As Maryland's Adjutant General and the senior leader of the Maryland National Guard, I would like to express my thanks to the local and state officials, first responders and the citizens of Maryland for their outpouring of appreciation for the Maryland National Guard during the recent record-breaking back-to-back snowstorms.

Approximately 700 men and women of the Maryland Army and Air National Guard were activated for state active duty by Governor O'Malley and deployed to assist state and local authorities by rescuing stranded motorists, transporting firemen and equipment to fight fires, transferring severely injured and sick patients to medical treatment facilities, and transporting first responder

Maryland National Guard Helps State 'Dig Out'

■he weekend before Christmas. a massive snowstorm blew through the Northeast bringing Guardmembers from seven states out in force to help their fellow citizens during the largest snowfall so far this winter.

In Maryland, more than 140 Guardmembers were on duty over the weekend, but that number dropped to 19 by Monday. About 46 Humvees and five ambulances were used throughout the state. A state of emergency was declared in the state.

"The majority of the requests we received during the snowstorm were to support local and state law enforcement agencies," said Brig. Gen. James A. Adkins, adjutant general of Maryland. "Use of our Humvees ensured that first responders were able to get where they needed to go to provide critical services to the citizens of

Maryland."

The snowstorm was the latest illustration of the Maryland National Guard's unique state role in support of emergency first responders in addition to its federal war-fighting role. In recent years, The Maryland Guard

has been called on to support the emergency response and relief efforts for Hurricanes including Isabel, Katrina, Rita and Gustav, in addition to the President's Day Snowstorm, the LaPlata Tornado and other emergen-

ollowing the Feb. 5 declared state of emergency by Governor Martin O'Malley, approximately 200 Maryland National Guardmembers along with 60 vehicles became available to support local first responders throughout the sytate of Maryland.

"Even though we have approximately 500 people deployed in Iraq and Afghanistan, we still have plenty of forces back here to respond," said Brig. Gen. James A. Adkins, the adjutant general of Maryland. "We can up that number if needed."

As transportation becomes more of a challenge throughout this snowstorm, these Guardmembers will assist civil authorities, such as police

and medical personnel, to carry out their duties.

Maryland has 34 armories across the state that will also be used to support ongoing operations.

"I just want to thank the families of those that wear the uniform," said Adkins. "They're not able to be home to shovel the sidewalks. They're going to be out here supporting the citizens of Maryland under the direction of the governor."

way through the blowing snow and was within one mile of my home when I was blocked by a large snow drift across the road.

When I tried to reverse course and find a different way I became stuck on the icy road, unable to move. I contacted the Baltimore County Fire Department, who had a Humvee assigned to the Pikesville Fire Station, to see if they could pull me out.

The Humvee crew, Spc. Nicholas Rosado and Spc. Scott Kreiner, manning unit Charlie 175 from the 58th Brigade Combat Team, performed in an outstanding manner. The soldiers braved the blowing snow and 4-5 foot drifts to help find a solution to my predicament.

They worked eagerly and tirelessly to help me get free and made sure I made it home safely. Being at MEMA for the last two weeks, it was difficult to understand what the troops in the field were facing as we sat in the warm SEOC. But now I can truly appreciate what the soldiers did and how much they helped their communities.

Thank you for all The Guard does for the State of Maryland.

O'Malley Thanks Road Crews, Emergency Responders, National Guard for Storm Response

NNAPOLIS, MD (February 11, 2010) -Governor Mar-Lin O'Malley today praised state and local road crews, emergency responders and members of the Maryland National Guard for their round-the-clock efforts during the two historic snow storms during this past week. The two storms combined dumped as much as 50 inches of snow in some parts of the state.

"For nearly one solid week, thousands of men and women in Maryland stepped forward to help their fellow citizens get through this historic weather event," said Governor O'Malley. "Road crews worked with very little sleep to continuously plow our roads in conditions they had never seen before. Emergency responders and the Maryland National Guard braved deep snow and blizzard conditions to rescue stranded motorists, deliver supplies and get those in need of medical care to area hospitals. No matter how bad things got, they never gave up. These are the true heroes of the 'Blizzard of 2010' and Maryland is very proud of each and every one of them."

Recovery from the double dose of winter weather picked up momentum once the snow stopped this evening. State road crews will continue to plow the interstates and major highways with the goal of reclaiming lanes for traffic as soon as possible. However, it will take several days to get down to bare pavement on roads throughout the state. It could take several weeks to totally remove the piles of snow that have been plowed to the side of the road.

Local jurisdictions also will be

working on county and municipal roads and residential streets. Governments across the state face a huge challenge in removing this massive amount of snow.

