## Some thoughts about teens, *Taps*, respect for flag

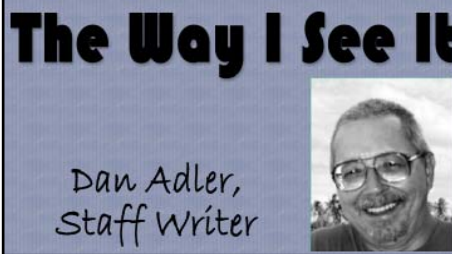
I read 1st Sgt. Kenneth Mackey's commentary about lack of respect for the flag. Sadly, it seems he's right.

I've seen some people ignore 7 a.m. *reveille* (when the flag is being raised) and evening *retreat* at 5 p.m. (when the flag is being lowered for the day).

But what bothers and saddens me the most is when people ignore *Taps*.

As I said in one of my recent commentaries, things were different when I was growing up. It seems to me that people were more respectful of traditions.

I remember my father telling me that he was at a ballgame



during World War II shortly before he was to ship out for what would be the terrible battlefields of Europe.

According to the story my father told me, the national anthem was being played, and two men sitting three rows in front of him didn't stand up. In about a half-second, the two 'gentlemen' were 'assisted' to their feet by my father along with several other people, who began to vigorously explain what respect for the flag meant. I guess it

## Reader responds to teen drinking letter

Adults drink legally, but no one commits burglary legally.

Alcohol prohibition has been tried and failed. Whether you like it or not, it's constitutionally legal for adults to drink alcohol. Drinking under the age of 21 is illegal.

The drinking age wasn't always 21, and it's not a federal law that sets the drinking age. Each state sets its own drinking age. Congress passed the National Minimum Drinking Age Act of 1984, lobbied by MADD [Mothers Against Drunk Driving]. States had to raise their drinking ages to 21 or lose their federal highway funds. It all came

down to money.

Wisconsin and New Hampshire are considering lowering the drinking age for military members to 18 or 19. Wisconsin has already passed a bill through the House Committee decreasing fines for underage drinking by service members from \$500 to \$10. It hasn't yet gone through the full House. This gives service members the 'go ahead' to drink without lowering the drinking age, preserving their federal highway funds.

Anyone can drink irresponsibly, but

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# New school calendar for 2007-2008 accepted

The Student Advisory Council voted to accept one of two versions of the 2007-2008 school calendar submitted for review on Wednesday.

SAC members voted to accept the gamma version of the upcoming school year calendar.

The two versions submitted to the council were not too dissimilar; both fulfill the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll of 180 student contact days. The gamma calendar version allows for a 20-day Christmas vacation compared to the thirteen day holiday break written into the beta calendar.

Traditionally, school calendar proposals are submitted in January, the decision to submit the calendar earlier was an attempt to give faculty and students more time to arrange summer travel plans. The vote by the council is a recommendation to the USAKA Commander for final approval.

Acting Superintendent Steve Howell presented an update of the Corrective Action Plan for the Parent Survey conducted spring semester 2006. At that time, elementary school parents suggested the library/media center was in need of updating and expansion of book titles. High School parents were concerned about the cleanliness of the high school facility, especially the restrooms.

Lynn Booth, Library Media specialist and Deb Johnson, Elementary School principal, addressed the library expansion concern, formulating a corrective action plan to evaluate the quantity of books in the collection as well as the quality. When measured against national and state standards, the elementary school library exceeds the standards set for quantity by providing an average of 40 books per student compared to the standards that call for 10-15 books per student.

In the area of quality, in terms of book titles, the collection was deemed sufficient for grades K-4, book titles, for the 5th and 6th grades was problematic.

Another factor is that the library has been without air-conditioning for months at a time during the past two years, Booth said, and the books show signs of wear and tear, mold and disintegration.

To remedy this situation, the team recommended adding 5th and 6th-grade materials at a cost of \$3,000 over a three-year period.

Their action plan also called for weeding out moldy and disintegrated materials and purchasing replacements over three years at an approximate cost of \$12,000.

