

# Here's Sample of GI Life in 1779

Ever think that working for the government is a lot of complicated details? Well the travel orders below, dated July 6, 1779, show something of GI complications in those days. They were issued by the office of the acting commandant, Federal Defense of Yorktown and N.Y. Harbor in Yonkers, N.Y.

They are the oldest special order on file with the Adjutant General's office in Washington and the original copy is now in the National Archives.

Our thanks to George Hesse, of AMCPM-CSW for bringing the orders to our attention.

1. Issue necessary orders sending one enlisted man, on horseback via safest and most

convenient route, at Government expense to Fort Van Steuben on the Ohio River below the junction of the great rivers at Old Fort Pitt, for the purpose of carrying secret dispatches to Maj. Alonzo De Lafayette, who, at last official roll call, is the Commandant of Fort Van Steuben. If, upon arrival, Maj. Lafayette is either dead or resigned, the soldier will deliver the dispatches to the immediate Commanding Officer.

2. The expense section of the finance department will supply this courier with the necessary cash to buy himself sufficient food supplies to subsist him on the entire journey. If the finance department at the destination is not functioning the enlisted man is authorized to barter with neighboring Indians for necessary salt and other miscellaneous necessities for the return trip. Uniform buttons

and musketry badges may be utilized in connection with bartering. If the situation warrants fraternizing with Indian tribes, due precautions will be taken insofar as the relief troops are concerned, soldier making full use of his medical kit immediately after exposure. The expedition directed is considered necessary in the military service. Government mounts and subsistence will be furnished and if used in bartering, uniform buttons and marksman medals will be replaced by the government, upon application for same by the enlisted man concerned.

3. Upon return to his home station, soldier will submit a written report showing the full names and ranks of Commanding Officers of all military forts visited, so that the Department of War can be informed and bring their rosters up to date.

## Maj. Gen. Oren E. Hurlbut Receives Cluster to DSM

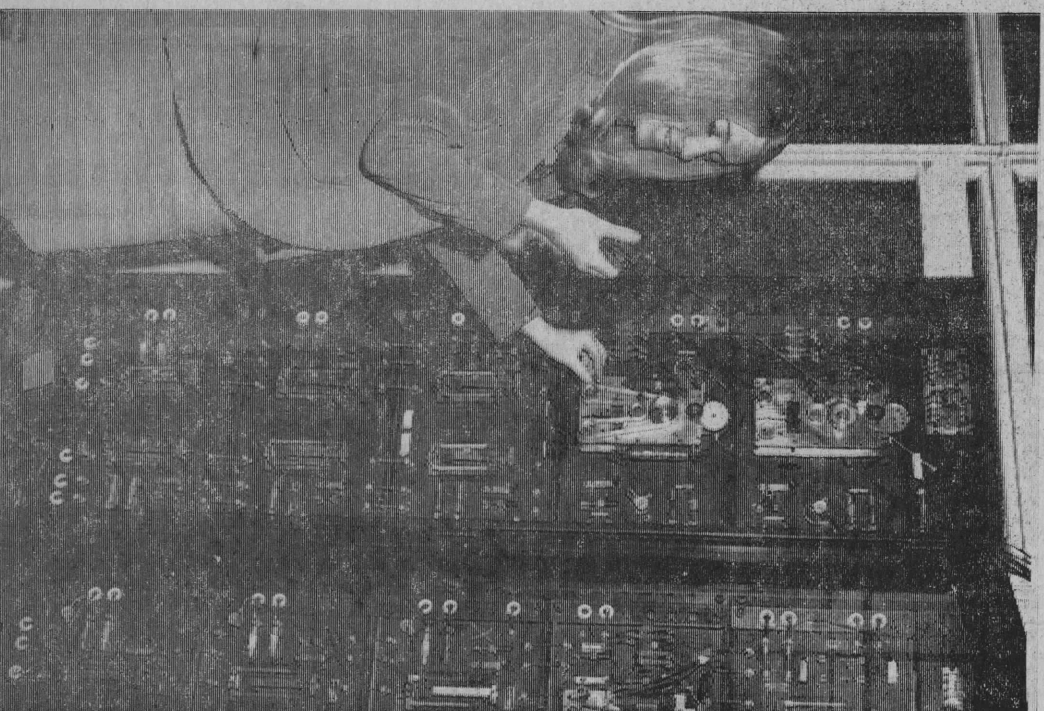

The medal was presented last week by Gen. Ralph E. Haines Jr., commander in chief, U.S. Army Pacific.

Word has been received that General Hurlbut will arrive here Monday and will "be in his office" Tuesday.

The citation said: "He effected profound and far-reaching changes to the logistical support system which greatly enhanced the effectiveness of our fighting forces. During his frequent visits to overseas installations, he provided comprehensive guidance, direction, and assistance to United States Army Pacific commands which resulted in significant improvement in all phases of logistical support." ## Wage Survey Underway

The Rock Island Arsenal Wage Survey Committee is conducting a Department of Defense wage survey in a six county area.

This is the first full-scale wage survey being conducted under the new Coordinated Federal Wage System.

