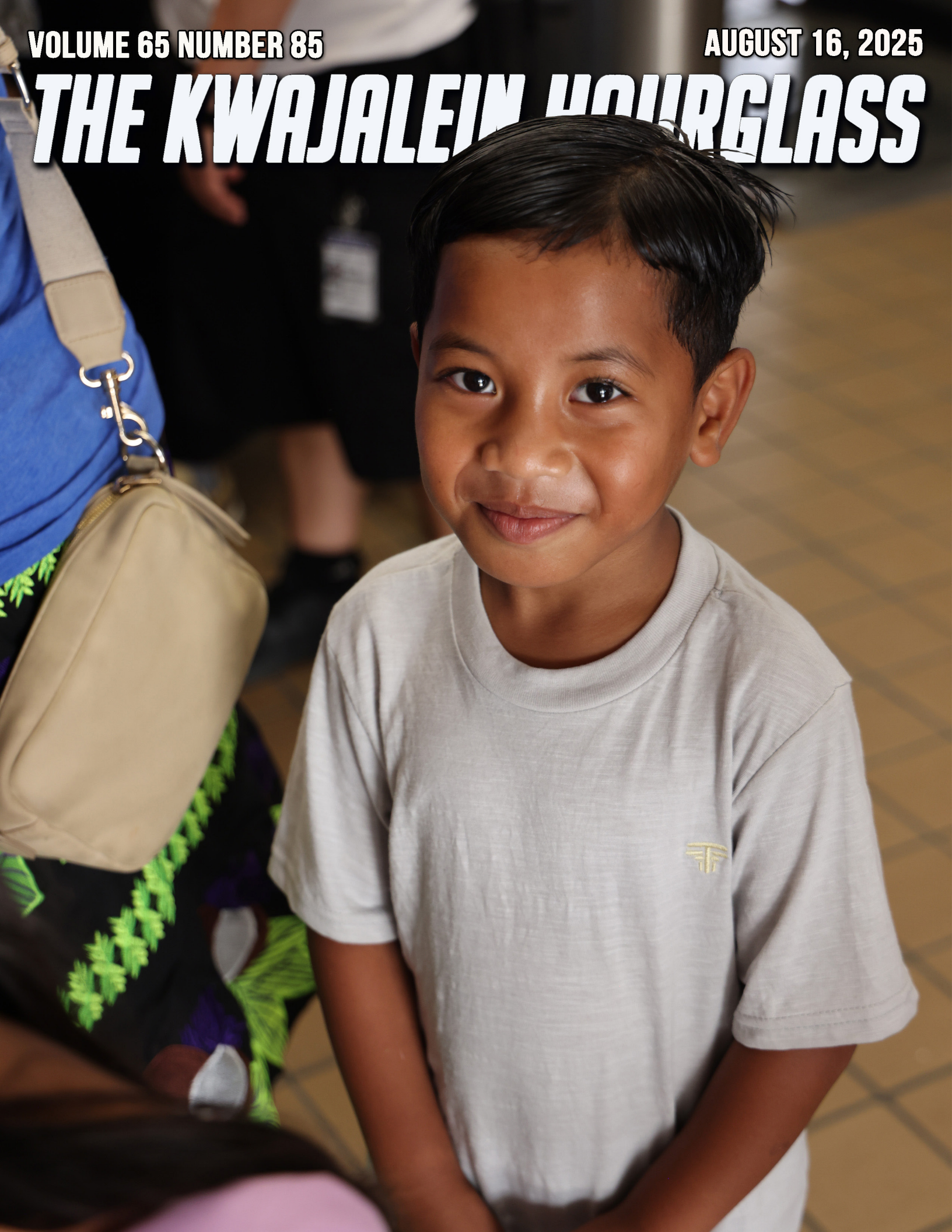

COMMUNITY BACKPACKS, SMILES AND FRESH STARTS: STUDENTS RETURN TO SCHOOL ON KWAJALEIN

As the sun rose over U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll on Friday morning, classrooms lit up not only with tropical light but with a renewed sense of purpose.

Administrators and staff said the new year marks a fresh chapter for the island's close-knit school community, combining local tradition with renewed energy and direction.

"We're using the golden year as our theme this year, and we're really emphasizing the marigold; the support that the marigolds show oth-

er plants. That's kind of our theme for the whole year to work as we all need to work together to maintain this positive community, culture, and to make sure all of our students learn, grow, and achieve at the level they're supposed to," said Jerrod Gertsema, principal of George Seitz Elementary School.

The day began with a morning assembly, where students were welcomed back and introduced to new faculty and staff. Across the school, bulletin boards were decorated with bright messages of encouragement, and classrooms buzzed with first-day activities. Teachers, many of whom spent weeks prepar-

ing, said they were eager to begin building relationships and setting a positive tone for the year ahead.

"Our big goal here this year is to ensure that every student feels welcome and is showing growth in their academic and [their ability to] work with one another, because we always need somebody to lean on," said Gertsema.

