

General Anderson Receives Second Star

Registration Of Autos To Start Monday

Registration of cars of all personnel at Rock Island Arsenal will begin Monday.

Arsenal Security Chief J. R. Hurless said today a team from the police department will visit all areas of the Arsenal, Headquarters, AWC, and agencies between Monday and May 27.

Police Chief John L. Hannan named Lt. Edward B. Lester to head the registration team.

A 1965 year tab will be issued to employees who have bumper decals in good condition. New decals will be available as replacements where needed.

Military and civilian personnel will be covered in the same registration.

Form 1409

Chief Hannan said persons registering cars must have a valid driver's license and these additional items ready for the registration team's visit:

1. A completed form 1409, including present decal number, if the decal is in satisfactory condition.

2. Proof of paid-up liability insurance, including evidence of the amount of coverage and a receipt for the present policy period.

3. Proof of car ownership, or, if the registrant is not the owner, a signed statement by the registrant attesting that the owner understands restrictions on use of the decal.

Form 1409 is available to supervisors through regular supply channels.

The Registration schedule starts Monday in the basement of the Administration Building. Registering will shift to Building 90 April 19.

Promoted at Ceremonies in Washington

Army Weapons Command's commanding general, Roland B. Anderson, returned this week from Washington wearing the two star insignia of a major general.

Gen. Anderson received the second star Tuesday from his commander, Gen. Frank S. Besson Jr., CG of Army Materiel Command, at a promotion ceremony in the nation's capital.

President Johnson nominated Gen. Anderson for promotion in a recommendation to the Senate Feb. 1.

Lynde Present

Present at the ceremony was retired Maj. Gen. Nelson M. Lynde Jr., Gen. Anderson's predecessor as AWC commander.

Also on hand was the mother of Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Eugene Cox, widow of the Georgia congressman.

Gen. Anderson assumed command of AWC on March 1, last year, when Gen. Lynde retired. Before that, Gen. Anderson served for 17 months as the AWC deputy commanding general.

First Star

Gen. Anderson was promoted to brigadier general in September, 1962.

A native of Duncan, Okla., Gen. Anderson was graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1938 and was commissioned a second lieutenant of artillery. Before going to West Point, he attended the University of Oklahoma for 3½ years.

His military career has included assignments in all phases of ordnance activity, including procurement, industrial management, supply and technical analysis.

RIA Tools for Jeep Work

Rock Island Arsenal Operations Division expects to receive in 10 days the first batch of quarter-ton trucks (jeeps) to be fitted here to mount the 106mm recoilless rifle.

A total of 1,660 of the vehicles will be modified under a \$1,363,043 work order placed with the RIA Comptroller and Programs Office by Army

Mobility Command, Warren, Mich.

An estimated 175 workers will be involved in the task. No additional hiring is anticipated. Deliveries of modified vehicles are scheduled for July, August and September.

M14, Too

The work here will include manufacture and installation of the mounting for the 106mm rifle, an overload kit and a mounting kit for the M14 rifle.

The order, placed by the Mobility Command's project manager for General Purpose Vehicles, covers materials, labor

and services for manufacture of the kits, handling, modifications, inside storage and loading vehicles for shipment.

All work will be done at the Arsenal, except for some minor components to be procured from other sources.

When modified, the M151 vehicle will be designated the M151A1C.

Council Picks Wildermuth and Virginia Case

Everette E. Wildermuth was elected chairman, and Virginia Case, recorder, by the new 7-member Civilian Non-Appropriated Funds Council last week.

Wildermuth served as chairman of the old 10-member council during the four years it operated as an experimental group, combining the welfare and restaurant council functions.

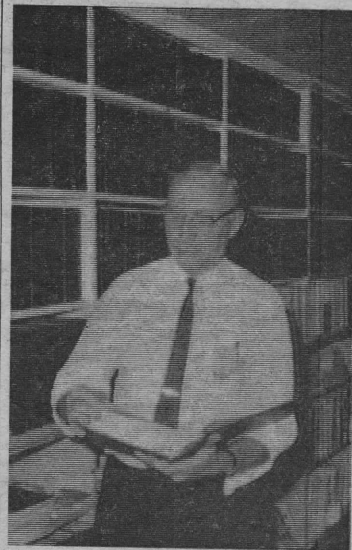
The recorder formerly was a member of the old Welfare Council for two years. Both officers are in the AWC Comptroller's office.