The purpose of the survey is to gather data to be used in maintaining the hourly payrate comparability between Federal agencies and private firms in the area.

When the survey is completed, the wage data will be forwarded to the DOD. New wage schedules, determined from the survey, will apply to all government agencies in Scott and Muscatine counties in Iowa and Bureau, Henry, Mercer and

Rock Island counties in Illinois.

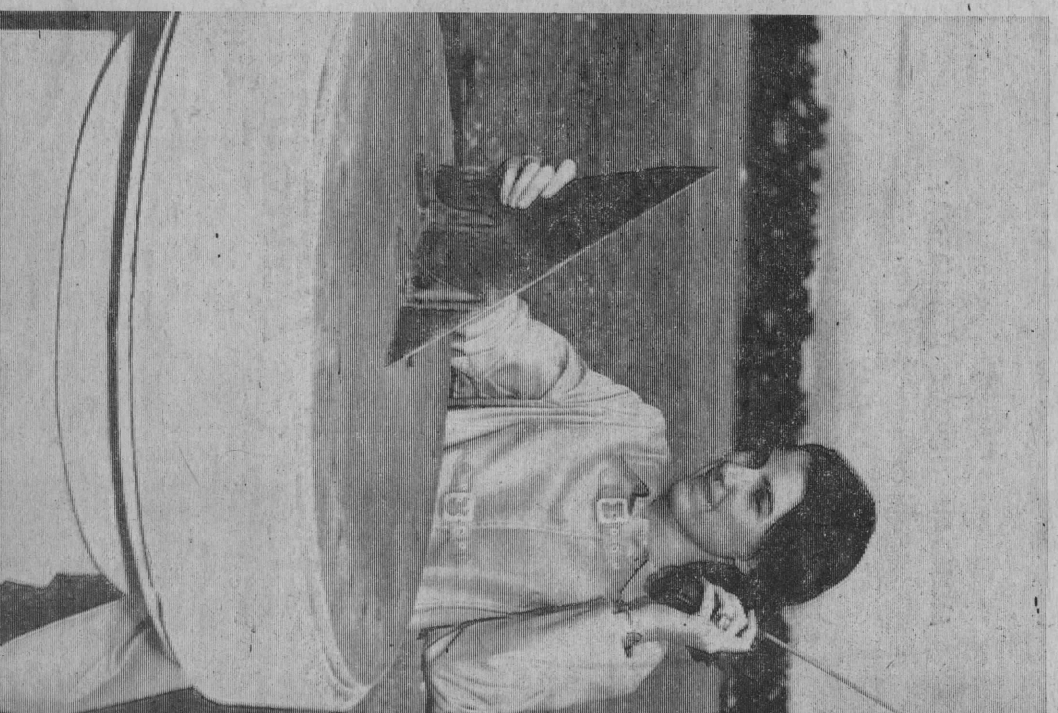
Nov. 16, 1965 Presidential memorandum directed the Chairman of the Civil Service Commission to develop the Coordinated Federal Wage System.

The objective is equality — to insure that trade, craft and labor employees performing similar work in the same wage area get the same rates of pay in all Federal agencies, and that pay distinctions be maintained in keeping with work distinctions.

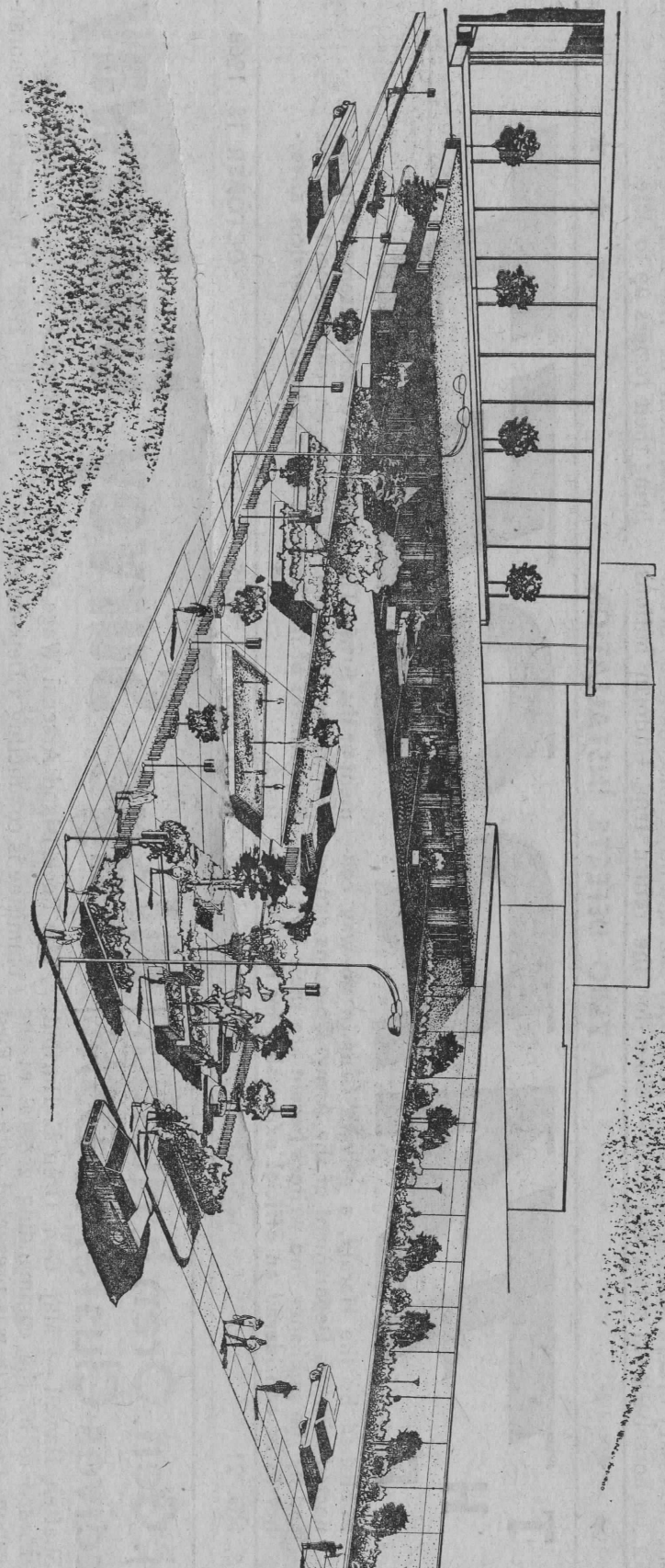
The Coordinated Federal Wage System will be placed into operation area by area, as full-scale wage surveys are made, over a two-year period.

