From the Commander

It has been an immense pleasure to serve by your side for the last three years. Even more so, it is humbling and a great honor to now serve you as the 88th Commander of this proud and historic shipyard. Since our founding 225 years ago, Portsmouth Naval Shipyard has done great things. In 1814, we built our first ship-of-the-line, USS Washington. During World War II, we built more than one-third of the US submarine fleet, and for the last 70 years, we have served the Nation as the premiere nuclear submarine shipyard.

In today's global environment, our expertise in delivering these apex predators of the deep is needed now, more than ever. Driving safely and rapidly through the availability endgame on USS Asheville (SSN 758) and USS Cheyenne (SSN 773) will take our dedication, expertise, and focus on getting it right the first time. Our submarine force is the tip of the spear in today's Navy. As recently as a couple of weeks ago, a submarine launched multiple Tomahawk missiles into Iran, striking targets at Iranian nuclear facilities in coordination with



the B-2 bomber strike.

Our ability to rapidly work through roadblocks and achieve first-time quality throughout a maintenance and overhaul availability buys our submariners more time at sea- time that is CRITICAL in order to be ready for immediate tasking, and the fight ahead.

It is my commitment to ensure continuous and consistent communication with you throughout my time in command. Beginning with this first edition of "From the Commander," I will highlight my "top three."

Though I expect these to vary in scope each month, my top three will provide insight into the things that are top-of-mind for me. I will use this opportunity to highlight wins, focus areas, or update on progress of our work.

Captain Jesse Nice Assumes Command

In his remarks, Nice expressed appreciation for the opportunity to lead. "It is humbling and a great honor to now stand here before you as the 88th Commander of this proud and historic shipyard," said Capt. Nice. "From our very founding 225 years ago yesterday, Portsmouth Naval Shipyard has done great things. Today, the Nation calls upon us once more to do great things, to deliver our submarines back to the fleet, timely, ready, and deadly against all foes. We rise to meet this challenge, bringing our expertise, ingenuity, and steadfast determination for what is right."

Capt. Nice reported to Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in June 2022 and has since served as production officer, business and strategic planning officer, and most recently as operations officer.

U.S. Senator Maggie Hassan and U.S. Representatives Chris Pappas and Maggie Goodlander were the shipyard's honored guests. Commander, Naval Submarine Forces Vice Adm. Robert Gaucher served as keynote speaker, and Deputy Commander, Industrial Operations, Naval Sea Systems Command Rear Adm. Scott Brown presided over the ceremony.

Gaucher praised Oberdorf's leadership while in command of the shipyard. "As Commanding Officer, you built a unit based on taking care of your Sailors, increasing morale, retention, and advancements across your Sailor and civilian workforce," Gaucher said. "You developed future leaders with enduring characteristics and without a doubt you left a lasting legacy with those you led and a significant impact on the Navy through your continued leadership."

Oberdorf reflected on his time in command of PNSY. "When I assumed command 40 months ago, I knew I was stepping into a legacy built on excellence, craftsmanship, and commitment," said Oberdorf. "As I prepare to step away, I do so with immense pride, deep gratitude, and complete confidence in the future of this shipyard."

During the ceremony, Brown presented Oberdorf with a Legion of Merit award. "Under Captain Oberdorf's leadership, Portsmouth Naval Shipyard has accomplished a great deal, but more importantly, he and his team have made impactful improvements that have reached beyond the island and are having a positive effect on all four of our naval shipyards."

Capt. Nice, a native of Cleveland Heights, Ohio, enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1996 as a Nuclear Electrician's Mate and holds a Masters in Nuclear Engineering. He served aboard three nuclear-powered submarines: USS Kentucky (SSBN 737), USS Michigan (SSGN 727), and USS Henry M. Jackson (SSBN 730). His shore assignments include the Trident Training Facility in Bangor, Washington; an Individual Augmentation tour in Kenya, supporting antiterrorism operations; and roles at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Yokosuka, Japan, New London, Connecticut, and NAVSEA, Washington, D.C.

As America's leader for attack submarine maintenance, repair and modernization, Portsmouth Naval Shipyard is enhancing critical warfighting capabilities by safely delivering first-time quality service, on-budget, on time to the fleet.

PNSY HOSTS OFFICER IN CHARGE OF CONSTRUCTION CHANGE OF COMMAND

Captain Kenneth Sowell relieved Capt. Benjamin Wainwright as commander, Officer in Charge of Construction Portsmouth Naval Shipyard during a change of command ceremony held May 28.

Rear Adm. Jorge Cuadros, commander, Naval Facilities Engineering Systems Command, Atlantic, and U.S. Fleet Forces Civil Engineer, presided over the ceremony.