Arsenal Union Gets Agreement; Gibbs Elected

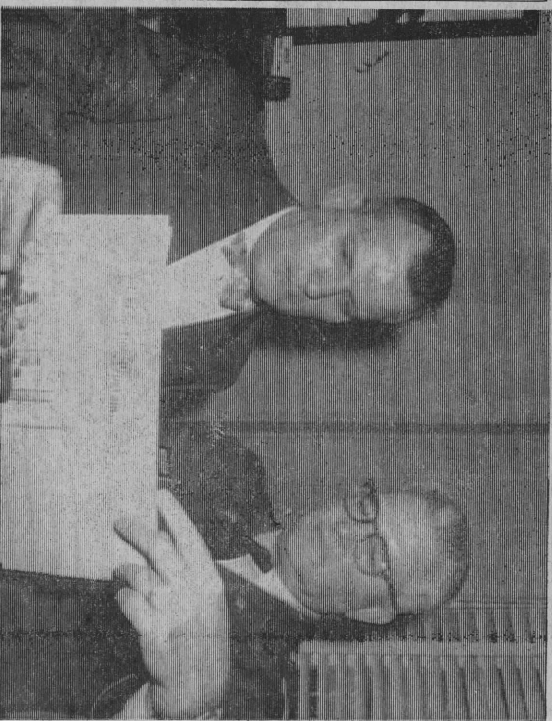

Cost Reduction Assigned to CP

Effective April 1 responsibility for the AWC Cost Reduction Program was transferred from Management Science to the Comptroller and Director of Programs.

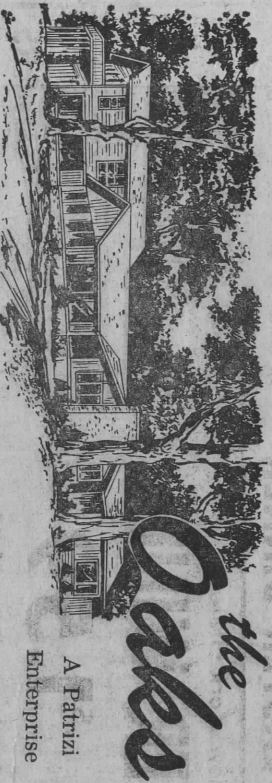

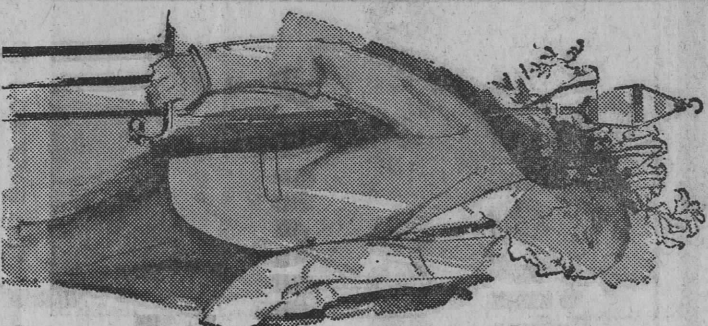

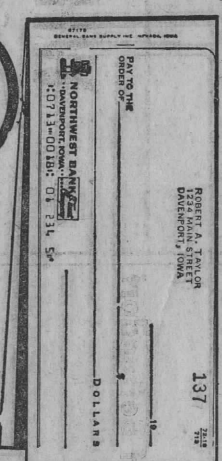

Ultrasonic Power Tested for Army Use

Arsenal Lab

Unit in Study Of Machining

The quiet power of ultrasonic energy is being put to the test by engineers of the Rock Island Arsenal Laboratory.

In a basement lab section in Building 103, an ultrasonic machine tool makes daily successful attacks on super-hard materials that were considered unmachineable not long ago.

