
Soldiers from Echo Company

The native language dialogue erupting on a daily basis here in the civil-military office of Forward Operating Base Mehter Lam is often difficult to understand for U.S. service-members. However, U.S. Army Staff Sergeant Zachary Lewis is one soldier who does have a very clear understanding of the Pahsto language.

"At first, Afghans look at me with disbelief when I start speaking their language, but they quickly recover and help me learn new words and phrases," Lewis states.

Lewis continues to improve his language skills and hopes to have a higher level of fluency before the end of his tour. There is no doubt in anyone's mind that Lewis is truly impacting Laghman Province.
