Time of year leaves some in depression

It's one of the best times of year for many people. But, for some, it's one of the saddest.

Although the holidays are thought to be a time of joy and cheer, many people experience seasonal "blues," according to the National Mental Health Association.

Dr. Theo Riley, psychologist at Kwajalein, said, "It's OK to feel down this time of year.

"There are a lot of legitimate reasons to not feel like celebrating or be in the holiday spirit," she added. "Some people feel sad even though it's considered a time of celebration."

Some of the reasons for the blues are: financial pressures because of added expenses, especially for families with children who have large wish lists; too much to do and not enough time; fatigue; and loneliness far away from loved ones.

Even people who don't become depressed may develop other stress reactions, such as headaches and difficulty sleeping.

Increased alcohol use and eating more sugar this time of year also leave us feeling more tired, Riley added.

If you are feeling sad or stressed this season, there are some things you can do.

For people feeling overstressed, cutting back on expectations helps. Set realistic goals. Maybe the house doesn't have to be perfect; all those cookies don't have to be baked; or you can get someone to help. Be realistic about what you can and want to do.

"The holidays come on top of normal expectations. We need to focus on the things that really mean some-

On a wing and a prayer

Off-island travel doesn't have to be a nightmare

Vacation. What a wonderful word to savor. The date is circled on the calendar. The places to go are selected. Logistics of where to go and what to see are ironed out.

Now all that's left to do is make the reservations, pack and show up at the terminal an hour before the flight. Right? Wrong.

On Kwajalein, it takes a little more paperwork and planning to take a vacation. But with the proper information, a trip to an off-island destination can go as expected.

Maj. Matthew Reed, chief of Supply and Transportation for USAKA/KMR and Capt. Walter R. Gandy,

installation transportation officer, outlined the procedures for someone leaving on vacation other than on Space A travel.

After making the decision to take vacation, what should be done first?

"The first step, whether flying Air Mobility Command (AMC) or commercial, is to fill out a Travel Request, which can be obtained from your employer's Human Resource (HR) department," Reed said.

This is critical, according to Jan Christiansen, KLS travel coordinator.

"A few weeks ago, four people left the island using a commercial flight. Getting off of the island wasn't the problem. Getting back on was. Since

they did not have travel orders containing the CIS entry/exit stamp before they left. CIS didn't know they belonged back on the island. The procedure, if that happens, will be to escort the traveler to the dock and send them to Ebeye until everything gets straightened out," Christiansen warned.

Travel orders that contain the CIS entry/exit stamp are required for anyone leaving the island.

"After filling out the travel request listing every person traveling, the department and division managers of the sponsor's workplace need to sign the form. This is required even if a dependent is the only one traveling," Christiansen said.

The travel request is then sent to the HR office. HR has the travel orders cut, obtains the CIS entry/exit stamp and arranges the flight on and off the island according to the individual's proposed travel plans — unless that person is using a commercial carrier.

What if a commercial carrier is used to leave the island?

Continental Travel Agency arranges travel on both Continental

and Aloha airlines, but travel orders are still required.

What about off-island travel arrangements?

The next step involves setting up any travel arrangements including hotels, auto rental and additional plane travel using the Continental Travel Agency in the mini-mall or calling an off-island travel agency.

Can passengers be bumped?

According to Reed, "If you are not flying Space A then you are a duty passenger. It does not matter if you are government, military or a contractor. All duty passengers receive hard (reserved) seats. You won't be bumped except for an emergency, such as a death in the family or other emergency. The bumped person will be put in the very next available seat."

If flying commercial, Sylvia Notarianni, Continental Travel Agency travel specialist, said, "We have not had a problem with that for a while. It can happen when the flight is sold out."

Finally, the actual day of departure arrives. Now passengers just show up with tickets in hand and leave, right? Wrong.

According to the schedule, the AMC flights leave Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays. The check-in time at the terminal for Tuesdays and Thursdays is 7 to 8 a.m., Saturdays, 10 to 11 a.m. Travelers need to bring travel orders, identification for each person traveling if old enough to have a K-badger and their luggage.

Continental has three flights to Honolulu a week — Monday, Wednesday and Friday — and check-in time is from 1 to 4 p.m. The airline also runs three flights per week to Guam, with stops at Kosrae, Pohnpei and Chuuk. Aloha's Saturday flight check-in time is from 6:30 to 8 a.m. Travelers need to show up with identification, tickets and their luggage, according to Notarianni.

Yvonne Duarte, Continental Travel Agency manager, stressed the need for travelers to carry either passports or two forms of identification, such

as a birth certificate and picture I.D.

Why bring luggage when checking in so far ahead of time?

"People are surprised that they have to bring their luggage with them to check in. We have to have it early to get it loaded and to do weights and measure calibrations on the aircraft," explained Donna Groth, AMC representative for travel.

Groth or the commercial carrier agent gives each traveler a time to be back for boarding at the time of check in.

What is so critical about being back at exactly the time given?