While the school continues to integrate updated curriculum and new learning technologies, educators emphasized that relationships remain at the heart of their work.

"We are all a community, we're here to support each

other, we take care of each other," said Gertsema. "Kwajalein is a great place to be, with our school community, it's just a wonderful place to serve and help the community and help out to support our students and our staff."

For parents, the day brought a blend of pride and emotion. Some lingered outside classrooms, offering words of encouragement. Others walked away quickly, trusting their children were in good hands. For SFC Smith, his daughter Nora began her first day of kindergarten.

"The staff in the school community has been nothing but supportive for our family,

and we look forward to our daughter's education here," said SFC Nathaniel Smith, a Provost Sergeant with U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. "It's a great place for our children to learn and grow in such a small, tight-knit community where everyone helps each other out, and everyone can feel safe."

The excitement for the students returning and their education extended beyond George Seitz Elementary School.

"I am most excited for the opportunities in front of the students," said Dr. Matthew Gerber, the principal of Kwajalein Junior/ Senior School.

"We have such a great group of children. I am really excited about what they will accomplish; just being a part of their story and education."

Despite the tropical heat and back-to-school nerves, the atmosphere remained optimistic and focused on the future.

"We're so excited to start a new school year, and we've heard amazing things about our new kids, and it's going to be one of our best years yet," said Dr. Amy Blakey, School Superintendent. ❧

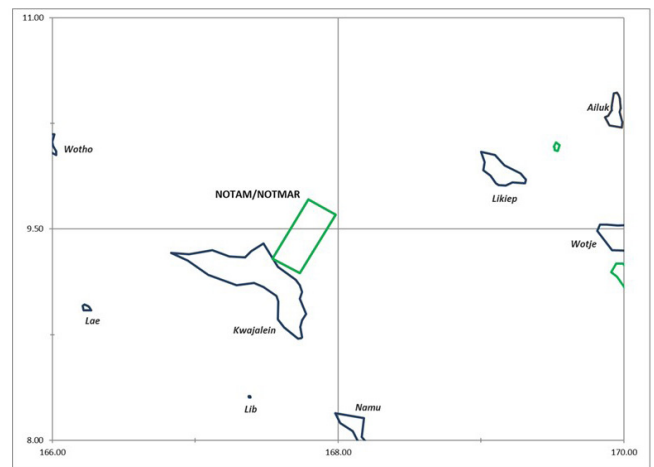
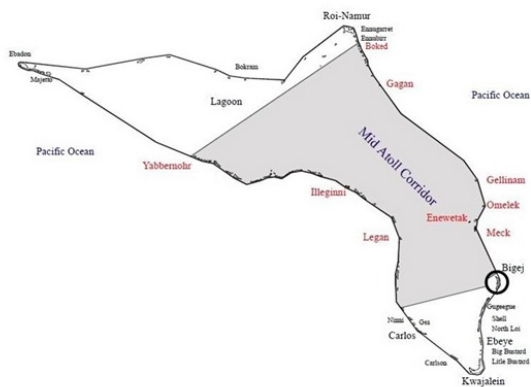

COMMUNITY GUIDING HAND: HAND-PAINTED SCHOOL MURALS

On your way back towards housing from Emon beach you may have noticed an add-on to the Kwajalein Jr./Sr High School building. A Spartan helmet like no other, symbolism flowing through the warrior helmet like the currents that flow through the Marshall Islands. It is an impressive sight, and I wondered who had painted the new “Ruainene Tok Non” (welcome to) sign. Then on my way down Ocean View, headed to work, I saw her.....brush in hand, in the soft morning sunlight at it again, this time on the George Seitz Elementary school (GSES). I pulled a hard right turn to meet the

artist responsible for these magnificent murals.

Oanh P. Letter is her name, an assistant teacher/librarian working at the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School is here on Kwajalein Atoll with her husband Luke Letter, an engineer with MIT. The two have been on Kwajalein for three years. “It has been such a great home for us, and such a great community. I feel so lucky to be here every day,” Oanh stated about their time here on Kwajalein.

I asked how the project for the Murals came to light and Oanh told me “A bit over a year ago, Dr. Gerber, the principal of the HS asked me if I

could design a new logo for the HS as the old logo we used ran into copy right problem. It was something that came from a place of inspiration based on an old Spartan design. I took the liberty to add some Marshallese motifs and symbols unique to culture of the people here. I’d like to capture as many symbols as I could in each logo.”

And wow has she amazingly intertwined the Marshallese culture through the paintings. “On the Spartan logo, you could clearly see the stick chart on the face, the outriggers, the shark fins (for Shark sanctuary), the 24 triangles representing the 24 districts of the RMI, the plumeria, the



shape of the RMI on the nose, the 13 stars for the original 13 states of the US, the sun rays behind the clouds, the small shape of Kwajalein at the very end.