"Despite the tireless work of road crews and the best efforts of local elected officials to manage snow removal efforts, citizens need to appreciate the magnitude of this storm and how challenging it will be to remove this much snow," added Governor O'Malley. "This is not your basic Maryland snowfall of five to seven inches followed by a return to bare pavement in less than 24 hours. This will take time, both at the state and local level. We appreciate the patience and understanding of our citizens as all of us work as hard and as fast as we can to recover."









The Maryland Meritorious Service Medal was presented today to 8 Soldiers who served on state active duty during this weekend's snowstorm. The actions recognized today ranged from delivering a baby to giving CPR to heart attack victims to assisting trauma patients. "Operation Snowflake" involved more than 500 members of the Maryland Army National Guard who provided support to the state of Maryland and several local jurisdictions.

Guardmembers Rescue Stranded Motorist During Snow Emergency

howing the National Guard's strength and capabilities during emergencies such as the massive snowstorm currently hitting the Mid Atlantic region, a team of Maryland National Guardmembers rescued a stranded motorist Feb. 6.

The HUMVEE with Maryland National Guardmembers came upon Baltimore resident David Page's vehicle at approximately 8:00 a.m.

Page had been stuck in his car for hours, according to Lt. Col. Charles Kohler, Maryland National Guard public affairs officer. Snowplows had obviously come through multiple times and piled up snow around his car on both sides, making it almost impossible for him to get out.

"There were several vehicles which were abandoned on the roads, and we were checking them all to make sure that everybody was ok," said Kohler.

The Guardmembers gave Page food and water and transported him to a warm location where he was able to call family members to let them know he was safe.

The Maryland National Guard currently has 117 HUMVEEs on the road assisting local emergency responders as the state reacts to the largest snowfall since the 2003.

Maryland Army National Guard assists first responders in Baltimore

While many residents of Baltimore spent the first weekend in February staying indoors and out of the snow, dozens of Maryland Army National Guardmembers moved throughout the city, teaming up with first responders to keep things safe.

The Maryland National Guard assisted the community in a variety of ways, from rescuing stranded motorists and removing vehicles stuck in the snow, to quickly transporting medical, police and fire personnel in Humvees, to respond to emergency calls.

Many of these situations, such as aggravated assaults and roof collapses, can be serious and time-sensitive.

Baltimore City Police officer, Joe

Crystal, one of the officers assisted by Guardmembers, expected the weather to result in increased domestic violence.

"Domestic violence, for the city, is a very big deal and big problem," explained Crystal.

Referring to a recent domestic violence call, Crystal said he would have never gotten there without Maryland National Guardmembers. "Somebody could have ended up getting killed, or the situation could have escalated. Essentially, you stopped a bigger crime from happening."

In addition to transporting city workers to a number of critical calls, Guardmembers helped to make the roads more accessible by helping Baltimore residents whose vehicles were stuck in the snow.

"We can't tow people," said Sgt.
Troy K. Mitchell, a Maryland Guardmember with the state's Joint Force
Headquarters. "Even though my vehicle is strong enough and could tow
vehicles out, there's a liability issue.
Basically, it's been a brute strength
effort and people pulling together to
help."

Soldiers like Mitchell have worked around the clock since Friday to provide a presence in the community.

"We get a lot of thumbs up from the people that are on the street," said Mitchell. "They don't always see the police officer in the back, but they do understand this is a military vehicle. They give us a thumbs-up, and they're pretty amazed at how well the Humvee handles through the snow and ice."

Soldiers 'cut a road' to injured girl

he Maryland National Guard helped a seriously injured girl **get** the specialized care she needed during the fist weekend in February snowstorm, which pushed state emergency operations nearly to the limit.

Staff Sgt. Randy Runkles, assigned to the Maryland Army National Guard's Marksmanship Training Unit, was tasked to assist the Baltimore City Fire Department in transportation support with his Humvee ambulance when a call came in to transfer a 13-year-old girl with a broken back from Howard County General Hospital to Johns Hopkins University Hospital in Baltimore.

"They needed someone to run a critical care mission, so I set up the litter system in the 'ambo' and went with the EMT." said Runkles, who has experience transporting wounded Soldiers from overseas deployments with multiple Special Forces units.

First, however, they had to take members of the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit from Johns Hopkins to Howard County in order to safely transport the girl, who was injured in a car accident on Interstate 95.

"The roads hadn't been plowed, and we had to cut a road through the snow with the Humvee to get to Hopkins because the Fire Department's ambulance couldn't make it," said Runkles.

After picking up the PICU, Runkles drove them to Howard County General Hospital, where they picked up the girl and took her about 20 miles to Johns Hopkins, where she is currently in critical, but stable condi-

As of Monday, February 8, The Maryland National Guard had approximately 120 vehicles assigned to assist state emergency responders as the state recovers from Maryland's largest-ever snowstorm.