Ceramics Use

With great precision but little noise, the machine cuts such stuff as ceramics, glass, germanium, fashioning holes and shapes that used to be achieved only at great hand labor, if at all.

Ultrasonic energy cuts by driving tiny sharp particles into the work piece. How useful is this sophisticated tool to the Army?

Preliminary results indicate the process is very good for machining hard and brittle materials, such as ceramics, according to George F. Wilson, head of the Metal Cutting Technology Unit. But an electrical discharge machine previously tested and now in use in Shop M, is better for metals, mainly because it's faster, Wilson says.

Findings so far point the ultrasonic device toward the communications and missile areas of Army activity.

Conventional, Too

Wilson's unit is testing the ultrasonic machine tool as a phase of its basic production engineering investigation of metal cutting and related processes.

As part of its mission under Acting Director Gerald O. Inman's Laboratory Branch, the unit also is engaged in studies of more conventional machining. Wilson reports tests of machining high strength steels are about completed. A study of forces to machine high temperature alloys will begin soon.

Next winter, according to Wilson, the unit will begin a study of the laser—a device that cuts holes with a beam of light.

The Arsenal's ultrasonic machine is named for the high speed vibrations of its tool, which oscillates up and down at 20,000 or more cycles per second — well

above the frequency audible to the human ear. The tool does not touch the work piece.

Chipping Action

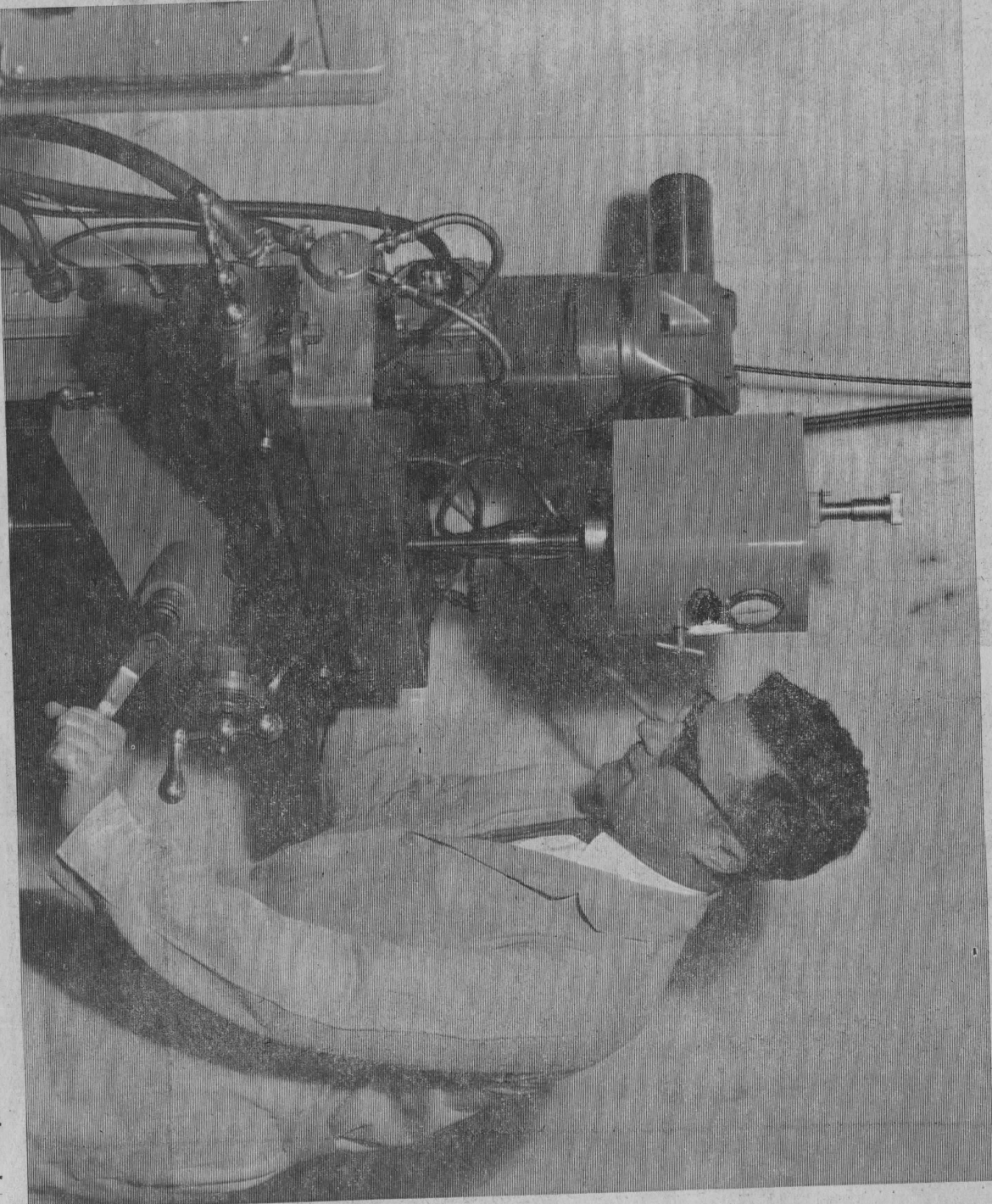
Cutting is done by sharp particles, usually boron carbide, that are fed be-