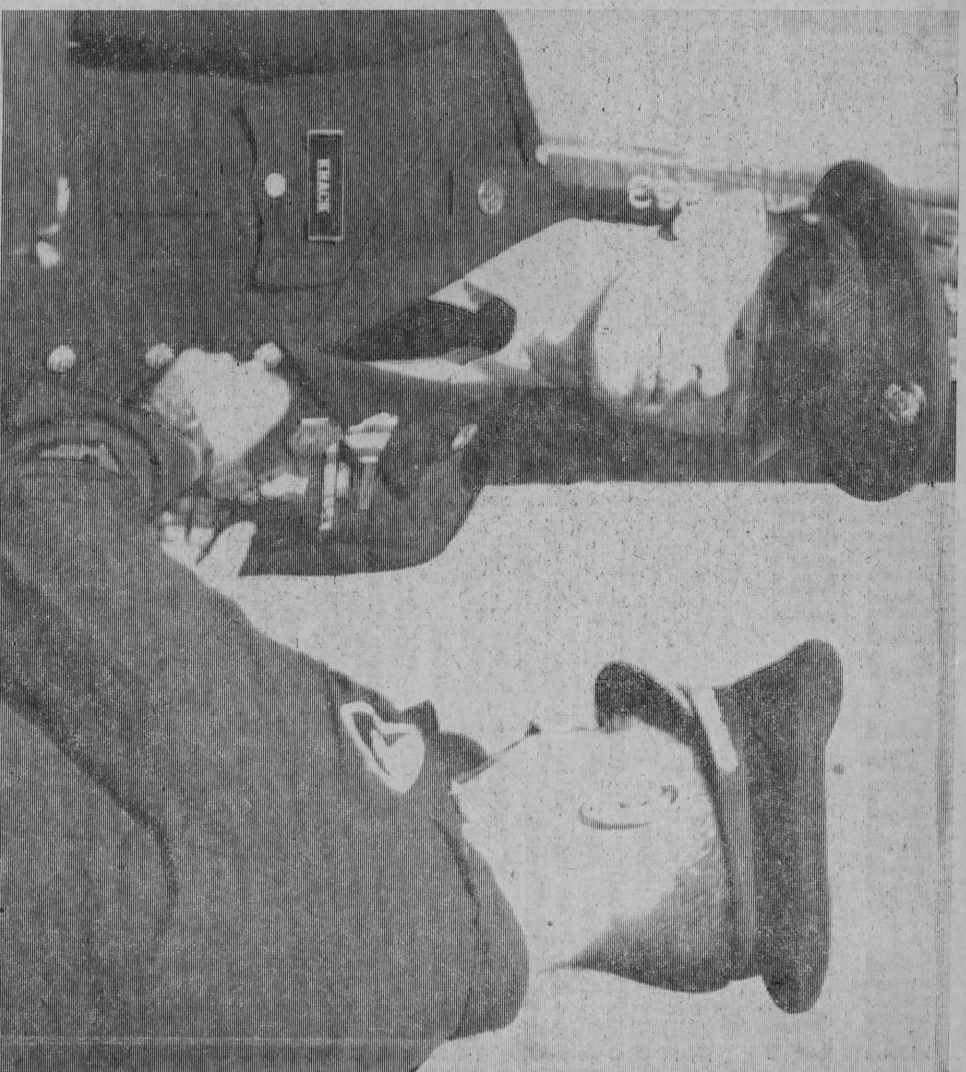

On April 13, Anderson was checking a noise in a truck engine when a fan blade broke loose and embedded itself near his left arm pit severing an artery.