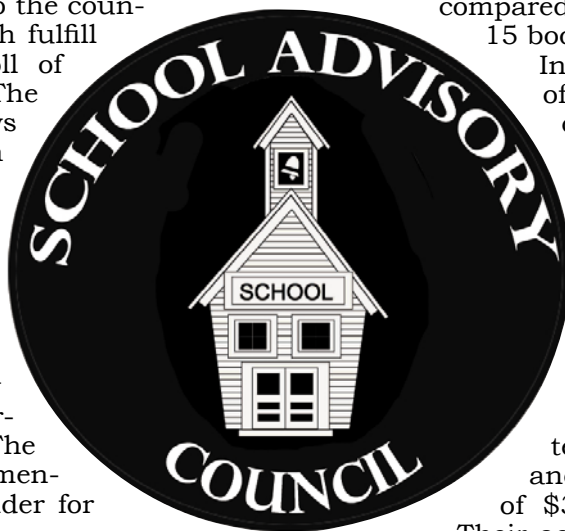
"I feel it is a good plan and within our abilities to accomplish successfully," Howell said. "We will move forward with their plan."

At the High School, Howell met with Kwajalein Range Services Housing custodial supervisor to discuss the issue of restroom cleanliness at the school. The corrective action focused on a strategic plan, which included the assignment of a night crew custodian to clean and maintain restrooms and a daily checklist.

"However, there is a perception that this problem still exists, and there is concern that it will return once again if not watched carefully," Howell said addressing the corrective action. "I think this will give more credibility and accountability to helping solve the problem of improving cleanliness, upkeep and maintenance of our school restrooms."

Howell also shared the results of the latest parent survey taken at the Parent-Teacher Conference in November. The corrective action plan for this survey will be presented at the February SAC meeting.

"Overall, the results suggest that our parents felt very positive about the Kwajalein school system," Howell said. Faculty working relationships with students and communication between teachers and parents scored very high on the survey.

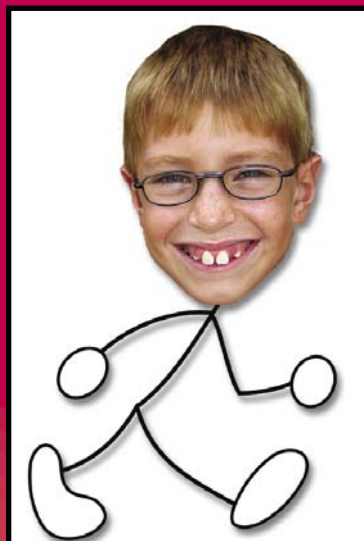

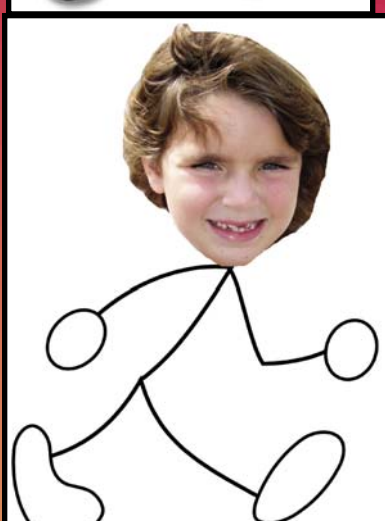
**Chris Kulig, 9**

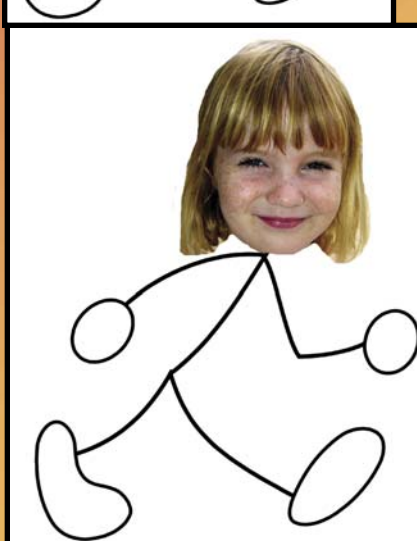
**Mackenzie Cooper, 6 ½**

"I was nice. Sometimes I help my brother get on his bike and I help people when they're hurt. And I let people into my club that I made."



