"THIS IS THE RMI": MARSHALL ISLANDS SOCCER TEAM REFLECTS ON HISTORIC FIRST MATCHES

HOURGLASS REPORT

For years, the Marshall Islands carried a unique distinction—it was the only nation in the world without a soccer team. That changed in August 2025 when a determined group of athletes pulled on blue and orange jerseys and stepped onto the field in Springdale, Arkansas.

The site was fitting. Northwest Arkansas is home to the largest Marshallese community outside the islands. On game day, families waved flags, drummed, and sang, their voices echoing across the stands.

"The first time I stepped on the field, I felt incredibly honored to represent the Republic of the Marshall Islands," said Johnathan Koehler, a goalkeeper with the Marshall Islands National Soccer Team. "Being able to step on the field and represent them and their country while assisting the soccer program to move forward is a huge honor."

Their first match came against the U.S. Virgin Is-

lands. Though the final score read 4–0.

Just days later, against the Turks and Caicos Islands, they celebrated their first two international goals in a spirited 3–2 contest.

"We were excited as a team and far more so than any just one goal because it was the first goal, Koehler said. "It was against a FIFA credited nation, that was not an easier opponent. They're very tough, very well skilled and being able to see that happen was a boost, huge excitement for not just me, but he entire team."

Behind the scenes, the journey was far from simple. The Marshall Islands Soccer Federation, founded in 2020, faced challenges of distance, resources, and recognition. Yet on the field, the players turned obstacles into opportunity.

"We never played together before," said Koehler. "We had only five practices, about an hour and a half each practice to find our groove."

For many, the debut meant more than just sport—it was

about carrying family pride, honoring the islands, and showing the world that the RMI belongs in global football.

"The most special thing, the reason they chose Springdale, Arkansas, was because of the Marshallese population," said Danny Razook, a defensive center back with the Marshall Islands national team. "It's a great honor. Our job now is to inspire the next generation of Marshallese kids to want to play soccer. Knowing that was on our back is a big burden—but it was worth it, to hopefully inspire."

Off the pitch, the squad bonded over shared meals, music, and stories. By the end of the week, they weren't just a roster of names; they were a team.

"The chemistry was awesome," said Koelher. "The work ethic was great. Everybody wanted to be there, give it their all and do their best."

The debut may not have grabbed international headlines, but for Marshallese everywhere, it was monumental. The sight of their flag carried onto a soccer field—once unimaginable—became a living symbol of identity, resilience, and unity.

"It was a dream come true," said Koehler. "I'd been messaged by family members across the U.S. by Marshallese friends scattered across the world. It was already in papers in England, Spain, Portugal, France and in Taiwan. It was all over the world."

The players know the road ahead is long. But whether the next match is in the islands or abroad, they've proven the Marshall Islands can compete, and more importantly, inspire.

"We have a lot of heart," Kholer said. "We have a lot of love and culture to share with other people and a strong desire to become a FIFA credited nation and show the world what we're capable of."

YOKWE YUK WELCOME CLUB: HONORING TRADITION, BUILDING COMMUNITY, AND SUPPORTING EDUCATION

Since its founding in 1956 as the Kwajalein Officer's Wives Club, the Yokwe Yuk Welcome Club (YYWC) has been a cornerstone of community life on Kwajalein. Established to foster social connection and provide support for Marshallese communities, the club evolved into the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club in 1961 and, in 2020, proudly opened its membership to both men and women, welcoming all K- and C-badge holders rebranding itself to be more inclusive and reflect broader community engagement. Today, the YYWC remains committed to its mission: promoting friendship, cultural exchange, and educational opportunities across the Marshall Islands and Micronesia.

What began as a network of social support for families on Kwajalein has grown into a vibrant organization that strengthens ties between island residents and Marshallese communities. Over the decades, YYWC has raised thousands of dollars to fund scholarships and educational initiatives, supporting students throughout the region.

