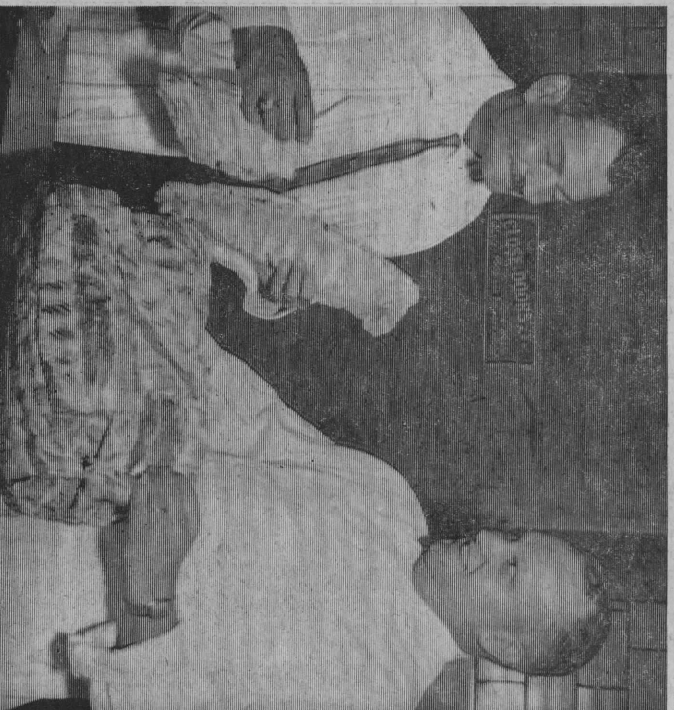
The \$1,200 they received in special service awards is part of a total of \$2,040 in special service and performance awards announced for 12 employees

a warning: Fishermen who abuse privileges at the Arsenal fishing grounds will lose their permits.

Hurless said he had received complaints that some fishermen have a practice of casting toward the hydro plant from downstream positions. As a result, he said, lines nearer the plant are crossed and sometimes snagged.

The security chief said he also had received new complaints that fishermen's children run uncontrolled, disturbing other anglers.

"This is a small fishing area. Simple courtesy by all fishermen will solve many of the problems," Hurless said.

"We are prepared to revoke licenses of fishermen who can't respect the rights of others."

## Receives Medal

Maj. Lynch, a native of Butte, Mont., was graduated from the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, in 1951. He served as a tank company commander in Korea, and was wounded during that conflict.

From 1954 to 1956, he served in Germany where he was commander of a reconnaissance company. In 1960, he received the master's degree in mechanical engineering at the University of Southern California, then served three years as a nuclear weapons engineer at the university's Lawrence Radiation Laboratory. After that, he spent 13 months in Iran as a military advisor.

Maj. Lynch, his wife and their daughter, 2 years old, are residing temporarily in Arsenal quarters No. 2.

