Arsenal Air Filled with Goodbyes

More Than 100 To Depart by End of Year

In the years ahead, men will look back on the present as the time of the great exodus from Rock Island Arsenal, the time of farewell.

It's a time when nobody but the newest newcomer on the Island can fail to have a last workaday "good-bye" coming up very soon for someone known well and long.

The wave of retirements now in progress or impending for key personnel of this installation has not been equalled within the memory of the veteran Arsenal Islanders. There is not yet a final count.

Annuity Did It

But it is expected that more than 100 will end their service here before the year's end.

The reason, of course, is the annuity bonus now available. Under the Daniels bill, and prior legislation, federal employees retiring by Dec. 30 will receive 8.1 per cent more than if they wait until January, or February, or later.

Long-service employees who had been considering retirement anyhow make up the bulk of the departing scores.

More impressive than the number who felt they "couldn't afford" to continue working another year or two is the caliber of the group. Senior in years, those who are leaving also are senior in know-how, general experience and position.

Arsenal Operations Divisions, for instance, will have gaping holes to fill. The large number of AOD employees retiring is headed by Orville L. Coulson, the No. 1 chief, and Carl J. Dall, superintendent of the factory branch, bosses of over two thousand workers and

Survey Report 10 Days Away

What is going to happen to wages of blue collar, hourly-paid workers at the Arsenal?

The answer will be known in about 10 days.

Some 2,900 Arsenal employees will be affected by any pay changes resulting from a wage survey of the Rock Island area by the Army-Air Force Wage Board.

The effect of the survey will be made known not later than Dec. 15, according to William G. Lawrence, chief of the position and pay management branch of the Arsenal Personnel office.

Lawrence said no information was yet available. The wage survey is proceeding under a normal timetable, which would produce conclusions for announcement by mid-month, he said.

It is expected the wage survey results will be available in time for the Dec. 17 edition of the Target.

The wage board is making a full scale review of this area on the basis of wage survey data obtained by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Labor. The survey was announced in October.

Carolers 'Sing' In Restaurant

Two animated carolers were added to the Arsenal cafeteria's Christmas decorations this week, along with a wide assortment of new garlands and associated items.

Mounted over the south door, the caroler figures are electrically powered. They were purchased in Moline by the Civilian Non-Appropriated Funds Council, which also provided the garlands and much of the manpower for the decorating job.

Command Tops in Safety

Army Weapons Command was tops in safety during the fiscal year 1965.

Word has been received that AWC has won the Army Materiel Command award of honor for the best safety program within AMC's seven subordinate commands.

Gen. Frank S. Besson Jr., AMC commanding general, has sent his congratulations. In a letter to Maj. Gen. Roland B. Anderson, AWC commanding general, Gen. Besson praised the Weapons Command for its "outstanding accomplishments."

The Weapons Command has scored at the top in two of the three years since it was formed in the Army reorganization. AWC won the award of honor for fiscal

year 1963, and placed second in 1964.

The award of honor is based on judging of all seven subordinate AMC commands on several points. Forty per cent of a command's score comes from its record of accident costs, injuries and related facts.

