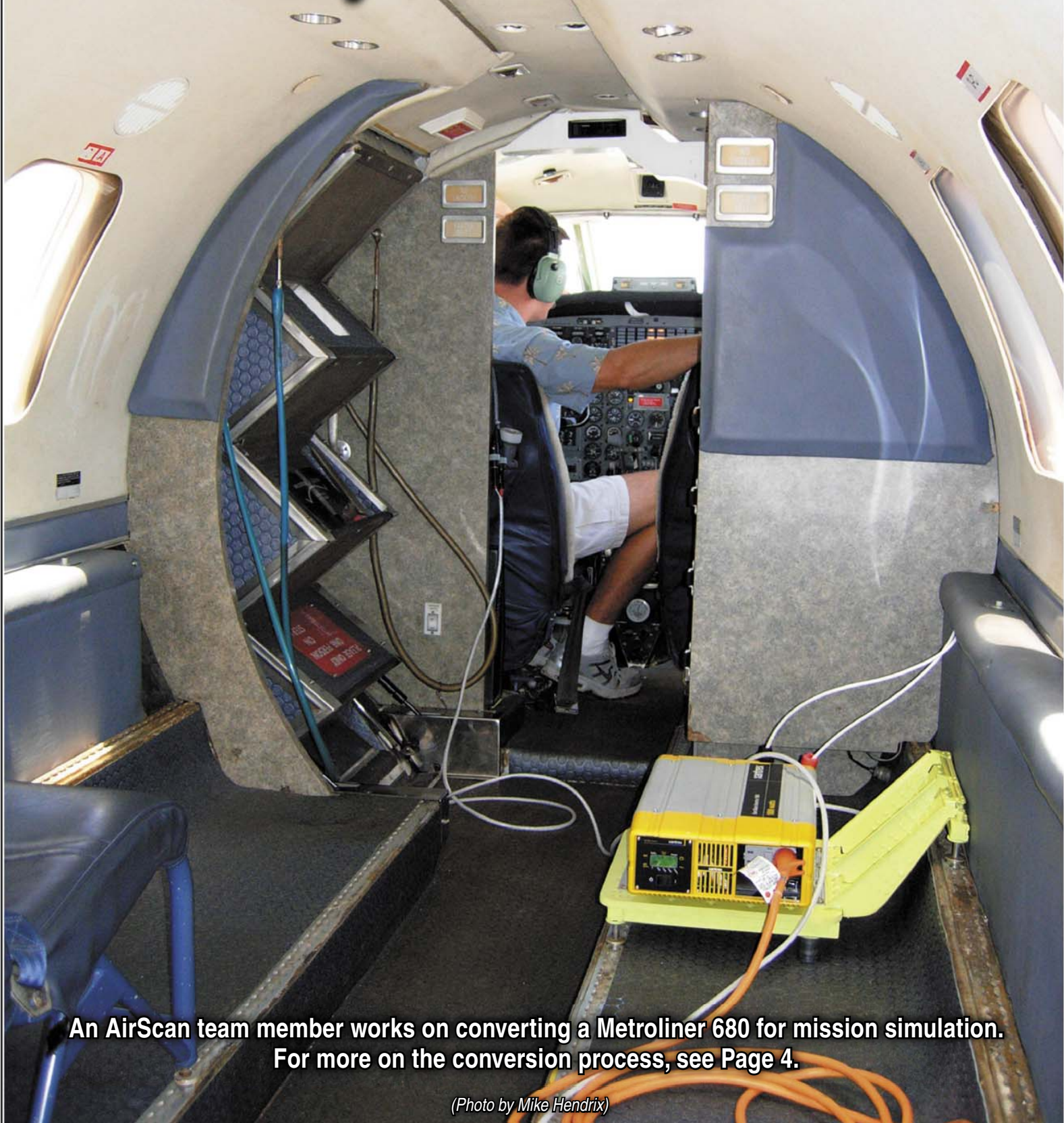

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Ebeye teachers observe Kwajalein classes

Jabro School teachers spend two days in Kwaj schools learning new methods, skills, styles

Sometimes the easiest way to find inspiration is to find it right under your nose. For teachers from the Jabro Private School on Ebeye inspiration came from an invitation to observe Kwajalein teachers in their classrooms.

