992, the post also completed Operation Desert Fix, which was one of the largest reserve-component equipment demobilization/repair missions in the Army. During Desert Fix, Fort McCoy was responsible for inventorying, inspecting, repairing, and returning more than a division-and-a-half's worth of equipment to 121 owning units located throughout a nine-state area.

The 1990s ushered in the first great construction growth experienced at the post since the construction of the cantonment area in 1942.



From 1990 to the present day, new construction projects have served to modernize the post's infrastructure, facilities, and training areas. The hundreds of millions of dollars invested in the post have benefited Fort McCoy as well the local economy, with the majority of the new construction contracts having been awarded to regional firms.

The installation has provided support and facilities for the training of more than 100,000 personnel annually since 1984.

Fort McCoy was realigned under what is now known as the Installation Management Command (IMCOM) in 2002. On March 8, 2019, Installation Management Command became a subordinate command to Army Materiel Command, which Fort McCoy is also now aligned under through IMCOM. Today, Fort McCoy's primary mission is to support the readiness of the force by serving as a training center, mobilization force generation installation, and strategic support area.

The installation has served in a

continuing capacity as an Army power-projection site by processing and preparing military personnel for duty in overseas contingency operations.

From Sept. 11, 2001, through Dec. 30, 2011, 140,197 military personnel from 2,416 units mobilized or demobilized at Fort McCoy during the installation's efforts to support the war on terrorism.

In September 2014, the movie "Fort McCoy" was released. "Fort McCoy" is a drama written, coproduced, and co-directed by Kate Connor, who also stars in the film, playing her real-life grandmother. The film, based on a true story, is set in the summer of 1944, with Connor sharing the experience of her mother's family with the U.S. Army and prisoner-of-war camp situated at the Wisconsin post.

Today, the post provides full-scale support to its customers at each juncture of its training triad — transient, institutional, and exercise. Fort McCoy training levels reached an all-time record in fiscal year 2017 with 155,975 personnel participating in training.

## Commemorative Area preserves post's past

The 900 block of the installation and the 11-acre area surrounding it are at the hub of the fort's history-preservation efforts. The area features the History Center, World War II-era buildings, Equipment Park, and Veterans Memorial Plaza.

The Commemorative Area also has a picnic pavilion and restroom facilities.

## **Commemorative Buildings**

The Commemorative Area consists of five World War II-era buildings set aside to help tell Fort McCoy's unique story. These facilities are representative of the types found in the cantonment area when it was constructed in 1942.

Three of the buildings — an administrative facility, a dining facility, and a barracks — are set up to depict Soldier life during the 1940s. Display items include a World War II chapel, bunk beds, footlockers, mannequins, and potbelly stoves. Another building highlights four different modern military training venues, and a separate facility shows various training aids.

The Commemorative Area is open April through October by appointment to groups of 15 or more. The area is also open to small groups and individuals selected days June through September without appointment. Check www.facebook.com/ftmccoy/ for upcoming days.

## **History Center**

The History Center features displays of photographs and memorabilia that reflect the roles the installation has held since 1909. The History Center is handicapped-accessible.



The History Center is open year-round by appointment to groups of 10 or more.

## **Equipment Park**

The Equipment Park is an outdoor display of historic and present-day equipment representative of the types used on the installation.

The design of the park allows for display of 70 pieces of equipment, ranging from helicopters and howitzers to trucks and trailers.

A brochure featuring the park layout provides information about each piece of equipment on display is available on site.

Visitors with access to the installation have access to the Equipment Park year-round from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, weather permitting.

## **Veterans Memorial Plaza**

Veterans Memorial Plaza is a tribute to all of

the men and women who have served the nation during each era of Fort McCoy's history. Visitors with access to the installation can visit Veterans Memorial Plaza year-round from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, weather permitting.

## Tours

Guided tours can be arranged for groups of 10 or more Monday through Friday, excluding federal holidays, throughout the year. There is no cost for tours.

Tours of the History Center, Commemorative Area buildings, Equipment Park, and Veterans Memorial Plaza take approximately one to 1 1/2 hours, depending on the size of the group. Bus tours of the installation are also available and last approximately 30 minutes.

Dining is available on the installation. To schedule a guided tour, contact the Fort McCoy Public Affairs Office.

## **Armed Forces Day Open House**

Fort McCoy typically hosts an Open House each year on the third Saturday in May — Armed Forces Day.

This is an excellent time to visit — no appointment required! All Commemorative Area buildings are open, and many special activities are scheduled.

## Pine View Recreation Area enhances quality of life

## **Pine View Campground**

Pine View Campground, nestled in a wooded area about a quarter mile west of Fort McCoy's cantonment area, is bounded by Suukjak Sep Lake on the east and the La Crosse River on the west and south. The campground is easily accessible off of Highway 21 about a mile west of the Fort McCoy Main Gate.