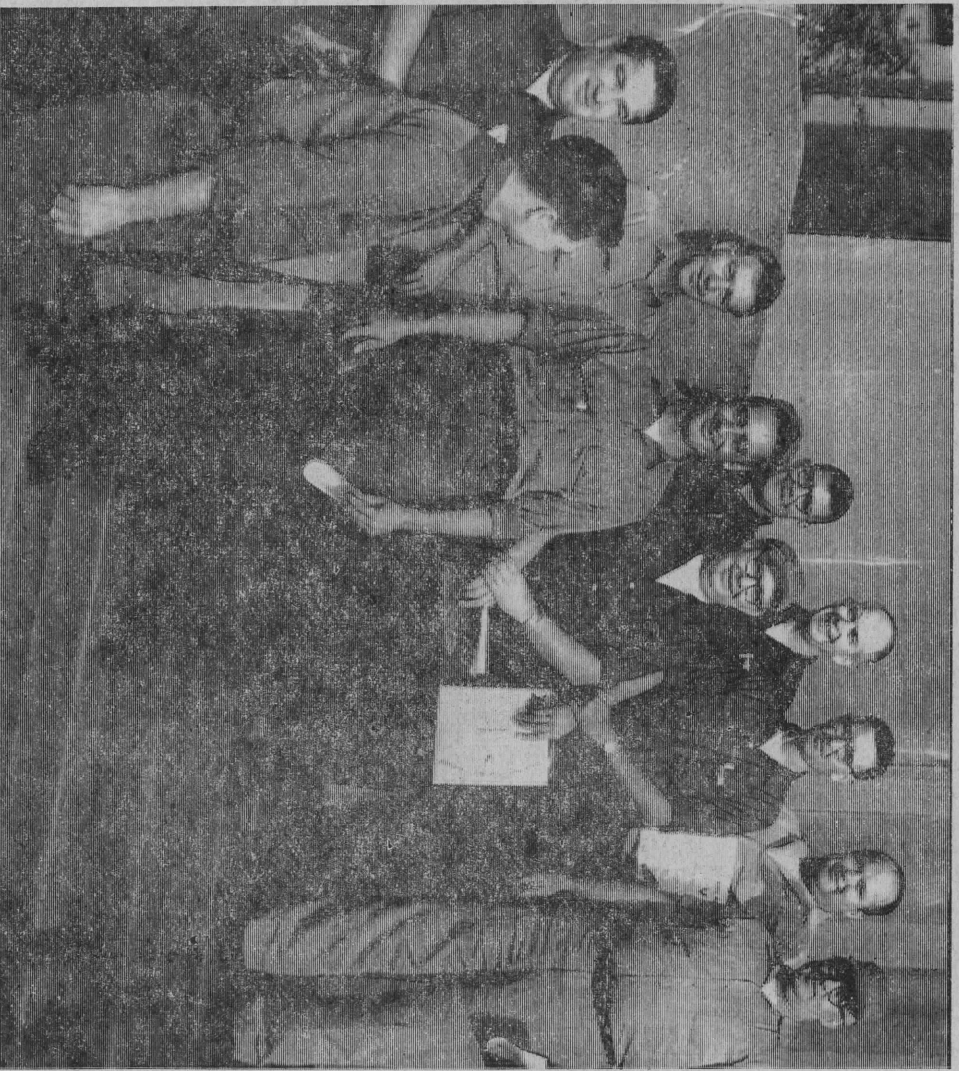

# CFC TERMED 'ON THE MONEY' AT ONE-THIRD MARK

At approximately the one-third mark of the Combined Federal Campaign, Local drive officials said that donations were just about "on the money" according to first reports last Friday.

Last week's report—there are three due—showed a total of \$31,386 donated through CFC. A goal of \$95,000 was set by officials at the beginning of the campaign.

Officials said the start was actually better than it looked on paper because the report covered only four

days or less of work since the beginning of the drive on Oct. 7.

The initial report showed percentage breakdowns for four of the major reporting agencies of the Army Division and one agency under the Scott County Division.

Army Weapons Command headquarters reported 39 per cent of its goal in the first report. PEQUA had 36 per cent, Rock Island Arsenal 31 per cent, and AMCIS 12 per cent.

Rock Island District of the Corps of Engineers and AMETA did not report.

When the USS New Jersey returned to combat last month off the coast of Vietnam, weapons made at Watervliet Arsenal played a major role in the battle action which reportedly knocked out four heavily fortified enemy gun positions in the DMZ.

Two of the nine giant 16-inch gun tubes which hurled 2,700 pound projectiles from the re-commissioned battleship more than 20 miles at the enemy targets were made at Watervliet during World War II.

And, the arsenal may figure in future plans for the New Jersey as the area installation is one of two facilities in the nation being considered by the Navy for the difficult job of re-lining the huge tubes of the guns when continued use makes this necessary.

