Major Changes Made in Court Legal Procedures

WASHINGTON — President Lyndon B. Johnson has signed into law the Military Justice Act of 1968, which is designed to insure that military personnel are afforded the same protection as civilian persons who are accused of federal offenses.

Also, the new law is intended to bring the procedures for trials by special and general courts martial more closely parallel to current procedures in U.S. district courts.

The legislation, which had the concurrence of the Office of the Secretary of Defense, makes far-reaching changes in military law and trial procedures.

Part of the law went into effect when the President signed the act in late October. The remaining provisions, which will have a great influence on commanders and all other military personnel, will become effective on Aug. 1, 1969.

The portions of the law now in effect pertain to appellate review of court-martial cases. Two major changes are included:

- The time in which the accused can petition for a new trial is extended from one year to two years, including summary and special court-martial cases.
 - The Judge Advocate General is given new powers to modify, or set-aside, illegal convictions by summary or special courts martial.
- Before the remaining provisions of the law can be implemented, the President must issue an executive order changing

the Manual for Courts Martial.

A revised Manual for Courts Martial, reflecting changes in military law over the past 17 years, will be used by the Armed Forces beginning Jan. 1, 1969. This manual will be revised further by the President's executive order, which will be drafted with the assistance of the military services.

Among the major changes in the Manual for Courts Martial required, or permitted, by the law are the following:

- The accused will be afforded the opportunity to be defended by a legally qualified counsel at special courts martial unless the commander certifies that such counsel cannot be obtained.
- Trial in special and general courts martial may be held by a military judge alone if the accused so requests and the request is approved by the military judge.
- Pre-trial and post-trial sessions of courts martial may be held by the military judge without the presence of the court members for the purpose of deciding procedural questions.
- Convening authorities are given discretionary authority to defer the service of sentences to confinement pending appellate review. (This parallels the civilian practice of an individual being freed on bail pending appeal of a sentence.)
- An accused may object to trial by summary court martial even if he has refused punishment under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

CFC Officials Hope Late Returns Will Reach Goal

Combined Federal Campaign officials announced last week that \$34,098 was donated to each of the two major local area fund drives as its contribution to the welfare of the surrounding communities.

The recipients — Rock Island's United Appeal and Scott County's United Crusade — had each set a goal of \$34,000 as the CFC goal for this year.

Unofficial figures at the last CFC reports needing \$40,500 donated, almost 99 percent. Three other WECOM units came out ahead—the Secretary of the General Staff office, 106 per cent; Systems Analysis division, 100 per cent, and Procurement and Production directorate, 101 per cent.

Of the Rock Island Arsenal units, four came out with more than 100 per cent of their goals—the Commander's office, Security office, Civilian Personnel office, and the Procurement division.

Two of the three divisions in CFC topped their goals. The federal employees of Rock Island County organizations donated \$5,906, going over their \$5,700 goal. Those with Scott County organizations tallied \$3,527—over their \$3,400 mark.

In the Army division, one unit topped its goal—the Army Production Equipment Agency with \$902, just edging its \$900 goal.

Donations from Headquarters Army Weapons Command came close to the expected \$41,000 with over

Q. My next door neighbor received a Presidential Memorial Certificate. How does one qualify to receive these certificates?

A. The Presidential Memorial Certificates honor the memory of a deceased veteran or a deceased member of the Armed Forces. The Certificate may be issued to the next of kin, however, a request from a close friend or associate of the deceased will be honored when no certificate is issued to an eligible next-of-kin.

Eligibility for the certificate will be determined by prima facie evidence of the character of discharge of

the deceased member of the Armed Forces, which must have been other than dishonorable.

Public law authorizes the Certificate to war and peacetime veterans so long as the service of the veteran was under honorable conditions. The next-of-kin will be determined in the following precedence: Widow, oldest child, mother, father, oldest sister, or oldest brother.