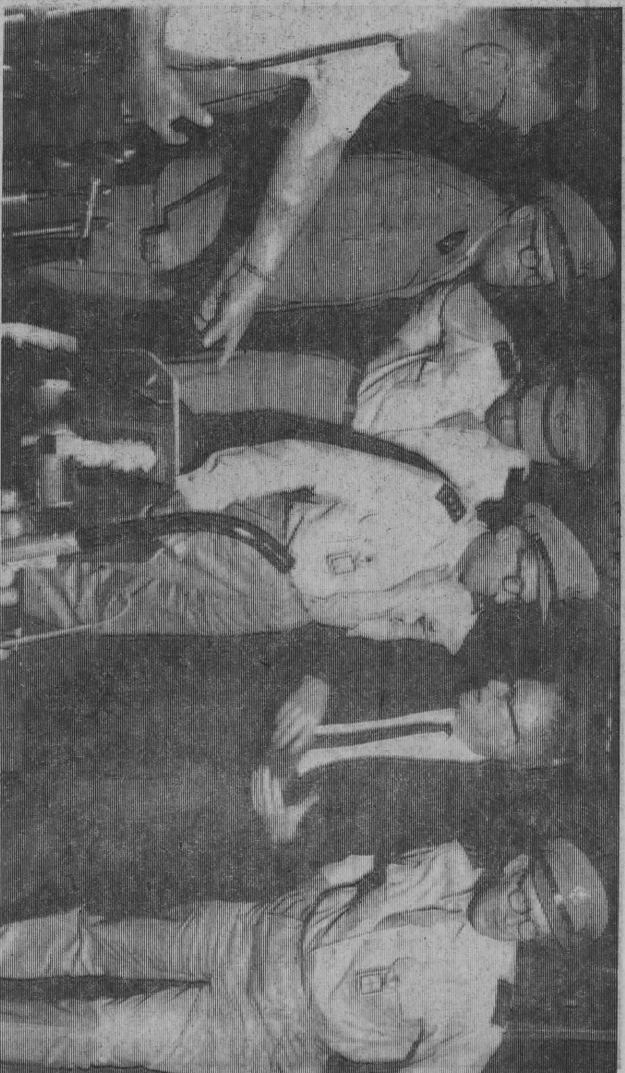

## Let Contract For Work on Kennedy Grave

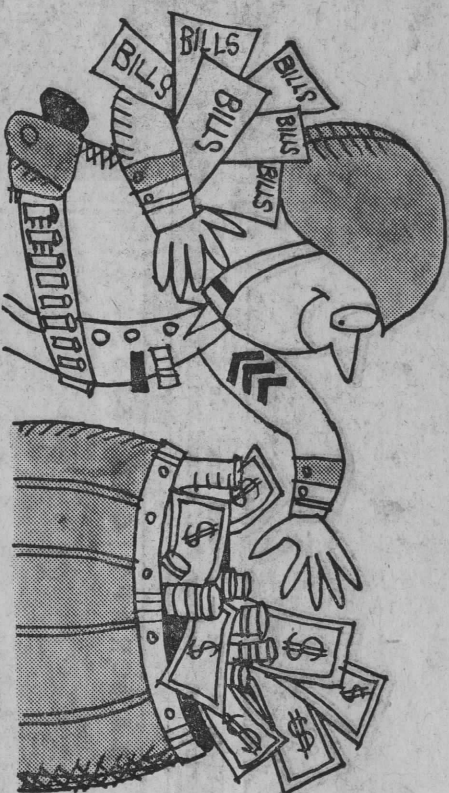
Washington (AFPS) — A contract for construction of a permanent grave for President John F. Kennedy at Arlington National Cemetery has been awarded by the office of the chief of Army Engineers. Construction is expected to begin this summer.

Army officials said provisions will be made to accommodate the thousands of persons who visit the present grave site daily. Work is expected to take 14 months. The grave will be located on a hillside overlooking the Potomac River at a site adjacent to the present temporary grave just east of the Custis-Lee Mansion. There have been no major changes to the design since its announcement last November, an official said. Construction is designed to blend into contours of existing terrain and includes a walkway from the graveside to the Custis-Lee Mansion and a circular walkway 210 feet in diameter. Walks and terraces will be of white marble from Proctor, Vt., and granite from Deer Island, Maine. The \$1,408,350 contract was awarded to the Abertaw Construction Company, Boston, Mass., lowest bidder.

Officials said other contracts will be signed to cover the marble base and bronze font for the eternal flame, the Presidential seal on the terminal wall behind the grave, inscription on an overlook wall and the three slate grave markers, one for the late President and one for each of the deceased Kennedy children.

