



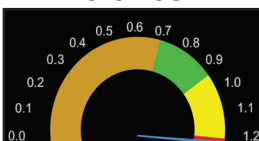

Town Halls held in November Arsenal commander addresses Workforce

Pine Bluff Arsenal Commander Col. Matthew C. Mason addressed members of the Workforce during five Town Hall meetings held over a two-day period in mid-November.

"I've been in command now for about four months," said Mason. "A lot has been going on so I wanted to bring everyone together. I am never going to hide anything from you. I will tell you what I know and what I don't know."

Right now, Mason said his number one priority is to make sure we expand, grow and are viable and relevant to the Organic Industrial Base.

"My priority is to ensure all of you have jobs and we bring in more people in the future," he said. "I think we are headed in that direction."

Mason said he wanted to thank everyone for their dedication, adaptability and commitment to excellence.

"I haven't met anyone who doesn't want to be here. I have met people who are very enthusiastic about what they do as well as others who are just here for a paycheck. I understand you must take care of your family," he said. "The goal is to make everyone feel a part of the team, so it is less about the paycheck but to be the future of the Arsenal."

Approximately five months ago before Mason took command, an operations order came out about the possibility of the Arsenal closing. "I can't tell you why we were that list,

but we were there," he said. "We didn't argue. We started fighting against the possibility. I can tell you today the Army Transformation Initiative is no longer a threat but an opportunity."

Mason said we went from the "Arsenal of Yesterday" and are moving towards the "Arsenal of Tomorrow".

Nothing can be done without trust, said Mason. "The foundation of the Army is trust. Without it we aren't going anywhere. I must be transparent. I am not hiding anything," he said. "Having a culture where you can talk to your peers and your first-line supervisor about issues is what we want. We

scale combat operations."

"Arsenal Ready" represents some strong attributes the Workforce needs to have. Mason went through some of its key themes during the town hall.

Focusing on adaptability and resilience, he said the defense landscape evolves rapidly and PBA must be ready to embrace change and remain agile. "Arsenal Ready is a mindset of preparation and innovation," said Mason. "You can't be stuck in your old ways. Big Army and senior leadership thought they knew what Pine Bluff was, what we made and what we did. They had no clue. Now they do and they know we are willing to adapt."

Looking at accountability and ownership, Mason said every member plays a vital role in mission success. "This goes back to trust. I will own my job as the commander. Accountability flows between leadership and the Workforce," he said. "If I mess up, I will own it so everyone in the Workforce is protected. All of you must do the same and own your own piece of the pie. You must be as responsible as me. Support the organization and be damn good at it."

Mason said things are going to be moving fast.

"What does that look like? I'm only here for two years but the vision I have is solid. When the next commander comes in, all they will have to do is make small changes and keep moving forward," he said. "It only works if we are all synergizing. We need everyone's buy in. You guys were just surviving, and I want to get to where the Arsenal is thriving."

Being the Commander of Pine Bluff Arsenal is a completely different job for me, said Mason. "We need to look beyond five months. We need a group working together to look five and 10 years out all the time," he said. "My job is to look out. I may never see the fruits of my labor – maybe the very beginnings – but I am hoping to come back in 10 years and see what we put in place still here. We must help

want those open-door conversations."

The commander highlighted the *Arsenal Sentinel* as a good communications tool for him to use, for the Workforce.

"The *Sentinel* goes out every month. I am trying every month to inform you," said Mason. "If you read it, especially my columns, you know everything I know."

Before Mason took command, he started working on what is known now as "Arsenal Ready". "This was something I came up with about six months ago. I wanted to create something to rally around and a foundation to base everything on," he said. "This is something we can drive conversations with and ask what it means to each individual person. It was generated around are we "Arsenal Ready", are we ready to fight our nation's next war – large

My favorite part of the Winter Holiday is setting up a Christmas village that my daughters and I have been



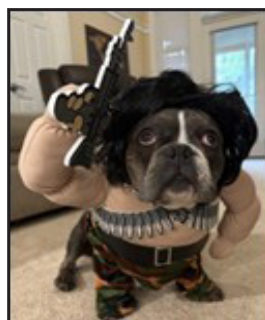
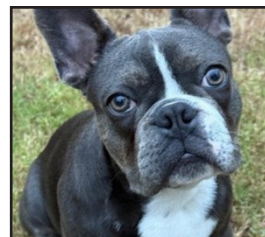

DPW converts passenger van into emergency vehicle

Pine Bluff Arsenal's Directorate of Public Works – Sheet Metal shop was instrumental recently in converting a 15-passenger van into a one-person ambulance for the Arsenal's Health Clinic.

"This project started out with a conversation between Tim Silvey, the supervisor for the shop, and Jessie Brust, chief of the Mobile Equipment Division for DPW," said Mark Throneberry, chief of the Operations and Maintenance Division. "She asked Tim if it could be done. He looked at it and said yes he could do it."

Silvey, who is also supervisor for DPW's Tool and Dye shop, said he talked with Doug McCurry, who is an emergency medical technician at the Health Clinic.

"They called it a chemical exposure vehicle. I asked all the questions about why they needed it. First off, they have two ambulances. McCurry explained to me it was easier to dispose of a van than an expensive ambulance if someone was ever exposed," said Silvey.

All the seats were removed from the back of the van, said Throneberry. "The guys in my shop created a removable grid where the seats go – where it will lock into place," said Silvey, who has been at PBA for 13 years.

Throneberry said the van is an impressive piece of engineering.