The mascot of the GSES is the dolphin blue and white. Since it's a part of the Kwajalein school system, I'd like to design the dolphin with similar symbols like the new Spartan logo. You could see the small map of Kwajalein with the plumeria, triangles on the body of the dolphin, stick charts on the fins, and the flag of the RMI on the face of the dolphin."

I was very surprised when Oanh told me "Actually, the high school mural was my first attempt, and the George Seitz mural was my 2nd one". Grant it she has been painting for around 13 years stating "I started my first painting 13 years ago after I happened to see Bob Ross on TV. I remember he said anyone could paint. I felt very inspired and decided that I wanted to paint. I usually do landscapes, but I also painted a couple of portrait paintings of my children.

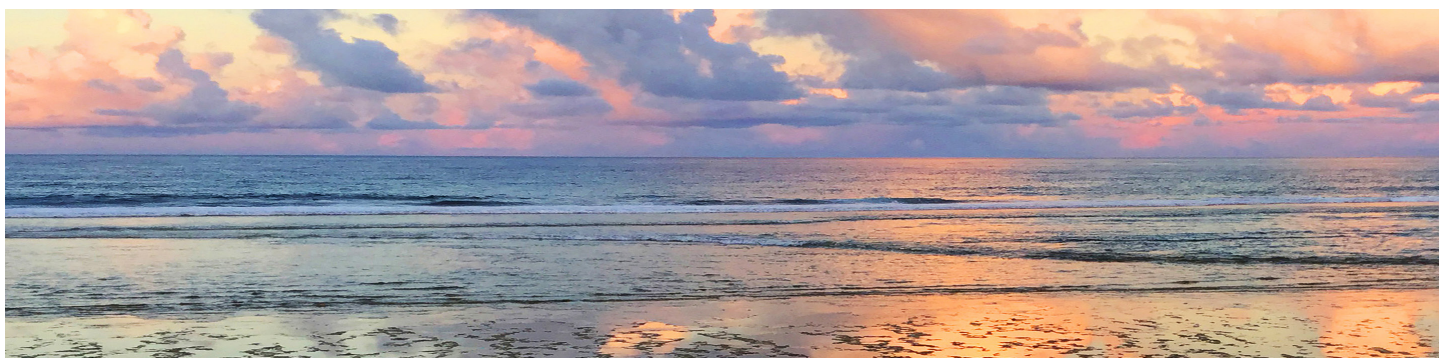
Oanh told me that what

she likes best about the paintings is "Kwaj is a special place for me, and I've loved being a part of the school community. I have a special relationship with the kids and people here. In life, I think the best we can all hope for is to do something we love doing and have the people we care about impacted in a positive way. I will always feel that pride when I see the mural, and I am thrilled that I was given the opportunity to do it.

What painting is next? "It's so beautiful here, and there are so many inspirations for my next paintings.

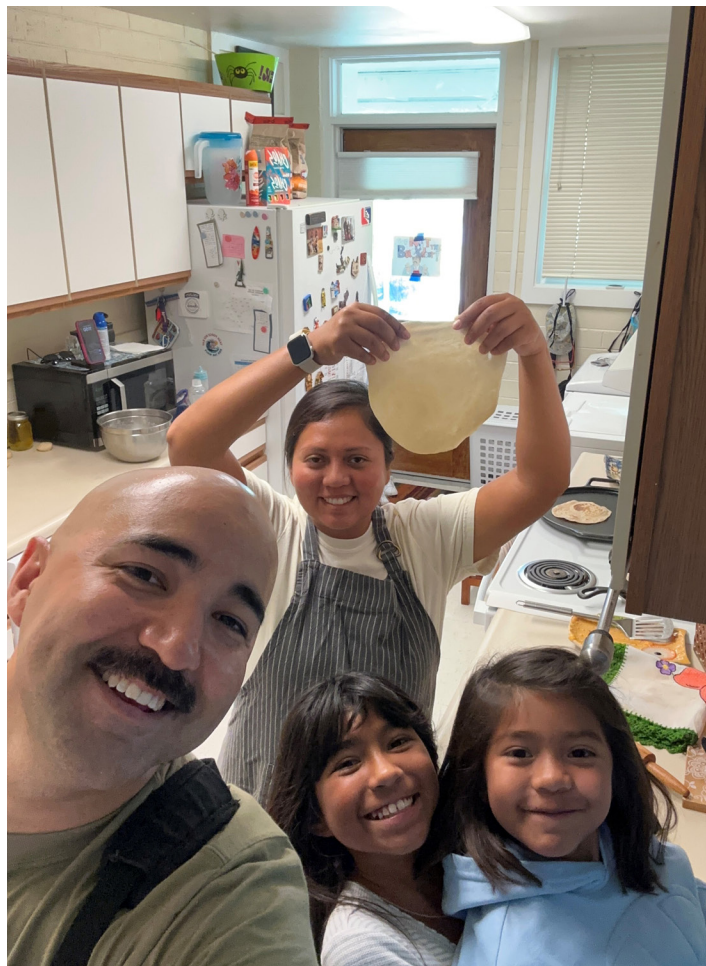
I don't have an exact piece in mind yet, but I think the next painting would be a place on Roi (if I could find some time to do it)."