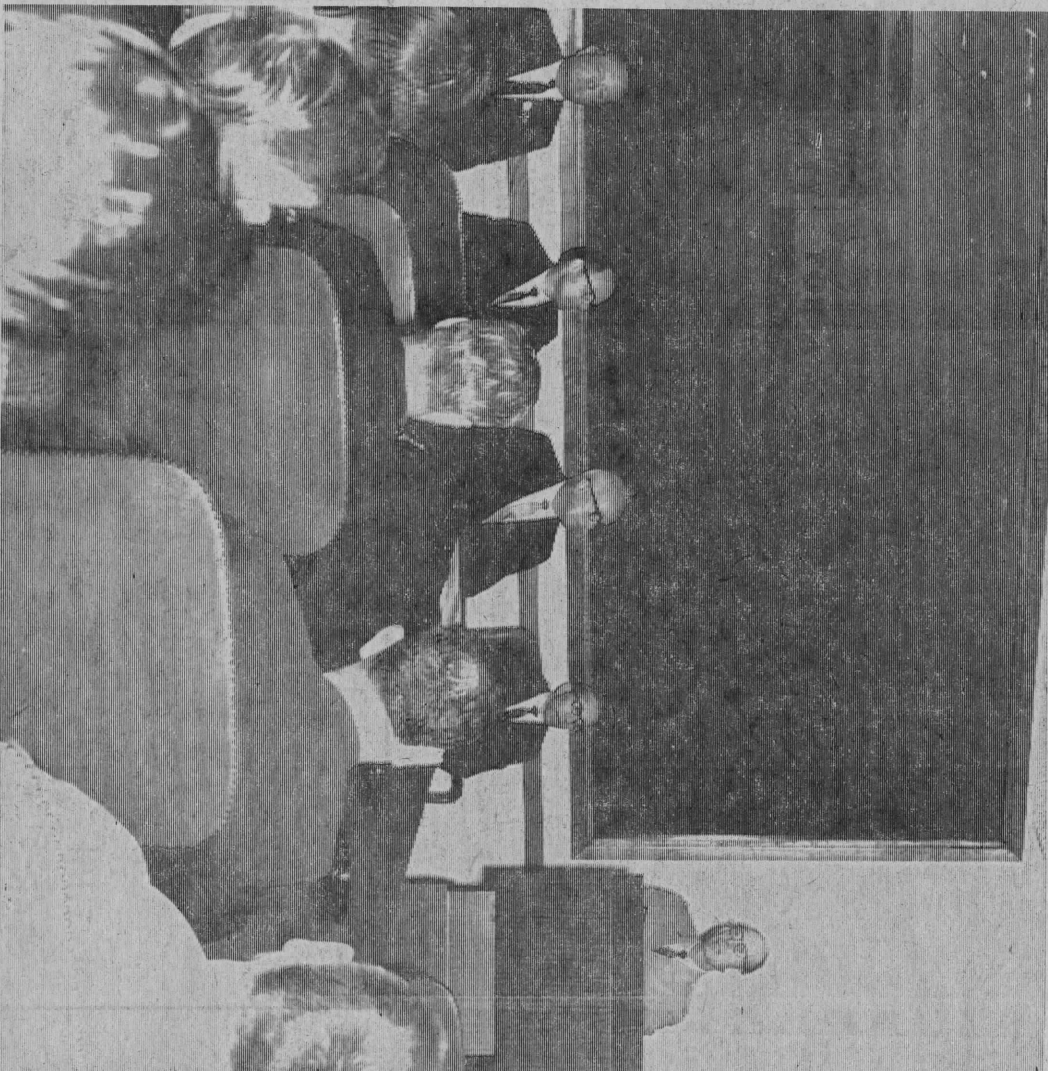
Only the arsenal and the S&A Fabricating Inc., Pocatello, Idaho, have the expertise and facilities for "unshrinking" the present liner from the gun barrel and, then, by reversing the process, installing a new liner. The New Jersey is a vet-

eran of World War II and Korea where she was used for shore bombardment similar to today's action. The 45,000 ton battleship was ordered re-commissioned a year ago and emerged from the mothballs last April. She sailed from California for her present mission on Sept. 5.

The Defense Department ordered the New Jersey back into action to take advantage of its 16-inch guns which "will provide an extended range and increased destructive power for current 7th Fleet activities."

# Auto Talk

By Werner A. am Ende

A little time spent now in preparing the buggy for cold weather driving will pay big dividends later.

Just a few words about anti-freeze. Should you decide to keep your old permanent anti-freeze in the car for one more winter, be sure to add some anti-rust and corrosion inhibitors.



Remember! Anti-freeze is far from "permanent". Manufacturers generally do not recommend that their product be used for more than one freezing season. Although the ethylene glycol base remains permanent, the inhibitors do not. Therefore, it's a good idea to use new anti-freeze each year.

A few hints prior to using new anti-freeze. Be sure all hoses are in good condition. Bad hoses have a nasty habit of blowing at the most inopportune time.

Use a good quality radiator cleaner to prepare your motor for the new anti-freeze. Remember, mineral deposits, sludge, oil, dirt and rust accumulations can do a very effective job in gumming up the works.

