

Roi-Namur welcomes new physician assistant Michael Carney to the island

Roi-Namur is going to be the home of our newest hospital staff member, Michael Carney, who will be the full-time physician assistant on Roi. He arrived Oct. 6 and has been working out some credentialing issues on Kwajalein before heading to Roi. Carney is from New York and his medical license needs to be renewed before he can practice out here. His last post was in Saipan where he worked for three years as a physician assistant. Saipan is the largest island of the Unites States Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, a chain of 15 tropical islands in the western Pacific.

Carney grew up and went to school in New York City. There he attended the Sophie Davis School of Biomedical education, headquartered at City College of New York. He has been practicing medicine for about 11 years now.

Physician assistants are considered mid-level practitioners. They function like a physician and are able to do most of the same functions, but usually practice under their supervision. One of the main differences between a physician assistant and a physician is the amount of time spent in school; the length of a physician assistant program is about two-thirds that of medical school. For a physician, their rotations are approximately three to four months, whereas a physician assistant's rotations are just two months. The training to become a physician assistant was based on the World War II era when they were trying to make a lot of medical

doctors quickly for the war. "If I was in WWII, I would be an MD," Carney explained. Carney's background is in orthopedics and emergency medicine.

Carney heard about Kwajalein on his tour in Saipan through a co-worker who was a lab technician that had spent some time working here on Kwajalein. Through word-of-mouth, Carney was told about Kwajalein and recently heard of the job opening.

So far, Carney is fond of his short time spent on Kwajalein."It's a very nice little community," he said. "It's a little different than Saipan; this is a little more close-knit, a lot smaller." Saipan hosts about 60,000 residents compared to Kwajalein's 1,500. Carney seems to be moving in the direction of smaller and smaller communities, beginning in New York City, then to Saipan and finally to Kwajalein and eventually Roi.

Carney has yet to experience all that Kwajalein has to offer, but is looking forward to doing so once all his credentialing is worked out. He is looking forward to SCUBA diving and his quarters are on the edge of the Roi golf course, so he is expecting to get back into golf

soon and looks forward to working on his game a little. Carney has done a bit of SCUBA diving in the past, but didn't make it a passion. "I think here I'll keep occupied and it'll be a passion," he commented.

Adjusting to the Kwajalein climate and time zone was not too difficult for Carney, since he came directly from Saipan, which is very similar to Kwajalein in terms of weather; it too is situated on the equator and is only about 800 miles west of us. There is only a two-hour difference in time zones, so Carney's adjustment to our time here on Kwajalein was much easier than most who PCS from the States. "The waters are similar [at Kwajalein] and I like this part of the region," he said. "I think I'm more inclined to be in this part of the world. I just like being out in the Pacific."

Carney is unsure about how long he plans to stay on Kwajalein and Roi, and will be taking things one year at a time. But he does enjoy living in this area of the world, so it is possible that like many that come out here to work, his one or two year contract may turn into five or 10 quite easily.

Quality of Life funds various proposals for Kwajalein, Roi-Namur communities

he Quality of Life Fund is one of the unique benefits here on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. The Fund is managed by a QOL Committee made up of representatives to the various demographics on Kwajalein and Roi. The committee meets monthly and considers recommendations from all their constituents for potential funding. Proposals are presented to the QOL committee for funding consideration and are voted on by the voting-members of the committee.

The QOL Charter states: The QOL committee is an Integrated Product Team established in accordance with the KRS contract that results in an allocation of payments received under the provisions of the Indian Incentive Program to be used for the general improvement of the USAKA/RTS community. The committee includes reasonable representation from all organizations and activities maintaining a permanent presence at USAKA/RTS. The committee is responsible for accepting and reviewing input from all demographics of the USAKA/RTS community in order to identify and fund projects and programs that will enhance and improve the morale and living conditions of the USAKA/RTS community. The committee will avoid the use of the QOL funds to supplement base-funded requirements and activities. A senior manager of KRS will serve as a non-voting member of the committee and will provide oversight of the committee's activities. Currently that member is Jim Willman, DPM of Business Services.

QOL has funded many projects on Kwajalein and Roi that you may have noticed, but may not have known where the funding came from. In the last year, QOL has funded more than \$150K in 2010 projects and more than \$1.5M since 2004.

Following are some of the QOL funded projects in 2010.

- Items for the Adult Recreation Center, including a pan set, a set of dishes, a blender, mixing bowls, and pool table felt.
- Items for Community Activity Center, including 23 sets of light to medium weight vinyl dumbbells placed at the Community Activity Center and Corlett Recreation Center gym and a 12-channel mixer for the sound system in the Corlett Recreation Center room six.
- The stainless steel sports bottles with the Kwajalein logo that were passed out at the Community Activities 'Get in the Mix' event in February and in

conjunction with Community Activities welcome tours was funded by QOL

- QOL vehicles are probably one of the most visible and utilized items funded by QOL. This past year, QOL purchased five additional vehicles, four 4-passenger golf carts and one 6-passenger golf cart. In total, QOL has funded the purchase of seven golf carts and one pick-up truck that are available for rental use on Kwajalein and Roi.
- Equipment for Holmberg Fairways, including ball washers, tee markers, yardage markers, water cooler stands, plastic outdoor patio furniture and

carpet for the patio. Also, seven new benches were purchased and placed at the golf course, weather station and flagpoles.