COMMUNITY TORTILLAS, TRADITIONS, AND THE THREAD OF FAMILY

A heartfelt look at how one military family keeps culture alive through homemade tortillas and shared time around the table.

In the Arroyo household, family traditions are measured in memories, moments, and the soft, familiar texture of handmade tortillas warm out of the pan.

For Silvestre Arroyo—a dedicated military husband and father—tradition isn't just something you honor during the holidays. It's a living, breathing part of his family's everyday life. This month, Silvestre and his wife, Joyce, will celebrate 14 years of marriage, a journey that's been

shaped by love, resilience, and a deep appreciation for the values passed down from their mothers' kitchens.

Between their three children—a 13-year-old son, Matthew and two daughters, Madalynn and Michaela, ages 10 and 7—there's constant motion in the house. But there are also still, grounding moments where the kids are given guidance and structure to shape their future. One of those moments is when the family gathers around the table, often with tortillas made by hand, just as Silvestre's mother has done for decades. There's even a family text group where new recipe ideas are often shared and planned as family activities.

"My mother has been making tortillas since she was six years old," Silvestre says with pride. Now 73, she continues to make them, teaching not just technique, but tradition—kneading stories, strength, and culture into every batch. She passed this knowledge on to Silvestre, who now shares the experience with his own family, creating a link across generations that's as nourishing emotionally as it is physically.

Joyce's mother, too, was an avid cook. With both sides of the family steeped in the rhythms of home cooking, food has become more than a daily routine—it's become a ritual of remembrance and reconnection. Making torti-

llas by hand is one of those rituals, rooted in love, patience, and an understanding that something as simple as shared bread can carry the weight of heritage.

As a military family, the Arroyos understand the importance of being intentional about their time together. Schedules shift. Assignments come and go. But family traditions are constants—especially those formed in the kitchen and carried to the dinner table.

"The table is where we slow down," Silvestre says. "Where we reconnect, share our days, and remember where we come from."

Silvestre has taken a special role in the tortilla-making

process—one that's become his signature at family gatherings. "I'm always in charge of making the dough, and everyone compliments how soft it turns out," he says, smiling. "They'll say, 'You've got the magic touch!' I take pride in that. It's a part of me now."

With practiced hands and quiet focus, he rolls out each tortilla, just like in the photo snapped in his own kitchen. His skill, honed over years of practice, is not just about texture—it's a reflection of his connection to his roots, and a point of pride passed from one generation to the next.

And the best reviews? They come straight from home.

"Dad's tortillas are the best," says 10-year-old Madalynn. "So much better than the ones at the grocery store that have a weird aftertaste."

"Yeah," adds 7-year-old Michaela with a scrunched-up face, "they taste disgusting... Ewww!"

In a world that moves fast, preserving family traditions—like making tortillas—is a powerful act. It

reinforces identity. It creates a sense of home no matter where you are. And for the Arroyos, it ensures that their children grow up with more than just good food. They grow up with roots.

From the hands of a 6-year-old girl in a kitchen decades ago, to a 73-year-old grandmother still sharing her wisdom, to a father teaching his own children how to shape and press tortillas—the thread of family holds strong. And it continues, one tortilla at a time.

RECIPE

Ingredients:

- 1,000 grams of all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons of salt
- 1 teaspoon of baking powder
- 160 grams of shortening
- 640 milliliters (ml) of water

Instructions:

1. In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour, salt, and baking powder. Stir until the

TRASH & RECYCLING PICKUP SCHEDULE

The Green Residential TRASH receptacles are collected every **Tuesday and Friday**.

The blue RECYCLE bins are also collected every **Tuesday and Friday**.

The large black General Solid Waste Community Containers are emptied on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Safety First! Please keep any curious children away from the Compactor Truck as it feeds contents into the truck.

Recyclable materials are also collected by both *solid waste* and *horizontal maintenance personnel*, in conjunction with general trash collection. Currently the island only recycles glass, aluminum, metal, and bulk organic materials. **Cardboard and plastics are not recycled materials on Kwajalein.** These items should be placed into the general trash stream for disposal/incineration.



Residential users will be given a **green trash receptacle** and a smaller **blue receptacle** for recyclable materials. It is requested that residences place their recyclable items into the blue containers, and stack larger materials next to the bins. Lawn clippings and leaves should be bagged and placed next to bins. Palm fronds and coconuts should also be stacked up next to the bins for removal by horizontal maintenance personnel.

ingredients are well mixed.

2. Cut the shortening into the dry ingredients using a pastry blender or two knives. Continue cutting the shortening into the flour until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

3. Gradually add the hot water to the flour mixture, stirring with a wooden spoon until a soft dough forms. The dough should be slightly sticky to the touch.

4. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead it for 5-10 minutes, or until it is smooth and elastic.

