



USAKA NEW LEADERSHIP, NEW HOPE: KWAJALEIN TOWN HALL OUTLINES PATH FORWARD

HOURGLASS REPORT

The Kwajalein Atoll community recently came together for a town hall meeting that was anything but ordinary. On Wednesday, August 13, 2025, residents packed the High School Multi-Purpose Room to welcome the new U.S. Army Garrison -Kwajalein Atoll (USAG-KA), Commander Col. Matthew J. Cannon and Command Sergeant Major Stanley L. Jackson, and hear a vision for the future.

Despite a minimal agenda, the message from the new leadership was clear and full of promise. Col. Cannon

wasted no time in confirming his commitment to a thorough review of current policies over his first 60 to 90 days. He assured the community that any revisions would only come after a deep understanding of their original justification.

Cannon also candidly addressed the persistent challenges of island life, from slow shipping and limited supplies to communication hurdles. He then swiftly transitioned to a recap of recent impactful events, highlighting the value of Kwajalein as the missile test sight and the resilience of its workers.



He recognized the community's strong response to recent challenges, including a tsunami advisory, a shark encounter, and the tragic loss of a valued RMI team member. With a heartfelt tone, he praised task force leaders and residents for their timely efforts and compassionate actions.

Looking ahead, Col. Can-

non revealed his request for more funds to tackle critical infrastructure projects, improve resource prioritization and integrate strategic planning for other core projects. To keep the community informed, he also committed to providing biweekly or bimonthly updates on these projects. Senior Garrison leadership through visits to

the island will remain highly engaged in understanding, supporting, and improving the infrastructure and quality of life on Kwajalein.

The town hall meeting was a powerful display of transparency, commitment, and a shared sense of purpose. It fostered a balance between acknowledging current challenges and instilling confidence in a unified path forward toward progression and stability for the Kwajalein Atoll.

DR. WILL BLACK: BRINGING QUALITY EYE

CARE TO KWAJALEIN

HOURGLASS REPORT

Dr. Will Black, an experienced Optometric Physician, discovered his passion for medicine in high school and quickly found his niche in optometry during his first year of college. He was drawn not only to the clinical side of the profession but also to the personal, one-on-one connection with patients and the business aspect of private practice.

Over the course of 35 years, Dr. Black built a successful optometry career in Idaho, owning and operating five private practices. In 2019, all five practices were acquired by private equity, allowing him to retire in 2022. That same year, he accepted a unique opportunity to provide remote optometry ser-

vices on Kwajalein, thanks to a referral from a friend—formerly a dental hygienist on the island who later became the hospital administrator.

Initially, Dr. Black came to Kwaj for a three-month stint. That experience led to a semi-annual arrangement: he now visits twice a year—mid-July to mid-August and mid-January to mid-February—offering full-scope eye care services to the island's residents. Each month-long visit includes three weeks of scheduled clinic appointments.

What began with cumbersome, manual appointment scheduling—relying on voicemails and callbacks—has since evolved into a streamlined process through an online scheduling platform. This system allows patients to book annual exams,

disease checks, and other services in advance, while also receiving automated reminders. During his current visit, nearly 70% of his patients are new—demonstrating a growing demand for optometry services on the island. Kwajeyes.com is his website for booking appointments, and he is currently onsite for appointments through August 16.

Dr. Black provides comprehensive eye care, including vision correction, treatment of eye diseases, and prescription eyewear. One ongoing challenge has been the timely delivery of glasses and contact lenses to the island. In the past, shipments sometimes ended up as far away as Hong Kong or Japan. Despite these logistical hurdles, Dr. Black offers an impressive selection of over 250 eyeglass frames and 150 sunglasses.

He has also introduced a valuable educational component to his Kwaj Eyecare by partnering with Arizona College of Optometry to bring fourth-year optometry intern

doctors like current incumbent, Dr. Jared Baldridge to the island, giving him handson experience and academic credit. Additionally, he has helped modernize the clinic by transporting up-to-date diagnostic equipment to Kwaj, which remains on-site for continued use during his visits.

"The most rewarding part of this journey is the sense of community," Dr. Black shared as he reflected on the opportunity to educate the kindergarten class during their first eye exam visit this week. He deeply values the relationships he has built with longterm residents and enjoys welcoming new faces each time he returns. Beyond the clinic, he takes full advantage of the island's natural beauty-spending his downtime scuba diving, snorkeling, and simply relaxing by the ocean and the pool. **Y**

TRASH & RECYCLING PICKUP SCHEDULE

The Green Residential TRASH receptacles are collected every **Tuesday and Friday**. The blue RECYCLE bins are also collected every **Tuesday and Friday**.