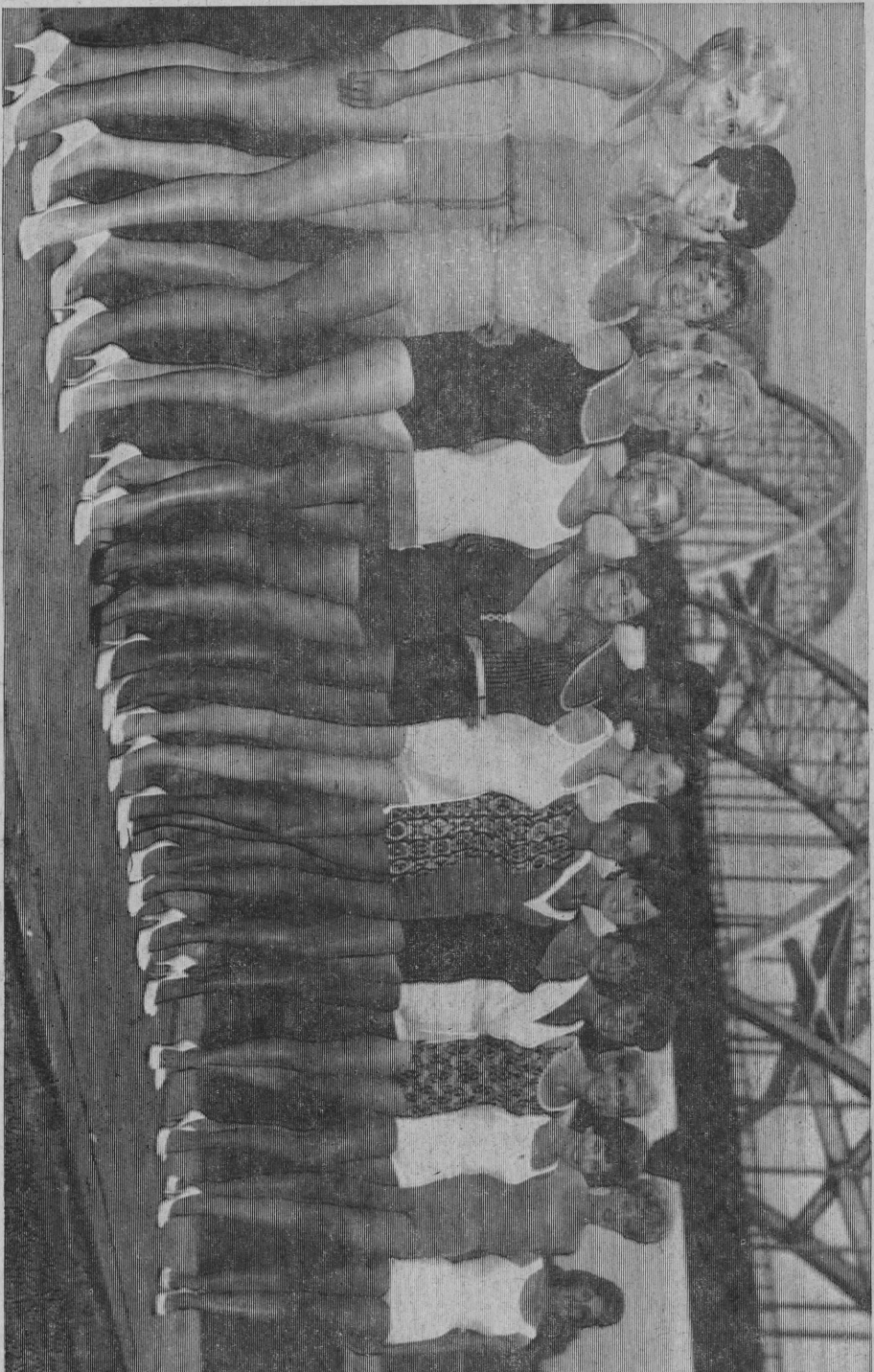

## Marine Corps Adopts Supply Streamlining

**Washington (AFPS)**—The Marine Corps has adopted a concept of centralized material management for its supply department task force, identified as the Marine Corps Unified Material Management System (MUMMS).

The new system will utilize modern management techniques and automatic data processing. A single inventory control point will be established at the Marine Corps Supply Activity, Philadelphia.

Present supply centers will be redesignated as remote storage activities, retaining their repair activities and responsibilities. An alternate inventory control point will be established at the Marine Corps Supply Center, Albany, Ga.

The new system is expected to be fully operational by July 1966.

## Second Overseas Tour May Omit Stateside Break

**Washington (AFPS)**—Soldiers completing an overseas tour may be assigned directly to another overseas tour under a new Army policy.

Previously, personnel normally were returned to the continental United States before being sent overseas again.

The new policy allows assignment from a short tour area to a long tour area, and conversely, from a long tour area to a short tour area.

One example would be the assignment of a person from Alaska or the Republic of Korea — both short tours — to Panama or the Federal Republic of Germany, which are long tours.

Individuals who returned from the Republic of Vietnam since Jan. 1, 1961, were previously exempt from further assignment there. There is now only a 24-month guarantee before they are eligible for return.

Personnel assigned to a unit scheduled for overseas deployment will accompany the unit even if they have no more than 60 days remaining on their service obligation from the date of departure from the port of embarkation, an official said.

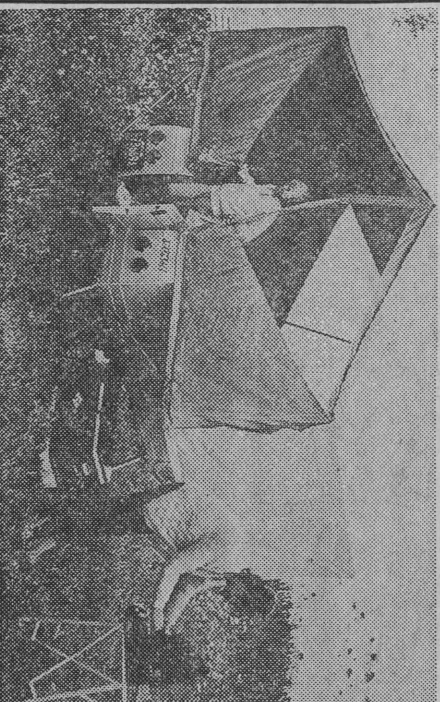
The deployment phase represents a critical period, and experienced personnel are needed, even though they may rotate back to CONUS within a month or two after arrival overseas.

A person may also be levied for assignment to Vietnam before completing a stabilized tour, provided a replacement is readily available to the losing command.

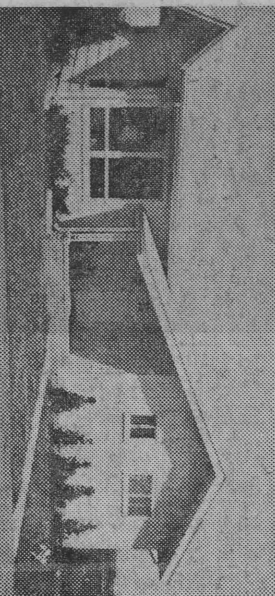

# Disposal Unit Has Big Job Handling Surplus

## System Aims to Squeeze All Good Out of Materiel

There's a fine pair of leather boots, quite new, for sale at Arsenal Building 154 for only \$3. They may take less.

Last month, a Navion airplane went for a bargain basement \$657.

