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# CFAY Welcomes Newest Chiefs during FY26 Pinning Ceremony

ailors joined a 132-year naval tradition on September 16, 2025 as Commander, Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) welcomed its newest Chief Petty Officers. The pinning ceremony marks the culmination of years of effort and the transition into roles of greater leadership and responsibility, an achievement fewer than 10 percent of enlisted Sailors will reach.

The U.S. Navy officially established the rank of Chief Petty Officer on April 1, 1893. Since then, Chiefs have stood as a cornerstone of the Navy's structure and heritage. Donning the fouled anchors is more than a promotion. The emblem symbolizes both the trials and responsibilities of senior leadership, as well as the resilience required to overcome obstacles and guide others forward.

A significant part of this journey is "chief season," a demanding six-week period designed to prepare selectees for life in the Chief's Mess. Through teamwork, mentorship and tradition, they learn to balance competing demands while carrying on the Navy's core values of honor, courage and commitment. Though the details remain closely held, the intent is clear: to shape Chiefs who are ready to lead and inspire their Sailors.

Now pinned, CFAY's newest Chiefs join the mess of deck plate leaders who proudly uphold naval tradition while keeping the base and its mission ready.

For more than 80 years, CFAY has supported the U.S. 7th Fleet's forward-deployed forces, tenant commands, and thousands of service members and families across the region.





## **CONSTRUCTION AND CLOSURES**

**Yokosuka:** C-2 parking lot day-time closure on Sept. 19 due to CFAY Change of Command ceremony. The first two floor in the parking structure will be secured.

- Howard Street and Nimitz Boulevard partial closure until Sept. 28. Closures will only be on the weekends. Two way traffic will be maintained. Flagmen will be posted around work areas.
- Vacant Lot full closure until Dec. 30. The vacant lot between the Post Office and NMCRS Thrift Shop will be used as a laydown area for contractors doing various work around base.

The second closure (from Feb.1, 2026 to July 31, 2028) is only for vehicular traffic. Tunnel will be open for pedestrian and bicycle traffic.
- Carney Gate water line replacement. Construction period until Nov. 26. Expect detours and periodic closures for waterline replacement construction. Two-way traffic to be maintained. Most of the work will occur overnight.
- Nimitz Boulevard and Gridley Lane partial road closure. Closure period from Sept. 20 to Nov. 26, 8 p.m. to 5 a.m. Two-way traffic will be maintained with flagmen.
- Vandegrift Lane full road closure until October.
- The parking lot immediately in front of ATG is secured through 2027 in support of the NSST Shiphandling Trainer construction. Additionally, half of the 12-hour parking lot is also secured to support NSST construction material laydown and management.

**Ikego:** Yasakayato Street will be partially closed from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. until Dec. 25. Installation of communication and electrical lines. Connect water main to new Child and Youth programs building. Flagmen will be posted on both sides to allow two-way traffic.

• Ikego CDC parking lot partial closure until Sept. 30. 14 additional parking spots and Five parallel spots will be closed for the new CDC construction area.