Fourteen teachers from the Jabro school spent two afternoons observing classrooms, talking with students and sharing ideas with Kwajalein teachers. The visits to George Seitz Elementary and the Jr. and Sr. High Schools, arranged by former Kwajalein teacher Jane Premo and kindergarten teacher Judy Kirchner, were the second in two years.

"We had done some mini inservice meetings with the teachers at Jabro on Ebeye in the past and shared ideas about classroom organization, lesson planning, using pocket charts, and other tips we had learned along the way as teachers," Kirchner said. "When talking with the teachers in some of those sessions, they expressed an interest in seeing how classrooms on Kwaj operate."

"I really believe that teachers learn a lot from other teachers, how other teachers interact with their students and how they deliver or teach, all the skills and styles," said Jabro Private School Principal Kiorong Sam.

Teachers were matched to their Kwajalein counterparts by subject areas or grade levels by Premo and escorted around campus. The Jabro teachers were able to spend time following classes talking with the teachers they observed.

"We value education for both our communities," said Kirchner, explaining the reason for arranging the visit and suggestions by Kwajalein teachers for more opportunities for observation as well

as other avenues for teacher development.

After the observation, Jabro teachers were invited to Kirchner's home for dessert and a discussion on their observations and the methods and ideas they could implement in their Ebeye classrooms.

"I like the way Mrs. 'O' [Oyamot] handles and teaches her math students," said Nena Buensuesco, high school math teacher from Ebeye, "disciplinary with excellent teaching result in best learning outcomes and a better person."

Rogan Kibin, fourth- and fifth-grade teacher, was surprised to see the sixth grade Kwajalein teachers reading to their students. He never associated that teaching tool with older children and thought it was worth exploring with his students.

The students in Rubin Tekita's classroom should be forewarned. Tekita was particularly interested in borrowing the idea of a classroom homework chart to keep track of missed homework assignments.

"Besides various tips for running their classrooms and developing lessons, the Jabro teachers expressed how invigorated they were after these sessions," said Premo. "Once again they were excited to get back into their own classrooms to try again!"

AirScan, MIT team up for conversion of Metroliner to simulate actual missions

Step inside Metroliner 680, waiting to whisk commuters to Roi-Namur, and you would have no clue that just a month ago this aircraft was customized with eight antennas to fly test profiles with the *Worthy* for U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site.

The *Worthy*, a former U.S. naval ship assigned to USAKA in the early 1990s, supports a variety of missions that involve data collection and communication with airborne assets such as missiles and aircraft.

The plane modification began when the Kwajalein Mobile Range Safety System, the mission related portion of the *Worthy*, recently upgraded the telemetry, communications, networks, range safety and ship subsystems. KMRSS needed a cost-effective way to test the capabilities of the upgrades before heading out to

Hawaii in support of several missions. A custom-configured aircraft simulating a missile and other mission assets fit the profile.

"Utilizing the Metroliner allowed us to emulate some of the characteristics of a real mission," said Dr. Shawn Ohler, Massachusetts's Institute of Technology/Lincoln Labs Technical staff.