tween the tool and the work piece in a slurry of water. The up-and-down vibration of the tool propels the particles into the work piece in a chipping action, something like a drill on a rock.

The bombardment produces a cavity the same shape and size, within thousandths, as the vibrating tool.

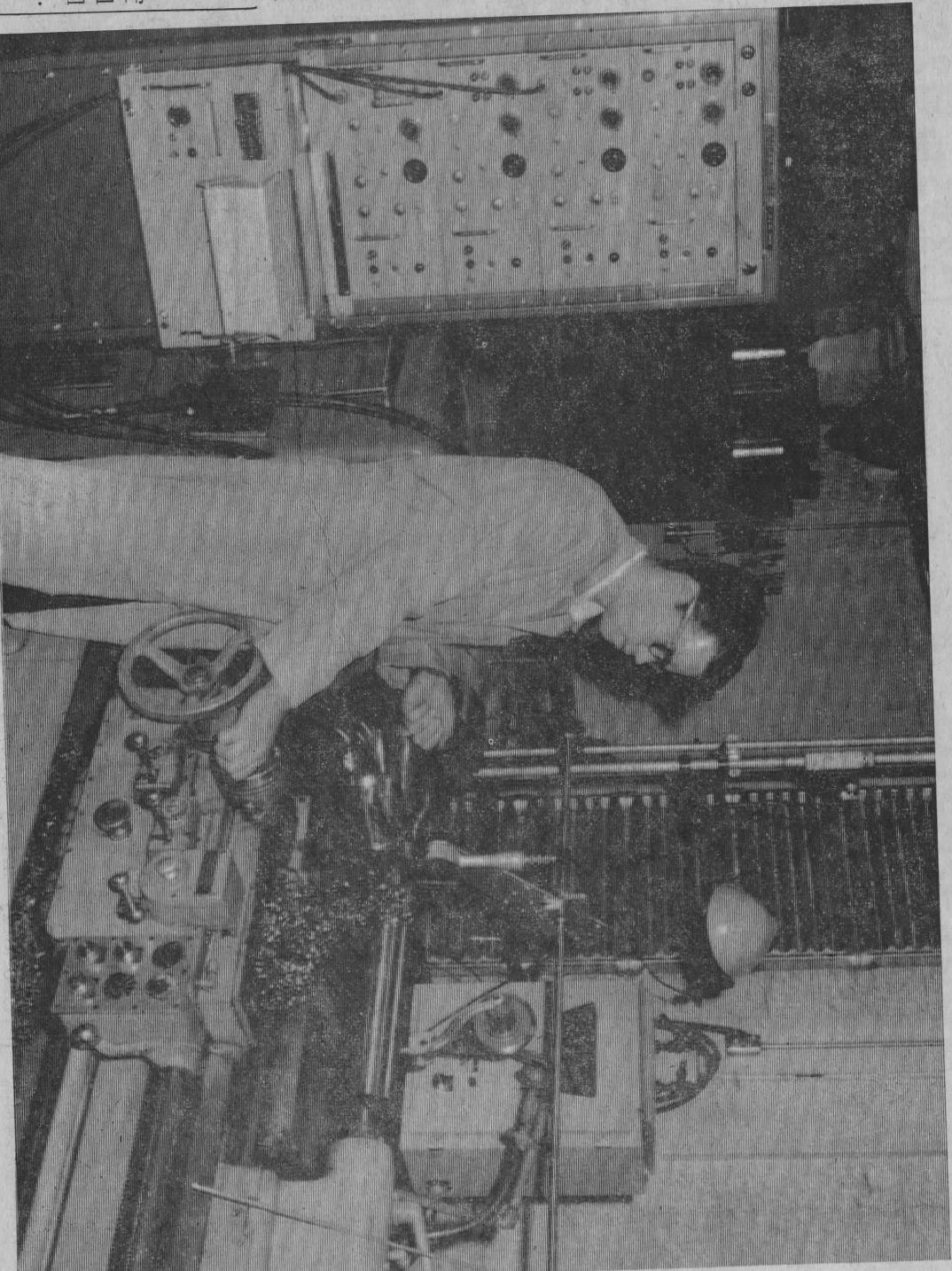
Two electrical discharge machines perform similar cutting work daily in Shop