5. Place the dough in a large plastic bag or cover it with a damp cloth and let it rest for 20-30 minutes. This will allow the gluten in the dough to relax, making it easier to roll out.

6. After the dough has rested, divide it into 45-50 gram portions and roll each portion into a ball. You should have approximately 30 balls of dough.

7. Roll out each ball of dough into a thin circle, using

a rolling pin or tortilla press. If using a rolling pin, lightly flour the surface to prevent the dough from sticking. If using a tortilla press, place the ball of dough between two sheets of plastic wrap to keep it from sticking to the press.

8. Cook the tortillas on a hot, dry griddle or skillet for about 30-60 seconds on each side, or until they are lightly browned and puffed.

9. Transfer the cooked tortillas to a plate lined with a clean kitchen towel and cover them with another towel to keep them warm and moist.

10. Serve the tortillas warm, or store them in a plastic bag or airtight container for later use.

This recipe will yield approximately 30 tortillas, depending on the size of each tortilla. Homemade tortillas are a delicious and versatile addition to any meal.

COMMUNITY ACUITY INTERNATIONAL DEMONSTRATES TSUNAMI-READY EMERGENCY RESPONSE ON KWAJALEIN

In response to a tsunami bulletin issued for the Marshall Islands following a powerful 8.8 magnitude earthquake off the coast of Kamchatka, Russia, Kwajalein Hospital mobilized emergency protocols with precision and professionalism.

While experts confirmed that Kwajalein Atoll's steep reef drop-off and surrounding ocean depths mitigate the likelihood of devastating wave impact, the hospital took no chances—initiating a full-scale mass casualty response to prepare for a worst-case scenario.

The National Weather Station's bulletin projected wave activity ranging from 0.3 to 1

meter (up to 3.3 feet) above tidal levels. Though the island's natural geography lowers risk, the potential for up to 6.5 feet of sea-level rise prompted immediate action.

At the center of the response was Kwajalein Hospital, led by Mass Casualty Incident (MCI) Coordinator Christina Leder, who activated the hospital's rehearsed MCI plan without hesitation. "Efficiency and coordination are everything in an MCI," said Leder. "The moment the call goes out, we move together."

Within an hour, all essential equipment was relocated to the second floor, the emergency room was transferred upstairs in case of flooding, the upstairs conference room was converted into a storage and staging area, non-emer-



gent appointments were canceled to ensure full staffing, and all hospital personnel, including TDY staff, reported for duty—bringing changes of clothes and passports in accordance with readiness protocols.

“This team moved the entire hospital into emergency configuration in about an hour. I had goosebumps watching it. I’m incredibly proud of our team,” said Hospital Business Administrator Diana Mosenge. “I also want to acknowledge the exemplary leadership of Mike Reusse, Critical Care Flight Nurse, he was a steady and decisive presence throughout the response.”

Nurse Manager Savanna Gastineau added, “This is what we train for. We hold mass casualty drills two times a year with internal training quarterly, and it showed today. Everyone stepped in, even people who’ve never done this before. Volunteers showed up. It was a true team effort.”

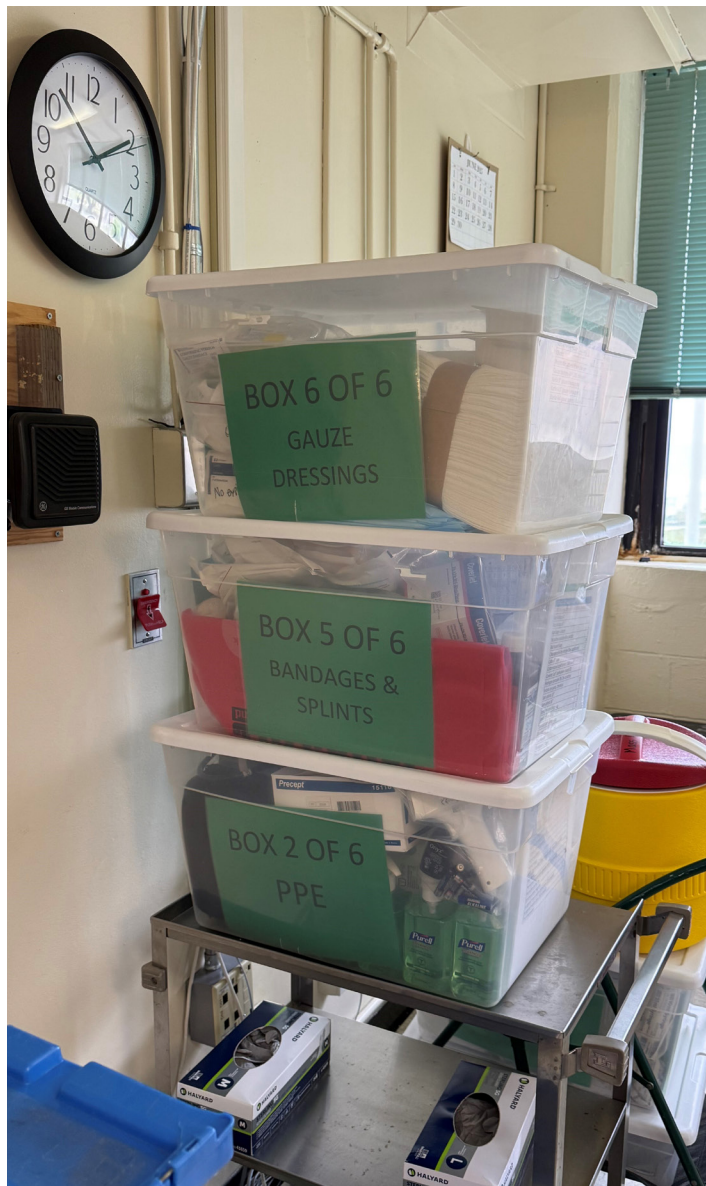
Behind the scenes, Hospital Administrator Carrie Jimenez steadily kept leadership, and USAG-KA apprised of operations step-by-step, ensuring complete situational awareness across agencies.