However — one thing about those boots: They are both for the right foot. And about that airplane—it was a government surplus job used by the Arsenal Flying Club until a wind storm wrecked it at Quad-City Airport.

For Building 154 is the home of the Property Disposal Branch of the Arsenal Administrative Office. It is there that Irving Haefs, property disposal officer, and a staff of 21 deal in castoffs—call the stuff obsolete, excess, or just plain surplus.

### Use and Sell

From tiny washers to trucks, from text books to machine gun barrels, worn, obsolete or property flows through Haefs' department at a rate of about \$3 million per month in acquisition value.

Outdoor space totaling 225,000 square feet, and 125,000 square feet indoors are needed to accommodate the storage and movement of material.

Not all of it is sold, nor is selling the primary mission of the property disposal system.

"Our first duty is to try to utilize these items in the government establishment, or somewhere else for the benefit of taxpayers. If that isn't possible, then we try to get back as much of the original cost as we can," says Haefs.

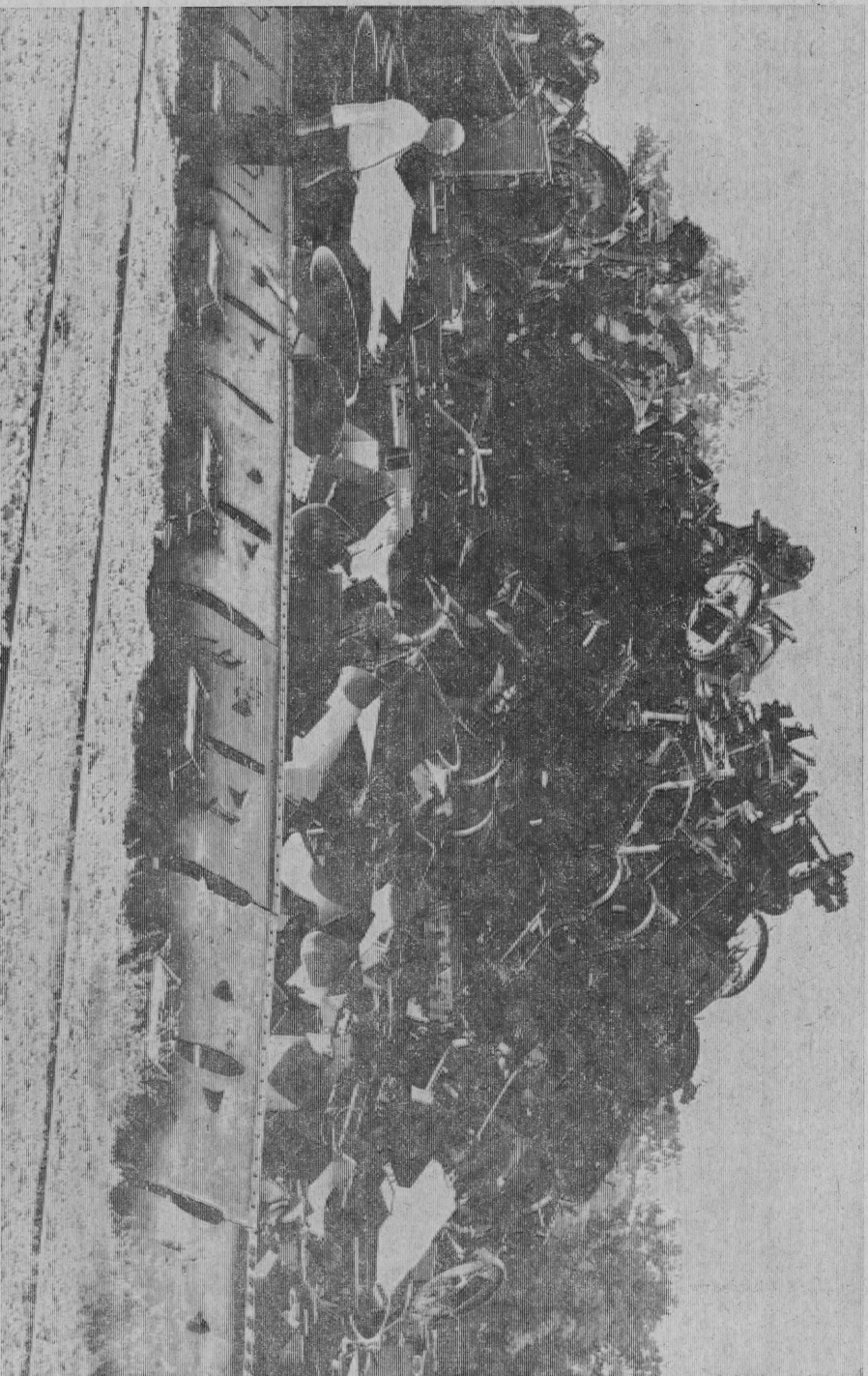
In the selling business, Haefs' department has a partner—the Defense Surplus Sales Office (DSSO) in Building 60. That office prepares catalogs of surplus items and receives bids.

Smaller items and groups of items with a retail application are offered at a "store" that's open to the public at Building 154.