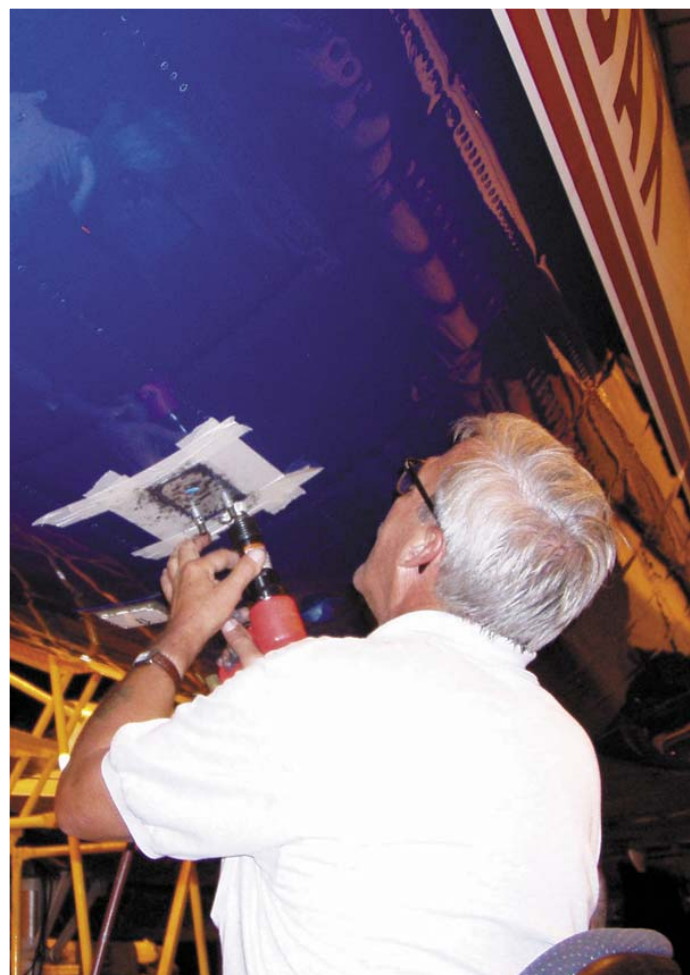
"Airscan generated the design package, obtained Federal Aviation Administration approval, procured the antennas, power inverter, cables and equipment racks, and installed these items all at their own expense," said Mark Thimsen, KRS Systems engineer and *Worthy* Upgrade Project lead.

"Using existing airborne test beds would have required modifying them for our purposes and then having the aircraft along with flight and support crew resident on Kwajalein for several months," said Bob Hamel, MIT/LL Technical staff. "That would have been prohibitively expensive."

Once the parts arrived, AirScan identified Aircraft 680 for modification, one of its three planes, and took out all the seats. Hamel set to work planning how to configure the experimental hardware on the plane for the sole purpose of testing the upgraded equipment on the *Worthy*. The AirScan maintenance staff started the process of determining the placement of eight antennas, drilling holes in the body of the plane to attach the antennas and fabricating custom racks to hold the experimental hardware.

The maintenance staff had to undertake many considerations when attaching the various antennas to the plane. If an antenna was placed on the wrong side, a vehicle could tear off the antenna loading cargo on the plane.

"The actual modification, once all the materials were

here, took us ten days," Lollar said. The unexpected speed at which the team performed the modification included 14-hour days.

"We had to do 14-hour days because the maintenance on the other planes didn't go away," Bill Givens, AirScan director of maintenance said. "In fact, when you only have two airplanes doing the work of three, maintenance on those two planes goes up."

"I was really surprised at the amount of equipment we put in this aircraft, the amount of hardwiring we added and the amount of holes added," continued Givens, "and we haven't had a single problem."

Once the plane was completely modified, it was ready to test the upgraded systems. AirScan pilots flew the plane while two or three technicians and engineers operated the equipment in the now bare fuselage.

"[Sometimes] the ship stayed in port, fired up all the equipment they could in port and we would fly racetrack patterns over the top of the ship," Lollar said. "The MIT guys would set up and give us these fairly complicated series of coordinates. It was not uncommon for them to put in 60 way points, where you fly from designated point to point. The pilots had to hit those way points within a specific time frame."

Initially MIT asked for 22 test flights, but AirScan pilots were able to perform the required tasks in six flights.