Cuadros stressed the importance and magnitude of the level of work being performed at PNSY, including Wainwright's oversight of a multibillion-dollar construction portfolio of critical industrial infrastructure, as part of the Shipyard Infrastructure Optimization Program (SIOP). SIOP is a holistic plan that integrates all infrastructure and industrial plant equipment investments at the Navy's four public shipyards to meet nuclear fleet maintenance requirements, as well as improve Navy maintenance capabilities by expanding shipyard capacity and optimizing shipyard configuration.

"Our public shipyards represent some of the largest projects we've ever taken on as a nation," said Cuadros. "This is not business as usual, and you are not a business-as-usual team. We know what we are building here has a mission, and we are building it to support you, our shipyard partners; to provide you with world-leading shipyard facilities so that, in turn, you are able to keep these platforms ready for war."

Wainwright is the third commanding officer since OICC PNSY stood up in 2021. In his remarks, he emphasized teamwork and the resilience of his team, who never let any challenge keep them from completing the mission at hand. "As commanding officer, I'm wrapping up a tour that was short in time, but long on complexity and long of the list of command accomplishments," said Wainwright. "The award may be pinned on me, but it represents all the tremendous achievements of the OICC team, which is easy to do when you are surrounded by superstars. On my short watch, you've delivered \$355 million in work in progress projects, we cut the ribbon on a \$98 million waterfront support facility, replaced the Dry Dock 1 East caisson, and made auxiliary seawater environmental upgrades to Dry Dock 2. That's not just execution, that's domination."

Wainwright also underscored the importance of SIOP projects to PNSY and the significant global impact they will have. He next welcomed Sowell.

Sowell thanked those in attendance, those who planned and supported the ceremony, and went on to thank Wainwright for his leadership.

"Thank you, Adm. Cuadros, for your years of mentorship and for entrusting me with this incredible opportunity," said Sowell. "Since 1842, NAVFAC has existed to support the fleet. As Navy Civil Engineer Corps officers, that mission – to support the fleet – is ingrained in us from day one. It's never been more relevant to me than it is here, where our success is so directly linked to the readiness and lethality of the submarine force. OICC will remain steadfastly aligned with your intent and we will deliver for Portsmouth Naval Shipyard."

Sowell, a native of Rolla, Missouri, enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in 1991 and was commissioned as a naval officer through Navy Officer Candidate School in April 2004. Sowell has served in operational, contingency, and shore installation assignments of increasing complexity and responsibility throughout his career as a Navy Civil Engineer Corps Officer.

Shaping the Future of PNSY: Clearing Henderson's Point

In the early 20th century, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard began to take on a new role. As America expanded its influence on the global stage, the U.S. Navy needed more robust facilities to support its growing fleet. Portsmouth responded by making key infrastructure improvements, one of the most important being the removal of Henderson's Point.

Located on the western edge of Seavey Island, Henderson's Point had long been a navigational hazard. Named after William Henderson, who settled there in the early 1700s, the rocky ledge jutted into the Piscataqua River and created difficult passage for larger ships. As battleships grew in size, the Navy recognized that removing the point was essential.

The removal process officially began August 1902 and continued for nine years. The Massachusetts Contracting Company oversaw the work, which at times involved up to 300 laborers. It was a dangerous and complex operation. The crew drilled lift holes as deep as 80 feet—some of the deepest ever attempted at the time, and used more than 200 tons of dynamite over the course of the project.

The most dramatic moment came on July 22, 1905, when a single detonation involving 50 tons of dynamite leveled the bulk of the ledge. Residents of Portsmouth and Kittery watched the event from nearby islands and shorelines. The next day, the New York Times ran the headline, "50 Tons of Dynamite Destroy Wicked Ledge."

The explosion successfully removed the point, leaving a clean line with the edge of Seavey Island. Dredging crews followed, clearing away the debris and widening the channel by 350 feet. Once complete, the passage had a uniform depth of 35 feet at mean low tide, allowing for easier navigation by even the largest Navy vessels.

The project brought also other changes to the area. Prior the removal to of Henderson's Point, Quarters S—a structure that had served as a light station—was relocated from the southern tip of the point to a new position on Seavey Island. In addition, rock and soil



removed from the ledge were used to expand the shipyard's land area, adding more than 25 acres to the southern shoreline.

The work concluded on August 10, 1911, with a final cost estimated at \$850,000. Two workers lost their lives during the nine year effort, a reminder of the risks involved in such large-scale engineering projects. Divers also played a key role, assisting with underwater operations throughout the job.

The removal of Henderson's Point marked a turning point for PNSY. With improved access and expanded facilities, the shipyard was better prepared to meet the demands of a modern Navy. Today, shipyard workers and guests interested in this history can explore more at the PNSY Heritage Center, which is open every Thursday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. and by appointment on other weekdays.