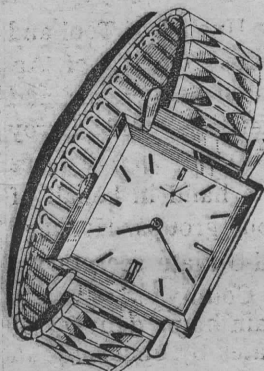

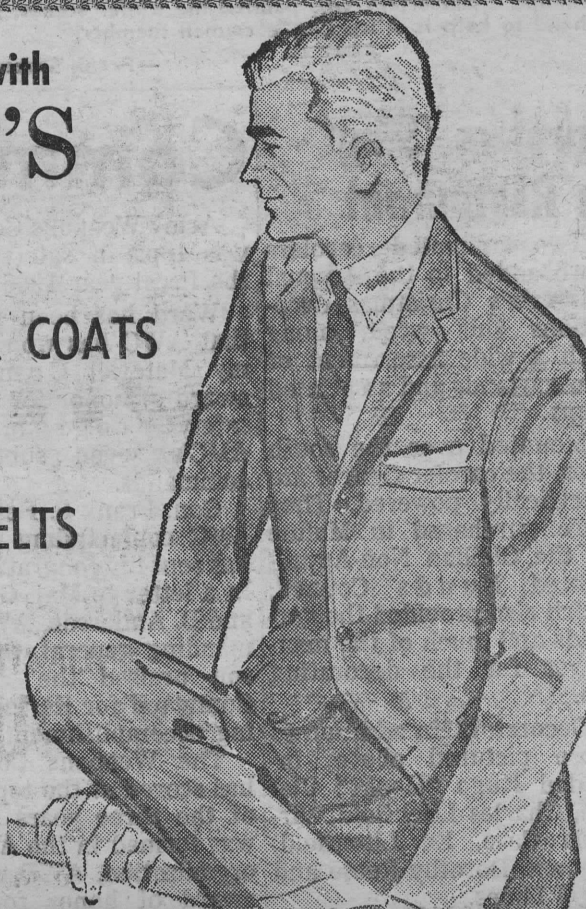

Sick Leave Is Above Average

Management officials at the Arsenal, including first-line supervisors, are being urged to work on the problem of improper use of sick leave.

Harold Sedrel, chief of the Personnel and Training Office, said the Arsenal's sick leave rate for the last year is above the Department of Army average.

"We have many large departments which are well below the Army average," Sedrel said. "Obviously then, some of our other large departments are well above."

"Improper use of sick leave by an employee means he is squandering his 'insurance pay' which he could use in case of serious illness or accident."

"Also, it is an unwarranted expense on the taxpayer."

The personnel chief said the sick leave problem is discussed in Personnel Management Comment 15-65, which has been sent to all supervisors. The supervisors will provide their copies for reading by employees upon request.

Arsenal Men Aid Speed-O-Plate

Three employees at the Arsenal are active in Speed-O-Plate, a nonprofit group that raises money for service organizations by delivering auto license plates in Scott County.

Clyde Huston of Tool and Equipment Division of Army Weapons Command and Bob Heritage and Leroy Puls of Depot Activity are lending a hand in behalf of Boy Scout groups. Heritage is Speed-O-Plate secretary.

Scott County car owners can obtain home delivery of 1966 plates by enclosing an additional quarter with their license remittance to the county treasurer. Twenty cents of each quarter goes to the service groups who will make the plate deliveries.

Speed-O-Plate members point out that reminder postcards will not be sent to Iowa car owners this year. The 1965 registration cards show the license plate costs.

Fire Trucks Roll 23 Times Due to Smokers

The call, "Fire!" came from Bldg. 60. Arsenal fire fighters rolled out their equipment and were on the scene, only a block from the fire station, within a minute or two.

They found an all-too-familiar source of smoke and potential danger: A smoldering trash container.

The cause, says Fire Chief Farrell R. Jordan, was a cigarette, cigar, match or pipe ash, mixed somehow with the fine fuel in an office wastepaper basket.

Smoke-Scare Cost

"Careless smoking habits caused 23 fires at this installation during the fiscal year '65," Jordan said later.

Even though the monetary loss was small due to the fires being discovered in early stages, the smoke-scare cost to this installation was far larger.

He pointed to employee loss of time, plus the dangers and expense involved whenever fire fighting apparatus must be rolled out in a hurry.

The chief pointed a stern finger at urn style ash trays that are often filled to overflowing with cigarette packages, gum

wrappers and other trash. "Don't make waste baskets out of ash trays. And don't empty ash trays into waste baskets.

"Another thing. Smoke

only in authorized areas."

The emergency, that occurred the other day in Bldg. 60 got its start on the second floor, fire fighter investigators learned.

Up the Shaft

Employees had discovered smoke coming from a large trash container, and tried to put out the smoldering fire deep down in the trash. Unsuccessful they had wheeled the container onto the elevator to take it to the basement.

The smoke traveled the shaft to all three floors.

Chief Jordan's men had to take the container outside and saturate it with water.

"One more thing," Chief Jordan said. "Use a metal container for ash tray trash, one with a lid. An empty coffee can works just fine."

Story of Retirees Tells Story of Arsenal

the key men in manufacturing operations at this installation.

Thomas Rice

Coulson has 37 years in. Dall started at the Arsenal nearly 50 years ago, and has about 30 years of government service.

There are many more like them all over the Island.

Thomas Rice, chief of the analytical chemistry unit of the Arsenal Laboratory, is departing after 38 years.

Twenty-six years service is behind M. G. Liljegren, chief of the Small Business and Labor Surplus office of the Weapons Command.

