# 2nd MAW prepares for Tactical Air Control Party

MCAS CHERRY POINT

Tactical Air Control Party 6-11, or TACP, is an exercise scheduled to take place Aug. 22-26 and will encompass several of 2nd MAW's units home-based out of Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, Marine Corps Auxiliary Landing Field Bogue and MCAS New River, N.C.

TACP is a team of forward air controllers that train on how to control airspace in a particular battle space and call in combined air support. During TACP Marine tactical aircraft will conduct "hot" refueling and reloading missions. These operations allow ground crews to refuel and reload aircraft between flights while the aircraft's engines are still in operation, which helps to decrease

turnaround time and keep aircraft in the air longer. Such operations are unique to the Marine Corps, and something that 2nd MAW does particularly well.

Marines, Sailors and civilians will all be working together during TACP 6-11. Personnel will conduct "surge" operations that will help them develop their skills and enhance their overall capability to generate sorties in support of Expeditionary Warfare Training Group, Atlantic.

This exercise is designed to focus on developing the TACP teams' skills in a realistic expeditionary environment. 2nd MAW's goal is to ensure the highest sortie rate possible in support of the controllers on the ground.

This exercise will incorporate a wide range of fixed

and rotary wing aircraft to include, EA-6B Prowlers, AV-8B Harriers, UH-1N Hueys and F/A-18 Hornets from various 2nd MAW units, which will require a high level of coordination by the wing operations center.

Maj. Gen. Jon Davis, the 2nd MAW commanding general, designed this exercise to ensure the Wing remains prepared as II Marine Expeditionary Force's rapid-deployment aviation force-in-readiness.

The Marine Corps is America's ready expeditionary force. Ready and capable aviation is vital to all aspects of Marine Corps operations.

Therefore, 2nd MAW seeks to provide the very best aviation support to the Marine Air-Ground Task Force, joint forces and the nation.

## MACG-28 Marines gear-up to support OEF

## DOD opens Safe Helpline for sexual assault victims

Service members are regularly given statistics that show deaths from motorcycle crashes, drug abuse, suicides, or even the number of Marines and Sailors who were arrested for driving under the influence. One statistic that is commonly looked over is the number of sexual assault victims in the military.

Data collected from Naval Criminal Investigative Services shows that 1.1 percent per every 1,000 people reported a sexual assault in the Marine Corps during fiscal year 2010. While it may sound like such a small percentage, there are nearly 203,000 Marines, which turns that 1.1 percent into nearly 2,233 reports.

A single company, for example Headquarters Company, averages 150 to 200 Marines. These numbers mean that in 2010, the number of Marines that reported sexual assault would be enough to create more than 14 companies, or nearly five battalions. The 1.1 percent does not look as small anymore. And these are only the reported incidents.

"The Department of Defense says that approximately only 20 percent of incidents are reported," said Marie Brodie, the Sexual Assault and Prevention Response program manager for Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune. "So even if you look at our numbers, they don't actually (compare)."

The DOD has partnered with a non-profit organization called the

Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network, in order to create a completely confidential DOD-wide sexual assault response line.

"Any (service member) can either call, text or chat online with a trained victim advocate," said Brodie. "The reason that they did this is because there has never been anything like this, and it is 100 percent confidential. That means that the victim advocate who answers that call will not make any further actions."

The DOD Safe Helpline does not keep track of any information other than the number of contacts made by either phone, text, or online chat. All Safe Helpline staff members on the other end of the line have been trained on DOD Directive 6495 for sexual assault, so they each have information on doing an either restricted or unrestricted report, if the victim chooses to do so.

"If a victim calls and says, 'I would like an unrestricted report,' they know how to explain that to them, who to go to, and they also have a list of all the sexual response coordinators at every installation," said Brodie.

The DOD Safe Helpline has helped fill a void and created three different methods for contact. The motto is "Help is just a Click, Call or Text away." All three can be reached 24/7, around the world and are always confidential.

Brodie added that the texting

# Strategy for survival

## *Marines learn basic techniques to protect, save lives*

While Marines conduct a training mission over the Atlantic Ocean, a CH-53E Super Stallion has a mechanical failure and lands in the turbid water. The water immediately rushes into the aircraft. Without hesitation, crew members think back to their training and prepare to act. The crew waits for the right moment then begins to make their way out of the water-filled aircraft.