October rain fell just short of new record

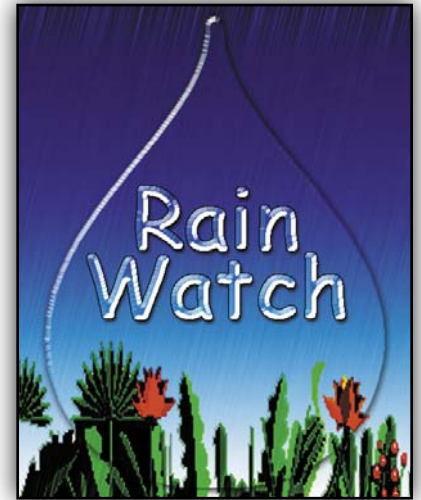
As Kwajalein residents probably recall, the month of October was very soggy. October finished with 19.91 inches of rain, and while that was well above the normal of 11.46 inches, it fell just short of the record of 20.05 inches, set back in 1964. Oct. 31 started out looking like a new record was in the offing, but as the day progressed, the rain dried up and the weather turned out relatively pleasant, much to the delight of trick-or-treaters.

Having been so close to breaking the 40-year old record, last month has earned the title of the second wettest October, since record-keeping of Kwajalein's weather observations began back in 1945. In addition to being near record-breaking levels, October was the first month of 2006 to end with a yearly surplus of rainfall, and the best of three months to end with a monthly surplus. At the beginning of the month, Kwajalein faced a deficit of 6.11 inches of rain for the year, but managed to end it 2.34 inches higher than normal for the year, racking up an 8.45 inches gain in just 31 days. Some of those days may have seemed longer and drearier than others, as a week's worth of days received over an inch of rainfall, the rainiest of which was Oct. 7 with 3.25 inches.

October was not only wet, but lightning lit up the sky numerous times and several tropical disturbances came calling during the month. All of these phenomena can be attributed to the presence of El Nino, or an unusual warming of the waters of the central and eastern Pacific. When El Nino develops, the warm water helps to fuel convection, and it also allows the monsoon trough, which normally stays west of Kwajalein, to infiltrate our area. In fact, the monsoon trough extended across the

northern Marshalls for much of October. The monsoon trough not only brings rain and lightning, but west winds which buffeted Kwajalein on several occasions in October. The accompanying large westerly swells washed up on the beach in many places, bringing debris onto roads and flooding some areas. It wasn't all bad though. Children and adults alike were treated to a rare opportunity to ride the waves at Emon Beach on Oct. 7 and 8 as high tides allowed the swells to cross the west reef and break along the swimming area.

So what's to come in the months ahead? El Nino is still going strong, and computer models indicate it will continue into the winter. Since this El Nino started late in the year, its effects will likely continue later than usual. That means above normal rainfall and an increased potential for tropical cyclones to develop near Kwajalein can be expected through the end of the year. The rainfall excesses should then be followed by a period of drought lasting, on average, up to a year. After the 1997 El Nino, Kwajalein went into a drought that lasted nearly two years and racked up a deficit of over 50 inches. After a wet and wild fall in 2006, history would suggest that 2007 will be dry, perhaps very dry, on Kwajalein.



Kwajalein residents urged to prepare for severe weather

While unusually warm water has been in place around the Marshall Islands since this summer, the warm waters have finally extended to the South American coast and thus El Nino is now officially occurring. Water temperatures near Kwajalein are currently 1.2 degrees Celsius above normal, and computer models indicate that El Nino will continue through the end of the year.

During an El Nino there is an increased chance of seeing a tropical storm or typhoon in the Marshall Islands, particularly late in the year. In general, October through December is by far the most active

period for tropical cyclone activity in the Marshalls with approximately 70 percent of all storms having occurred within those three months.

The last two significant El Ninos produced Typhoon *Paka*, passing within 80 miles to our south in December 1997, and Tropical Storm *Talas*, which passed 10 miles to our south in December 2004. In August of this year, Super Typhoon *Ioke* passed about 450 miles to our north, and since then there have been numerous other tropical disturbances that affected the northern Marshalls. This genesis area will continue to shift southward through the end of the year, putting us at even greater risk.