M, eroding metal from work pieces by a rapid spark discharge. Like the ultrasonic machine, the electrical machines easily make intricate cuts, slits and patterns, without hand skill or labor.

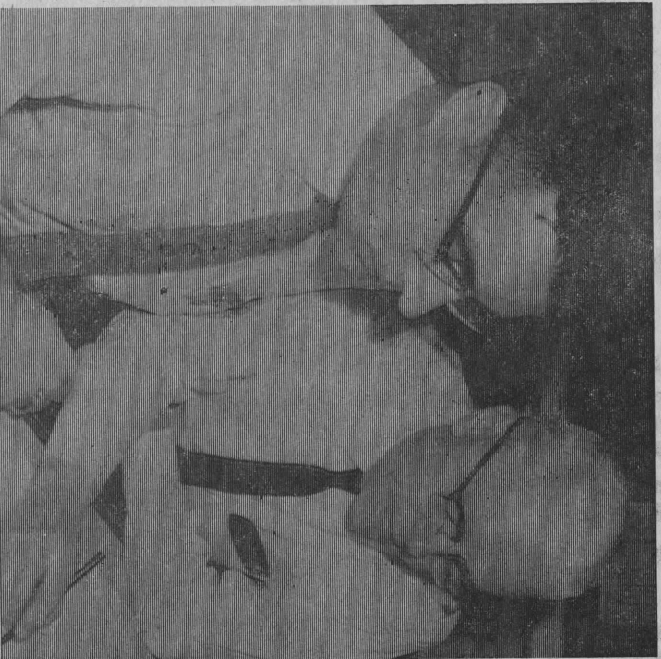

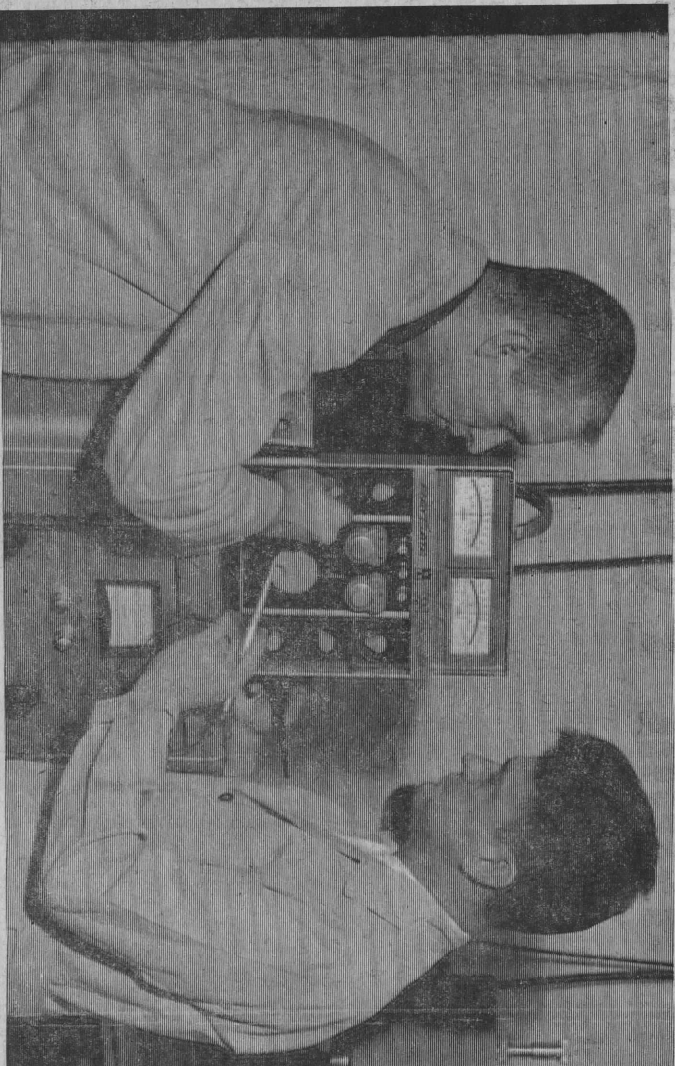