Hospital leadership reported 100% staff turnout via the emergency call tree—an “all-hands-on-deck” moment, with team members returning from scheduled leave and even off-island travel.

Should casualties have arrived, the hospital was prepared to implement a triage system—green for non-urgent, yellow for urgent, and red for critical emergencies. In tsunami scenarios, red cases typically involve drowning or trauma from debris, and the team was ready to manage them.

“This is a remote island,” said Leder. “Our resources are limited, but our people are resourceful. When lives are on the line, this team shows up. Every time.”

Ultimately, the tsunami warning passed without incident. No wave activity reached the atoll, and daily life resumed. But the response by the hospital team reinforced the island’s capability to respond swiftly and professionally in moments of uncertainty—transforming a warning into a powerful demonstration of readiness.▲

August 2025 marks the sixteenth year of dedicated focus on Antiterrorism Awareness Month, a critical period for reinforcing the security of our Army communities.

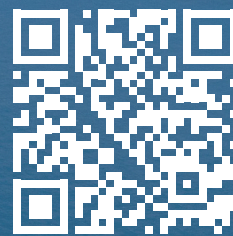
Our capacity to deter adversaries and prevail in any operational environment - from competitive engagement to large-scale combat - hinges on the proactive security posture of every USARPAC team member.

How to dress in the RMI. Out of respect for the Marshallese culture, residents are asked to dress appropriately when visiting Ebeye, Third Island, or anywhere within Kwajalein Atoll. Women should wear clothing to cover shoulders and knees. None are permitted to wear shorts when visiting churches on Ebeye. Men should wear long slacks to church.

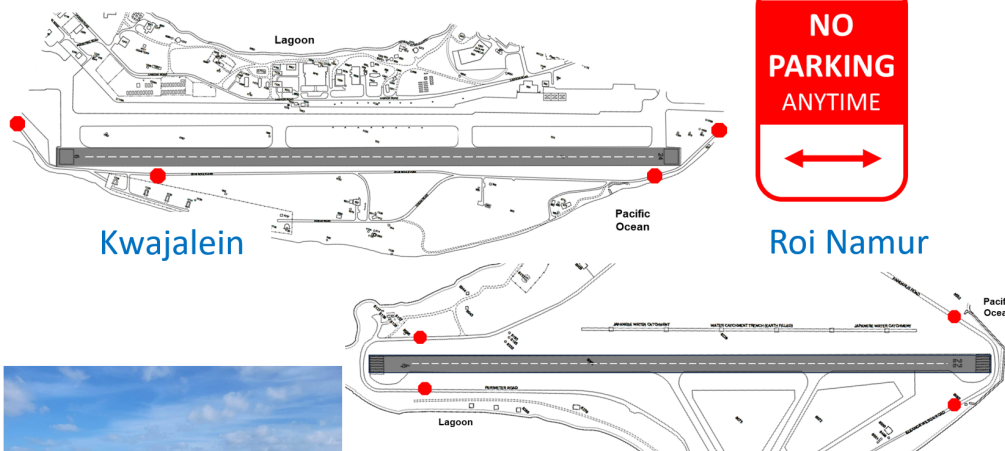

E-wareness: Trimming and Removal of Vegetation

A *Vegetation Trimming and Removal Permit* is required for the following actions:

- Complete removal of any established vegetation.
- Major trimming of vegetation, defined as greater than 20% of each plant/tree volume.

Vegetation permits are obtained through the V2X Environmental Department by calling 480-0722.

Removal of root balls below six inches requires an approved Dig Permit from the Service Desk (480-3550).

UV Safety Awareness Month — Protect Your Vision This July!

July is UV Safety Awareness Month, and with Kwajalein's strong sunbeams at their peak, safeguarding your eyes against UV exposure is more important than ever. Our trusted eye doctor, Dr. Will Black, answers KEY questions to help you keep your vision healthy year round.

