readiness of those who depend on us. You are not just employees — you are an essential force in ensuring national security.



Army Regulation 360-1

AR 360-1 is the regulation that governs the release of public information.

This includes what to release and how to release it to the public, non-releaseable subjects, and items that need to be clearned through public affairs channels prior to release. The Public Affairs Program is the overall responsibility of the Arsenal commander.

Only the commander and his designated representatives are authorized to speak for the Pine Bluff Arsenal. The PAO acts as the liaison between the media and the installation.

However, employees are encouraged to speak to civilian professional groups on matter in which the individual has personal knowledge and expertise. This should be coordinated with PAO. They shouldn't comment on military matters that are beyond their knowledge. Classified information won't be discussed.

The EDS is a hazardous waste treatment unit that will be used to treat recovered chemical warfare materiel by deactivating any explosive components and neutralizing chemical agents and industrial chemicals present in the materiel.

Hough takes command of RFAAP

RADFORD, Va. — The Radford Army Ammunition Plant has a new commander.

Lt. Col. Marie Hough accepted the responsibilities during a change of command ceremony on June 5, and she replaces Lt. Col. Adrien Humphreys.

Hough's assignment before taking command of RFAAP was as the Chief of Operations for the 20th Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Command, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md.

In 1997, Hough began her Army career. Ten years later, Hough commissioned through Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Ga., and her initial assignment as a Chemical Officer was with the 2-17th Cavalry Regiment at Fort Campbell, Ky., where she deployed as the Squadron Chemical Officer in support of Operation Enduring Freedom from 2007-08.

Two other past assignments include Commander, Intelligence and Sustainment Company, U.S. Army Europe, Heidelberg, Germany; and Commander Direct Commission Course, 3-11 Infantry Battalion, OCS, Fort Benning, Georgia.

"Marie has completed multiple command level, and

operational chemical, biological assignments since her commissioning," said Col. Collin Keenan, the commander of Pine Bluff Arsenal. "Likewise, her civil and professional military education, coupled with her expertise and leadership at various levels of command, has unquestionably prepared her to lead Radford Army Ammunition Plant.

"Marie, you have a very important mission ahead of you," added Keenan, who officiated the ceremony. "By diligently focusing on establishing priorities, empowering your new team, and fostering a positive and winning mindset among the workforce, I'm confident you will build upon the incredible reputation Radford enjoys in this community and throughout our Army today."

Hough has earned a Master of Science in environmental management from Webster University, St. Louis, Mo., and a Bachelor of Arts in political science from Chaminade University of Honolulu, Hawaii.

"I believe our strength as an organization is deeply intertwined with the strength of our community. We are not separate entities, but rather vital parts of the same fabric," Hough said. "As we move forward, I am committed to fostering strong relationships, actively participating in community initiatives, and ensur-

Dangers of drinking alcohol in the summer heat

Summer is a wonderful time for outdoor activities with family and friends. For many people, a day at the beach, on the boat, or at a backyard barbecue will include drinking alcoholic beverages. Drinking impairs both physical and mental abilities, and it also decreases inhibitions, which can lead to tragic consequences on the water, on the road, and in the great outdoors.

During the hot summer months, it can be tempting to crack open an ice-cold beer to cool off at a cookout, at a pool party, or on a boat ride. But drinking too much alcohol in hot weather can set you up for dehydration and even heat illness.

How alcohol affects your body

When you're out in the heat, your body temperature will usually increase. This causes your blood vessels to dilate, which makes you more susceptible to fainting. And if you're not well-hydrated, this can increase your risk of heat illness even more.


When you add alcohol to this mix, it can make matters worse. Alcohol slows the production of the body's antidiuretic hormone (ADH). This causes you to urinate more frequently and lose even more fluid. Losing fluid from drinking alcohol and being dehydrated from the heat creates a compound effect that can cause:

- Dizziness
- Nausea
- Dry mouth
- · Loss of coordination
- Confusion
- Heat illness
- · Heat stroke

Some people mistake these signs for intoxication, but they may be the result of dehydration. Being intoxicated and dehydrated is dangerous because it can lead to poor judgment, risky behavior and accidents from a lack of coordination and mental clarity.

Drinking in the heat also increases your risk of heat illness.

Being in the heat and drinking alcohol makes it hard for your body to regulate its temperature effectively. This can lead to heat



cramps from the loss of water and salt and even heat stroke, which can lead to organ fail-

Here are tips to stay safe in the summer heat:

- If you're going to a party, drink plenty of water before, during, and after the event.
- · Eat a meal before drinking alcohol. Having food in your stomach will help slow the absorption of alcohol.
- · Eat hydrating foods. This includes fresh fruits and vegetables, such as salad, watermelon or fruit popsicles with little to no added sugar.