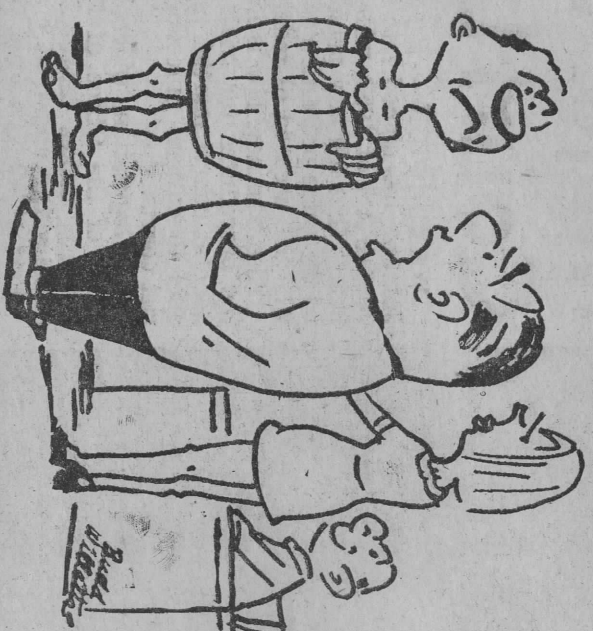
Notice of death in any form received by any VA Field Station will result in the initiation of necessary procedures for issuance of a Presidential Memorial Certificate if the character of discharge qualifies, and if VA records contain information identifying the next-of-kin.

Offer Immunization Program

With New Mumps Vaccine

A voluntary immunization program for employees that it is expected who have never had the mumps is being offered by the Medical office, according to word from Maj. John L. Zumerchik, post surgeon.

Major Zumerchik said that adults who have not had the mumps, especially male, should take advantage of the opportunity to participate in the voluntary immunization program.

He recommended that those adults who are doubtful about whether or not they have ever had the mumps also should get the immunization.

Green computer cards will be distributed to all employees. Those interested in getting the immunization should return them to their supervisors before Nov. 20.

Only those who want the immunization should sign and return the cards. Supervisors should get the signed cards back to the Medical office before Nov. 25.

The new ly developed "Lyovac" mumps vaccine provides protection against the natural mumps in most cases — approximately 95 per cent effective—with no significant side effects, said the post surgeon.

When the cards are tabulated, the vaccine will be ordered, their parents get there a lot sooner.

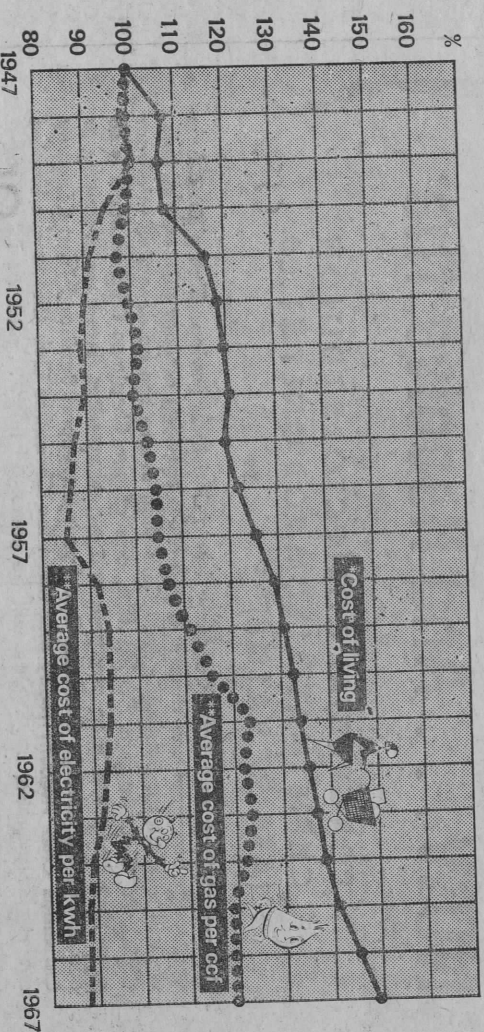

of an automobile and women's knowledge thereof are not necessarily compatible. Driving the car from here to there is no problem for the female—or is it? What causes the engine to do this, however, is quite a different story.