Military pilots and crew members are subject to this type of risk every time they fly, and conduct training to be prepared for such an emergency.

The instructors at the Cherry Point Aviation Survival Training Center make it their top priority to ensure the United States Armed Service members who fly in aircraft know how to save themselves in case the worst should happen.

"We use this training to help save lives," said Petty Officer 2nd Class Jeffrey J. Crowley, an instructor with the ASTC. "We teach them the basic survival skills needed to help them stay alive in case an in-flight situation occurs."

ASTC instructors teach pilots and crews how to properly wear equipment, how to escape a sinking aircraft and deal with medical situations such as Hypoxia, which occurs when the body does not have enough oxygen.

"The Hypoxia training we are given al-

lows you to really understand what happens when you suffer from lack of oxygen," said Maj. Walter D. Reece, officer in charge of the Marine Aviation Training Systems site at Marine Corps Air Station New River, N.C.

At the ASTC there is also a pressure tank, where oxygen can be sucked out, forcing the pilots to use their oxygen masks.

"During this training they actually begin to suffer and feel what it's like to have Hypoxia. We have to then aid ourselves by using our oxygen tanks," said Reece.

ASTC Cherry Point is one of eight facilities in the United States used for water survival training.

"The course provides the military with a way to train their pilots and crew members to save their lives and those around them," said Reece.

Crowley said every four years a pilot and crew member has to recertify themselves and receive their aircrew refresher qualification.

"This training helps keep people alive," said Petty Officer 2nd Class Matthew P. Johnson, an in-flight technician with Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron 4, Naval Air Station Patuxent River, Md. "It helps prepare flight crews for survival situations. Now, with this training we will be more prepared for a bad situation."

"You can always rebuild planes," said Johnson about the importance of training. "This training prepares us to stay alive."



## Marines in Afghanistan run in honor of fallen sister

### CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan

— More than 500 U.S. Marines and deployed troops participated in a 5-kilometer memorial run to honor the life and service of Maj. Megan McClung at Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan, Aug. 13.

McClung, a public affairs officer, was the first female Marine Corps officer to die in combat in Iraq. She was killed Dec. 6, 2006, by an improvised explosive device in Al Anbar province, where she served with I Marine Expeditionary Force.

Lt. Cmdr. Rachel Oden graduated with McClung from the United States Naval Academy in 1995. Oden, a physical therapist with the Concussion Restoration Care Clinic on Camp Leatherneck, organized the memorial run here with the help of other volunteers.

"To be able to say I knew her and to be here doing something to honor her

memory and all the good things she did is a big honor for me," said Oden, a native of Casa Grande, Ariz. "Megan was a big runner. She was an avid athlete and tri-athlete. It's just something she loved doing."

In 2002 while serving as a public affairs officer with the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing, McClung was named as athlete of the year for Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, N.C.

During her yearlong deployment to Iraq, which ultimately ended in her death, McClung helped to organize a variant of the Marine Corps Marathon for deployed troops. She also ran in the race, finishing second amongst female competitors.

The first memorial run in McClung's honor was held in 2007 at Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Wash., near her parents' home in Coupeville. The race has been carried on annually in Washington, with deployed troops simultaneously par-

ticipating in Iraq in 2009, and Afghanistan in 2010 and 2011.

"There was a memorial run last year on Leatherneck and her folks are putting together a run in her hometown this weekend as well," said Oden.

"People around the world are running to honor her memory. I would love for us to continue this tradition."

"It's always great to run in memory of someone," said Master Sgt. Michael Noble, the senior enlisted advisor for Marine Wing Headquarters Squadron 2, and a native of Suffolk, Va. "The amount of people that ran today for her is great."

Prior to the start of the race at Camp Leatherneck, Oden asked for any runners who knew McClung to raise their hands. Dozens responded.

"There were quite a few people that knew Megan and more know her story," said Oden. "The fact that her spirit is still alive and inspiring people is awesome."