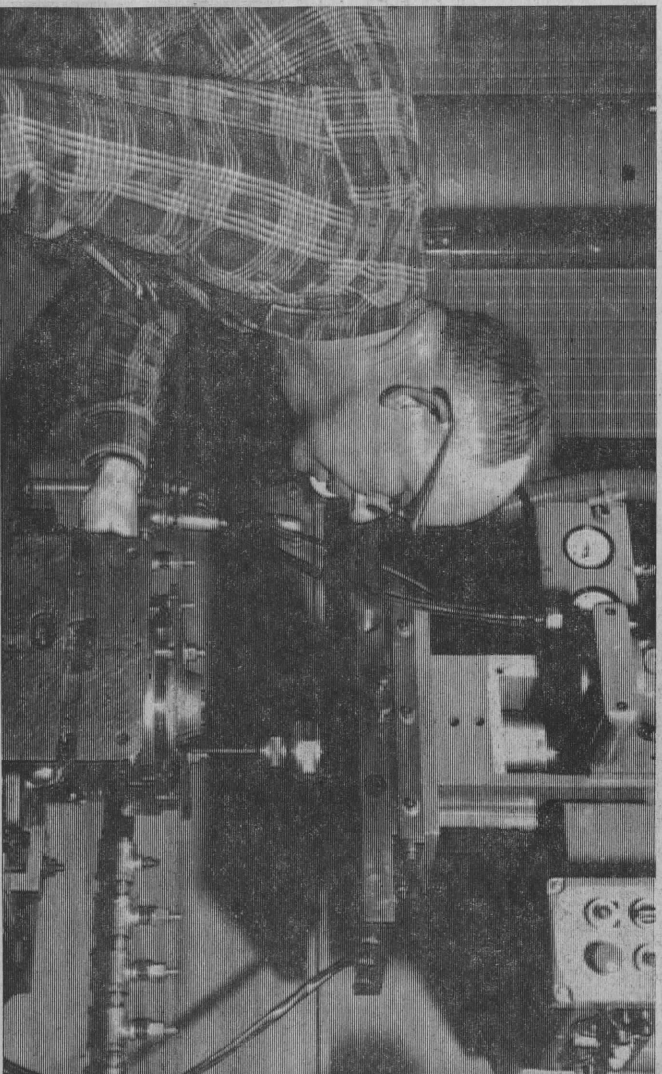
Electrical Discharge at Work in Shop

Story of Labs Is Told in Historical Report

The story of the Rock Island Arsenal laboratories, starting with two temporary wooden buildings 91 years ago, is told in the RIA Annual Historical Report for fiscal 1964.