"Tim and the personnel in his shops designed and fabricated all the flooring and brackets to hold the gurney, and they also made it possible to convert it back to a regular van," he said. "It still needed to be a workable van. There was a lot of thought process to the project. It needed to be made into what the Health Clinic needed but when it was time to turn it in – it needed to go back to a regular van."

A backwards seat was also constructed so a paramedic could ride in the back with the patient/passenger. "There was no working blueprint on how to construct this. This was something Tim and the personnel in his shops figured out," said Throneberry. "They did all the design and fabrication. I can tell them what we want and walk away. It will get done – and done well."

"This is probably faster than we have ever moved here," he said. "This might be a bit uncomfortable, but we need to be ready for it."

Lastly, he talked about teamwork and collaboration and how "success depends on collective action and a shared commitment to excellence."

The commander then shared what his vision is for the "Arsenal of Tomorrow".

"I have pitched this to my leadership. I see an 'industrial park' concept. We can't do it alone and we can't keep doing it the same way we have been doing it. We must invite partners to come here and help us," said Mason. "This help can be a wide range of things and includes strengthening our partnership with industry. The big picture is us sharing our Workforce with commercial industry."

As the town hall concluded, Mason said his commitment to the Workforce was to have an open dialogue and share information. "If you want to come see me, come see me. I want to support your success and well-being," he said.

A season for safety

December is recognized as National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month. This month is dedicated to raising awareness about the dangers of impaired driving and promoting safe alternatives to driving under the influence. Every U.S. President since 1981 has proclaimed December as National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month.

“A Season for Safety” is this month’s focus on raising awareness about the dangers of impaired driving and promoting safe driving practices, especially during the holiday season.

Campaigns like “Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over” and “If You Feel Different, You Drive Different, Drive High Get a DUI” will be active during this time to encourage responsible choices and deter impaired driving.

December is a season of celebration, but it’s also a time to reflect on the choices we make behind the wheel. This nationwide campaign is a powerful reminder impaired driving, whether caused by alcohol, drugs, or distractions is 100 percent preventable.

By raising awareness, encouraging smart decisions, and promoting safer roads, we can help save lives.

What is impaired driving?

Impaired driving means operating a vehicle while your ability to do so is compromised. This can include:

- Alcohol impairment
- Drug impairment (illegal, prescription, or over-the-counter drugs)
- Fatigue
- Distracted driving (texting, eating, adjusting GPS)

Even a small amount of alcohol or one missed night of sleep can affect reaction time, judgment, and coordination, putting everyone on the road at risk.

The alarming numbers

- Every day, 37 people die in the U.S. due to drunk-driving crashes, that’s one life every 39 minutes.
- December sees a sharp increase in impaired driving incidents due to holiday gatherings.
- In 2022, 13,524 people were killed in drunk-driving crashes. Drugs other than alcohol (both legal and illegal) are involved in about 16 percent of motor vehicle crashes. These numbers aren’t just statistics; they represent real families affected by one preventable decision.

Why December matters

- During December, people travel more frequently to:
- Holiday parties and gatherings
 - End-of-year celebrations
 - Shopping trips
 - Long-distance family visits

Unfortunately, these occasions often involve alcohol, and with winter weather and shorter daylight hours, driving conditions are already more dangerous. That’s why National Impaired Driving Prevention Month serves as a timely call to action (Hauber, Megan, 2025).

Being Safe this Thanksgiving

Holiday Safety Tips

Travel

Flying : Pack light, most airlines charge extra for checked bags, use a carry-on to avoid the cost and the risk of bags getting lost

Book flights early to avoid higher costs or sold out flights

Arrive early to be sure you won't miss your flight, chances of getting another flight is unlikely

Driving: Leave early in the morning to avoid traffic

If traveling through a big city, use a traffic app to check traffic conditions



Pack extra snacks and water for the trip to keep from frequent stops

Get vehicle maintenance done before you leave check tire pressure, fluids and fill your tank before leaving

Cooking

Wash your hands and surfaces often with warm soapy water

Seperate foods, never cross-contaminate

Always cook foods to the correct temperature, check them with a food thermometer



Keep raw turkey separated from all other foods

Fry a thawed turkey outside only, and away from your home and do not overfill or over-heat the oil in the turkey fryer.

Never leave cooking food unattended on the stove.

Refrigerate promptly if not eating right away

Fire

Keep all flammable items away from the stove and oven.



Keep a fire extinguisher in the kitchen in case of emergency, teach your family how to use it

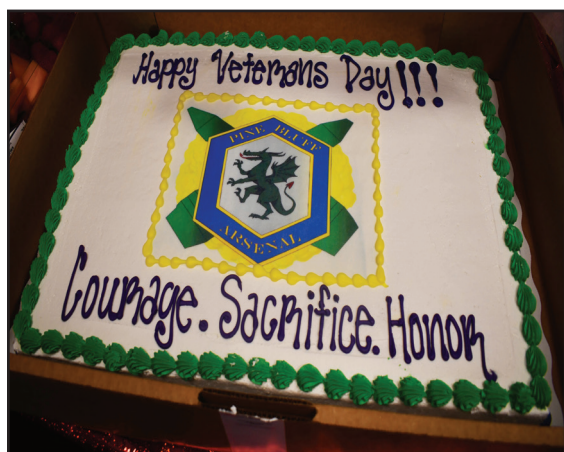
Never wear loose fitting clothing when cooking, open sleeves could ignite and catch fire from a flame or hot burner

Have a "kids-free" zone of at least three feet around the stove and areas where hot foods and drinks are prepared or carried

Have smoke alarms on every level of your home; test them monthly and replace batteries twice a year and replace alarms that are 10+ years old

Place burning candles away from flammable items, and blow them out before leaving the room
