

Shaving Cream Social one of the oldest traditions on Kwajalein

wajalein is known for its unique and long-practiced traditions. The Shaving Cream Social is one of them, and also happens to be one of the oldest; it is even older than the Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony.

The Shaving Cream Social is usually the kick-off for Halloween celebrations. This year the social was directed by Mandie Morris, Recreation Manager, who dressed in her skull t-shirt and funky purple wig, really getting the kids into the Halloween spirit. Halloween and dance music was also played to keep the momentum of the event in high gear.

This year over 250 Kwajalein youths came out in their bathing suits, rash guards, goggles and hats, ready to be covered from head to toe in white, frothy lather.

Each grade or age group was given 10 to 20 minutes to play in what is now known as the "Rich Ravine." The little ones, in pre-school, were accompanied by a parent and their children made sure that they got in on the fun too. Some parents welcomed the attack of wet children covered in shaving cream while others tried their best to dodge their attempts to smear them with the white stuff, most not succeeding.

The next group up was Kindergarten through second grade, followed by third grade through sixth grade, and finally all junior and senior high school students. It seemed no matter the age, and no matter the grade,

What a great event to have on Kwaj, where your ride home is your bicycle and if it gets covered in shaving cream on the way home, rest assured a rain shower is not too far off in the distance to rinse off your ride.

As always, the event was a fun-filled kick-off for the Halloween weekend; one that kids, parents and friends all enjoyed, either by participating or spectating.