*Competitive sport improves social, physical lives of local residents*

A group of local Marine wives, active-duty Marines, a retired Sailor and civilians formed the Ring City Rollergirls Derby Team that represents eastern North Carolina.

Roller derby is a full contact sport where players skate around a track and one person on each team, the "jammer," tries to get past the blockers of the other team. The more blockers the jammer passes, the more points she scores for her team.

"There's not a lot to do in Jacksonville, so I started to look around," said Sgt. Bianca Luna, a Marine stationed at Camp Johnson and member of the Ring City Rollergirls Derby Team. "I heard about derby so I went to the practice and that's how it all started. I love it. It gives me something to do, it keeps me out of trouble and its great exercise."

Beyond physical fitness, roller derby also has social and psychological benefits, according to the players.

"It's a big network and it builds camaraderie," said Luna. "Everyone is a spouse or is in the military or knows military people. It's also very diverse because we all come from all over the country to play derby."

For psychological benefits, players claim that the rough aspect of the sport is a way to vent frustrations.

The players said that the sport is easy to learn so

anyone can benefit from the activity.

"We've had girls who've never skated in their life and it took them maybe a month or so to learn," said Tanea M. Murphy and member of the Ring City Rollergirls Derby Team. "Eventually, they can become excellent skaters. You don't have to have any skills in skating whatsoever to be a derby girl."

The players encourage anyone to participate. While the Ring City Rollergirls is an all-female team, men are welcome to be part of the action by participating as referees.

As a roller derby team, the girls compete in 'bouts' against other roller derby teams. The next is set for Aug. 27. The Information Tickets and Travel office is selling tickets for \$4 each. If interested, call 466-2172.

"There's good and bad in the Marine Corps, like anything in life," Longoria said. "Is better than most jobs."

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
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# Logistics company welcomes new CO

is not as interactive. "It's limited, when a Marine or Sailor texts, they only get a text back of who their SARC is," said Brodie. "It's not truly texting the way a young Marine or Sailor would think of having a conversation."

The call line just kicked off April 1 and has already received a number of calls. From the moment a service member picks up the phone, that line will be picked up by an advocate who is trained to help. That is the same person that stays with the victim throughout the reporting process.

The last way to use the DOD Safe Helpline is by online chat at <http://www.safehelpline.org>. The website has all information regarding numbers for calls and texts, and has a link to the anonymous online chat.

Once a victim reads over the terms of service, which contains the user agreement, privacy policy and user safety procedures. The person must read and agree to the services. They will then be directed to the waiting room where a trained advocate will begin the session. A "Go Chat" button will appear when the advocate is ready.

The chat will begin immediately, the user will be logged in as "Anonymous." No personal information will be requested, and no logs or records of the conversations are kept.

"We want Marines and Sailors to know that one - you can report this, two - we are going to be here to help you if you do report this and three - there's no way to stop an offender if it is never reported," said Brodie. "We are going to take care of you."

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

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



The combination of upbeat music, free food, volunteer services and games for children, attracted hundreds of local families to the Havelock National Night Out organized by the Havelock Police Department and Marines of Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point.

The Havelock Police Department began holding national night outs in 1996 to help heighten awareness of crime in the local area, promote increased crime prevention, generate support for local anti-crime programs, strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships and send a message to criminals.

The Marines of Cherry Point started participating in the Havelock National Night Out in 2007, when the then commanding officer of the air station, Col. Francis Bottorff, purposed to Havelock Police Department's chief of police, Chief Wayne Cyrus, for the two to join forces. At the time Havelock and MCAS Cherry Point had separate events and it made sense to combine them.

"It's not practical to separate the Marines and us, because we are all one community," said Cyrus. "We work together in many ways and their contribution to crime prevention in this town makes Havelock a much safer place."

Cyrus, as a young Marine, was stationed on Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune back in the 1970's. After one term of service he returned home to Va. and served 30 years as a police officer and retired as a division captain. He then lived up to a promise he made to himself when he was a young Marine.

"I really enjoyed my time in this area as a Marine, so I promised myself that I would come back here someday, and after my time in Va., I applied for the job here as chief and the promise came true," said Cyrus.