Dr. A. C. Hanson wrote the history, a 53-page section, before his retirement as laboratory director in December.

His narrative spans the years from the original tensile test machine of the then Maj. T. J. Rodman to the Betatron of today. It carries forward from the poorly-documented beginnings, with no trained personnel, to the present modern layout, with fine equipment and a highly qualified staff in the neighborhood of one hundred.

Dr. Hanson deals with the lab's research contributions—new materials, improvements in old materials, new uses for the old. He writes of work in rub-

ber, paints, oils and greases, corrosion preventives and many other materials.

Aids Economy

He cites 96 "significant accomplishments" by the laboratory. His list begins with a shellac coating process of 1926 to eliminate pitting of silver rings in recoil mechanisms. It ends with the development of a fungus-proof barrier material.

With its research in auto greases and tires, the laboratory has made contributions of value to the civilian economy, as well as the military services, Dr. Hanson points out.

At the same time, he writes, the lab's contributions to efficiency of Rock Island Arsenal, by solution of shop problems, can't even be estimated. Such work is not well documented.

Dr. Hanson traces the laboratory history to 1962, when the reorganization of the Army "marked the end of an era." It was a long

road, he points out, leading to the present lab facilities in Shop I (Bldg. 110) and the A-C annex (Bldg. 103).

In the original Rock Island Arsenal plan of Major Rodman, laboratory space was marked out for an area south of the present Shop I. This was proposed in 1866. However, in 1871, the then chief of ordnance, Gen. A. B. Dyer, picked the site where Bldg. 299 is now located. There, in 1874, two temporary wooden buildings were erected, and in them the limited laboratory work then required was performed.

First Director

In September, 1910, a "Chemical Laboratory" was formally organized in the east wing of Shop D (Bldg. 60) and a chemist was put in charge. It's believed that this chemist was Walter Wahle, later to become the first known director of the RIA laboratory.

By 1920, there were 19 laboratory employees. But in the post-war depres-

sion period, the force dropped to four persons by 1924. By 1933, it was down to two. Then began the steady increase through the World War II period. During the Korean conflict, there were 105 working in the laboratory.

Over the years, different locations were occupied, including Bldg. 250, just north of Bldg. 299, Shop M in Bldg. 220, and the Shops B-D annex, Bldg. 61.

As the Army modernized, significant research missions were given to the laboratories, Dr. Hanson notes. The general field of investigation of oils and cleaning and preserving materials was assigned to the laboratory as early as 1934. Rubber work came, and a metallurgical lab unit was established.

After the feverish work period of World War II and the Korean fighting, the organization of the Ordnance Weapons Command in 1954 added further impetus with an increase in research assignments. Ex-

panisive moves were made to Shops G and I and the G-I annex.

The history contains pictures of five laboratory directors, plus 14 pages of pictures of facilities, including sketches of the Rodman testing machine.

The laboratory history was included in the fiscal 1964 report as part of the program of the RIA Historical Branch to enhance the reports' usefulness as reference books. Other supplements of similar kind will be included in the future, according to Clifford W. Stevens, Historical Branch chief.

Library's Tools' Speed Command Mission

Technical Info Branch Boon To Researcher

"Books," wrote Stephen Vincent Benet, "are not men and yet they are alive, "They are man's memory and his aspiration,

"The link between his present and his past, "The tools he builds with."

Books at Rock Island Arsenal are tools in the full sense, just as are the lathes, presses, mills and drills.

The more than 10,000 cataloged volumes of the Technical Information Branch, and even more technical reports, guide and speed the engineer, the research scientist, the management man.

Look to Future

The theme of National Library Week (April 25 to May 1) is "Open Your Future—Read."

In the way it hastens progress on missions of the Arsenal and Army Weapons Command, the Technical Information Branch helps assure there will be a future for this country.

Shelves of the TIB book section in Building 109 are loaded with reference volumes, encyclopedias and technical works. Engineering, chemistry, business and management subjects predominate in this fertile territory for digging by the scientist, the speech or technical writer. There are language studies — Russian, German, Italian, French, even Czech.

