# POWER OUTAGE RESPONSE: ISLAND TEAMS RALLY TO RESTORE CRITICAL OPERATIONS

Over the weekend, nearly half of Kwajalein experienced a widespread power outage due to a short between two electrical lines that disrupted power across the industrial sector of the island base. The unexpected failure tested the resilience and readiness of the community. Rapid response teams mobilized swiftly to restore essential services.

When asked about why the power outage occurred, Hernandez, **Public** Iose Works Department Director, "The incident reported, began with a failure in one of the island's underground utility access points, creating a power outage affecting the western side of the island." With urgency high, specialized teams were activated to manage both emergency power distribution and fault detection.

Rapid Response Action Teams were immediately put in place. Two generator deployment teams—Teams 1 and 2, each comprised of around 10 personnel-were tasked with distributing backup generators across key mission support areas and residential zones. Working around the clock throughout the weekend, these teams ensured generators were fully operational positioned to power missioncritical systems including communication networks, phone lines, HVAC systems and server rooms.

Simultaneously, Teams 3 and 4, composed of skilled electrical feeder line specialists, conducted a meticulous search to identify the failure's source. Their mission: find the damaged underground utility chamber

responsible for the outage and assess its accessibility and safety.

Initial leads included a suspiciously smoking access point, which was later ruled a false alarm. The real breakthrough came within 24 hours when one of the search teams located the actual compromised site. The feeder zone was immediately cordoned off, and a full-scale technical inspection began.


Investigators determined the outage was caused by decayed wiring connections submerged in water due to recent excessove rain. Though originally built with water-resistant materials, the aging infrastructure had deteriorated after prolonged exposure to moisture, causing widespread corrosion and a critical failure.

The repair has proven to be labor-intensive, requiring crews to work in confined, hot, grime-filled underground conditions to remove and replace thick, corroded cabling. More than 300 feet of new cable is expected to be laid, a process slated to take two weeks due to the complexity of the system and the extent of the damage.

Throughout the crisis, the dedication of the four response teams has been nothing short of exceptional. From generator distribution to hands-on electrical repairs, their combined efforts significantly minimized downtime and kept the heart of the island's operations beating.


Their swift coordination and around-the-clock commitment ensured that vital functions remained powered and mission-critical work could continue with minimal disruption.

A heartfelt thank you goes



out to all members of Teams 1 through 4, our mission partners, Bae Stephen, – MV Cable Splicer, Tarry Jacklick – MV Electrician II, and Samu Laszlo, Electrical Utilities Manager. Everyone's diligence, technical skill, and determination under pressure exemplifies the best of our island community. A clear path to full restoration,

with stronger insight into the future protection and stability of our power systems is underway. This is what resilience born from true teamwork looks like. \mathbf{Y}

Following the dive, the club came together for a cookout, with special thanks to Blair Jones and Dustin Carmichael for keeping everyone well-fed at the grill.

Reflecting on the event, Suzy Riccardi shared, "I enjoy Women's Dive Day each year-it's one of my favorite dives that the scuba club organizes. No matter our backgrounds or experience levels, we all come together. It's great to have so many amazing women divers here on Kwaj!'

The Kwajalein Scuba Club extends its gratitude to the women divers who inspire us all, and to the men who support them. The club is already planning more challenge coin scavenger hunts in the future-details will be shared in the KSC newsletter and on Facebook.

### TRASH & RECYCLING PICKUP SCHEDULE

The Green Residential TRASH receptacles are collected every Tuesday and Friday.

The blue RECYCLE bins are also collected every Tuesday and Friday.

The large black General Solid Waste Community Containers are emptied on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Safety First! Please keep any curious children away from the Compactor Truck as it feeds contents into the truck.

Recyclable materials are also collected by both solid waste and horizontal maintenance personnel, in conjunction with general trash collection. Currently the island only recycles glass, aluminum, metal, and bulk organic materials. Cardboard and plastics are not recycled materials on Kwajallein. These items should be placed into the general trash stream for disposal/incineration.



Residential users will be given a green trash receptacle and a smaller blue receptacle for recycloble materials. It is requested that residences place their recycloble items into the blue containers, and stack larger materials next to the bins. Lawn clippings and leaves should be bagged and placed next to bins. Palm fronds and occounts should also be stacked up next to the bins for removal by horizontal maintenance personnel.

## COMMUNITY CARING FOR KWAJ'S FOUR-LEGGED RESI-DENTS: ISLAND WELCOMES NEW VET TEC

For the first time since February, pets on Kwajalein have a dedicated advocate on the island. After completing her veterinary technician certification in January, Alea Lasley, a licensed veterinary technician, has arrived to fill a role that was in a rotational approach, which limited important health care for on island pets.

