

Job fair takes Soldiers from camo to careers

More than 2,000 job seekers met and spoke with potential employers, representing a plethora of career fields, Jan. 28 at the Lone Star Conference Center at Fort Cavazos.

The biannual Mega Career fair, hosted by the Fort Cavazos Transition Assistance Program, aims to connect transitioning service members with employers in order to assist them in their shift from military to civilian life. The job fair also connects military dependents and anyone else with installation access with job opportunities.

At the Mega Career Fair, 180 employers representing organizations from multiple states and industries were offering a combined 75,000 positions to job seekers.

"With a Mega Career Fair it is opened up to a wider variety of employers," said Owen Alexander, TAP liaison officer. "Not just from Texas or the Killeen, Harker Heights

Capt. Cameron Washington, 62nd Engineer Battalion, 36th Engineer Brigade, and member of the Fort Cavazos Phantom Warriors Basketball Men's team, was named the Most Valuable Player of the Battle of Texas Basketball Tournament hosted at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Dec. 15, 2024.

The Battle of Texas Basketball Tournament is a competition held between Fort Bliss, Fort Cavazos, Fort Sam Houston and Lackland Air Force Base to see who has the best team across the state.

Washington was born and raised in Atlanta, Georgia; is 6 feet, 6 inches tall; plays the position of power forward and center and works in military intelligence. He joined the service to help pay for college through Army tuition assistance and attended Georgia Tech University, where he majored in criminal justice. While attending school he participated in the Kennesaw State Reserve Officers' Training Corps, which is also held at Georgia Tech, commissioned in May 2018 and became active duty in October 2019.

Originally, Washington wanted to join the FBI or Drug Enforcement Administration and knew obtaining a top secret clearance from the military service would look good on his resume, but, after joining the service, he began enjoying his lifestyle where he found opportunities for extracurricular activities and decided to stay in the service.

"I love my job in military intelligence, but it's cool to know that's not the only thing I can do while serving my country,"
Washington expressed.

"I think it would help with retention. I know that playing basketball is part of the reason that I want to stay in the Army," he added.

Washington never played organized basketball in high school or college, only pick-up games. While stationed at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington, a lieutenant introduced the idea to play for the post basketball team and submit a packet to join the All-Army team. He went on to become part of the JBLM post team and, after making it through five rounds of cuts, was selected for the

October 2022.

After he was stationed at Fort Cavazos in September 2024, Washington joined the post team. The Battle of Texas

All-Army basketball team that won a gold medal in San Diego, California, in

Tournament was the first time he played with the team, and he believes the team has serious potential, especially after emerging as champions.

"This is my first tournament with the team as well, so it couldn't have gone better from the jump," Washington said. "Everybody just wants to win. Everybody's rooting for everybody. The chemistry is great, and I think as we play together more and more there, we'll all be like brothers."

After winning the championship game with his fellow Phantom Warriors, Washington and his teammates were presented with a trophy and individual rings as winners of the tournament. Washington received an additional ring for being named MVP of the tournament.

"It was a big honor, and I appreciate it," Washington said. "It could have gone to multiple people on our team. I'm very, very honored, but I think my teammates had a lot to do with it too."

The Fort Cavazos Phantom Warriors Men and Lady Phantom Warriors Women basketball teams are power ranked No. 1 in the entire military and will continue building on their hard work as they face other teams in future tournaments.

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Forging readiness:

3rd ABCT executes CALFEX training

oldiers from 1st Cavalry Division began a combined arms live-fire exercise, or CALFEX, to prepare for upcoming missions Jan. 13 at Fort Cavazos. After planning for months to execute a large training exercise, units from the 1st Cav. Div. departed to the field to start a major field operation that combined live fire with different military tactics.

The complex exercise involved infantry, mortars, cavalry scouts and fire and air support teams from the 3rd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cav. Div., with support from other units within the division.

"The purpose of this combined arms live-fire exercise is to qualify companies and batteries on live -fire tables," said Capt. Christopher Kellier, assigned to 3rd Battalion, 8th Cavalry Regiment. "We're an armored brigade. We have the Abrams tanks, the Bradleys, we have Paladins and a whole bunch of sustainers, which are essential fighting vehicles."