This year's national night out marked the 29th year since the event started nationwide. The youth of Havelock and Cherry Point raced around the grass to see everything the night offered. There were bounce houses, a demonstration of military working dogs attacking 'bad guys,' food and music.

Waiting in line near the bounce

houses, the kids anticipated the preparatory command. Once the Marine said, 'Go!' two kids jolted through the bouncy obstacle course while Marines encouraged them to move faster.

Pfc. Alex N. Sotelo, a field wireman with Marine Wing Communication Squadron 28 volunteered for the event and said, "I heard about this from a corporal in my shop and I decided to help. We're here helping monitor events, ensuring the kids are safe, and all in all to have a good time with the people of Havelock."

"We want to show that the 'Corps is more family oriented than what people think," Sotelo said.

Maj. Jason Vrable, a naval aviator with Marine Transport Squadron 1, along with a crew of Marines, mingled with the local community and walked visitors through a HH-46E, a search and rescue helicopter fondly known as "Pedro."

"Everybody sees Pedro flying around the area, but tonight provides an opportunity for the people to actually see it up close and learn our mission," said Vrable.

Marines with the air station provost marshals' office provided a military working dog demonstration as well as a police car to allow kids to sit in the driver's seat.

"It's really nice to get out and socialize," said Samantha Rose, a Marine spouse. "We look for places or events that are inexpensive, and this is just perfect."

As the music came to a dull roar and the crowd slimmed in size, another successful national night out was in the books.

Each year the national night out campaign stretches across the whole continent, with last year's involving citizens, law enforcement agencies, civic groups, businesses, neighborhood organizations and local officials from 9,850 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities, and military bases worldwide.

"The national night out shows our strength as a community," Cyrus stated. "We know we will never defeat crime, but with events like this we hope to break the barrier of us versus them and build camaraderie."

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

## School assistance



### Program eases transitions for military families

When a Marine moves to a new duty station, they are not the only one who has to adapt to changes. A Marine's spouse and children will also face new experiences with the neighbors, community and schools.

Military children can have a difficult time making new friends or relating to fellow students because they are constantly moving. Fortunately, through the military's school liaison program teachers and parents are able to help children cope with the stresses they may encounter during transitions.

"The school liaison program in the Marine Corps community can help families as they move from one duty station to the next," said Joy Harmon, Marine Corps spouse of 17 years and mother of three.

Harmon said the program gives children of military families an opportunity to adapt to the unique military lifestyle and the ongoing tasks asked of them.

"The most important part of my job is making that connection between the families and the schools," said Donna M. Bagley, the school liaison officer for Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point. "It is my job to reduce the impact of the mobile Marine Corps on our K-12 students, and help schools find ways to help students better cope with the

stresses of a military life."

Bagley said she works diligently with the schools, families, and other organizations to better prepare the children for the upcoming school year.

"There are some students who transfer halfway through the year and it takes a lot of work and coordination between the school liaison officers to make sure these families are taken care of," Bagley added.

As another part of her job, Bagley said she helps principals and teachers of the surrounding communities understand the military life and also organizes information for the Adopt-a-school program.

"The impact that these liaisons have on the military families is amazing," said Angela L. Franks, the principal of Tucker Creek Middle School. "As a principal, we need to have the knowledge and power to take care of our students. Donna and the other school liaisons have dedicated their time to help us do that."

Franks said she feels more in control and able to help her faculty and students with the help that school liaisons give her.

"These children are unique because they have to go through things I, as a civilian, have never had to go through," said Franks. "These children deal with deployments, moving away from a comfort zone and even a

higher chance for divorce."

Bagley said out of the main three stresses children endure, the most frequent is a tie between deployment and divorce.

"I was shocked when I learned that military members have a higher rate of divorce, and it causes as much stress as a deployment does," said Bagley. "It is my job to help these schools learn what to look for and what resources they have available to help their students."

Harmon said the liaisons also inform families of many resources that support the parents and students.

"It is critical that we help the families ease the transition to their new school and that their unique needs are met," said Bagley.

Bagley said the more a school knows about an incoming family the easier it is to help them.