Let's for the moment go into basics. You turn the ignition key and this starts the engine. So? A lot of things happen that you may or may not know about.

As the engine turns, an electrical connection is made from the battery to the coil which, in turn, causes high voltage to be conveyed from the distributor to the spark plugs. An earlier article told about this in a little more detail. Now, as the distributor allows high voltage to be channeled to the spark plugs, these little fellows try to explode a gas and air mixture in the cylinders.

That is not all, though. As the ignition system is attempting to do its work, the carburetor and valves automatically cooperate. The turning of the engine will lift an intake valve at the time the piston is on its downward stroke, causing a partial vacuum and pulling air and a small amount of gas through the carburetor. Incidentally, the carburetor is the thing-a-ma-jig that sits on top of the engine which you never see unless

you take that big air cleaner and other things to turn at the same time the ignition and carburetor do their work. I won't explain the operation of these items at this time—it'll just be confusing.

I hope you girls have some picture as to basically what happens when you turn the ignition key.

Now, should you discuss these functions with your husband and he says, "I know that," just ask him, if he's so smart, what's the ratio of air to gas, as this mixture is pulled into the engine cylinder. If he doesn't know, tell him, "between 12 and 14 to one, you dummy."

This explosion causes the piston to travel down the cylinder in a hurry. Other pistons are activated in the same way, and the engine should start rotating by itself.