If there is a call for a work not on hand, the branch tries to obtain it. "Our mission is to pro-

vide service," says Mabel Culbertson of the 7-member staff of TIB, a branch of the Arsenal Research and Engineering Division.

Document Section

In striving for completeness, Mrs. Culbertson points out, the branch handles subscriptions to more than 350 technical magazines. Some are filed back to 1950.

In its document section, the branch receives more than 650 technical reports each month, covering research in industry and government laboratories all over the country.

Fifteen thousand are on file, by subject, source and title, an invaluable aid to Arsenal researchers.

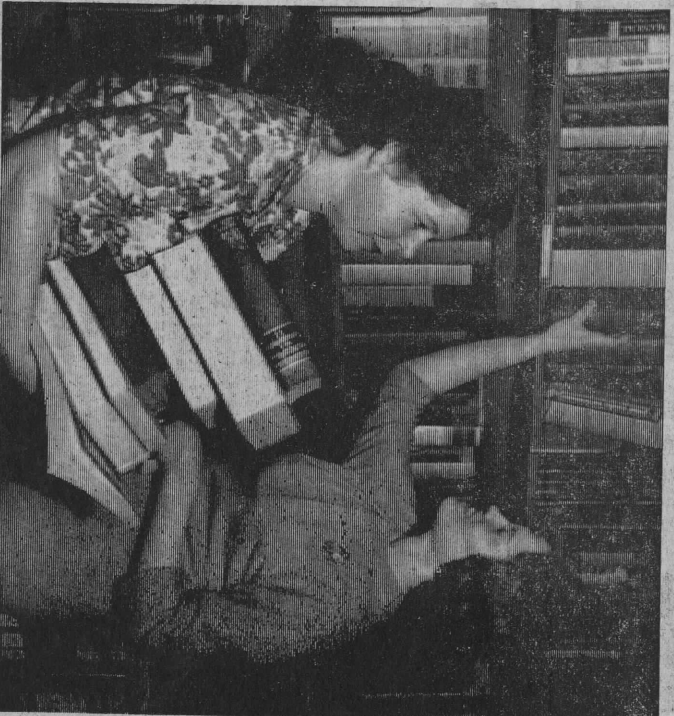
The branch is responsible for ordering all books for Arsenal installations, but does not have them all on file at Building 109. Another technical library, with emphasis on chemistry, is located in Building 108.

And the Army Management Engineering Training Agency has a 2,500-volume school library in the basement of its Building 90.

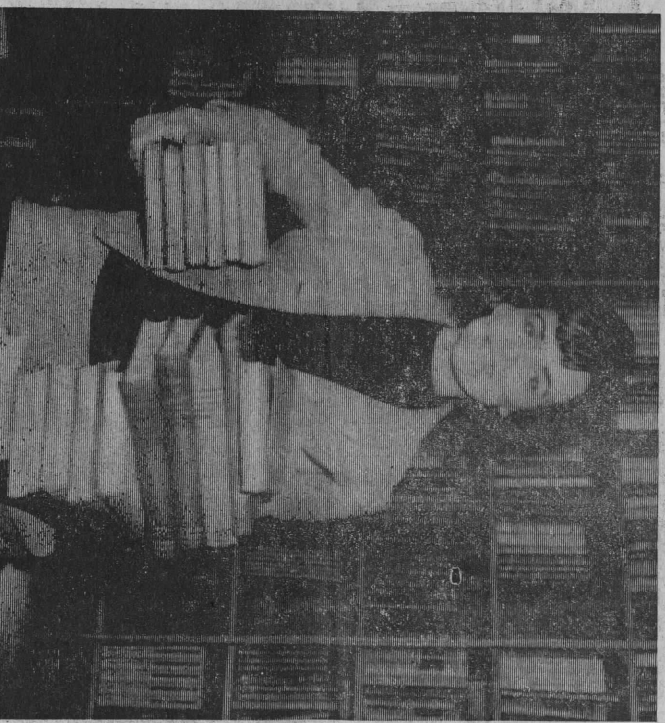
Official publications are maintained in still another library-type section — the