Two key initiatives drive this effort:

- The Bargain Bazaar: Established in 1958 as the Island Thrift Store, the Bargain Bazaar reopened in 1961 and continues to operate near the dock. The shop sells secondhand goods donated by the community, with all proceeds funding education programs in the Marshall Islands and Micronesia.
- The Micronesian Handicraft Shop (Mic Shop):

Founded in 1963, showcases and sells high-quality handicrafts created by artisans from across Micronesia. Located downtown, it not only promotes cultural heritage but also generates income for educational assistance.

These operations, combined with seasonal bake sales and fundraising events, make up the foundation of YYWC's Educational Assistance Committee, created in 1963 to administer scholarships and allocate funds where they are needed most.

Mark your calendars for Monday, September 8, 2025, as we launch the new season with the YYWC Sunset Social—an annual event reimagined for the entire community. This festive evening will feature light refreshments, music, and a warm welcome to new and returning members. Guests will have the opportunity to learn about volunteer opportunities, sign up for committees, and explore the exciting calendar of events ahead.

New this year: the Kwaj Smoke-Off Contest will add a delicious twist to the social. Amateur and experienced







grill masters alike will compete for the title of Kwaj's Best BBQ, with attendees sampling entries and voting for their favorites.

The 2025-2026 calendar is packed with creative and interactive events designed to bring people together and raise funds for education:

- Kwaj Clue (January 18, 2026): A family-friendly mystery biking adventure where teams solve clues island-wide to crack the case of the missing Glow-in-the-Dark Coral Sample.
- Amazing Race Kwajalein (February 2, 2026): An island-wide adults only challenge inspired by the hit TV show, featuring physical and mental tasks at multiple checkpoints.
- Date Night Series kicks off with an Elegant Valentine's Dinner (February 15, 2026) at Vet's Hall, featuring dinner and live music.
- Annual Ladies' Holiday Luncheon at the Commander's Residence (December 2025): A festive afternoon of cultural exchange and holiday cheer with honored guests from Ebeye.
- Collaborative Cultural Events: YYWC partners annually with the Kwajalein Art Guild for two signature events—

- o Photography Show (August 31, 2025) showcasing local photographers
- o Island Impressions Art Show & Music Evening (January 25, 2026) featuring curated art and live performances at the Commander's Residence.

YYWC thrives because of the dedication and creativity of its members. Whether you want to volunteer at the Bargain Bazaar, help run an event, or lend your talents to the Mic Shop, there's a place for you in our community.

Membership is open to all K- and C-badge holders. Joining means more than attending events—it's about making a difference in the lives of students across Micronesia and building lifelong friendships on Kwajalein.

COMMUNITY FROM THE ICE TO THE ATOLL: A FLIGHT MEDIC'S JOURNEY SPANS THE GLOBE

The cold in Antarctica is something most people can't imagine, but Rebecca Craig doesn't focus on that. What stands out to her more is how quiet it was.

"When I first landed in Antarctica, it was nothing around," said Craig, a flight medic now working at Kwajalein Hospital. "We stepped off the plane. We all had our big red puffy coats on, our bunny boots and our goggles. It was a little bit dark on the horizon and hardly any light out there."

The remote environment was unlike anything she had seen before.

"It was just a different landscape that I'm not typically used to," she said. "Then it was a lot to fathom how far distance actually is."

Before working in Antarctica, Craig had already served

as a flight medic in remote locations. Her job often meant working with limited equipment, no backup and a need to stay calm in emergencies. She became used to thinking on her feet and making do with what was available.

"I was allowed to do a lot more than what I'm used to," she said. "We have walking blood banks. If we need the blood, we find somebody who has matched the same patient's blood. We would take blood from the donor, run it into a bag, test it and run it back into the patient."

In Antarctica, Craig's main job was to support the health of scientists and workers at a research station. But she also took on another unexpected task: herding penguins out of harm's way.

"It was our responsibility as the fire department to get the penguins off the runway and off the road," Craig said. "So, to get a penguin off the road or tarmac, you can go and talk to them, or kind of approach them. Usually, they do not like contact, but they are curious animals."

Sometimes that didn't work, so she and others used bamboo sticks to gently make noise and guide the penguins away from danger.

Penguin herding, she said, wasn't about chasing the birds, it was about being patient and reading their behavior.

After eight months in Antarctica, Craig returned to a much different setting: the tropical climate of Kwajalein Atoll. Despite the change in scenery, she said the work shares some similarities.