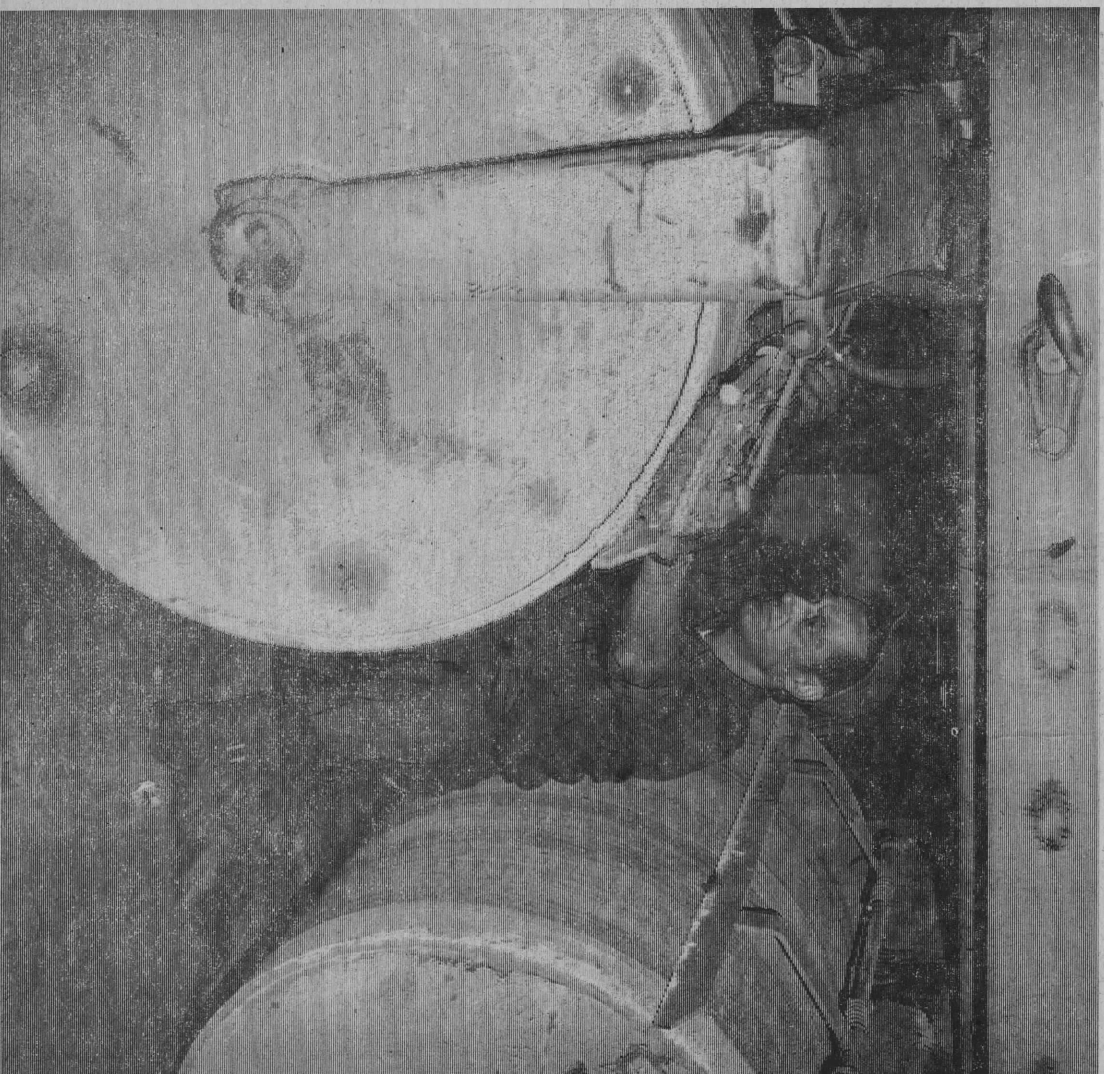

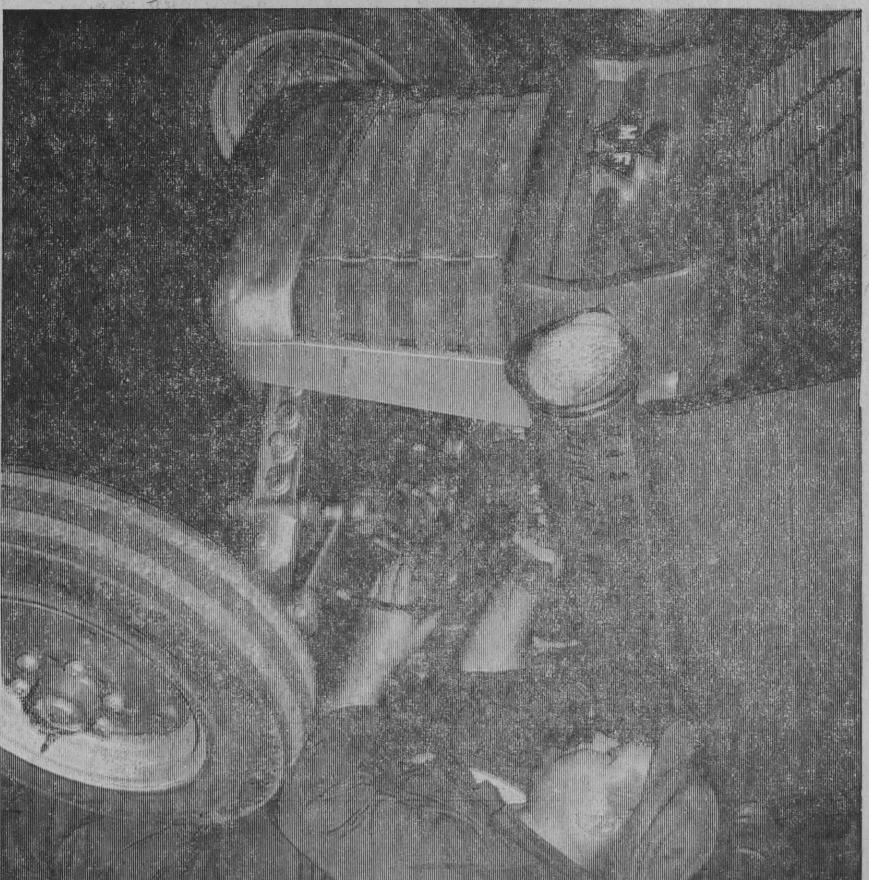

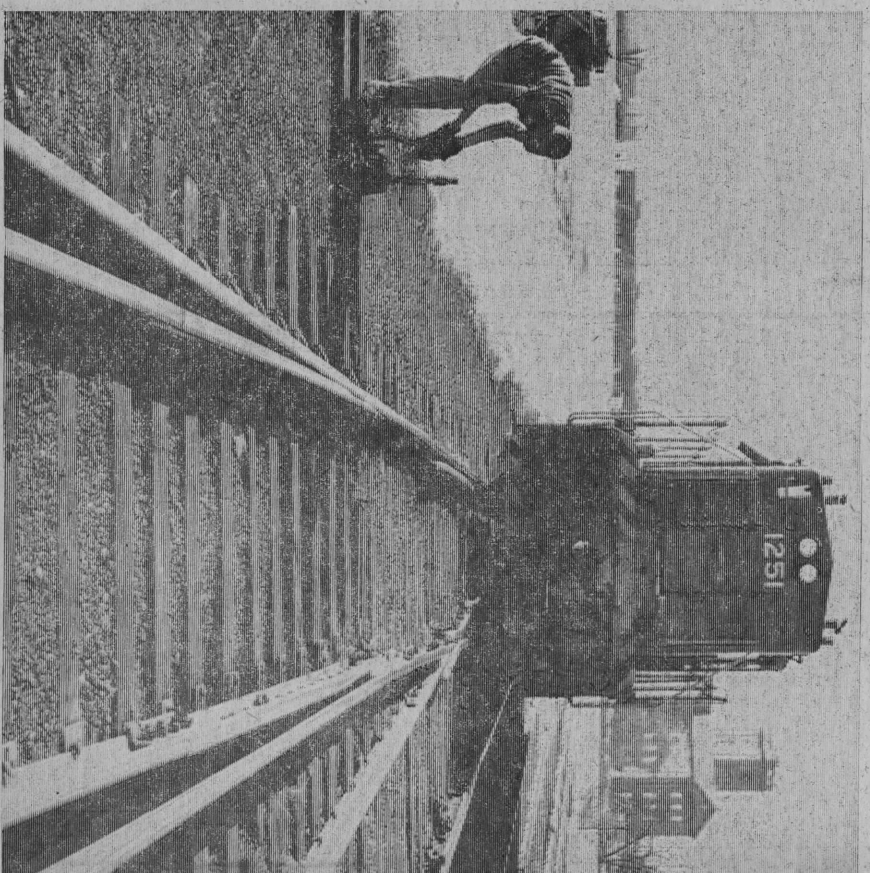


CARL ROSEMILLER, an auto mechanic in the general maintenance division, adjusts a roller cleaner on a road roller.