For the exercise, 1st Cav. Div. Soldiers focused on practicing standard field operational skills and table qualifications within the area of operations. These tasks were accomplished by the utilization of direct and indirect fire to give forces the tactical advantage to successfully complete the mission.

The Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 2nd Battalion, 82nd Field Artillery Regiment, also participated in the training exercise.

"We are the fire support engine for this exercise," said Sgt. 1st Class Marshall Grier, assigned to the

Steel Dragon" field artillery regiment. "We give them the ability to take out more targets for other assets. Grier continued explaining how his Soldiers work to tie in more fire and air assets, as well as field Fort Cavazos.

The CALFEX training helped Soldiers learn how to work together to attack the enemy using helicopters, drones and included teams that observed the enemy with laser-guided weapons. Leaders were also able to see how well the Soldiers could refuel, acquire new

supplies and reload their weapons.

at Fort Cavazos.

"The purpose of today's event is to integrate armor, mechanized infantry, light infantry, dismounted engineers and aviation assets to ensure we are able to conduct more fighting functions as a brigade armored combat team," said Sgt. 1st Class Dominic Butler, 3rd ABCT, 1st Cav. Div.

Butler elaborated on the land and air tactics used during the division's CALFEX.

"A unique capability that the 3rd Armored Brigade Combat Team brings to the fight is our ability to integrate both direct fire and indirect fires — aviation, such as Apache fire, artillery fire — in conjunc-

tion with Abrams and Bradley maneuvers as well," Butler said. Although field training exercises are common, each one provides unique training that serves as a learning and practice experience for Soldiers and leaders to prepare for everyday operations, and be ready at a moment's notice to deploy and defend.

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
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
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
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

Texas legislators, staff learn about Army training, operations, life

"Every year, we get some funding here to help with our energy resiliency; the money that you provide for the local community; the airport, which is critically important for our ability to deploy; with the railhead support, for us to be able to send Bradleys and all the other combat systems.

"Thank you for your service and taking care of the people of Texas," Admiral concluded.

From there, legislators and staff were split into four groups. Each group had the opportunity to see and interact with static displays of a M1A2 Enhancement Package version 4 Abrams, M109A7 Paladin, MIM-104 Patriot, M-1070 heavy equipment transporter, M2A4 Bradley, SGT STOUT M-SHO-RAD, Stryker infantry carrier vehicle, an all-terrain vehicle outfitted for military police and an AH-64 Apache.

The groups also toured the Warrior Skills Training Center, learning and experiencing some of the simulators Soldiers use to train; Medical Simulations Training Center, hearing about the hands-on medical training and seeing the manikins used for instruction; and used the Reconfigurable Virtual Collective Trainer to see, observe and try out some of the control systems for military vehicles.

Texas State Rep. Hillary Hickland (TX-55) enjoyed the day. "It's great for other members at the state level, to be here to see face to face boots on the ground (and) what we're fighting for," she expressed. "It's important to understand the needs and the partnership of our military with the state and how it affects our communities and statewide. So, it's always good to get a greater understanding of those needs."

Georgia Page, a legislative aide for Texas State Sen. Bryan Hughes (TX-1), noted it was good to learn more about Fort Cavazos and the funding necessary to operate and provide for

"I thought it was interesting looking at the simulations from a standpoint of trying to save money," she said. "And I think that's cool to have technology that can help people train easier."

Morgan Register, legislative director for State Rep. Joanne Shofner (TX-11), also appreciated the opportunity to see some of the training Soldiers conduct.

"Just seeing the inner workings, it's really great that the Army has allowed us to come out here and be a part of this," he said. "I hope that we can also provide for the men and women who protect us."

Each team of legislative staff had a Soldier escort, leading them to each location and answering any questions they had. One escort, Master Sgt. Marvin Blaise, 20th Engineer Battalion, 36th Engineer Brigade, enjoyed interacting with his group.

"I think it's a good opportunity to meet young men and women making a positive impact in the state at the macro level when it comes to legislation but (also) having the opportunity to allow them to see what we do every day and see some of the laws that they implemented and how that's impacting service members," Blaise said. "And I'm thankful for how they appreciate the things that we do every day and we, of course, as a community, appreciate the things they do for us as well."