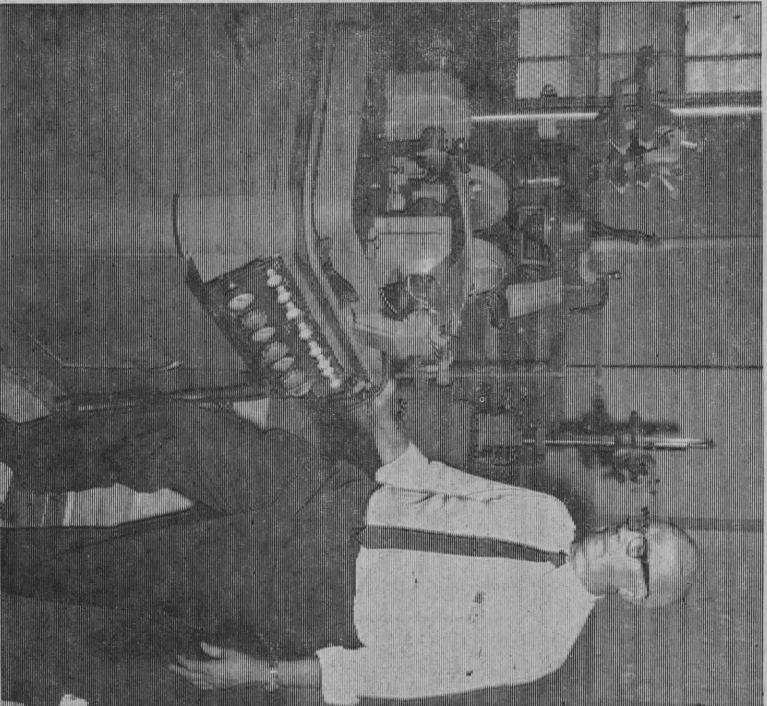
### Screening

But before the selling stage is reached, properties are screened for possible use. Haefs' disposal branch receives obsolete items and material from all Arsenal departments, and from government agencies in a wide surrounding area.

After inspection and processing by Haefs' staff, the screening begins. Defense Logistics Service Center at Battle Creek, Mich., tries to find use for the items and materials in the Department of Defense. Next comes the General Services Administration, on the lookout for equipment for 12,000 federal agencies. More screening checks for items for schools, reserve

units, Scouts, Civil Air Patrol and such groups.

Material that remains is offered for sale. Haefs figures that out of 100,000 items, some 5,000 have commercial application. The remainder have value as basic scrap. Restrictions ordered from Washington have removed weapons from Haefs' merchandise listings.

The retail store used to offer .22 caliber bolt action rifles for \$15 and the Springfield .30-06 for \$25. Haefs recalls that the full quota of 5,000 of these surplus rifles was sold each quarter. A halt was called in April.

In addition, restrictions have been placed on sales of parts and demilitarized weapons. The disposal branch scrap yard contains tons of machine gun barrels, receivers and mounts which are being held pending fur-

ther instructions on disposing of the metal.

The retail offerings of the disposal branch are widely varied, however.

Anyone who needs a 100,000 BTU ground heater for aircraft engines will find it at Building 154, marked \$35. There's a grave digging device for \$10. Twenty-five dollars will purchase a freezing unit with capacity for cakes of ice 25 pounds or bigger.

There are parachute packs (no chute) for \$3, drills, end mills and cutters for \$1 per pound. World War II neckties at a dime each, desks at \$9.50 and a couple of ottomans at \$2 apiece.

Irving Haefs has worked in the branch for 25 years and has headed it for 18, and he remembers some busy, exciting times. The branch's biggest

years were 1958 and 1959. Surplus tanks and high speed tractors with acquisition cost of \$350 million were sold through the branch in the 24 months.

## Guide Helps Evaluate Supervisor Job Grades

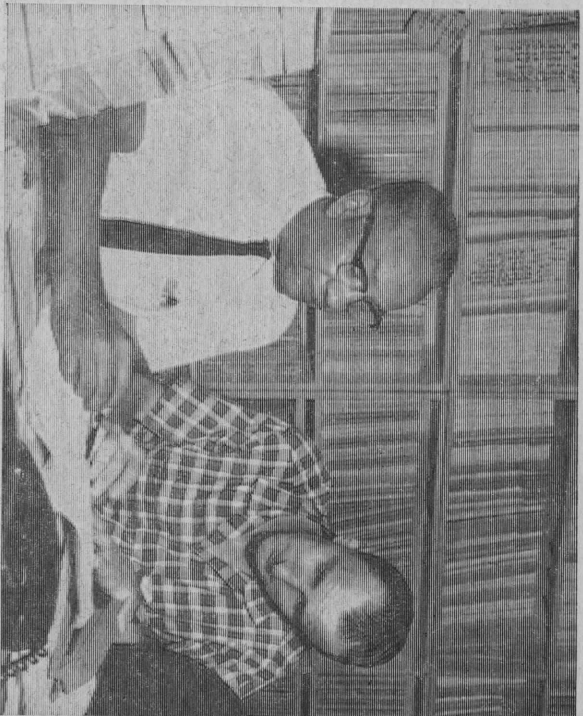
The Civil Service Commission has issued an evaluation guide for supervisory positions which will aid federal agencies in determining grades for up to 50,000 jobs.