A word of caution—after cleaning the motor, make certain if you have a V-8 that both blocks are drained as well as the radiator. This item is often overlooked. Quite often the block drains are difficult to get at—but the blocks must be drained.

If you have a six, you're in business. A small plug or drain cock is usually visible at the lower part of the block and may be easily reached.

After completely draining the motor and radiator, close all drains and pour in sufficient anti-freeze to prevent freezing at the lowest temperature normally experienced in your area unless you're planning to take a trip up north during the winter. Then let the lowest temperature of that area be your guide.

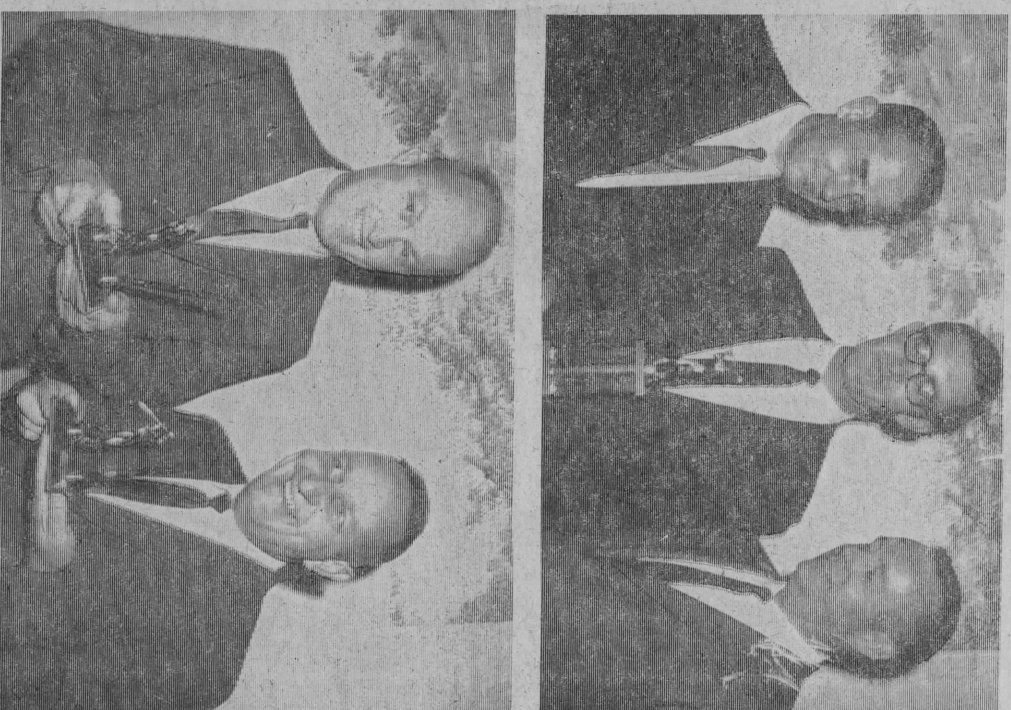
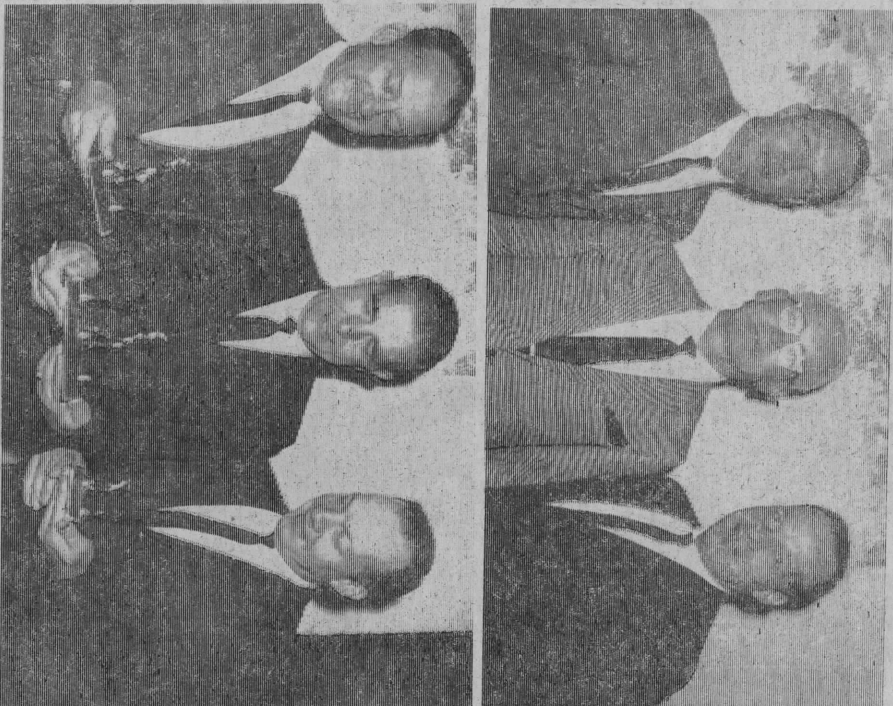
Fill the radiator to normal level by adding tap water, or better yet, rain water, if you have it. Most likely you have never looked into the radiator fill and feasted your eyes on the cores. If you have, however, you will agree with me that in many radiators the amount of mineral deposits on top of the cores is astounding. Soft water may be the answer to preventing this build-up.