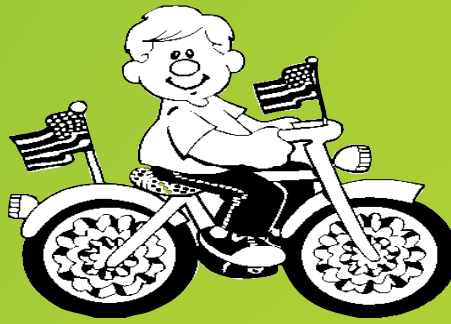

"I'm really nice; sometimes I'll be bad if I don't listen to my parents. I help people with their bikes and if I have to do the dishes, then I do it."

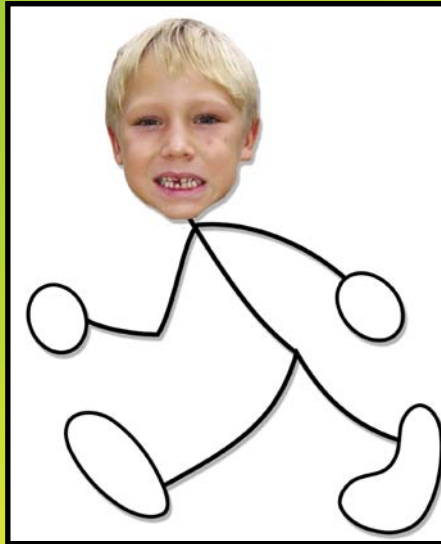

He will be back Christmas day. I just think he would want one."



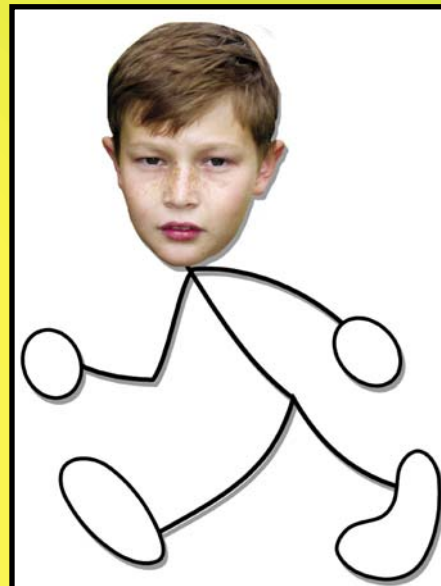

# Trees, shrubs will be removed in housing areas for fire/emergency vehicles, maintenance crews

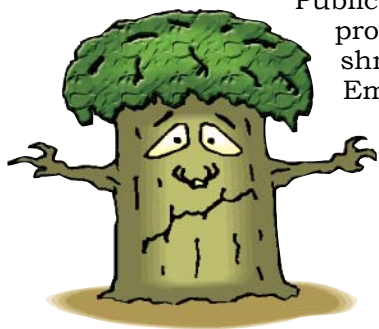
Kwajalein Range Services Fire Department and Public Works crews are in the process of removing trees and shrubs that impede Fire and Emergency vehicle access in all residential areas and caution residents to be aware.

"Vegetation growth has gotten to the point where it is hindering access to emergency vehicles in case of a fire or other emergency

as well as blocking access for proper maintenance of facilities," said Public Works manager Fred McNickle. "In addition, this is also part of the general island beautification initiative of the post commander."

Using chain saws, machetes and when warranted cranes and forklifts, crews will be cutting down approximately 225 to 250 trees tagged for removal by a team of fire and maintenance personnel. Public Works began the clean-up in the trailer area last week and will move systematically through the rest of the housing areas, McNickle said, hoping to complete the removal by the end of January.

Residents are asked to be observant of any activities in their immediate areas, obey all signs and do not enter any closed or roped off areas.

# Running Club holds Pauper's Marathon Monday

## *Jahnke, Mack, Kirchner complete full marathon course*

The 25th Annual Paupers' Marathon and Relay was held Monday. Start times varied between 4 and 6:30 a.m., allowing the three full marathoners to start in the dark and "beat the heat" by finishing before the late morning sun became too intense.

Throughout the morning there were many clouds and a few rain showers, making for cool conditions by historical standards. The traditional 26.2 mile course consisted of 10 loops of 2.6 miles around the downtown and residential sections of Kwajalein, staying north of 9th Street.