"The similarities are that we're so far away from any type of particular help," she said. "We do have good physicians and good medical care on Kwajalein, but anything as high critical care would be a long time coming. So, we have to be able to manage that patient for longer times."


On Kwajalein, flights in and out can be limited, and in some cases, emergency evacuations take hours. Being prepared to provide care over long periods is part of the job.

Craig said working in remote places teaches you to rely on yourself and your team, and to keep improving, no matter where you are.

"If you're a good person, good people would find you," she said. "So always keep looking ahead and always keep being the person you want to be."

From frozen tundra to island airstrips, Craig brings the same dedication to her work, no matter the location.

THE KWAJALEIN ART GUILD: A CREATIVE HOME FOR EVERYONE

On an island best known for science, service, and sea, the Kwajalein Art Guild (KAG) quietly nurtures a different kind of excellence—creativity. Today's KAG welcomes artists of every level and discipline, inviting anyone with a spark of curiosity to make, share, and celebrate art together.

The KAG's current vision is simple and generous: provide a space where artisans of all levels can explore, practice, and share their work. That spirit shows up in everything the KAG does—from entry-friendly classes to gallery-style showcases—so neighbors who may not think of themselves as "artists" discover they are.

"Kwajalein is a very, very

small community, and a lot of times we don't know the caliber of our friends," KAG President Stephanie Fried reflected. "The Art Guild brings those talents out, especially when members teach classes—expert or not."

Alongside a steady rotation of classes, the KAG anchors the island's creative calendar with two craft fairs each year and, in partnership with the Yokwe Yuk Welcome Club (YYWC), two major shows: the island-wide Art Show and the Photography Show.

The current Art Show emerged from a collaboration with a previous YYWC lead and was intentionally styled to feel like an elegant evening out— "a fancy cocktail party" that gave attendees an excuse to dress up and take in painting, sculpture, fiber arts,

stained glass, and more. The newer Photography Show riffs on that idea with a medium that resonates widely on Kwaj. With so many casual and avid photographers here, the show draws fresh voices and lowers the barrier to participating in the arts.

Equally important, these events aren't just marketplaces. "The Art Show is about showing an artist's creation without requiring large quantities to sell," Fried said. It's a venue to gather in a new way, meet people you might not otherwise, and be inspired by what your neighbors make.

Everyone who calls Kwajalein home is welcome—individuals and families alike. Many members first discover the KAG through a class and stay for the fellowship. It's not a club for professionals; it's a community for anyone who wants to explore creativity in any form.

The KAG encourages participation through approachable classes and hands-on workshops. Teaching is part of the magic—members who try leading a class often find new confidence in their own practice, and participants leave with skills, friends, and momentum to keep creating.

Art here is personal. In a close-knit community, creative work becomes a conversation—between neighbors, with the ocean and sky, and across disciplines. Shows and classes reveal the surprising depth of talent tucked into everyday life on island.

Like many local groups, the KAG navigates a smaller population and has a constant need for extra hands, especially for big shows and class instruction. If you've been looking for a meaningful way to contribute or an excuse to learn that art you've been curious about—

Responding to surging interest (stained glass, in particular, has a waitlist), the KAG is launching an Art of the Month series featuring rotating themes and classes:

• August: Photography

September: Tie-DyeOctober: Stained

Glass

• November: Painting

• December: Holiday Crafts

More themes are in the works, and members are encouraged to pitch ideas and lead sessions.

The KAG also invests in the next generation through a senior scholarship built on three pillars: building community, supporting the KAG community, and practicing the arts. Seniors apply in the spring and interview with KAG members to discuss their projects and what art means to them.

"I hope the Art Guild continues to give our technically oriented community an outlet to express their creative sides," one leader shared. That sentiment echoes across members' stories: Zoe King shared, "The purpose of the Art Guild spoke to me. I love learning stained glass and teaching others. The space is

open any time—which matters when you're a full-time working mom." Fried agrees, "I've always loved working with my hands. As president, I get to help create a community that encourages people to try new creative arts. That's the best part."