The large black General Solid Waste Community Containers are emptied on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Safety First! Please keep any curious children away from the Compactor Truck as it feeds contents into the truck.

Recyclable materials are also collected by both solid waste and horizontal maintenance personnel, in conjunction with general trash collection. Currently the island only recycles glass, aluminum, metal, and bulk organic materials. Cardboard and plastics are not recycled materials on Kwajalein. These items should be placed into the general trash stream for disposal/incineration.



Residential users will be given a green trash receptacle and a smaller blue receptacle for recyclable materials. It is requested that residences place their recyclable items into the blue containers, and stack larger materials next to the bins. Lawn clippings and leaves should be bagged and placed next to bins. Palm fronds and coconuts should also be stacked up next to the bins for removal by horizontal maintenance nersonnel.

RISING TIDES: THE MARSHALL ISLANDS MAKES ITS INTERNATIONAL SOCCER DEBUT

The last nation on Earth without a soccer team, until now. The Republic of the Marshall Islands is finally stepping onto the global pitch. This August, the Marshall Islands Soccer Federation (MISF) launches its first men's national team into international play with two debut matches: August 14 against the U.S. Virgin Islands and August 16 against Turks and Caicos, both hosted in Springdale, Arkansas.

This historic moment marks a major milestone for one of the last sovereign nations in the world without a FIFA or regional football confederation affiliation. And for those on Kwajalein and across the islands, AFN will air both games live and replay them multiple times on Kwaj TV channel 20.2, allowing our community to witness history unfold.

While the MISF was officially formed in 2021, true momentum came in late 2022 when Lloyd Owers, a British UEFA-licensed coach, and Matt Webb, now the federation's Marketing & Commercial Director, connected with MISF President Shem Livai. Inspired by the opportunity to grow something from the ground up, they joined forces and began their work in earnest in January 2023.

Today, Owers serves as both Technical Director and Head Coach of the Marshall Islands men's national soccer team. "Most people wanted to see us play a full 11 V 11 game," said Owers. "It wasn't the right time before—but now it is."

Over the past year, MISF has been developing the sport in Majuro, establishing futbol leagues and identi-

fying local talent. With increasing support from Marshallese communities in the U.S., especially in Kwajalein and Arkansas, the federation recognized that the time was right to take the next step.

"This is about more than one game," Owers explained. "It's the next step toward our goal of full confederation membership in Oceania Football Confederation (OFC) or Association Football Club (AFC)."

The debut squad features players from Majuro, Kwajalein, and the U.S., all selected based on Federation International Football Association (FIFA) eligibility. Players were found through a combination of local scouting, social media outreach, and community connections.

"We're representing Marshallese people all over the world," said Owers. "Our team reflects the global Marshallese diaspora and the movement of our people throughout history."

Support from Scott Hill, V2X Community Services Director and MISF board member and the community on Kwajalein helped identify eligible players and expand the





federation's reach.

Pulling together an international team from multiple countries is no easy feat, especially with zero formal funding. The project has been fueled entirely by grassroots efforts: donors, fundraising campaigns, small sponsors, and the unwavering dedication of a tight-knit leadership team.

"It's been a mammoth task," said Owers. "For six months, myself, Matt Webb, Press and Communication Director Justin Walley, and volunteer Woody Watson, have pushed this project forward, step by step."

Springdale, Arkansas was chosen for the debut because it's home to one of the largest Marshallese populations outside of the Marshall Islands. The local response has been enthusiastic, with community members traveling in from across the U.S. to support the team.

"It's incredible to see the community come together for this," said Webb. "We want these games to be a celebration."

The matches are part of the Outrigger Challenge Cup, a tournament created by the MISF. The first edition was held in 2024 in Majuro, featuring futsal matches between the Marshall Islands, FSM, and Kiribati. This year marks the expansion into full

11-a-side international play.

MISF's long-term goals include confederation membership in OFC or AFC, establishing youth leagues and training infrastructure in the RMI, stationing a permanent coach on-island to grow local talent, and creating a pathway for Marshallese athletes worldwide to represent their nation.

"Sport plays a huge role in national identity," said Owers. "It gives people something to believe in and rally around." To the next generation of Marshallese players, Owers offers encouragement, "Keep playing. Keep showing interest. Fill out our eligibility form. We want to find you and help you represent your country."

For the team, the fans, and the country, this debut is more than just two games—it's a declaration: The Marshall Islands has arrived on the world soccer stage.

"All of it makes me proud," said Owers. "We've gone from nothing to something big in a short time. And we're just getting started."



Participants are encouraged to get creative with boat designs and themes. From pirate ships to rocket ships—if


you can imagine it and build it out of cardboard, it's fair game. But remember: it's not just about style—it's about staying afloat and paddling across the finish line.