According to Reed and Groth, this is the most important item to pay attention to besides having proper travel orders.

"If you miss the report time that the AMC representative tells you to be back, you may be left behind. If the gate agent tells you 11:30 a.m. and you show up late, your bags may be pulled and you may not be allowed to board," Reed said.

Groth explained, "Our goal is to only allow 30 minutes to board and take off. We don't want to let the people sit in a hot plane on a runway waiting for someone who is late."

Gandy stated, "The published take off time is the time the plane has to takeoff by or it may have to stay at Kwaj overnight."

What if a traveler has a flat tire and is running late? Is there a way to still make the flight?

"Yes, just call before the time you need to be there and tell the gate agent that you are running late. Then they won't load the other passengers," Reed said.

What should a traveler know about returning to Kwajalein after vacation?

Be sure to call the AMC information line at Hickam Air Force Base at 808-449-1515 and verify the flight time. If flying commercial, call Aloha or Continental airlines and show up on time. If experiencing travel problems, contact the Honolulu Field Office at 808-438-1403.

"Hopefully, answering these questions will help everyone have a great vacation," Reed concluded.

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Robertson leaves legacy of KFAP

20-year Army veteran returns to the states

As 1st sergeant, he was Col. Gary K. McMillen's right-hand man for the USAKA/KMR command. But 1st Sgt. Ozell Robertson also had another duty he took just as seriously.

"My goal was to try to improve the quality of life for the community, and I think have done that to some degree," Robertson said during an interview last week as he prepared to PCS at the close of his 18-month tour.

"The process has started," he added. "I think the incoming 1st sergeant will continue that."

Robertson returned to the states this week, headed to Fort Campbell, Ky., with hopes of a promotion to sergeant major over the Army's promotions branch. 1st Sgt. Tony W. Burford takes his place.

A 20-year Army veteran, Robertson had done tours across the continental United States, as well as in Germany and Alaska, before coming to Kwajalein in June of 1998. Robertson said he counts the eight years spent in Germany on two separate tours as his favorite tour of duty.

"I love the food. I love to eat, so I love the food," he said, chuckling.

But the St. Louis native will miss Kwaj, with its blue oceans and tropical climates.

"What I'm going to miss most about Kwaj is the small-town lifestyle," he

said.

Robertson originally joined the Army to get a college education, explaining, "I came from a poor family and we couldn't afford college ... It was a way for me to go to college."

The plan had been to do four years, but Robertson instead made a career for himself in the Army, picking up his bachelor's degree in the social sciences along the way. He is now halfway through a master's degree, but is switching from business administration to public administration.

He said the different challenges presented by the Army kept him wed to the service for two decades. As well as, "Going to different places, meeting different people."

The Kwajalein assignment, he explained, offered its own unique challenges. The position provided Robertson an opportunity to "excel" beyond his rank, acting as a garrison sergeant major. In that capacity, he eventually established the Kwajalein Family Action Plan here.

KFAP is a program that allows residents to work on community issues at a local level. Two KFAP conferences were held this year. And while families were one focus of the program, Robertson said he is especially proud that he could help bring issues important to unaccompanied personnel to the forefront.

"Getting the bachelor's concerns to the commander was a big thing," he said.

Also, holiday movies will be shown each weekend at local theaters.


"Or, you can get creative at the Hobby Shop or the Photo Lab," he added.

Plethora of species
populate the waters

Part III


There are lots of sharks in the waters of Kwajalein that are seldom seen by divers. The sharks discussed in this installment either don't want to be seen, or they don't frequent the same areas the divers do. You may not see them, but they're out there.

Silky sharks

Sooner or later, it happens to every fisherman — you finally find a school of tuna under a halo of birds, and the reel screams as a good fish strips the line. Sometimes it happens when the fish is far away, and sometimes it happens at boatside, so you can see the culprit — but eventually it happens to every fisherman. The fish stops cold, and the line is cut, or you retrieve a head. You've been sharked.

If this happens more than about a half-mile offshore, chances are it was a silky shark that got your fish. Silkys are among the most common, but least known, of the sharks of Kwajalein. They are seldom seen by divers because they shun the reef, but there's a lot of open ocean out there, and that's silky country.

Silkys are brown above and cream-colored below. The contrast is striking because they spend a lot of time near the surface, and the sun darkens their backs. They don't have any distinguishing physical traits, except that the rear edge of the second dorsal fin is elongated; however, you must be very close to the shark to see

this.

Silky sharks will often take a trolled lure, and have saved many a tuna from the ice chest by putting up a dogged fight while the fishermen helplessly watch the object of their desires frolicking all around the boat.

It seems that silkys around Kwajalein have learned to associate boats with hooked, easy-to-eat tuna. Our attempts at blue-water spear fishing invariably result in encounters with these sharks before we even spear any fish. Probably they are attracted by the boat.