"The families come to us to help them better prepare for their arrival at a new duty station," said Bagley. "If the school liaison program didn't exist, these families would have to do all the work themselves. We help make the process easier and help them choose the best possible school to further their child's education."

# From the clinic: Heat-related illnesses

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention encourages coaches, athletes, and those exercising outside in hot weather to know the warning signs for heat-related illness and take action when needed.

"Any athlete dying from heat is a tragedy that can be prevented," said CDC's Robin Ikeda, M.D., M.P.H., Deputy Director for Noncommunicable Diseases, Injury and Environmental Health. "Coaches, parents, teachers and athletes should educate themselves on how to recognize and prevent heat-related illness."

CDC estimates that, each year, there are almost 6,000 emergency department visits for sports and recreation heat illnesses. CDC says the most common activities leading to the hospital visits are football, and exercises such as walking, jogging, running, and calisthenics. People who exercise in extreme heat are more likely to become dehydrated and get heat-related illness.

Extremely hot weather can cause illness or death, but all heat-related illnesses and deaths are preventable.

Here are some ways to act against heat-related illness:

- Stop all activity and get to a cool environment if you feel faint or weak.
- Limit outdoor activity, especially midday when the sun is hottest.
- Schedule workouts and practices earlier or later in the day when temperature is cooler.
- Pace activity. Start activities slow and pick up the pace gradually.
- Drink more water than usual and don't wait until you're thirsty to drink more.
- Have a workout partner. Monitor each other's condition.
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.

• Seek medical care immediately if you or a teammate has symptoms of heat-related illness.

Coaches can learn more about how to protect the athletes in their care by taking CDC's accredited Web-based course on how to recognize, treat, and prevent heat-related illness. School nurses and athletic trainers may also find the course useful for sharing information with others who work with athletes.

CDC has also published a toolkit to educate readers, especially caregivers for vulnerable groups such as athletes, as well as older adults and small children, about how to recognize warning signs of heat illness. Materials such as posters for locker rooms and water bottle labels are targeted for use with school athletic programs.

## Marines encouraged to share opinions while maintaining good order

As the 2012 presidential election approaches, the sweat on our commander in chief's forehead will build, the presidential candidates will nervously dream, and millions of Americans will feel uncertainty and hope. But with one group in particular, United States Marines, the outcome of elections affects their lives at a much more intimate level.

"Decisions made in Washington have a direct impact on our quality of life now as well as down the road when it comes to issues such as retirement and Veteran Affairs benefits," said 2nd Lt. Brett M. Berkman, the Marine Wing Support Squadron 2 voting officer. "Warfare is an extension of politics and as warriors it is important for Marines to be knowledgeable when it comes to what is occurring in the political realm."

DOD Directive 1344.10, a document published by the communication integration branch, Headquarters Marine Corps, July 21, establishes the political guidelines for what Marines need to know when it comes to voicing their opinions.

The three main points of the document are: all Marines, active duty or civilian, are encouraged to participate in the political process and to voice their views, at the same time Marines must be aware of the rules and regulations related to political activity that govern the conduct of all service members, and lastly if there are any questions about permissibly political activities to please contact the unit voting officer or staff judge advocate.

The guidelines reference everything active-duty service members need to know whether it's about when and where they can publicly voice their opinions, to attending political fundraising activities and debates.

"As Marines we have volunteered to carry out the policies that are disseminated from Washington, whether we agree with them personally or not," said Berkman. "Inappropriate political activity, such as before a partisan political gathering, would conflict with our duty to act as an apolitical tool to implement policy."

This is why it's important for all units to ensure their Marines are knowledgeable of what is going on in the world and can develop their own opinion.

"It is imperative Marines understand where candidates stand on the issues that will affect them so they can make an informed decision when it comes time to cast their vote," said Berkman.

This is precisely why all marines, active duty or reserves, are encouraged to participate in the political process to voice their opinions.

It is also important to understand that Marines should not use their rank while voicing their opinions in an attempt to preach or manipulate the opinions of their fellow Marines.

Berkman continued, "Candid discourse among peers is healthy and to be expected. However, Marines in a position of leadership, from fire team leader up to the commandant, must ensure they refrain from preaching to subordinates, which could be considered using official authority to influence an election."