- QOL provided the funds to cover both materials and labor for the replacement of the carpet in the Roi Outrigger Club.
- Scholarships for six Kwajalein High School graduating seniors were funded by QOL. Applicants were evaluated based on academic achievement and community activities contributions
- QOL has also funded equipment for the installation of public internet access to facilitate shared-usage of a non-mission internet network. This project also includes the DSL equipment needed to connect the homes to the fiber network for high speed internet access due in 2011.
- Projects that have been approved for funding but have yet to arrive are new Ivey Gym equipment to include inner thighs machine, adjustable incline bench and decline bench; a new Lab testing

machine for the Diabetic Clinic; a new computer for the music system at the Roi Outrigger Bar; a new antenna for the Roi-Namur Radio Station; additional DVD documentaries to be shown on both Roi and Kwajalein; new outdoor speakers to be placed at the main pavilion at Emon Beach, and a 12'x24' gazebo for the new laundry facility at the DSC.

If you have a request you would like to present to the QOL committee, simply contact your appropriate representative and they can get you scheduled to present your proposal or they can present to the committee on your behalf. Proposals are typically in a business case format so if you make a request, please be prepared to help gather information about work or purchase estimates and/or pictures and drawings.


Students who make the grade also can register for a drawing to win a savings bond worth up to \$5,000 by filling out and mailing an included entry form.

Kwajalein Post Office has tips to make your holiday mailing needs run smoothly

The holiday season is fast approaching and the Kwajalein Post Office wants to make sure all your packages and holiday cards get sent out on time.

To guarantee delivery for holiday packages, you should send them out by the end of November. That was a few days ago, so if you haven't done it yet, be sure to do it this week.

When sending your packages back to the States, you must have a customs form on a parcel larger than a normal-sized letter. If it is under one pound, use the small customs form. If it is over one pound, use the large customs form.

We know that you have family in friends in the States as well as here on Kwajalein. If you are

sending holiday cards or letters to Kwajalein residents, you must have the following information:

- Complete return address (including APO, AP 96555).
 - Complete address of recipient.
- Must write 'MPS' in upper righthand corner; it serves as your stamp.

If information is missing, your letter cannot be delivered.

If you would like to send a package to someone on Kwaj, we recommend ringing the doorbell and making a run for it. But, if you would like to send it through the mail, you address the package like you would a letter — with complete recipient address, return address and 'MPS' in upper right-hand corner. Please realize that MPS mail is not considered priority when mail is being sorted.

The holidays are the busiest time of the year for mail — not only outgoing, but incoming as well. Please check your mailboxes every day, even if it is not a mail day. Boxes tend to get full quickly and overflow.

If you would like to know if the mail has been processed or is still being processed on mail days, check the white board at the package pick-up window for information and updates on flights.



Samples taken thus far have been negative for the presence of coliform bacteria. RECENT sightings of small Portuguese Man-of-War, dimesize, have been identified oceanside on Kwajalein. Take extra precautions when you are in the water. To prevent injuries, avoid the areas they frequent. They are commonly

oceanside but have been seen in the lagoon and around beaches as well. Sypmtoms of a sting are burning, redness, stinging, swelling of lymph nodes and long welt lines. In severe reactions, difficulty breathing and cardiac arrest may occur. If stung, rinse the area with plenty of water and remove tentacles by rinsing with water or lifting off with a credit card. If the reaction is severe, contact emergency services.

REMINDER to all residents that it is USAKA policy that when walking your pet you have items capable of picking up and disposing of animal feces. There have been numerous reports of residents walking their pets over the last few weeks that have not been picking up after their pets. Please be good neighbors and pick up after your pet.

SAFELY SPEAKING. Teach your children the basic rules of the road. If your child has an electric powered vehicle, or power wheels, teach him or her to use it safely. Do not ride it on the road

TEACH OUR KIDS to be green. Turn off your lights, computer and TV when not in use. Don't let water run continuously when brushing your teeth. Use cotton or recycled material bags instead of plastic. Recycle your plastic bags and used paper.

DEEP-FRYING safety. Place the fryer in an open area away from all walls, fences or other structure. Raise and lower food slowly to reduce splatter and avoid burns. If a fire occurs immediately call 911. Do not attempt to extinguish the fire with water.

Recreational Diving

Effective immediately, recreational diving is not allowed when the dive chamber is unavailable. The 50 ft dive limit, previously indicated by the No. 6 pennant at the harbor, has been suspended pending a review by USAKA. Until further notice, the No. 6 pennant means "NO DIVING PERMITTED."

Hours when the dive chamber is normally available, unless down or committed for mission support are:

Sunday-Monday 7:30 a.m.-6 p.m. Tuesday-Wednesday 7 a.m.-4 p.m. Thursday-Saturday 7 a.m.-6 p.m. Designated holidays 7 a.m.-4 p.m.

All other periods the chamber is considered unavailable and under the interim command directive, no SCUBA diving is permitted.