Silky sharks are regarded as fairly safe by most authorities. In fact, in the Caribbean, some dive shops sponsor trips that allow divers to feed the sharks without the protection of a cage. However, the silkys around Kwaj seem to react to debris in the water as a feeding opportunity. If a fisherman were to fall overboard, and especially if he were to flail the water while waiting to be picked up, things could get ugly.

Tiger sharks

Along with the great white shark and the bull shark, the tiger shark is one of those often implicated in attacks on humans. While some scientists speculate that great whites attack because they mistake people for seals, and bulls attack because of confusion due to murky waters, they make no excuses for tigers. These

sharks are enthusiastically omnivorous. When they attack, it's because people are as good to eat as anything else.

Tigers grow to huge size — 20 feet has been reliably reported — and they eat anything they can fit into their cavernous mouths. They are brownish-grey above and white underneath. The stripes that give them their name are not very distinct in smaller sharks and may fade away completely when the tiger attains about 10 feet in length.

In seven years of spearfishing, I have yet to see one; they are very seldom seen by divers. Occasionally, one is caught on hook and line.

They usually spend daylight hours in deep water, coming into shallower water at night to feed. Several have been caught at night from the Ebeye pier, indicating they prowl the lagoon under cover of darkness. Apparently they don't often investigate divers. Night diving from North Point is popular, and it seems sightings wouldn't be so uncommon there if the sharks had any interest in divers.

Some scientists suggest these sharks may not be all bad. Dr. Samaul Gruebner even allows lay people to help with his research in the Bahamas as an adventure vacation, which includes swimming with tiger sharks that have been released from set lines. Valerie and Ron Taylor have handled

tiger sharks for several films and consider them friendly.

Nevertheless, most authorities recommend that divers exit the water as soon as a tiger shark is seen.

Silver-tip sharks

Silver-tip sharks are seldom encountered by most divers at Kwajalein because they generally stay at 200 feet or so. These sharks are similar in appearance to grey reefs but silver-tips sport distinct white edges on the rear of their pectoral, dorsal, and caudal fins. They grow to about 10 feet in length.

Silver-tips are not as likely as grey reefs to approach a diver closely. Sometimes individuals will deviate from this, as Matt Fine and I found out while spearfishing off Lone Palm.

We were away from the drop-off in blue water when Matt pointed down. Hoping to see a big yellow fin, I was startled by a couple of white faces hurtling up from the depths. Two 5-foot silver-tips had that late-for-dinner look in their eyes as they rushed to within 15 feet before turning.

Once they joined us on the

surface, they seemed to calm down a bit. They circled a few times and disappeared into the depths, only to come rocketing up to us again five minutes later. They repeated the performance several more times. They probably sensed our splashing from a couple hundred feet deep and expected to find a school of feeding fish instead of us.

A huge silver-tip has made a profitable habit of shadowing spearfishermen a couple hundred yards south of SAR Pass. The shark is probably nine feet long (it looks 12). Its overwhelming size and casually intimidating style earned it the name, "Frankenstein," but even this monster of a shark hasn't made any threatening passes at divers, to my knowledge.

Lemon sharks

Last October, one of the workers at Echo Pier caught a shark on a set line, and I wandered down to look at it. At first glance, it resembled a grey reef, but closer examination revealed that both dorsal fins were nearly the same size, the upper lobe

of the tail was longer than a grey reef's and the lower lobe was much shorter. It sported a blunt snout, small eyes, and narrow teeth in the upper and lower jaws. It could only be a lemon shark.

Lemon sharks were so named because some are lemon yellow to light brown in color, but not all fit this description; the one on the dock was grey.

Lemons have a reputation of being very shy and avoiding divers to the point of refusing to take speared, bloody fish. But paradoxically, they are also known to attack divers out of anger for no apparent reason and persist in the attack to extremes. They reportedly will circle for hours a coral head in which a tormentor has sought refuge.

Lemons prefer still, murky water and feed mostly on bottom fish.

It is not clear whether only one species exists worldwide or if there are several. The lemon sharks of our lagoon may be a rare species unique to Micronesia, but like many aspects of sharks, this is debatable.


Leopard sharks

Several years ago, Rick Jeffress and I were spearfishing in Gea Pass, when I was astounded to see a leopard shark lying on the bottom of a surge channel. It looked much like a nurse shark — the same roly-poly body, long upper lobe of the tail angled back almost to horizontal, and almost no lower lobe.

I dove to the sand beside it and took a picture. It had a blunt head like a tadpole's and brown skin with large dark spots scattered over the back. After catching my breath on the surface, I dove again and got a couple more shots, but the shark didn't like the company.

As it slowly rose from the sand and swam over me, I saw the two barbels beside its nostrils. It swam to the edge of the drop-off and glided down into the depths. Unfortunately, none of the pictures turned out.

Leopard sharks are very much bottom-oriented and seem to prefer to snooze away the daylight hours. At night, they forage for shellfish. The only fierce thing about leopard sharks is their name. They are inoffensive by nature, but will bite if harassed.