Covering more than 200 occupations, the new guide will be used for grade evaluation of jobs involving supervision of professional and administrative work.

The commission says the guide gives agencies a basis for consistency and fairness in grade evaluation. A single set of guidelines is provided for evaluations that recognize factors affecting the difficulty and responsibility of supervisory jobs.

For direct grade evaluation purposes, the guide will not apply above the second-line supervisor.





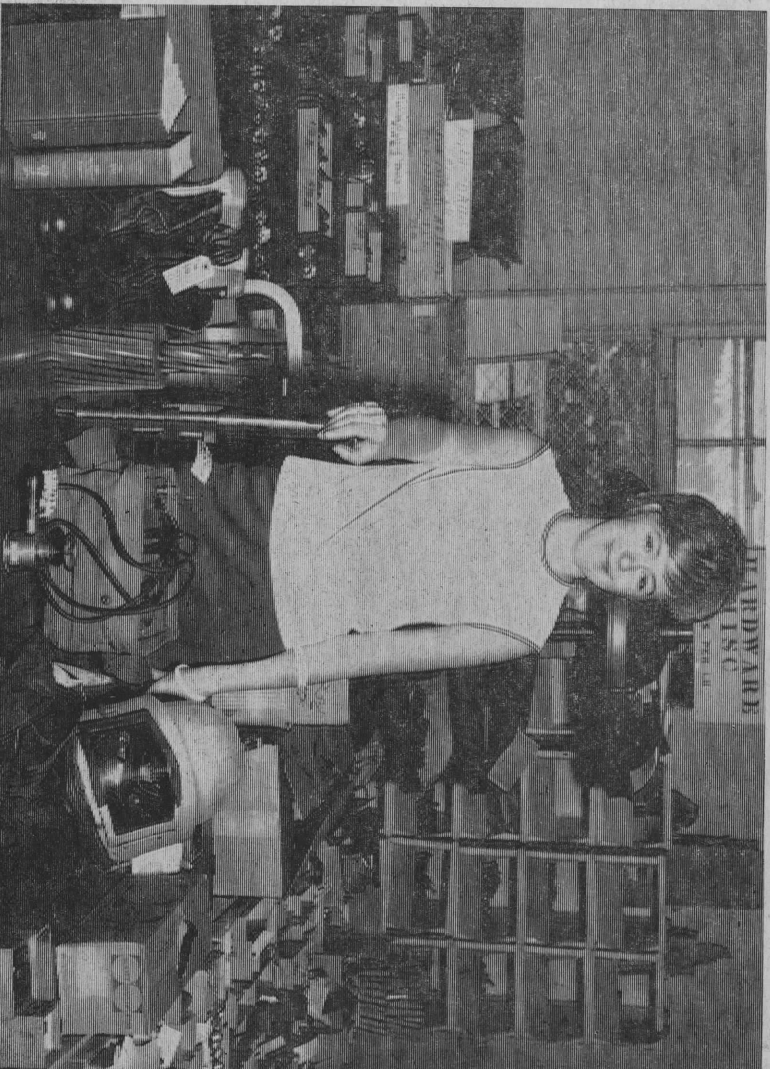

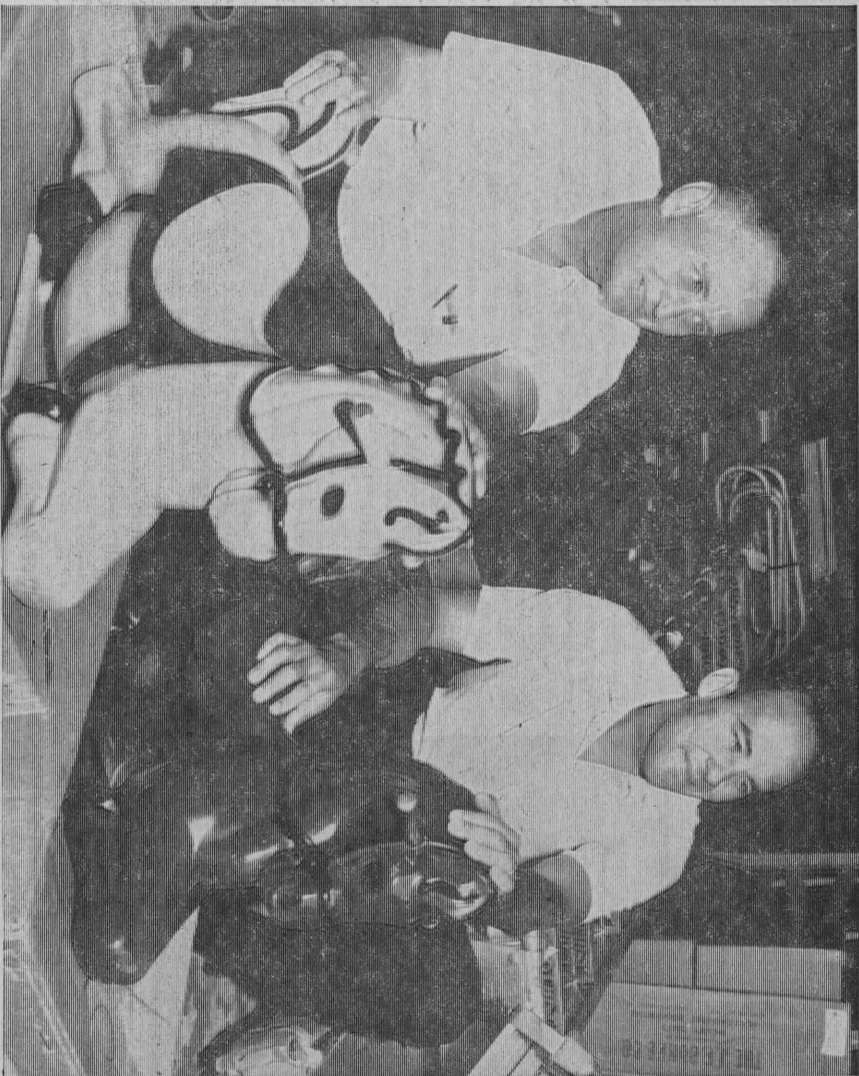

DOD Considers Doubling Army Chopper Units

Washington (AFPS)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara announced that consideration is being given to doubling the number of helicopter companies in the Army.

"We have already substantially increased helicopter production," Secretary McNamara said, announcing that UH-1 Iroquois production is being increased 60 per cent and CH-47A Chinook production is being increased 100 per cent.

Each service uses the twin-bladed Iroquois, which has been modified into several versions, including the Army's UH-1B and UH-1D, used for medical evacuation and other transport purposes.

The Chinook is a larger aircraft with about three times the troop carrying capability of the UH-1D.

"These production increases, of course, will not take place overnight," the secretary said. "We will achieve the full 60 per cent increase in the Iroquois production by the spring of next year, and the Chinook at roughly the same time."