As 2012 approaches, the state of America raises many questions and for Marines it is paramount to take charge, develop an opinion and vote for who they feel is capable of being their commander in chief.

### "THE CHANGE-UP" (R)

"The Change-Up" is a comedy about two friends who envy each other's lives and wish to switch positions.

Jason Bateman ("Horrible Bosses," "Couples Retreat") stars as Dave Lockwood, an overworked but successful lawyer, who is happily married and a father of three young children. Ryan Reynolds ("Green Lantern," "The Proposal") stars as Mitch Planko, a single, quasi-employed man-child who has never grown up or met a responsibility he liked.

Mitch works out of his bachelor pad by day and at night has encounters with as many women as possible; however, secretly he longs for someone to love and to come home to.

Dave and Mitch grew up together and used to be inseparable; but through the years have slowly drifted apart and now live in different worlds.

To Mitch, Dave has it all: a beautiful wife, Jamie, played by Leslie Mann ("17 Again," "Knocked Up"), three wonderful kids who adore him, and a high paying job at a prestigious law firm.

To family man and overworked Dave, living Mitch's stress free life without obligation or consequence would be a 'dream come' true. Then one night, after a drunken binge, the two find their worlds are turned upside down, when they wake up in each other's bodies. Despite all the benefits, Dave and Mitch soon discover that things are not as rosy as they seemed, just like the old saying: the grass is always greener on the other side. Further complicating matters are Dave's sexy legal associate, Sabrina, played by Olivia Wilde ("Cowboys & Aliens," "TRON: Legacy"); and Mitch's estranged father, played by Alan Arkin ("Marley & Me"). Now, they have to find a way to return their lives to normal before they destroy each other's lives completely.

David Dobkin ("Wedding Crashers," "Shanghai Nights," "Fred Claus") directed this film from a script by "The Hangover" writers, Jon Lucas & Scott Moore.

Expect strong crude language and explicit sexual content in this somewhat predictable raunchy but sweet comedy.

Bateman successfully takes the challenge of turning his mild-mannered character into a deliciously loose cannon, showing more and more of his comedic side. "The Change-Up" is an extremely hilarious movie about body-swapping that takes the traditional movies of this kind to a whole other level.

### "RISE OF THE PLANET OF THE APES" (PG-13)

"Rise of the Planet of the Apes" is a new adventure and science fiction fantasy in the 43-year-old franchise, where a single act of both compassion and arrogance leads to a war unlike any other.

This film is an origin story set in present day San Francisco, where man's own experiment with genetic engineering lead to the development of intelligence in apes and the onset of a war for supremacy.

James Franco ("127 Hours," "Eat, Pray, Love," "Milk") stars as Will Rodman, a scientist searching for an Alzheimer's cure.


While experimenting with a drug that he hopes can cure his father's illness, he stumbles onto a formula that boosts ape IQ. After his work is deemed a failure, Will becomes the guardian of Caesar, an infant chimp who was exposed to Will's drug in utero. When Caesar displays unusual intelligence, Will decides to take him home and continues his experiments in secret. But as Caesar's intellect and abilities grow, he comes to represent a threat to man's dominion over Earth. As Caesar grows into a rough hard to control adolescent, he is put into a detention facility which is staffed by sadist, led by Dodge Landon, played by Tom Felton (Draco from the "Harry Potter" series, where he eventually starts a prison riot).

The king of motion-capture creatures, Andy Serkis (Gollum from "Lord of the Rings," "King Kong") portrays the genetically enhanced subject, Caesar, an ape with a killer attitude.

Along the way, Caesar enlists the help of Maurice, an orangutan who knows how to use sign language; and a chimp named Rocket.

John Lithgow ("Leap Year") plays Charles Rodman, Will's father, who suffers from dementia. Co-starring is Freida Pinto ("Slumdog Millionaire") as Caroline Aranha, a primatologist and Will's sweetheart; and Brian Cox ("Red") as John Landon, the other zoo keeper.

"Rise of the Planet of the Apes" is a grand science fiction adventure with a satisfying climax where a primate revolution is taking over the Golden Gate Bridge for an epic showdown of survival.