1. How does UV exposure affect long-term eye health, and what conditions can it cause or worsen?

Long-term UV exposure accelerates aging and damage to critical eye structures. Over time, it can lead to:

- **Cataracts** (clouding of the lens)
- **Macular degeneration** (progressive loss of central vision)
- **Pterygium** (a growth on the cornea, "surfer's eye")
- **Photokeratitis** (corneal "sunburn," causing pain, redness, and swelling)
- Potentially **Cancers** of the eyelid and surrounding skin.

Even brief, intense UV exposure—like glare off reflected water—can cause acute damage, which contributes to cumulative harms.

2. What are the most effective ways to protect our eyes from UV damage, especially in sunny or tropical environments?

To minimize UV exposure:

- **Wear sunglasses rated "100% UV" or UV 400**, blocking UVA & UVB up to 400 nm.
- **Choose wraparound or large-frame styles** to protect against side UV rays and protect surrounding skin.
- **Add a wide-brimmed hat**—this can cut UV around your eyes by ~50%
- **Avoid peak sun hours** (10 a.m.–4 p.m.) and monitor UV index levels above 4!
- **Evaluate your sunglasses** if they are older, scratched, or if you are unsure of their UV protection and proper fit.

Bonus: Consider **polarized lenses** for glare-heavy activities! Remember, they also must also be 100% UV protective in addition to the polarization.

3. Are all sunglasses equally protective, or should we look for specific features or certifications when choosing UV-blocking eyewear?

Not all sunglasses offer the same level of protection. When choosing:

- Look for labels stating "100% UV protection" or "UV 400."
- Lens tint darkness does not equal UV safety—always check the UV rating.
- Inspect optical quality: no distortions—check tile lines through your lenses.
- Polycarbonate lenses offer impact resistance ideal for active wear.

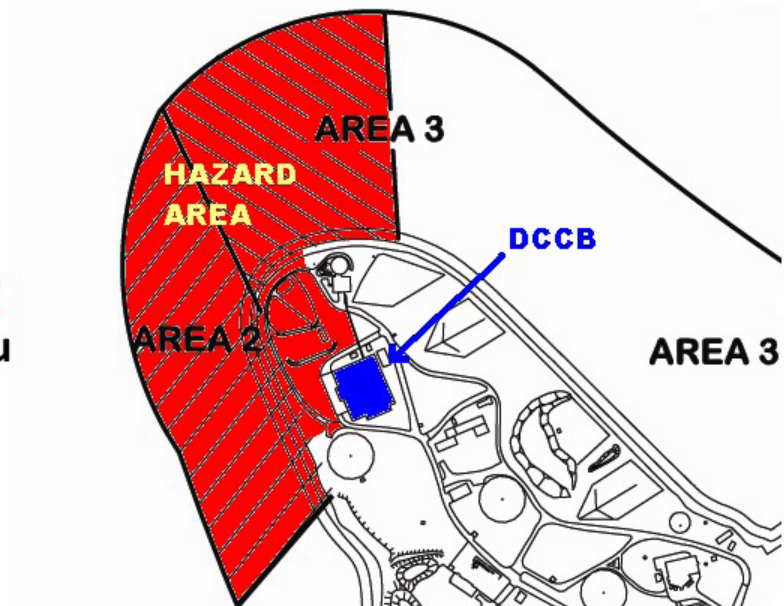

WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

For the first half of August, the weather station recorded 1.68 inches of rain about 2.68 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received about 33 inches of precipitation, which is more than 12.5 inches below normal for the year. Kwajalein Atoll remains in a moderate drought. There will be increased shower coverage through the evening due to speed convergence of the winds along with ENE-E-ESE troughing in the direction of the winds. Look for another bounce in shower coverage on the second half of Saturday through the first half of Sunday due to troughing in the winds. Expect an augmented shot at shower coverage in about a week as well. The thunderstorm risk will get the best boost on the second half of Saturday through Sunday morning with the troughing and slightly better shear conditions. For the overnight, the vertical shear will be a bit high, but there are some decent upper-level conditions to assist in thunderstorm development to our north. There were no thunderstorm days over the last seven days. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station or thunder

heard. The Madden/Julian Oscillation (MJO) remains quite well established globally. It is currently negative for the RMI, which has a repressive effect on shower growth, but will return to its positive phase, favoring precipitation coverage by the end of the month. It will also bring about constructive interference and enhance tropical cyclone development for the western Pacific by the end of the month. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is becoming more well established for the next few days, approaching the central RMI from the south, and will help bring our shower coverage back up some. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) is in ENSO-neutral conditions as a whole. There has been a recent episode of cooler than normal sea-surface temperatures (SST) between the RMI and the Date Line. This along with the negative MJO are the reason for the now drier than normal August.

Tropical Cyclones:

None for the RMI. We are now in the tropical cyclone season for the western Pacific and entering the peak of the season as we move into the second half of August. Look for a slightly higher chances of tropical cyclone development for the western Pacific

as we approach September first.