One of the standouts among the departing women is Gladys Woodyatt, security administrator for the AWC Research and Development Directorate. Her service spans 30 years.

Party Circle

In the Christmas holiday season with many parties scheduled normally, the wave of retirements has added heavily to the party circle. The number of special affairs, large and small, scheduled and soon to be scheduled cannot be estimated.

Coulson and Dall will be honored guests the night of Dec. 15 at the post restaurant.

Thomas Rice is to be feted the night of Jan. 8 at the Rocket Room.

Maurie Liljegren will hold farewell court, with coffee and cake, in his Administration Bldg. office Dec. 17.

Mrs. Woodyatt and others retiring in R & D will be honored the night of Dec. 14 at the Rocket Room.

The story of the service of these five people is very nearly the post-World War I history of Rock Island Arsenal.

Orville Coulson started as a machinist in Shop M on April 23, 1928. He entered the production planning department in 1930 and was foreman of planning during World War II.

Long Tom

Famous pieces of Army equipment occupied his time and skills over the years — pre-World War II light tank pilot models, scout cars, the M3 medium tank, which later evolved into the M4 Sheridan. He worked on the pilot model of the 155mm Long Tom of World War II.

Coulson rose to chief of the production branch in 1949, and in 1955 during a reorganization, he became chief of production engineering. In September, 1955, he was made chief of Operations Divisions.

Carl Dall had hoped to hang on until May 6, 1966. On that date, he would have marked the 50th anniversary of starting as an apprentice at the Arsenal. He was 16 when he started training, and in 1921, at the age of 21, he became a journeyman toolmaker.

The wanderlust had a firm grip on Dall, and he left the Quad-Cities to ply his skills in many parts of the country, spending substantial time with early mo-

vie makers in California and the east.

When he returned to this area, he worked for a time as superintendent of manufacturing for Victor Anamograph in Davenport. He came back to the Arsenal in 1941 as a toolmaker, but was marked to move up quickly. He became superintendent of the small arms shop, then general foreman of the tool room.

He became production superintendent in January 1950.

Thomas Rice came to the Arsenal Laboratory in October, 1927, with two degrees, and was hired as a chemist. He left for a couple of months in 1930, working for the U.S. Bureau of Mines in Pittsburgh.

This didn't suit, and he was back at the Arsenal after a few weeks. When the analytical lab was set up in 1940, he took charge of it, and has headed it ever since.

Rice has been an officer of and active in affairs of the American Chemical Society and authored a paper on polarography which was published in the society journal.

Liljegren was a journeyman machinist when

he hired on at the Arsenal in April, 1935, as a general planner. His knowledge of the trade was a valuable tool as he moved to industrial specialist, business analyst and, in 1955, to the post

of small business and labor surplus adviser.

When the Command was organized in 1962, he became chief of its small business office.

Liljegren plans to use his experience and skills after leaving the Arsenal. He'll set up a small business counseling service.

Mrs. Woodyatt entered the nation's work force in March, 1935, after the death of her husband. She took the FSEE test and

Later she became secretary to Walter Ackerman, who was civilian chief of Research and Development

Mrs. Woodyatt is married to a retired employee of the Moline Postoffice. She plans to join him in not getting up early in the morning starting Dec. 23.

It is time to get your holiday fruit cakes baked and for those of you who still like to bake from scratch here is a real ole fashioned recipe right from grandma's kitchen.

Dark and Delicious Fruit Cake

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup currants
- 1 cup dates
- 2 lb. mixed diced fruit
- 1 cup each coarsely chopped pecans, almonds and walnuts
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. soda
- 3 large eggs
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. allspice
- 1/2 tsp. cloves
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1/2 cup brandy
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 cups flour

Rinse and drain fruit. Combine fruit, nuts, spices, molasses and brandy; mix well. Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in sifted dry ingredients. Fold in fruit mixture. Pack firmly into a 10-inch tube pan lined with heavily greased white paper. Bake at 300 degrees for two hours.

Of course the modern Miss or Mrs. will stir up a package mix, add fruit and nuts, wrap in a wine-soaked cheese cloth and defy the man in her life to tell the difference.

For variation try baking

the fruit cake in individual ring molds. When cooled wrap in strips of aluminum foil, add a pretty, perky bow, a few small ornaments and VOILA!!! you have an attractive holiday wreath to be used for a table decoration, party favor or small gift.