the cab to the site. Operations division requests per day

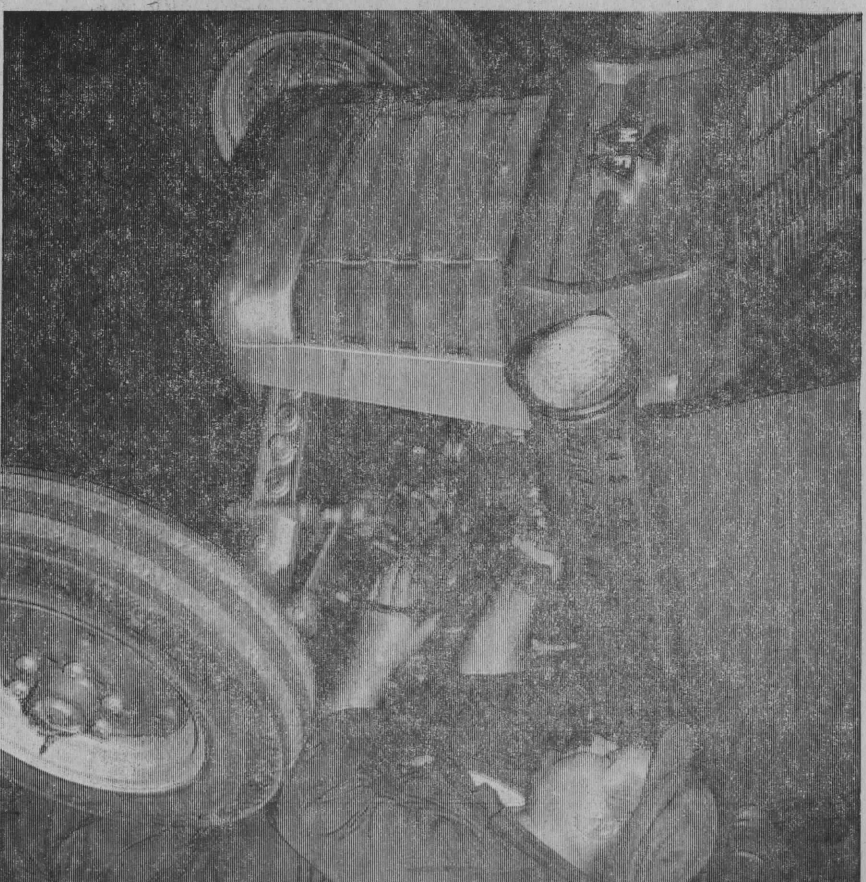

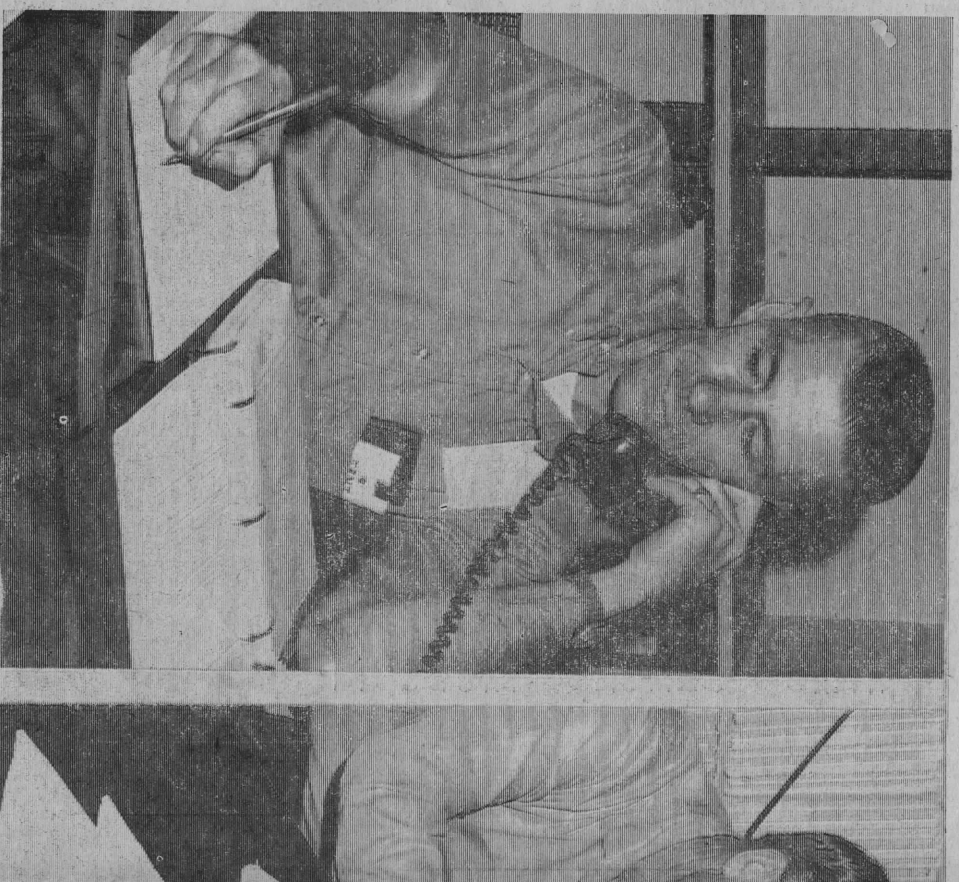

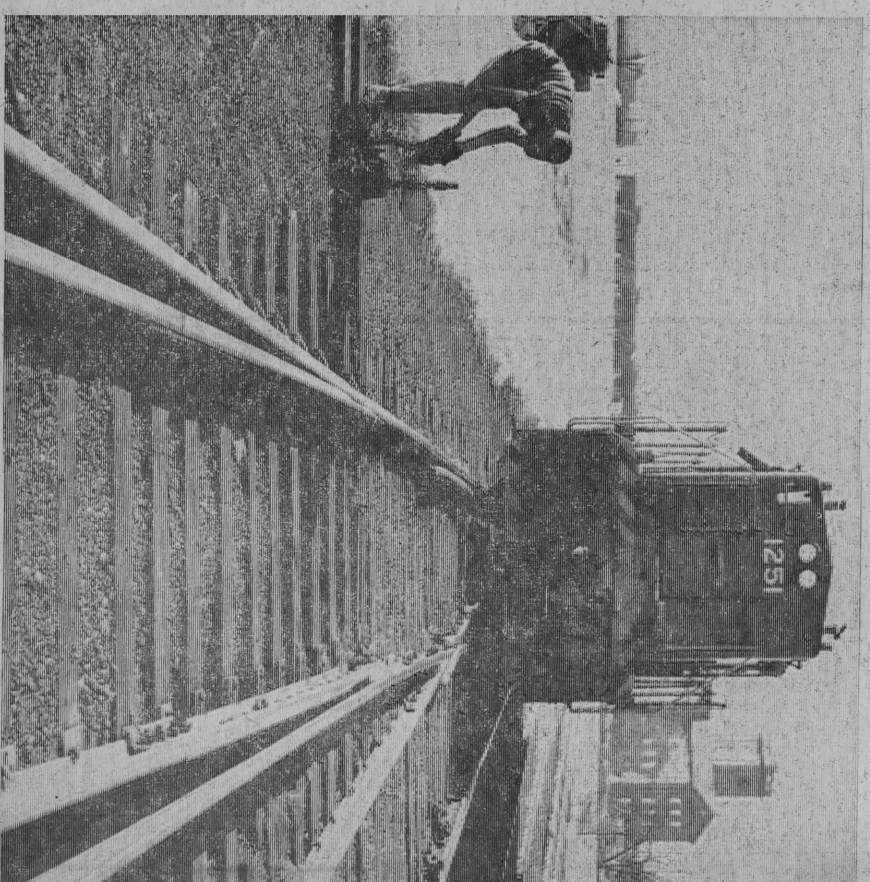


CARL ROSEMILLER, an auto mechanic in the general maintenance division, adjusts a roller cleaner on a road roller.

Work will be performed at Harrington and Richardson's Worcester, Mass., facility and by General Motors' Hydramatic Division at Ypsilanti, Mich.

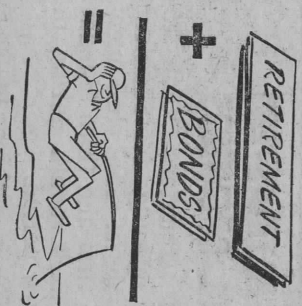