The three full marathoners were, in order of finish, John Jahnke (4:23:14), Virginia Mack (4:34:12) and Julianne Kirchner (5:20:07). It was the first marathon for Jahnke and Kirchner and the sixth for Mack, but the first Kwajalein island marathon for all three. Remarkably, Kirchner is a 14-year-old high school freshman.

Those who know Kirchner, also know what a fearlessly hard worker she is on many fronts and were not surprised by Monday's achievement. While Kirchner was running early laps, one adult spectator sincerely predicted that she is destined to go far, causing the lap timers to chuckle at the unintended double entendre. Kirchner was escorted for moral support through eight of 10 laps by classmate Michael Taylor. During lap 10, little brother Graham Kirchner and John Pickler joined in.

There were six teams consisting of between two and 10 members each. The husband and wife team of Abe and Cathy Stores split the

distance and opted for a 4 a.m. start. Cathy ran the first five loops and then hurried home to her sleeping youngsters. She tagged Abe at the front door; he then biked fast in the dark to the course hub at Namo Weto Youth Center and ran the last five laps.

Despite this delay, the Stores' still had the day's fastest team time with 3:20:14.

The fastest 2.661 mile loop of the day was Cathy's 18:45 - her second loop. No male runner did a loop that fast. A second husband and wife team, Linn Ezell and Ben Bartyzel flip-flopped running alternate laps.

Event enthusiast Justin Hill again formed a spunky team of 10 Elementary and Jr. High boys.

Ed Hillman, who has been involved in this event off-and-on for 20 years over multiple Kwaj tours, formed the most diverse team.

It was mixed gender, broad

**World Trade Center** Director Oliver Stone once again offers a powerful and provocative story based on real-life events in this drama. Sergeant John McLoughlin (Nicolas Cage) and William J. Jimeno (Michael Pena) were two officers assigned to New York City's Port Authority who were working their beats on a quiet day in early fall when they received an emergency call. The day was September 11, 2001, and McLoughlin and Jimeno were among the policemen who attempted to evacuate the World Trade Center towers after they were struck by airliners piloted by terrorists. Both McLoughlin and Jimeno were inside the fifth building of the World Trade Center when the towers fell, and were two of the last people found alive amidst the wreckage. As McLoughlin and Jimeno struggled to hold on to their lives as rescuers sifted through the rubble, their spouses — Donna McLoughlin (Maria Bello) and Allison Jimeno (Maggie Gyllenhaal) — clung to the desperate hope that their husbands would survive and be found. As the McLoughlin and Jimeno families waited for word on the fate of the two men, they watched as a city and a nation came together with strength and compassion in the face of a tragedy.

**Superman Returns** The Man of Steel returns to the big screen with this continuation of the icon's film legacy that picks up after the events of the first two Christopher Reeve films. Some time has passed since the events of *Superman II* and the world has gotten used to life without Superman (Brandon Routh) ever since his puzzling disappearance years earlier. Upon his return, he finds a Metropolis that doesn't need him anymore.

**Barnyard** A cow learns to walk like a man, both literally and figuratively, in this computer-animated comedy written and directed by Steve Oedekerk, the creator of *Jimmy Neutron: Boy Genius*. Farris was assigned to the 5th Battalion, 20th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Lewis, Wash.

**Sgt. Jay R. Gauthreaux**, 26, of Thibodaux, La., died Dec. 4 in Balad, Iraq, of injuries suffered in Baqubah, Iraq, when in improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle while on patrol. Gauthreaux was assigned to the 3rd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

**Spc. Nicholas R. Gibbs**, 25, of Stokesdale, N.C., died Dec. 6 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, of injuries suffered when he came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire while conducting observation and security operations. Gibbs was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 37th Armor Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division, Giessen, Germany.

**Cpl. Dustin J. Libby**, 22, of Presque Isle, Maine, died Dec. 6 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. Libby was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 4th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

They were assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 3rd Field Artillery Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division, Giessen.