A \$50,000,000 Army contract was recently awarded for continued Iroquois production to the Bell Helicopter Company Division, Bell Aerospace Corporation, Hurst, Tex.

New non-divisional companies will be formed within the Army giving greater air transportation mobility Army-wide, an official said, pointing out that this in no way affects the present structure of divisional aviation battalions.

President Johnson has signed an Executive order authorizing a Vietnam Service Medal for members of the United States armed forces who serve in that Southeast Asian country after July 3 of this year.

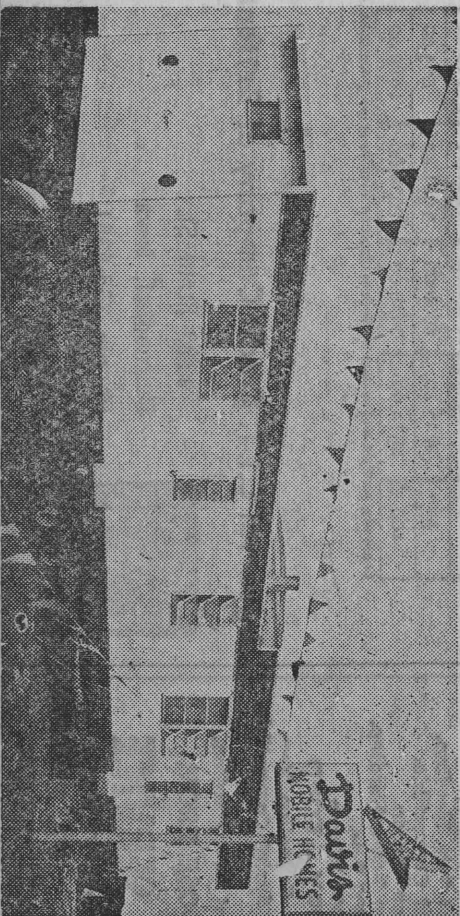

# Quick-Hitting Airmobile Troops to Vietnam

The Army's brand new quick-hitting answer to guerrilla operations, the "Airmobile" Division, is going to Vietnam.

President Johnson announced Wednesday that the division with its mass of helicopters was being dispatched to the scene of the Republic of Vietnam struggle against the Communist Viet Cong.

Twenty-eight months of tests of air assault techniques led to organization of the new division at Ft. Benning, Ga.

Called the 1st Cavalry

Division (Airmobile), the new organization was formed from the 2nd Infantry Division and the 11th Air Assault Division, both at Ft. Benning.

## 434 Aircraft

The division will be part of the currently authorized 16-division force structure of the Army.

It has a strength of 15,849 men and will be equipped with 434 aircraft, almost all of them helicopters. For comparison, the present Army ROAD Infantry division has about 15,900 personnel, 101 aircraft

and 3,200 ground vehicles.