"It feels good to be the permanent vet tech," Lasley said. "I'm glad to be here. It's work that needs to be done, and I'm prepared to provide quality care to the cats and dogs on the island."

Lasley's days are filled with routine checkups, assisting with surgeries, and advising pet owners on care and preventive health. In a close-knit community where animals are considered family, her presence offers peace of mind to residents who have gone months without consistent veterinary support.

"Being able to perform diagnostics on island makes a huge difference for pet owners," Lasley said. "Instead of waiting for an off-island vet or shipping samples, I can run tests right here and get results quickly. It helps me make faster, more accurate decisions about treatment."

Lasley's journey to becoming a certified vet tech took years of hard work and dedication. Her training covered everything from anatomy and nutrition to emergency care—skills she now uses daily in this remote setting.

"I wanted to be a vet since I was four years old," Lasley said. "Then, at 17, I realized vets aren't as hands-on as vet techs. So I changed my path."

Living and working on Kwajalein presents unique

challenges. Limited resources mean she often has to be resourceful, working closely with pet owners and making the most of what's available until off-island veterinarians can assist with more complex

"Recently, I had a dog come in with a with a growth on it's foot," Lasley said. "We scheduled the surgery for when the vet comes. I am excited about removing it from the dog's

Adjusting to the position hasn't been without its hurdles. After a long stretch of rotating temporary technicians, each with their own methods, Lasley said she had to establish consistency.

"After having multiple temporary techs, each accustomed to doing things their way, it created a slew of hurdles for me to overcome," she said. "But I've started to put new protocols in place and educate pet owners, which is already making a difference."

Still, the rewards outweigh the challenges. Lasley says the most fulfilling part of her job is seeing results in real time. "I recently had a dog come in for a routine checkup, and we decided to take an X-ray," Lasley said. "Being able to do that on-site means we don't have to wait for a specialist to come in or send the dog off-island. It gives us the ability to detect issues early, even when the dog seems perfectly healthy."


As she settles into her new role, Lasley is already thinking about long-term improvements.


"My goal is to build a stronger foundation for animal care on the island," she said. "That includes more education for pet owners, better record keeping, and making sure the animals here get the best care possible—even with

limited resources."

## COMMUNITY **SNORKELING WITH SEA LIFE: BRINGING** THE OCEAN TO LIFE IN A COLORING BOOK

For many people, snorkeling is an exciting vacation activity. For Lexie Brown, it's a lifelong passion—one she's found a new way to share through her recently published coloring book, Snorkeling with Sea Life. This unique book invites people of all ages to experience the underwater world of Kwajalein, not just through vivid photographs or videos, but by picking up a set of colored pencils and bringing her encounters in the book were chosen

to life.

Lexie's inspiration came from the last two years of snorkeling around Kwajalein and documenting her experiences online. "Snorkeling is amazing, but getting to document and share those experiences with others is what I am passionate about," she says. Encouraged by friends to create fun and educational resources for kids, she decided a coloring book was the perfect blend of art, science, and personal storytelling.

The sea creatures featured

from the most memorable encounters she regularly sees and those that made a lasting impression. Each illustration began as a screenshot from her popular snorkel recap videos on YouTube, Facebook, and Instagram. The result is a collection of pages that are both realistic and engaging, accurately depicting the animals' true appearance in their natural environment.

While many coloring books opt for whimsical, cartoon-like interpretations, Lexie was committed to accuracy. "It was important to me that the photos looked exactly like the sea life did under the water," she explains. By doing so, she hopes to help children (and adults) not only enjoy coloring but also learn to recognize and appreciate marine life as it truly exists.

One of Lexie's personal favorites in the book is Buddy, the first octopus she interacted with regularly. His image graces the cover, drawn from their very first meeting. Clarke, her clownfish friend, also makes an appearance in-

Lexie's passion for the sea began early. "I remember opening my science book in 3rd grade and seeing a whale shark and just knowing I'd see a whale shark one day. I haven't seen one yet, but it was the first life goal I've ever set," she recalls. Diving with her dad between the ages of 12 and 14 deepened her love for the ocean, and living near the sea again feels like coming full circle.

Her curiosity about marine life extends beyond the local reefs. If she could snorkel anywhere in the world right now, the Galapagos Islands with their unique black iguanas-and Oahu to see tiger sharks are at the top of her

Though the photos in the book span two years of snorkeling adventures, the process from concept to completion took just one month. Lexie leaned on trusted resources, like the Underwater

Kwajalein website, to ensure accuracy.