**Lance Cpl. Cody G. Watson**, 21, of Oxford, Ala., died Dec. 6 from a non-hostile incident in Al Anbar province. Watson was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

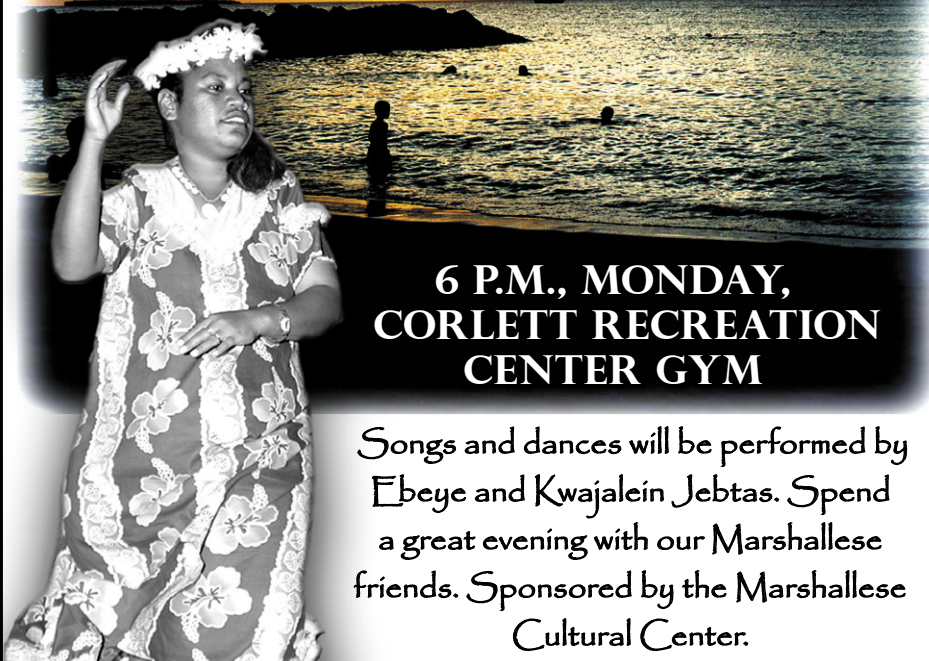

really was a different time then. I don't see that happening these days.

I read letters *The Hourglass* gets about teenagers, both good and bad.

I also read military press releases we get by e-mail every day.

One of those press releases stuck with me, and I'd like to share it with you.

It was about Ross McGinnis.

He grew up in a small town in Pennsylvania and graduated from high school in 2005. His family said he was always patriotic and had always wanted to serve his country.

McGinnis joined the Army right after graduation. He was assigned to the 1st Infantry Division and deployed to Iraq. His unit had been in heavy fighting, and on Dec. 4, Pfc. McGinnis was on Humvee patrol in Baghdad. He was manning the turret gun when an insurgent threw a grenade off a rooftop that bounced through the turret and into the Humvee which was crewed by four

other Soldiers.

According to the official notice, McGinnis tried to reach for the grenade to throw it back out, but when he realized there wasn't enough time, he fell on it and smothered the blast with his body and saved his fellow Soldiers that day.

McGinnis was 18 years old — just another teenager.

When we talk about teenagers and how 'bad' they are and what a 'pain' they are and what bad choices they make, we should remember there are thousands of teenagers like McGinnis.

Old fogies my age tend to refer to 18 year olds as boys. But McGinnis and those like him who serve our country are the best *men* America has to offer.

We lose our best men and women every day in Iraq and Afghanistan. There are more than 3,000 dead and the wounded number more than 25,000.

They are all ages. They come from all over the United States. They are you

and me. They are Americans.

McGinnis could be just another statistic, just another number.

When I hear *Taps* played at night, I promise I'll remember to think of him and all the men and women in Iraq and Afghanistan.

I'll think about all the youngsters like McGinnis, who didn't get long lives, but made what time they had count.

I'll think about the older ones who leave wives, husbands and children behind and about the families who will have a very sad holiday season.

I'll remember those who have sacrificed so much to allow you and I and those we love to live in freedom and peace, especially at this time of year.

Yeah, we can ignore *Taps*. That's our right. That's what freedom is. No one can make us respect the flag and honor the men and women who died for it.

But then, why on God's earth wouldn't we want to?

that isn't the reason the drinking age was raised. It was raised to cut down on drunk drivers. Actually, more lives would be saved by raising the legal driving age.