Between tours and static displays, participants had lunch with community leaders at Phantom Warrior Center.

Scott Connell, president of the Greater Killeen Chamber

of Commerce, gave remarks on the relationship between the installation and the city of Killeen.

"It is our pleasure to share with you something that maybe not everybody gets to see," he said, "but it's terribly important that you're aware of what you have here in

Fort Cavazos, in the Killeen area. "We're a special place in that Killeen is really adjacent to Fort Cavazos," he continued. "We really are one community, and Killeen is here to serve that group and everybody who comes in."

(or) Copperas Cove area, but from across the United States. We have employers that come from Colorado, Arizona, just to name a few.

"The reason we call it 'mega' is because of the volume, the quantity of employers that come to provide employment opportunities," he continued. "Not just for transitioning service members, but their dependents and anyone who's able to get on the installation. So the surrounding community benefits from the mega fair by the volume of positions and employers that's available."

Alexander said some job seekers could potentially leave the career fair with a job.

"There are some employers that are actually hiring on the spot," he said. "If a Soldier came prepared, they have a resume, they have that discussion with the employer, there's a possibility they could do an on the spot interview and actually hire that person.

Alexander continued, saying Soldiers who attended the job fair that were not close to transitioning yet had the opportunity to network and connect with resources that are available to them.

"They get the opportunity to meet various companies, various recruiters and hiring managers and get an understanding of the feel for the requirements of the profession that they're interested in, or the skills needed for the job they are seeking," he shared. "In addition to the employers, we also have support agencies, like ACS (Army Community Service), EFMP (Exceptional Family Member Program), just to name a few. That gives a Soldier the opportunity to meet these supporting agencies that could also assist them with resources as they transition from the military."

Sgt. 1st Class Jerry Klatt, 7th Battalion, 17th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Air Cavalry Brigade, is in the process of transitioning out of the Army and attended the Mega Career Fair looking for job opportunities in the mechanical and maintenance field. He said the career fairs hosted by TAP are very important for transitioning Soldiers.

"(Soldiers) wouldn't know all of this was out there," he said, adding job searching online doesn't compare to attending the job fair. "I mean, there's a lot of opportunities."

Alexander said the hard work TAP puts into hosting the career fairs is always palpable.

including law enforcement, technology and packaging were present at the career fair.

"It's an opportunity for everyone to come together, to take care of Soldiers, to support Soldiers as they transition," Alexander said. "Every now and again you stop and spot check a Soldier or talk to someone and you ask them ... was (the career fair) beneficial, and they say, 'I made contact,' or 'I was able to find a job.' Getting that type of feedback lets you know that the effort put into it is worthwhile. You can actually see the fruits of the effort that's put into it, knowing that Soldiers have all these resources available to them, they can make connections and actually get employed."

SECDEF directs creation of task force to restore America's fighting force

WASHINGTON — In a memorandum sent to leaders across the U.S. military Jan. 29, Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth announced the creation of a task force to oversee the strengthening of a military based entirely on merit.

"The Department of Defense has an obligation to the American public to ensure their sons and daughters serve under the best leadership we can provide them," Hegseth said. "Doing so is a national security imperative. A foundational

tenet of the DOD must always be that the most qualified individuals are placed in positions of responsibility in accordance with merit-based, color-blind policies."

The "Restoring America's Fighting Force" Task Force, the secretary said, will be established by the undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness and is charged with overseeing department efforts to eliminate organizations, offices and policies that perpetrate non-merit factors such as sex, race or ethnicity over factors such as lethality, meritocracy, accountability, standards or readiness.

"To ensure DOD focuses on its core mission of providing

the military forces needed to deter war and ensure our nation's security, the department will ensure all decisions related to hiring, promotion and selection of personnel for assignments are based on merit, the needs of the department, and lastly, the individual's desires," Hegseth said in the memorandum.

the individual's desires," Hegseth said in the memorandum.

As part of its mission, the task force will oversee the standing down of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion offices across the department and military services along with the cessation of actions initiated by those offices which promote, among other

things, ideologies related to systemic racism or gender fluidity. The secretary has set a March 1 deadline for an initial report

from the task force regarding its activities and June 1 as the deadline for a final report.