Damaging West Winds / Westerly Swell:

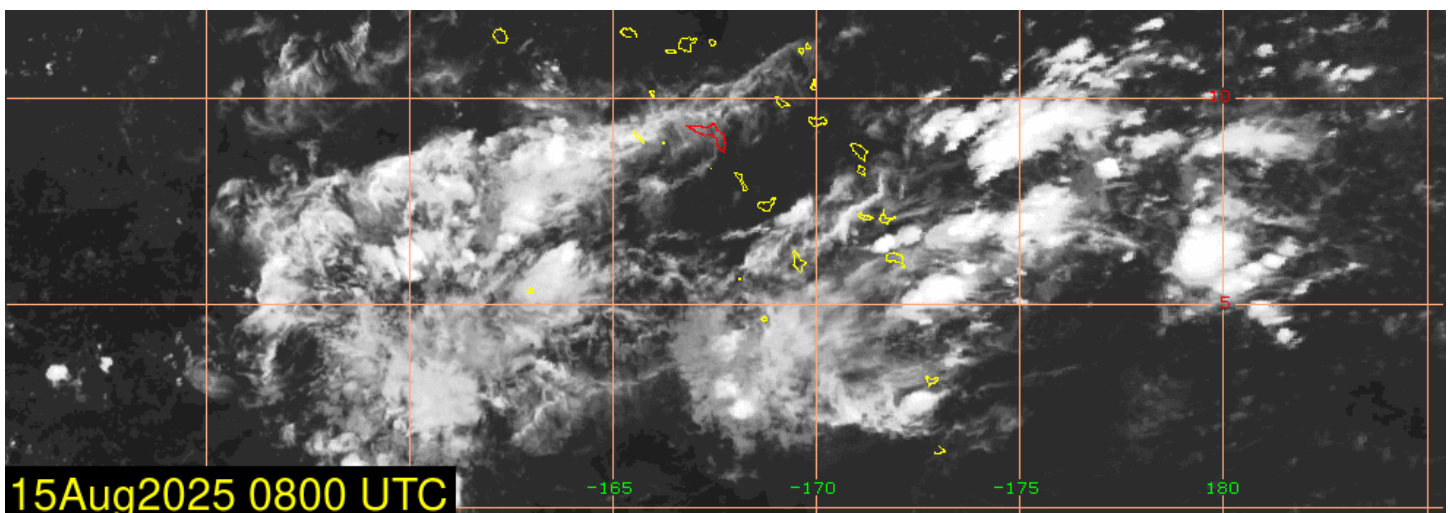
Low risk: Eastern Micronesia and the RMI are expected to be east-northeast to east-southeast trade wind dominant.

Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island:

We are waning toward a half-moon on the 16th and a neap tide situation. All high tides will be below four feet until the 21st. This is the time of the year when we see higher swells affecting the south side of the island due to powerful winter storm transiting between Australia and Antarctica. Winds: today represents the end of doldrum level winds for the next few days, as a strengthening Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) to our south steepens the pressure gradient between itself and higher-pressure regions to the north. Tomorrow and Saturday are looking at ENE-E-ESE winds between 11 and 16 knots with some gusts possible to the upper teens. When the winds are out of the ESE, they will be a bit lighter at about 10 knots. On Monday, expect the winds to come back down to the mid to upper single digits. Gusty outflow winds are possible

as a result of heavy showers just off to the east for short periods. There is low chance that a Small Craft Advisory (SCA) could be issued on the open lagoon for a short period during any strong showers just to the east of the lagoon. High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days. Look for a bump in the ENE swells from tropical cyclone activity to the southeast of Hawai'i in the early morning of the 16th for a short period to 5-8 ft.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product. ▴

WEATHER DISCUSSION

A trade wind trough moves through Kwajalein Atoll to end the week and start the weekend, bringing increased shower activity and wind speeds along with it. This trough, driven by the redeveloped Inter-tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ), will bring favorable conditions for deep convection, heavy rain, strong gusts, and potential thunderstorms. Shower activity should begin tapering off after midnight Saturday. Sunday morning could see a bump in shower coverage as a weaker atmospheric wave moves through the atoll, but conditions should begin to dry out during the late

morning hours, and winds will slacken to the upper single digits. By Monday, the ITCZ is expected to become fragmented and retreat southward, allowing a drier pattern and lighter winds to begin the work week.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with isolated showers and a possible stray thunderstorm. Winds ENE-ESE at 7-12 knots with higher gusts possible near showers.

MONDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E 9-14 knots with higher gusts possible near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Mostly dry conditions will remain over

the atoll to begin the workweek as the Inter-tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) becomes fragmented and moves out of the area. Winds to start the week will remain out of the northeast in the upper single digits. Winds will become light and variable by mid-week, and pleasant conditions will persist. By Friday into Saturday, a modest atmospheric wave will its way toward the atoll, bringing increased winds and showers for the tail end of the workweek into next weekend. ▲