In the end, the KAG is about joy, expression, and connection. "We can always do art alone," King said, "but being in the Guild means we get to share that with others."

The Kwajalein Art Guild welcomes all community members to get involved. Monthly meetings are held on the second Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. in the Art Annex, where members can connect and share ideas. Volunteers are always needed-whether it's lending a hand at a craft fair, helping with a show, or even teaching a class-no professional experience required, just a love for creativity. Be sure to mark your calendar for the upcoming KAG/ YYWC Photography Show on Sunday, August 31, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at CRC 6, where guests can enjoy an evening striking photography, desserts, and camaraderie. Attendees are encouraged to dress up for the occasion, making it a special night to celebrate art, community, and creativity.

Whether you're picking up a brush for the first time, dusting off a camera, or shaping glass under expert guidance, there's a place for you at the Kwajalein Art Guild. Come create with us.



Women should wear clothing to cover shoulders and knees. None are permitted to wear shorts when visiting churches on Ebeye. Men should wear long slacks to church.



WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

With that big boost of precipitation yesterday, the weather station recorded 6.47 inches of rain in August, about 2.6 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received about 38 inches of precipitation, which is 12.5 inches below normal for the year, keeping Kwajalein Atoll in drought conditions. With the positive MJO and strong ITCZ over the central RMI, increased shower coverage and possible thunderstorms will remain in the picture for the rest of today and through the overnight until a little after sunrise. More ENE-E-ESE troughing of the winds will bring increased shower coverage on Saturday with a slight chance of a thunderstorm. The long weekend will see isolated shower coverage from time to time but no long duration rain events. There was one thunderstorm day over the last seven days for Kwajalein Island and for Roi-Namur. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station or thunder heard. The Madden/Julian Oscillation's

(MJO) eastward progression had slowed some over the eastern Indian Ocean, but its positive phase is now working into the western Pacific. This positive phase will be conducive to increased shower coverage for the next seven days. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) will remain well established throughout the rest of the day and then fragment as well as diminish in organization tomorrow into the weekend near the RMI. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) is in ENSO-neutral conditions as a whole tending to support normal rainfall values. A quick episode of slightly cooler than normal sea-surface temperatures (SST) in August between the RMI and the Date Line is contributing to the atoll's drought conditions this month. A brief return to La Nina conditions is expected during the northern late fall and early winter.

Tropical Cyclones:

None for the RMI. We are now in the tropical cyclone season for the western Pacific and entering the peak of the season as we move toward September. Look for a slightly higher chances of tropical cyclone development for the western Pacific as we approach September first.

Damaging West Winds / Westerly Swell:

Low risk: Eastern Micronesia and the RMI are expected to be east-northeast to east-southeast trade wind dominant.

Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island and Winds:

The waxing half-moon will occur on the 31st with a neap tide situation and all high tides below until the sixth. This is the time of the year when we see higher swells affecting the south side of the island due to powerful winter storm transiting between Australia and Antarctica. Winds: after today, the winds will come down to their typical August levels mostly in single digits. Sunday will experience the lowest winds topping out in the middle single digits to light and variable at times outside of showers. During periods of heavy showers, gusty outflow winds are possible. There is a chance

that a Small Craft Advisory (SCA) could be issued on the open lagoon for a short period during any strong showers just to the east of the lagoon. High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Expect drier weather to settle over Kwajalein as the workweek wraps up. The trough that brought showers to the atoll Thursday evening has shifted west, allowing for a break from the rain on Friday. This drier pattern should continue through most of the weekend, aside from the occasional stray, garden-variety shower. Winds will generally be from the northeast to east at 5-10 knots, with periods of calm possible at times. Looking ahead to early next week, a strengthening subtropical ridge is expected to bring gentle east-northeasterly trade winds to the region. This will help maintain a stable atmosphere over the atoll and keep shower chances low through at least the first half of the week.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny with isolated stray showers. Winds ENE-ESE at 5–10 knots, with higher gusts possible near showers.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 5–10 knots, with higher gusts possible near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 3–8 knots, occasionally calm, with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Partly sunny with stray showers to begin the work-week. Winds generally from the NE-E at 3–8 knots, occasionally calm, with higher gusts possible near showers.