The Airmobile Division will permit a commander to apply defensive firepower and manpower in the most critical area of a battlefield at the most critical time of battle.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said:

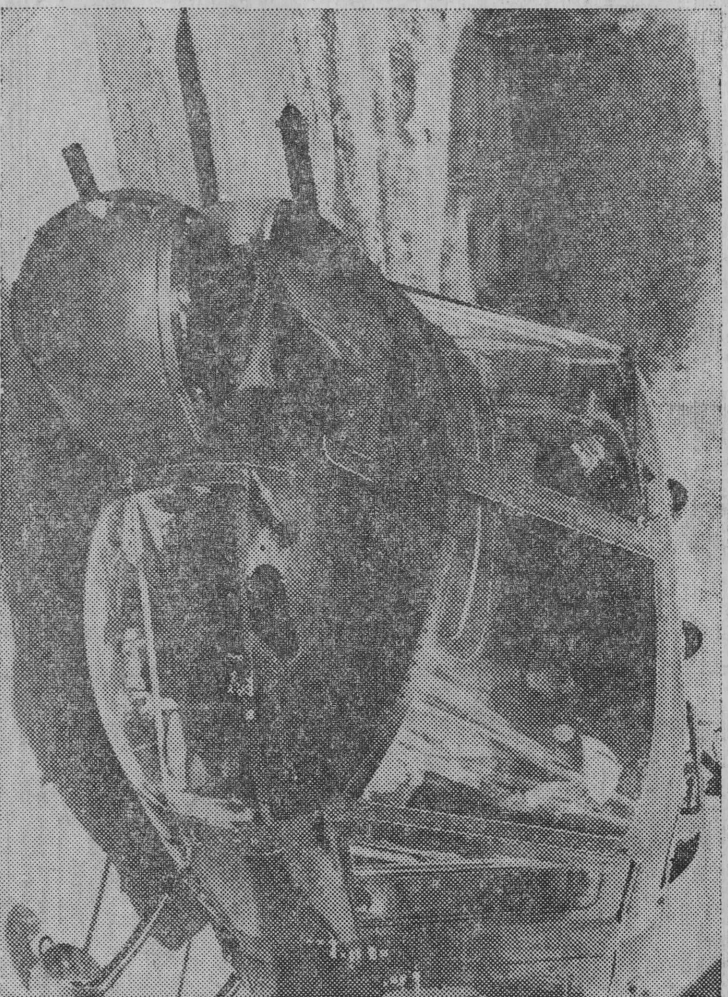
"The introduction of this new kind of division into the Army will greatly increase our growing capability to meet all kinds of threats. It places the Army on the threshold of an entirely new approach to the conduct of the land battle.

"Use of the helicopter to deliver men and weapons on the battlefield will result in greater freedom of movement and exploitation of the principle of surprise to an unprecedented degree."

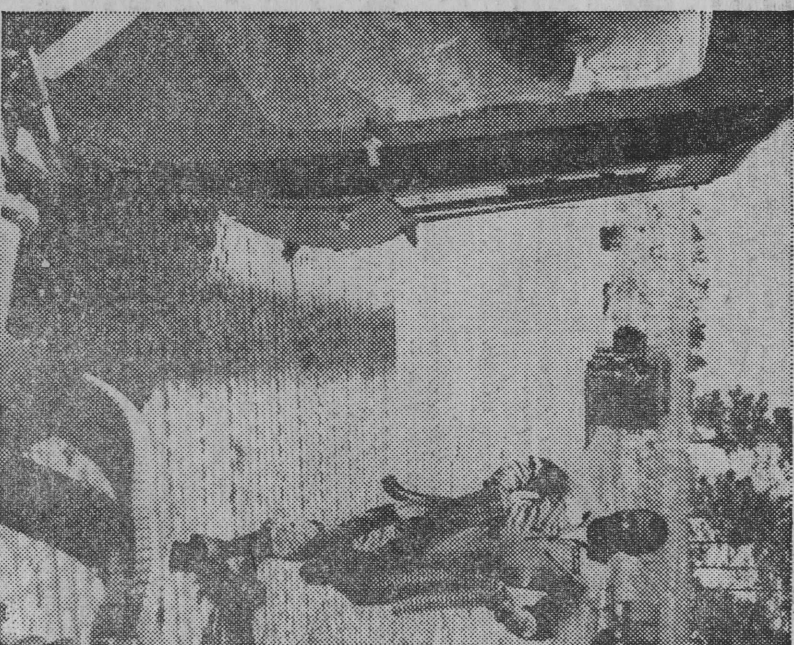
The Airmobile Division will have much greater mobility in bad terrains and will be able to operate over an area several times that of an infantry division. Its effectiveness will be especially great in operations against guerrillas, in underdeveloped areas or rear area security for a field army.

In raids and similar missions, airmobile forces may be equivalent to airborne units except that they can ride home rather than wait for a ground link-up.

Airmobile forces will not be as well suited for static defense as the infantry division because they will lack organic armor and medium and heavy artillery.