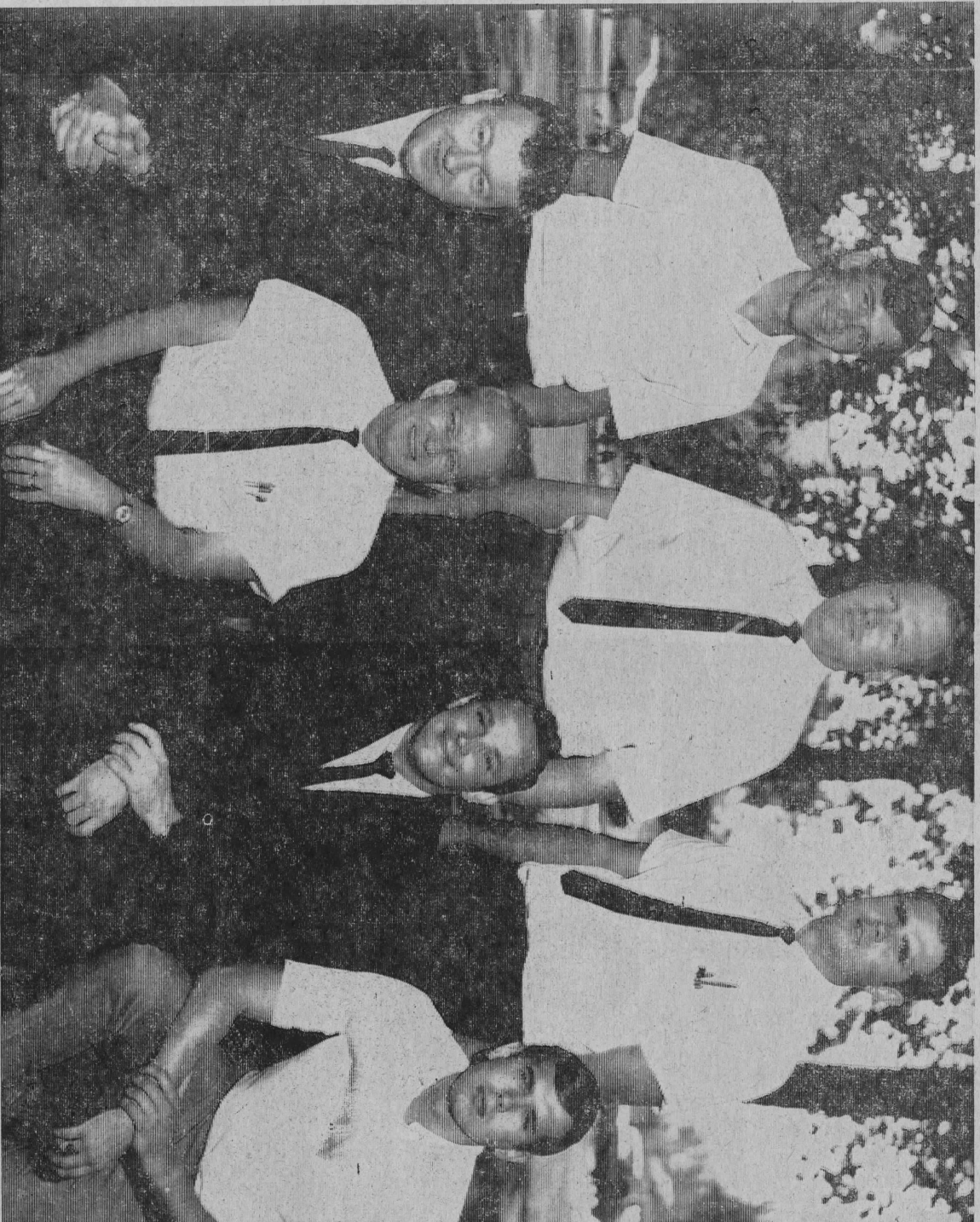

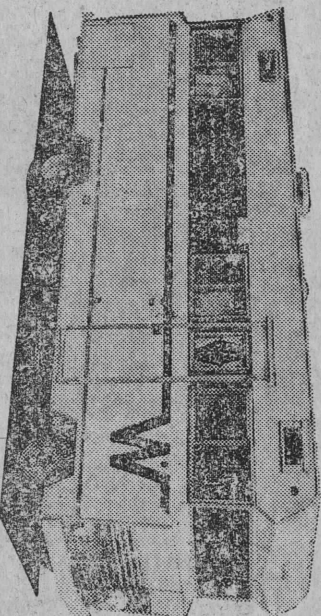

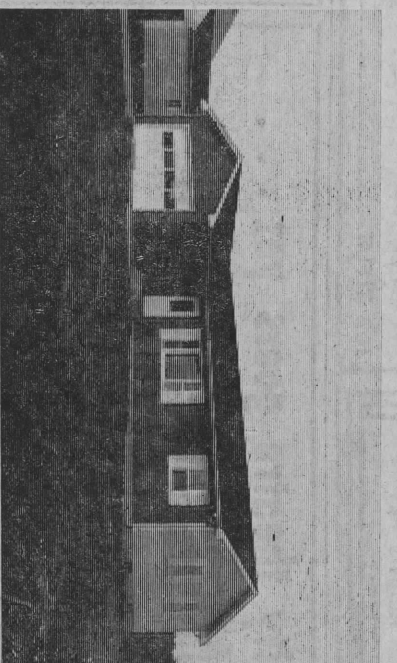

### WECOM Pact

The Army Weapons Command has awarded a \$500,000 research contract to the University of Iowa at Iowa City.

The contract, which runs for three years, is a phase of the Department of Defense THEMIS program. This program is designed to promote "centers of excellence" in science and technology in universities throughout the country.