Pine View offers all the conveniences of a clean, modern campground. Showers, restrooms, laundry facilities, and an LP fill station all are available on site

The campground features 170 campsites, of which 32 are nonelectric tent sites and 12 are electric only. The remaining 126 have full hookups for water, sewer, and electricity. Pine View also has 17 full-service cabins available for those who prefer the next level of comfort.

Among the features of the facility are picnic and playground areas (one handicapped accessible), a camp store, a recreational equipment check-out center, miniature golf, hiking trails, and a beach.

Members of the Fort McCoy community and the public may use this recreation area. Pine View Campground is operational from May through November. Only cabins are available from December to April. Approximately 65,000 people make use of the area annually.

Suukjak Sep Lake provides opportunities for fishing, boating, and swimming. Paddleboards, canoes and kayaks are available for rent by the hour or the day. The lake is stocked annually with rainbow trout and also has populations of largemouth bass and panfish.

## **Recreational Equipment Checkout Center**

The Campground Office/Recreational Equipment Checkout Center is the place to register campers as well as rent boats, canoes, fishing and camping equipment, and many other types of recreational gear.

An 18-hole miniature-golf course, a nine-hole disc-golf course, shuf-fleboard, and activity areas for basketball and volleyball are available.

## Picnic Area

Pine View's 5-acre picnic area features a large, shaded area with pavilions, playgrounds, grills, picnic tables, and a new restroom/shower facility. Volleyball and horseshoe activity areas, as well as playground equip-



ment, are located throughout the grounds.

Two miles of nature/hiking trails are maintained. The trail to Trout Falls starts at the picnic area.

## Whitetail Ridge Ski Area is home for winter fun, more

Fort McCoy's Whitetail Ridge Ski Area provides the Fort McCoy community and the public with multiple opportunities for outdoor recreation. The 200-acre facility also is used for military training.

## **Slopes & Chalet**

Whitetail Ridge is open from approximately mid-December through mid-March, weather permitting. Snow-making and snow-grooming equipment located on site keeps slopes in optimum condition. More than 10,000 people enjoy the facility each year. The area also is accessible by snowmobile when the statewide groomed snowmobile trail network is open.

Downhill skiers and snowboarders of all skill levels will find three groomed and lighted ski runs — the longest exceeding 1,300 feet — equipped with a self-loading T-bar lift. The vertical drop of the slope is more than 185 feet. A terrain park also is available to snowboarders.

The facility is ideal for those new to winter sports. Instructors are available for Ski/Snowboarding lessons, please book in advance.

The facility is recognized by the National Ski Patrol, and patrol members monitor activity on the slopes to promote safety and to attend to any injuries.

Snow tubers can enjoy the excitement of sliding down a 1,000-foot slope.

The six tubing runs are equipped with a Magic Carpet lift, making the journey to the top of the hill as enjoyable as the trip down.

When natural snow conditions are sufficient, cross-country skiers have access to more than 5 miles of groomed trails. Snowshoers also will find opportunities for fun.

The Whitetail Ridge Chalet provides an indoor respite. In addition to providing a break from the cold, the family-friendly area of the facility serves a variety of food and beverages and has large windows allowing views of the activities outdoors.

The Ten-Point Pub is open Thursday-Sunday each weekend during the season for adults to stop in and enjoy and adult beverage, one of our signature sandwiches, and a cozy seating area around the fireplace to warm up.

Lift tickets and on-site equipment rental are available at daily or seasonal rates. Whitetail Ridge facilities also are available at special rates for group functions.

## **Paintball**

Tactics Paintball also is located at Whitetail Ridge. Groups of six or more can be accommodated April-November. Reservations are required 48 hours in advance.

Whitetail Ridge is operated as a nonappropriated-fund activity, and all improvements to this recreation area are paid for using nonappropriated-fund dollars. ## FORT McCOY DIALING INSTRUCTIONS

Dialing instructions pertain only to Fort McCoy telephone extensions with a 898 prefix.

Do not use these dialing instructions when calling from CenturyLink commercial numbers (prefix of 269 or 366), pay phones, or cellphones.

Not all telephone lines on Fort McCoy have access to DSN or long-distance service.

**On-post** — To call another Fort McCoy location from a Fort McCoy telephone with a 502-898 prefix, dial 97, then 1, then all of the numbers in the number.

**DSN** — Dial 94 followed by the DSN phone number.

**Commercial long distance or local** — Dial 97, followed by area code (required for long distance) and the number.

Dialing in to Fort McCoy:



**Cellphone usage** by personnel driving government or privately owned vehicles at Fort McCoy is restricted to hands-free usage for cellphones only.

Drivers without a hands-free cellphone or who need to send a text message at Fort McCoy are required to stop and park the vehicle in a safe, authorized place (road shoulders are okay for short calls/texts).

DO NOT process, store, or transmit classified information on nonsecure telecommunications systems. Official DOD telecommunications systems — including telephones, facsimile machines, computer networks, and modems — are subject to monitoring for telecommunications security purposes at all times. Use of official DOD telecommunications systems constitutes consent to telecommunications-security monitoring.