As part of the memorandum, Hegseth spelled out clearly an array of ideas the DOD will adhere to going forward, and which the task force will in part help it achieve.

Among those is DOD will no longer regard an individual's sex, race, or ethnicity when considering that person for promotion, command or special duty. At the same time, the department will eliminate sex, race or ethnicity-based goals for organizational composition, academic admission and career fields.

force, including within military service academies, the secretary said the department would no longer provide instruction on concepts such as critical race theory (CRT), DEI or gender ideology.

Finally, advisory boards, councils and working groups related to gender ideology, DEI and CRT will stand down.

On Jan. 27, President Donald J. Trump released an executive order titled "Restoring America's Fighting Force," which prohibits any preference or disadvantage for an individual or a group within the armed forces on the basis of sex, race or ethnicity. The task force will ensure the department meets the goals set out by the president.

"The DOD mission is to win the nation's wars," Hegseth said. "To do this, we must have a lethal fighting force that rewards individual initiative, excellence and hard work based on merit."

are welcome to bring food in from the pizzeria up front or the creperie named Early Light Creperie inside the building

There is also, of course, plenty of books ranging from genres of fantasy to history, lining shelves around the store, and lots of bookish goodies and other items are set in-between, like earrings, fun mugs and totes.

The store regularly holds a number of events, including Tarot Night, cocktail-making classes, book-release parties, writer meetups, afternoon tea and themed trivia.

We did a quick practice round beforehand (we discovered that Hogwarts has 142 staircases, but unfortunately, the need for the information never presented itself) and then we were ready to take on the other teams.

First is not always best

By now, most professional football fans, er, sports fans, know the Kansas City Chiefs have the opportunity to do something extremely rare — actually something that has never been accomplished — by winning its third straight Vince Lombardi Trophy and subsequent Super Bowl title Sunday in Super Bowl LIX at New Orleans.

The Chiefs would go down in history as the first NFL team to win three straight Super Bowls.

This would theoretically make the Chiefs the best ever, right? Before I broach that subject, let's learn about what has transpired thus far.

Saquon Barkley and the Philadelphia

Eagles may have something to say about

And, he has driven the Chiefs to two consecutive world championships already.

Have you heard of the 1972 Miami Dolphins? Yes, that team was the best team ever with a perfect season.

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

WASHINGTON — As the new year continues, Soldiers, their families and Army civilians have a variety of tools and programs available to support their overall well-being. From Holistic Health and Fitness, or H2F, initiatives to spiritual readiness resources, free counseling, sleep assistance and family support programs, the Army is committed to fostering resilience. These resources ensure a comprehensive approach to strengthening mind and body for the challenges ahead.

The Army's H2F system, provides training and education to improve and maintain the readiness, resilience and performance of the

The H2F Performance Team is comprised of military professionals from the medical, dietary and religious support fields within the Army. The teams implement an interdisciplinary, holistic approach to the management of the physical and mental health of Soldiers, while also monitoring their well-being, and performance.

The effort seeks to optimize physical and nonphysical performance, reduce injury rates and improve rehabilitation after injury, ultimately increasing the overall readiness of the total Army.

Spiritual readiness is one component of the approach. This includes the development of personal qualities needed to sustain a person in times of stress, hardship or tragedy, according to the H2F Handbook. Spiritual readiness is not just about religion, although religion could play a key role for some.

Spiritual readiness is about finding one's purpose, believing in something, connecting with others, forgiving oneself and moving on from mistakes, getting along with others, living one's values and serving selflessly.

Chaplains and religious affairs specialists provide various types of counseling and training for the command stemming from religious, spiritual, relational and general life training. They can provide various resources to connect people with their spiritual core to build the human spirit, body and mind.

Military family life consultants

The Military and Family Life Counseling Program provides free, confidential nonmedical counseling to service members, their families and survivors on or near installations. Trained to work with the military community, military and family life counselors deliver valuable counseling services, briefings and pre-

sentations to the military community. Counselors can help with improving relationships at home and work, stress management, adjustment difficulties, parenting and

grief or loss. Adult, as well as child and youth, behavioral counselors are assigned to units, schools, child development centers and

other locations worldwide.