As one of last year's participants shared, "Our boat







WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK agoon for a

Discussion:

So far in August, the weather station recorded 2.93 inches of rain about 3.78 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received about 34.5 inches of precipitation, which is more than 13.5 inches below normal for the year, keeping Kwajalein Atoll in drought conditions. Troughing in the winds ENE-E-ESE will keep increased shower coverage in the picture this afternoon as well as a bump in the thunderstorm risk for the central RMI with a lull tomorrow. The trend is for increased shower coverage as we move toward the end of the month. Monday morning will see a bounce as well as the 28th through the 30th. The thunderstorm risk is always elevated with heavy showers in late August. From the 26th through the 30th, the atmospheric waves (troughing) will give the atoll an even greater risk of thunderstorms. There was one thunderstorm day over the last seven days for Kwajalein Island and another this morning for Roi-Namur. A thunderstorm day is defined as an

"in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station or thunder heard. The Madden/Julian Oscillation (MJO) remains a bit uncertain, but there are indications of a robust phase for the Pacific. The trend is now positive for the MJO, which will help to enhance rainfall coverage for the RMI moving toward the 1st of September. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) will remain modestly active in the vicinity of the central RMI and allow for troughing to pass over the atoll with augmented shower coverage during the next seven days. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) is in **ENSO-neutral** conditions as a whole. There has been a recent episode of cooler than normal sea-surface temperatures (SST) in August between the RMI and the Date Line. This along with the negative MJO are the reasons for the now drier than normal August.

Tropical Cyclones:

None for the RMI. We are now in the tropical cyclone season for the western Pacific and entering the peak of the season as we move toward September. Look for a slightly higher chances of tropical cyclone development for the western Pacific as we approach September first.


Damaging West Winds / Westerly Swell:

Low risk: Eastern Micronesia and the RMI are expected to be east-northeast to east-southeast trade wind dominant.

Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island and Winds:

The New-Moon will occur on Saturday with a max high tide of 4.6 feet the next day. This is the time of the year when we see higher swells affecting the south side of the island due to powerful winter storm transiting between Australia and Antarctica. Winds: As the afternoon progresses, we will see the winds fall down to near doldrum levels around 4-8 knots into tomorrow. . Winds will recover to the low teens on Saturday afternoon and climb higher to the middle teens on Sunday. These winds will come down some on Monday as they veer ENE-E_ESE on Monday. Gusty outflow winds are possible as a result of heavy showers just off to the east for short periods. There is a chance that a Small Craft Advisory (SCA) could be issued short period during any strong showers just to the east of the lagoon. High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days. We will see some very long period southern swells from major winter storms between Antarctica and Australia, but the heights are only about a foot the 24th through the 25th.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

WEATHER DIS-CUSSION

Occasional showers are expected across Kwajalein Atoll to end the work week and start the weekend. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is reorganizing near the south-central RMI. While the peak storm activity may stay south of the atoll over the weekend, the ITCZ will remain in close enough proximity to the atoll to send a series of atmospheric waves through the region, bringing a wetter pattern over the weekend and into early next week. The next atmospheric wave is expected to arrive early Saturday morning, increasing shower and thunderstorm coverage and bringing moderate northeasterly winds. A trade wind surge arrives Saturday evening and extends into Sunday, increasing winds into the upper teens with isolated showers during the day. By mid-afternoon Sunday, winds will decrease back to the upper single digits and shift to the east-southeast as the atmospheric wave pushes through the area. Showers will increase once again early Monday. Monday afternoon the atmospheric wave exits the area and winds will decrease further to light and variable with periods of calm. Showers should taper off Monday afternoon,

leading to a generally drier second half of the day.

ŚATURDAY

Partly sunny with isolated showers and a possible stray thunderstorm. Winds NE-E at 10-15 knots, increasing to 14-18 knots during the evening and overnight, with higher gusts possible near showers.

SUNDAY

Mostly cloudy with isolated showers and a possible stray thunderstorm. Winds NE-E at 13-17 knots, decreasing to ENE-ESE 8-13 knots in the afternoon, with higher gusts possible near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with widely scattered showers and a possible stray thunderstorm early, decreasing to isolated showers in the afternoon. Winds SE-E 7-12 knots with higher gusts possible near showers, becoming light and variable.

NEXT WEEK

An active Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) may shift north over the Atoll, increasing shower activity for

the week. Winds will be from the northeast in the upper single digits through mid-week, and reduce to calm, doldrum-like conditions for the latter part of the week. Shower coverage will generally increase as the week progresses. Stray thunderstorms may accompany some of these showers.