· Alternate alcoholic beverages with water. For every adult beverage you have, drink an eight to 12-ounce glass of water.

· Watch your serving sizes. A serving size of alcohol is 12 ounces of beer, five ounces of wine or 1.5 ounces (one shot glass) of spirits like rum, vodka, gin, tequila or whiskey.

· Limit caffeinated drinks. Most caffeinated drinks are diuretics, meaning they cause the body to lose water. This includes caffeinated soda, certain teas, energy drinks, and coffee. Stick to decaf or water

instead (Beal, Lena, 2025).

You don't have to give up your favorite drinks this summer. Just pay attention to your body, stay hydrated and drink responsibly.

PBA Commander recognized by local community

A community recognition program was held June 17 at the White Hall Community Center for Pine Bluff Arsenal's Commander Col. Collin K. Keenan. The event was hosted by the White Hall Military Affairs Advisory Committee.

White Hall Mayor Noel Foster, Jefferson County Judge Gerald Robinson, Pine Bluff Mayor Vivian Flowers and David Beck, White Hall senior alderman and chairman of the White Hall Military Affairs Advisory Committee attended the event.

"Thank you for taking the time out of your busy day to attend this farewell program honoring Col. Keenan," said Larry Wright, consultant with the City of White Hall. "We have a series of presentations and thank you's. After those conclude, we will have an open mic for anyone who has remarks."

Foster thanked everyone for being there.

Foster said from the first moment he met Keenan he knew he was a personal guy.

"As I drove up to the White Hall Community Center, the thing I thought about is trees, leaves and roots. Trees are central to what they can do in producing life. We often look at trees and say we like the leaves on the tree," he said. "Leaves will blow away in the fall and they regrow, but what truly stands out are the roots.

You don't get to see them, but they hold the tree together."

The leaders here in this community – White Hall, Pine Bluff and Jefferson County – these are truly leaders who are roots, said Keenan.

"They do this out of their heart," he said. "I hope I have been able to be that kind of leader for all of you. My challenge to you...are you rooted or are you a leaf?

PBA's Wayland speaks to teachers at science summit

Marcia Wayland, chief of the monitoring division, with Pine Bluff Arsenal's Directorate of Risk Management and Regulatory Affairs, got the opportunity to speak June 4 to science educators at the K-12 STEAM Safer Science Summit 2025 at Arkadelphia, Ark.

The event was a week-long professional teacher development event, touted online as "an immersive event focused on enhancing the understanding of government and state lab safety regulations, and the compliance with and implementation of safety protocols within STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) education environments.

"I was there for a half day to speak," said Wayland, who spoke to approximately 30 teachers from various high schools from around the state. "There were a few middle school teachers there but mostly high schools. I talked to teachers from Prescott, Beebe, Little Rock, Arkadelphia, Hot Springs...all over the area."

Wayland, who is from Sherwood, Ark., said she talked about her background and

working within various laboratory environments with the group, and how her degrees got her to PBA.

"I received my Bachelor of Science from the University of Louisiana at Monroe. My degree is toxicology with a minor in chemistry," she said. "Then I took an odd turn and earned my master's degree in forensic science at the University of Alabama-Birmingham. I did all kinds of things in toxicology and was a DNA analyst for a long time"

At that point, she started looking for another career

path. "I was from Arkansas; I knew about the Arsenal. A position opened, and I landed it," said Wayland. "Now, I'm an environmental chemist."

She said the teachers were split into three groups, and she was asked to talk with each group about how her career supports the Arsenal's missions.

"I didn't realize before this event, but school labs often have a lot of old chemicals, including hazardous ones," said Wayland. "I spent a little time talking about chemical inventories, Safety Data Sheets (SDSs), proper chemical storage and safe chemical disposal. I emphasized the need for printed SDSs and inventories, instead of just having them on the computer."

Grants are also given to the schools to assist in the costs of proper chemical disposal.

"I had so much fun talking to these teachers," said Wayland. "I talk to the science teachers at my own children's high school a few times a year. Teachers pay attention more than the students do most of the time. I love talking about science."

During the summit, Wayland said the teachers asked lots of good questions.

"They said they are always trying to give their students options when they ask why they had to learn about science and how it can benefit them in a future career – other than being a doctor," she added. "You can do a lot more with science than you think."