The University of Iowa Mechanics and Hydraulics department has been selected to study the variation

and stability of military vehicular weapons systems.

William F. Ames, professor of mechanics and hydraulics at the university, will direct the program. Dr. Alexander Hammer, acting chief of WECOM's science and technical laboratories, will work closely with the program here at Rock Island Arsenal.

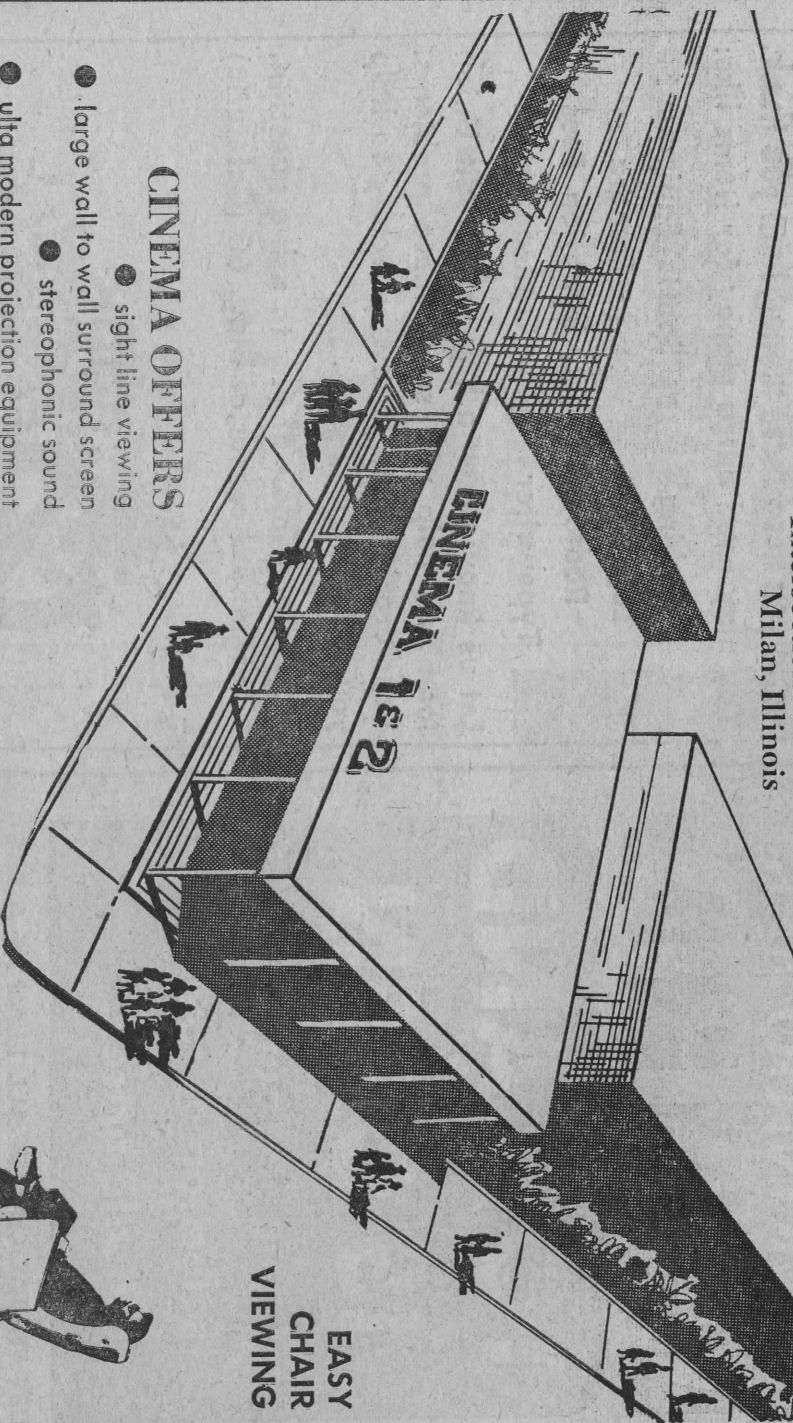
