COMMANDER'S CORNER | From the desk of Capt. JD Crinklaw



Team PSNS & IMF,

2025 NAS SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR

Shop 26 leader honored for his 'commitment to excellence'

The National Association of Superintendents has selected Steve Dibert as its 2025 Superintendent of the Year, according to a recent NAS announcement.

Dibert, welding superintendent, Shop 26, Welders, was selected for his "extraordinary leadership" and "commitment to excellence" at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard & Intermediate Maintenance Facility, according to the announcement.

"[Steve] is a recognized leader in broader efforts across PSNS, dedicating himself to the effective coordination of personnel and resources necessary for national defense. This tireless service, demonstrated by his leadership and contributions to the industrial efforts of the shipyard, is what makes him deserving of this distinction," according to the announcement.

A committee of past award winners, including 2024 recipient Chris Klinkert, director, Code 700, Lifting and Handling Department, convened to select this year's award winner.

In making the selection, NAS committee members noted Dibert's expertise in managing the complexities of an entire

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Apprentice of the Year. Filemoni was also chosen by his classmates to be the class speaker for the graduation ceremony.

In her remarks, Filemoni, reflected on the journey she and classmates went through as they completed the program, and what they have taken away from it.

"As we move forward into the workforce as journey workers, the responsibility now shifts to us," Filemoni said. "Our Sailors depend on the work we do. Our shops depend on our professionalism. And, future apprentices will look to us just as we once looked at the classes who came before us. The standard we set now—the quality we uphold, the leadership we show, and the pride we take in our trades—will shape not only our careers, but the legacy of this program."

Among this year's graduating class were students trained as production machinery electricians, machinist, marine machinery, marine electricians, pipefitters, riggers and welders.

The featured speaker for the event was Brian Karosich, commanding officer of Southwest Regional Maintenance Center. During his remarks, he challenged the graduates to continue to excel and grow their knowledge base.

"Your entrance to the government workforce comes at a critical time in the nation's history, where the demand for your skills and leadership will only increase," Karosich said. "Use this as an opportunity to build upon the lessons you have learned during your apprenticeship to expand your expertise. Continue to be curious and seek further knowledge. Challenge yourself to solve new problems that will foster growth through experience."