The point of this is not to frighten

anyone, but rather to reiterate the importance of preparedness. The time to prepare for a tropical storm or typhoon is before there is one out there. Have you assembled your personal survival kit as directed on Pages 5-12 of the 2006 Kwajalein phone book? By the time the first storm warning is issued, it may be too late to get supplies together. If the fully stocked shelves in a state-side store can empty out in a matter of hours, imagine how fast local supplies will go in the face of a natural disaster.

Please take the time to prepare. Put together the survival kits. Read Pages 5-20 in the 2006 phone book so you know what to do. It's better to be safe than sorry.

No place for a boat

Sailboat gets beached at Camp Hamilton

Over the Veterans Day weekend high winds helped move a boat from the private boat mooring area of the Small Boat Marina to Camp Hamilton.

"When the weather switches from doldrums to the trade winds, it is a common time when moorings break free," Paul McGrew of the Kwajalein Range Services SBM said.

McGrew said the mooring lines broke loose from the boat.

Boat owner Carol Todd said she was awakened at 7:10 a.m., Nov. 11 by a phone call. "My boat was on the beach. My procrastinations on replacing my mooring chain had caught up with me." She said a ride to Hamilton Beach "confirmed my boat was beached."

"Mike Herrington, Dale Finley and others decided to wait till near high tide to try to get her afloat,"

Todd said. McGrew added that it took team work to get the boat off of the beach. "The captain was very lucky. The boat broke loose at high tide and there was minimal damage," McGrew said.

"At about 4 p.m. the boating community started arriving," Todd said. "Anchors were placed; a fulcrum was rigged to keep the boat on her side. And the water started rising; inside the boat, too."

She added, "People pumped, people pushed and the anchor ropes were cranked. Finally there was movement; Paul McGrew arrived with a power boat to help pull."

The boat was back to its mooring by nightfall.

McGrew said it is up to boat own-

ers to check his or her moorings to ensure they are in shape.

"Boat owners should inspect their moorings on a regular basis," McGrew said.

"Friends, the boating community and just nice people were so kind and helpful," Todd said. "They hugged me, said they were sorry. And the work and effort that was put in was astonishing."

Kim**, 20, of Placentia, Calif. died Nov. 13 in Baghdad, Iraq, of injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle during combat operations. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 26th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, Schweinfurt, Germany.

Col. Thomas H. Felts Sr., 45, of Sandston, Va., and **Spc. Justin R. Garcia**, 26, of Elmhurst, N.Y. died Nov. 14 in Baghdad, of injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle during combat operations. Felts was assigned to the Command and General Staff College, School of Advanced Military Studies, Fort Leavenworth, Kan. Garcia was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 23rd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Lewis, Wash.

Sgt. 1st Class Tung M. Nguyen, 38, of Tracy, Calif., died Nov. 14 in Baghdad, of injuries suffered when his unit came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 3rd Special Forces Group, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Each flight was a fraction of the cost of what it would have been otherwise, Lollar said.

"Mike Hendrix [AirScan pilot] planned this thing out really well and established the protocols that we needed to make each flight really successful," continued Lollar. "It was fairly standardized, they [MIT] knew what to expect, and I think all test objectives were met. I don't think that they missed any."

The real Herculean feat for AirScan was its ability to fulfill its contractual requirement with KRS of maintaining all three planes and keeping its Kwajalein to Roi-Namur commuter shuttle on schedule while simultaneously modifying the aircraft and supporting the KMRSS testing.

"AirScan normally supports commuting personnel

back and forth to Roi, not supporting RTS testing," Ohler said. "Fortunately, everyone involved saw the value of this type of testing and worked together to make the project successful."

"Eventually there is the potential for the Metroliners to be range assets as opposed to just logistics assets," Lollar said, "and given the cost of research and development, aircraft using satellites and things like that, if you had that capability inhouse, it's a range asset that could potentially generate revenue for the range."

"Down the road they may want to call up the modified plane again," continued Lollar. "Right now it's back to shuttling passengers back and forth to Roi-Namur. The racks are out, the seats are in and the plane is back in service."