The book is designed for all ages, but Lexie hopes it will especially inspire children to love and care for the ocean. "As a kid I loved to color, and I still do, but my hope is that these pages inspire the next generation to love, appreciate, and care for sea life." She also shares a fun fact about one of her illustrated friends: "Turtles can live for so long. most of them are probably older than me!"

Seeing kids enjoy her work is one of Lexie's biggest rewards. "It honestly makes me the happiest! My snorkel recaps started as an inspiration from sharing pictures and videos with my friends' kids back home. I'd type out what everything was and send a picture, and one day I realized I should put it together into a video and that is how my snorkel recaps were born."

This is only the beginning. Lexie is already dreaming of more coloring books and even a children's series about octopuses, whose distinct personalities make them fascinating characters. She's also working on a sea life sticker collection.

Her advice for anyone wanting to create their own coloring book? "Create it about something you love, and it will be fun and a gift to vour future self."

## **WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK**

### RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

### Discussion:

We finished August recording 8.30 inches of rain at the weather station, about 2.1 inches below

normal

for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received about 40 inches of precipitation, which is

12.5 inches below normal for the year, keeping Kwajalein Atoll abnormally dry. Isolated showers

today with greater coverage tomorrow with ENE-E-ESE troughing in the winds. Isolated showers for

the weekend with more significant showers on Sunday during the day and a trend toward increased

shower activity next week. The highest thunderstorm risk will be for the second half of tomorrow

with another augmented risk on Sunday. There were no thunderstorm days over the last seven days for

Kwajalein

Island. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the

weather station or thunder heard. The Madden/Julian Oscillation's (MJO) remains in its positive

phase over the western Pa-

cific. This positive phase is conducive to increased shower coverage when

working with other surface forcing mechanisms. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is

currently rather lack-luster but has already started to reestablish and will assist with the

troughing and keeping the winds in the upper single digits to low teens. The El Nino Southern

Oscillation (ENSO) is in ENSO-neutral conditions as a whole tending to support normal rainfall

values. A quick episode of slightly cooler than normal sea-

surface temperatures (SST) is continuing some into September between the RMI and the Date Line

contributing to the atoll's lower than normal rainfall.

## Tropical Cyclones:

None for the RMI. We are now in the tropical cyclone season for the western Pacific and entering the peak of the season as we move toward September. Look for a slightly higher chances of tropical cyclone development for the western Pacific as we approach September first.

## Damaging West Winds /

### **Westerly Swell:**

Low risk: Eastern Micronesia and the RMI are expected to be east-northeast to east-southeast trade wind dominant.


## Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island and Winds:

The waxing half-moon will occur on the 31st with a neap tide situation and all high tides below until the sixth. This is the time of the year when we see higher swells affecting the south side of the island due to powerful winter storm transiting between Australia and Antarctica. Winds: after today, the winds will come down to their typical August levels mostly in single digits. Sunday will experience the lowest winds topping out in the middle single digits to light and variable at times outside of showers. During periods of heavy showers, gusty outflow winds are possible. There is a chance that a Small Craft Advisory (SCA) could be issued on the open lagoon for a short period during any strong showers just to the east of the lagoon. High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days.

**Purpose:** This weekly briefing is delivered Thurs-

day mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

## WEATHER DIS-CUSSION

Showers are expected today and into the end of the work week as a weak trade wind wave moves through the area. This activity is being driven by a fragment of the Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) situated over the central RMI. While a stray thunderstorm can't be ruled out, the risk remains low due to a stable upper-level atmosphere. Winds will be light to moderate from the east to southeast, with gusts reaching into the low 20s near passing showers. As the wave exits the region on Saturday, drier conditions are expected to return for most of the weekend. However, a second weak wave could bring a slight increase in showers on Sunday. Looking into next

week, the ITCZ may strengthen, potentially leading to a wetter start to the workweek.

### **SATURDAY**

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 8–13 knots, with higher gusts possible near showers.

### **SUNDAY**

Partly sunny to mostly cloudy with isolated showers. Winds NE-ESE at 7–12 knots, with higher gusts possible near showers.

### **MONDAY**

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 10–15 knots, with higher gusts near showers.

### **NEXT WEEK**

Partly sunny to mostly cloudy with stray to isolated showers to begin the workweek. Winds generally from the NE-ESE at 10–15 knots, with higher gusts possible near showers.
